Wheeler And Crowell In Area Game

The Wheeler Mustangs and the Crowell Wildcats both registered shutouts last Friday in their bi-district wins and something will have to give this Saturday night in Childress in the area game of the Class A football playoffs.

In what was considered an upset, the Wildcats defeated Muenster 14-0 to gain their trip to Childress to take on the state's # 3 ranked Wheeler Mustangs who blanked the Vega Longhorns 22-0.

No one has taken much notice of the

Wildcats during the regular season but while no one noticed, Crowell was fashioning a 10-1 record with their only loss in regular season play being to the Memphis Cyclones 34-22 and the Cyclones are in the playoffs and are one of the better AA clubs in the area.

The Wildcats are an entirely different ball club than the Mustangs faced last week in that they are capable of doing more things offensively as they not only have a great running attack out of the I formation but also have a good passing game. The Wildcats maybe aren't as tough as the Vega Longhorns were but overall have better athletes and are very explosive.

Vega is led by one of the better running backs the Mustangs have or will face in Gerald Dorsey, a 190 pound junior. "Dorsey is a great athlete and Crowell has the capability of getting touchdowns in a hurry with their offense," Coach Smith told the Mustangs Booster Club this week. He went on to say, "People have been overlooking Crowell but they have been hanging around the # 15 spot in the state all year and they showed what they can do in their win last week." Once more, Wheeler will be the visiting team and the south side of Bobcat Stadium will be theirs. The 7:30 kickoff Saturday night should see a big crowd as most of the other Panhandle teams have gone by the wayside in the playoffs except for the Memphis Cyclones. What more could fans want than to see an 11-0 team and a 11-1 team get together?

Perhaps it is a good omen, but the Mustangs have hit the playoffs in the best physical condition of the year and received no injuries in the hard hitting win over Vega.

MUSTANGS WIN BI-DISTRICT, 22-0

It was cold, windy and foggy in Pampa last Friday night but everything was right for the Wheeler Mustangs about 9:30 as the scoreboard read Wheeler 22, Vega 0 at the close of the first round playoff game between the Mustangs and the Longhorns.

Over 1200 fans braved the elements to witness the hard hitting contest on Harvester Field as the two bi-district entries fought it out toe to toe for four quarters.

Trailing 8-0 with 11 minutes still to play in the game and the strong south wind at their back's, Vega disdained punting and went for the first down from the Wheeler 44 needing 4 yards but came up a couple of yards shy and this could have been the big play of the game as the Mustangs drove 58 yards in just five plays for the clinching touchdown.

Dickie Salyer made a spinning run of 8 yards to paydirt and Richard Smith booted the extra point and Wheeler had a commanding 15-0 lead with 8:39 to play and the TD loomed large as Vega scored an apparent touchdown on a 65 yard pass and run play on first down after receiving the kickoff.

Quarterback Lynn Pulliam connected with Lawren Mason on a screen pass to his left and the Longhorn end cut back to the right and behind good blocking, raced into the end zone. An official noted a clip on a Longhorn at the Wheeler 45 and the touchdown was wiped out.

What was billed as a hard nosed game proved just that as the Longhorn

used their wishbone to run right at the Mustangs and the Mustangs in turn used the bull like rushes of Salyer as the wind effectively curtailed much passing. Both offenses ran into brick hard defenses and the Mustangs had to change their point of attack as nose guard Tim Vogler was a one man terror on defense.

"We knew Vogler was good but when he shut down our inside game to the right side with our tailback, we had to go somewhere else", Coach Preston Smith said. That somewhere else was the quick openers on the left side to Salyer and the Mustang responded with 141 yards on 24 carries.

Though the game was not really decided until the fourth quarter, the Mustangs had their chances to put the Longhorns away in the first quarter but three lost fumbles killed chances with the gusting wind to their backs. Wheeler took the wind to open the game and the choice appeared good as the Mustangs forced the Longhorns to punt four times against the wind but fumbles by Toby Collins, Salyer and Cody Wiggins blunted the offense.

Defense was really the name of this bi-district game and it was the Mustangs who stood the tallest when the chips were down, the Mustangs came through. "Our defense was tremendous and they had to be to beat a class ball club like Vega", Smith said. The head mentor of the Mustangs pointed out the outstanding play of his front four led by Ed Ellison and Danny DeBose and also lauded the play of linebackers Collins and

Charlie Miller and cornerback Robert Andis. "Charlie Miller played his best ball game of the year and Robert Andis just keeps getting better," Smith added.

Every scoring drive was made against the wind and the Mustangs first got on the scoreboard with a time consuming 80 yard drive in the second quarter that took 14 plays and Collins bulled over left tackle, away from Vogler, and Wheeler led by 8-0 when Vega jumped offsidelines on the PAT kick and the Mustangs opted for the two pointer and Salyer got it.

Having only made one first down in the first half, Vega took the second half kickoff and pounded inside for a first down at the Wheeler 8 yard line. Collins probably made a touchdown saving tackle when he nailed Pulliam at the 8 and the Mustangs really had to dig in. Vogler was held to a yard and Pulliam was dropped for no gain. The Longhorns decided to go outside for the first time in the 15 play drive but first Scott Howard and then Pulliam were thrown for losses and

the Mustangs had held.

Vega only threatened one time the remainder of the way and lost that on the choice not to punt.

Just over three minutes were left in the game and Wheeler started their last scoring drive when they took over at the Vega 42. The drive that looked like it was going to run the clock out without scoring was led by the keepers of quarterback Randall Hugg. In fact, Hugg was the Mustangs second leading ground gainer of the night as he picked up 76 yards. From the Vega 8, the Mustangs were flagged for delay of game and one second showed on the clock as Collins swept left end on the option pitch into the end zone and the Mustangs awaited the results of the Crowell - Muenster game.

Show Stock To Be

Validated Dec. 7

Saturday, December 7, is a very important date for all Wheeler County 4-H and FFA members who plan to exhibit livestock in the Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show. All of the lambs, hogs, and steers that are to be shown in the county stock show must be validated on that day to be eligible, according to Don King, County Extension Agent.

The animals must be brought to the county show barn at Wheeler between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. to be ear-tagged and classified. Steers that were ear-tagged in June do not have to be brought in unless they are to be shown in the English Breeds & Crosses division. Hereford, Angus, and Shorthorn steers not classified that day will be shown with the other Breeds and Crosses.

King also wishes to remind 4-H showmen that they must be enrolled by December 1, to be eligible to show a 4-H project in the county show. Anyone wishing to enroll in 4-H may contact the county Extension office at 826-5243.

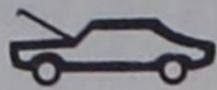

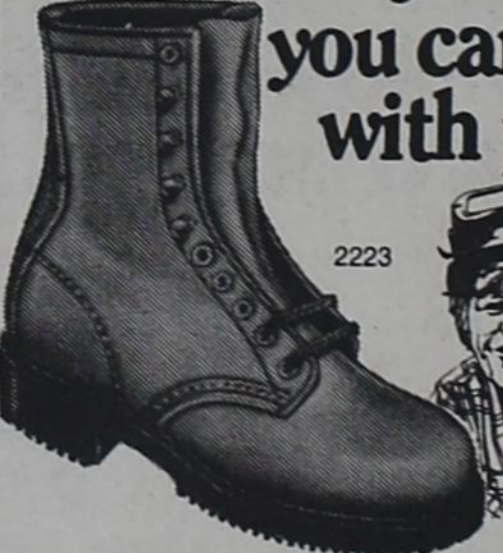

Area Catholics Prepare For Christmas

As the First Sunday of Advent arrives on December 1st, Catholics and many other Christians in the area and thru out the world will be lighting the first candle of their Advent Wreath.

The Advent Wreath pictured above dates back to ancient celebrations of the winter solstice—that time of year when the sun reaches its southernmost point in the heavens and the days are the darkest and most gloomy. Because they longed for the return of the sun's light and life, the ancients stopped all usual activity, sacrificed the use of their wagon wheels and hung them up, decorated with lights and gleams in their celebration halls.

There they waited the return of their sun-god, thinking of the warmth and life he brought. Celebrations culminated in the "nativity" of the sun—the turning point of the year. As Christians and Catholics, we use the same meaningful custom to anticipate the feast of light and life: the Nativity of the Savior. We add one light on the wreath for each Sunday in Advent—the four Sundays preceding Christmas. We think of the darkness after Adam's sin and watch the growing hope and light as the prophets and the Virgin help us prepare for His Saving Birth.

The Light of Christ can not shine into hearts that are darkened with obstacles. So Area Catholics will be invited to participate in individual penitential services during Advent which will help them ask the Lord for forgiveness and help them open themselves more fully to the light of Christ. Traditionally the Candles on the Advent Wreath were purple as a symbol of penitence.

Today, reflecting the joyful anticipation of December, four red candles are often used around the outside and a white candle as a symbol for Christ is placed in the center. On Christmas Day, the "Christ Candle" is lighted towering above the other four which are also lighted but have been consumed by the burning in preparation during the four weeks of Advent Preparation.

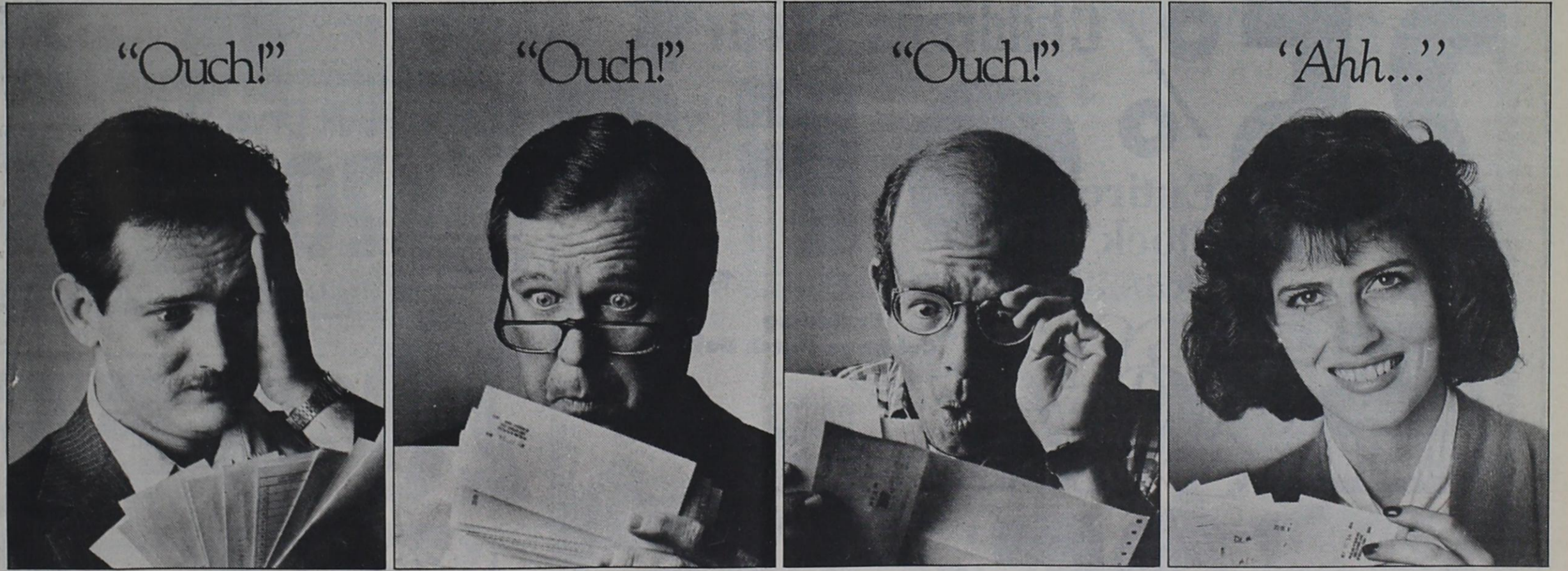

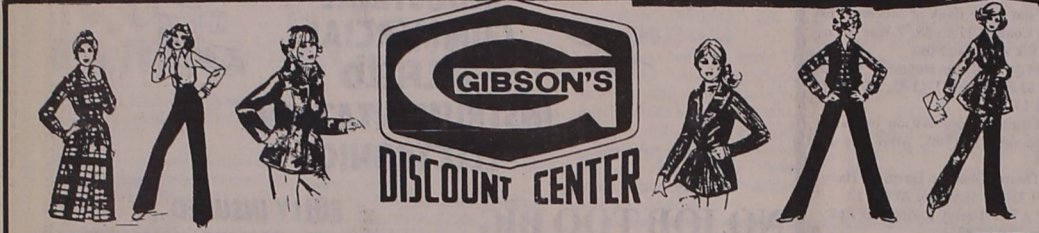
