Boarded Up After Accident

RUN-AWAY TRUCK HEAVILY DAMAGES LOCAL RESIDENCE

The home of Johnny and Donna Velasquez was heavily damaged Monday by a run-away tractor trailer. The residence, located at 300 East Eleventh in Wheeler was struck at 6:15 Monday morning by an 18-wheeler without a driver. No estimate of the damage was available at press time.

A tractor and trailer, filled with grain, was parked at 100 W. Eleventh rolled from its parking spot. The

trailer was parked the night before by Virgil Simmons at his residence. For some unknown reason, the vehicle began to roll; as it crossed Main Street and down Eleventh, it sheared an electrical pole at the alley in the 100 block of Eleventh. It crossed Alan L. Bean Blvd—Highway 83, narrowly missing two automobiles traveling on the highway. The rolling disaster left tire marks on the curb as it crossed the corner of the Albert Chapman lawn and over the concrete waterway at that corner. Continuing down the street, the Arkla Gas vehicle parked in front of the Von Chapman residence at 202 E. Eleventh was rear-ended and heavily damaged. After crossing the lawn and drive of the Velasquez residence the truck went through the north wall of the brick home.

The Velasquez couple and their three children were asleep when the tractor struck the house. Their first concern was the children. Gathering up the family in the house filled with dust and dark, the family made their way to the front door, afraid of a second 'explosion'. They were shocked to find a trailer filled with grain across the front walk.

The Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance Service was called to the scene; the crew was relieved to find the family unhurt and the cab of the truck empty.

The front of the tractor went through the kitchen wall, pushing in 15 or so feet of the wall. The cabinets were ripped from the wall and the appliances destroyed.

The 18-wheeler was pulled from the house and work began to close the wall of the house. Several sheets of plywood were used to cover the hole.

This is the second time a truck parked at this location has rolled down Eleventh. The first time, the truck traveled across Main Street and struck the rear corner of a car parked at the residence of Lowell Thomas. The truck then 'jack-knifed' and stopped, blocking the street until it was moved.

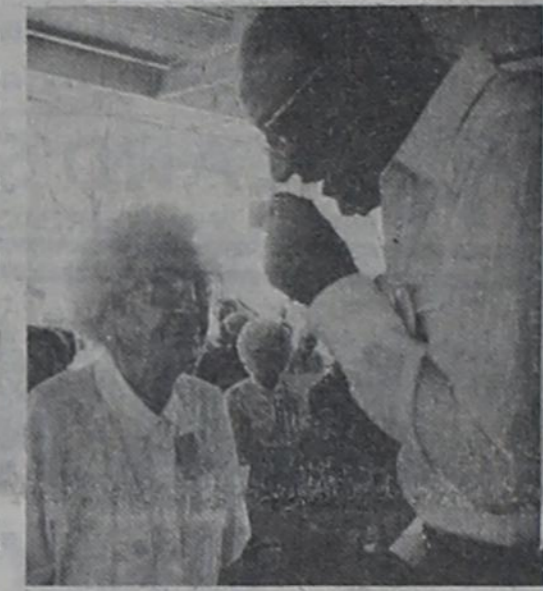
Wheeler County Second At Tri-State Rodeo

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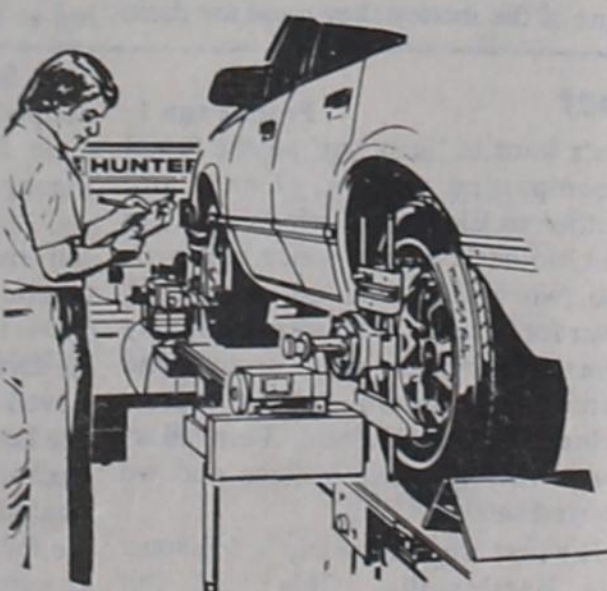

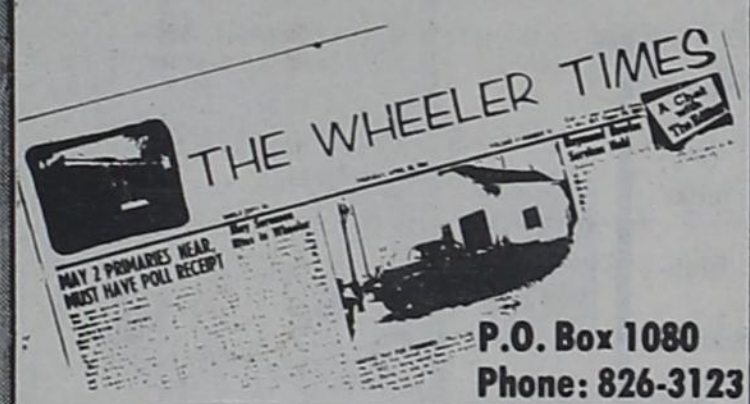

Automatic waterers are located throughout the building and the feed is moved into the feeders by an auger system. The barns are filled with turkeys year round; body heat keeps the building around 60 degrees in the coldest of weather.

The meeting was called to order by Herman Lowery. Johnnie Reed made a motion that Thomas Helton be nominated for president and Gary Miller Vice-President at the same time; Herman Lowery second the motion and they were elected unanimously.

Mr. Helton then took charge of the meeting as new President. The minutes of the last meeting was read and approved as read. Since Mr. Riley's illness Herman Lowery had been caring for the cemetery until he hired Dwayne Bradford as foreman and an assistant. Dwayne Bradford was paid \$7.00 per hour and the helper \$4.00 an hour. The cemetery is in pretty good condition now except they are still trimming around curbs and stones. Mr. Lowery announced there was a lot of improvements that needed to be made and he had a list of needs as follows: riding mower needs overhauling at a cost of about, \$150.00. One push mower needs work done on it, no mowing can be done until the mowers are repaired so it was agreed to buy two new push mowers and one week eater. The old weedeater is worn out not repairable. Other things were named that is needed a small tiller to clean around curbs and stones; guards on corners of road to prevent cars bumping into curbs, a work shed is needed to repair and clean the machines as needed. All of these needs were agreed upon by the members but the income from dues and sale of lots is not sufficient to meet the rising cost of everything and labor. There was a necessity to raise dues thus, the 2.50 to 3.50 the 3.75 to 4.75; 6.25 to 7.75 and the 12.50 to 15.50 for the new year beginning in January 1986. The perpetual fund is \$100.00 per lot, if paid the lots will be cared for from now on. All new rates will begin in 1986 lots raised from 0.00 to \$90.00 and the 60.00 lots raised to \$80.00 for two persons.

It was suggested that the salary of the secretary be raised to help meet rising cost and that was agreed unanimously, to pay her \$100.00 per mo. instead of \$62.50. As the cost of labor, supplies and machines has increased so much the income has to be raised or the cost of upkeep cannot be met.

We hope that this will be satisfactory to all the patrons and the entire community at large as it is a project for all of us to care for, and we are sure everyone wants to have a beautiful cemetery and well cared for. Much effort has been put forth the last few years to be sure it is kept clean and one we can feel proud of.

The last item brought up was for another director and Bobby Vanpool was nominated and voted on unanimously and when asked if he would accept he consented. The meeting was adjourned at 5:45.

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
