Before being beaten last week by the number one ranked team in Class 3-A in Oklahoma, the Hobart Bearcats were ranked number one in Class 2-A in the same state and they just happen

to be the Mustangs opponent this Friday night. Hobart signed a home and home agreement with the Mustangs after Wheeler's opponent for this week,

Alamo Catholic of Amarillo, cancelled and Hobart lost an opponent for the same reason. Wheeler brings a 2-0 record into the contest after a shaky home opener win

last week over rival Shamrock and is still carrying the mantle of #1 in Class A this week but will face the Bearcats without their all star Dicky Salyer. Not only will Salyer miss this game but he is out for the season after sustaining a knee injury in the second quarter of the Shamrock game and had surgery to correct the injury on Tuesday.

"You don't lose a player of Dicky's caliber without it hurting your ball club no matter what class you are in but we will just hook it up and get with Hobart and the rest of the teams on our schedule," Coach Preston Smith said this week after learning of Dicky's being lost for the year. "We've got good kids and they will respond to this O.K.," Smith added.

Losing Salyer could force some changes from last week in the Mustangs lineup but Smith and his staff probably won't know just what changes will be made until after preparations for Hobart are complete.

Hobart, like the Mustangs, were derailed in the state playoffs last year and lost heavily to graduation but with their large high school enrollment, the Bearcats return a lot of experience.

In scouting the Bearcats in their loss to Clinton last Friday night, the Mustangs coaches reported that Hobart doesn't have a much bigger ball club than the Mustangs and don't possess a lot of speed but they just line up and come at you for four quarters. The Bearcats lost their starting quarterback also to injury and he probably won't play against Wheeler.

Kickoff is at 8 P.M. and a big following is expected from Hobart as ranked teams in their respective classes in their respective states clash on Nicholson Field.

SHAPELINESS RETURNS FOR FALL FASHIONS

Clothing for fall 1986 emphasizes the female shape -- a shape very different from the popular reed-thin look of the past years. The return to shapeliness manifests itself in a relaxed silhouette that combines a sense of the body with a sense of ease. Clothes are close to the body, but not skin-tight.

Many of this fall's soft simple shapes could almost be mistaken for styles of a few decades ago. As the Soap and Detergent Association points out, however, these feminine fashions are quintessentially 1980's; the fabrics and prints involved in the designs are often bright, bold and heavily textured.

The focus for '86 is on a narrowed waist and rounded hips. To emphasize the hips, some designers drape or wrap the fabric around the mid-section. Others resort to peplum jackets. But perhaps the most unusual emphasis is made by changing the texture or print of the material around the hips. Many sweaters and skirts have ribbing over the hips to attract the eye to that part of the body.

Sweaters, in general, are big news, as are all knits. After all, no other material reveals curves so well. Figure-hugging knit dresses that start with a turtleneck and end mid-calf should be everyone's wardrobe staple. Top these tubular garbs with a bulky, boldly printed cardigan and the look is complete.

Another fashion must is the pull-over that reaches mid-thigh and is worn over skin-tight stirrup pants. The bolder the graphic print on the sweater, the better.

All-cotton sweaters in solids, cables and fleece are gaining in popularity. Cotton has become an important category in knitwear and understandably so when one of its many attributes is ease of care, namely, machine washing and drying.

Some extraordinary looks are evident -- tweeds and mohair sweaters with metallic accents, for example. Body suits are back as are all form-fitting sweaters. Both can be topped with huge sweaters or jackets cinched at the waist. And the new feminine look can be carried further with synthetic pile knits, an item that will be very visible this year.

The fitted jacket that extends below the hips, sometimes to just above the knee, is an important hit as well. These jackets are worn over tight skirts or classic trousers. Metallic accents and military cuts are possible fashion twists, as are nubby tweed materials or sparse collarless designs that require cutting and darting for flair.

Other styles include: Peplum jackets to emphasize the hips; short tight jackets that fasten at the waist; boxy or fitted boleros to draw attention to the bosom; as well as tuxedo, vest-peaked and asymmetrical designs.

Jackets can be worn over a mini-skirt for a suited effect, or over long full skirts for a more romantic look.

The long full skirt is more extreme than it has ever been since the fifties. Some versions form a flat circle when extended. Lengths vary from mid-calf to just above the ankle. The full skirt has not chased away the long straight skirt, however.

Aside from wool, both denim and corduroy will be adding a new dimension to the fashion scene. These fabrics are not necessarily just for casual wear.

In denim, the colors black, grey and white and the bright brights are important as are geometric prints, dobby patterns and woven textures. Even metallic prints and shiny denim are in evidence. So be sure to read the label on the garment for care instructions.

For corduroy, bright colors prevail, and a shimmering new finish is an exciting fashion option while wide wales create a new corduroy texture.

Color this year will be a spectrum of baroque shades -- will suited to fashion's newly-found classicism. Deep jeweled browns, reds and greens form the lower end of the palette, replacing black for the most part. Navy is the dark influence of '86. Blues, mauves and brown and

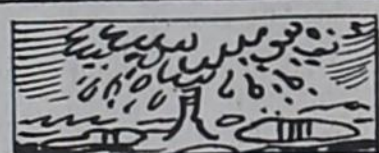

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1986

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Currently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment would also eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 78 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."

The comment period was extended because of the complex issues involved in implementation of the new provisions.
