Newland Named To Sports Hall Of Fame

[Editor's Note: The following article was taken from the alumni newsletter of William Penn College in Oskaloosa, Iowa.]

On Saturday, October 11th, as part of Homecoming, William Penn College inducted ten former athletes as charter members of the Sports Hall of Fame. These individuals were recognized for their outstanding athletic achievements and the contributions they have made to their profession and to the life of the College.

This is the second year of the Sports Hall of Fame. The first two years have been used to establish the charter membership with ten athletes being selected each year. In subsequent years, five athletes will be inducted.

Induction ceremonies were conducted during half-time of the William Penn-Central football game at the Oskaloosa Community Stadium on Saturday, October 11th.

Janis Irby Newland completed her

undergraduate degree at William Penn in 1976. She was the College's first woman athlete to receive All-American honors when she was named to the 1975 Kodak All-American Basketball Team. In her three years of varsity competition at Penn, she led the basketball team into the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women national tournament each year. During her senior year, she led the team in scoring and rebounding and was second in assists. Since graduation, Newland has taught and coached in Eddyville and is currently in Wheeler, Texas.

Under Newland's direction the Mustangettes have been district champions since 1983. Her 1985 & 1986 teams advanced to the Regional tournament in Levelland.

Texas Ranger Buried Monday; Stan Guffey Is Canadian Native

Texas Ranger Stan Guffey was buried Monday in Brady. The ranger died in a shootout during the rescue of a 2-year-old girl kidnapped Thursday. Guffey and his partner hid in the back of an auto which was to be used by the kidnapper to escape; as the child was placed in the front seat, the criminal spotted the troopers and shot Trooper Guffey in the head. Guffey's partner returned fire and killed the kidnapper.

Guffey was a 1965 graduate of Canadian High School. He was a member of the Department of Public Safety for 11 years before attaining his life's ambition to join the Texas Rangers in 1979.

The DPS Memorial Cross, the highest honor given to DPS officers was presented to Guffey's wife. The cross is reserved for those, like Guffey, who died in the line of duty.

A wake for Guffey was held Sunday evening at Colonial Funeral Home in Brady. The funeral was Monday at the Sunset Ridge Church of Christ in Brady. Burial was in the Resthaven Cemetery in Brady.

Guffey is survived by his wife, Josey; four sons, Mike of Lubbock, Stacy of the U.S. Navy and Christopher and Travis both of Brady; his father, M. F. Guffey of Wheeler; his mother, Willora of Canadian; his stepmother, Laverta of Wheeler; two sisters, Linda Ivey of Wheeler and

Brenda Perrin of Canadian; and two stepsisters, Donna Curtis and Denise Carroll, both of Hereford.

FmHA Accepting Loan Applications

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought, hail, high winds, excessive rain, flooding, early frost and freezing weather which occurred January 1, through November 12, 1986 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Wheeler, FmHA County Supervisor, John D. Wolf III said today.

Wheeler County is one of 26

counties in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the named disaster.

Mr. Wolf said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business for \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Wolf said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until August 31, 1987 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Wolf said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. Citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest. The FmHA office in Wheeler is open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

New Service For Cancer Patients

The Amarillo Unit of the American Cancer Society, in conjunction with Amarillo hotels and motels, has created a new service for cancer patients.

The Guestroom Program is a cooperative effort that provides complimentary housing for needy cancer patients and their family members who come to Amarillo from the outlying areas of the Texas Panhandle, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Kansas for treatment, reported Debrah Powell S.W., volunteer coordinator for the Guestroom Program.

"The program was designed to ease the physical, emotional, and financial hardships that occur when a patient has to travel great distances for treatment," said Ms. Powell.

The American Cancer Society is working with twelve hotels and motels who have agreed to participate in the program. Qualified patients stay in only one hotel which is selected on a rotating basis.

"Cancer patients undergoing radiation therapy may need up to six weeks of housing," added Ms. Powell. "The hotels have been very generous to donate the rooms for the needed time period."

Ms. Powell stated that a review committee evaluates each case to ensure proper placement and need. Two days advanced notice is needed to coordinate placement with the participating hotels.

Hotels and motels participating in the A.C.S. Guestroom program include the Sheraton Hotel of Amarillo, Quality Inn-Westgate, Quality Inn-East, Amerisuites, Amarillo Hilton, Hampton Inn, La Quita Inn-Coulter, Texian Inn, Parks Inn International, Holiday Inn, Days Inn, and the Big Texan Motel.

HIB Immunization

Question:

Doctor, I noticed in your column several weeks ago that you recommended a new vaccination for children that are about 2 years old. Can you remind me of what immunization this is and should my children be immunized?

Answer:

Two years ago, it became the current recommendation to give all children between the ages of 2 and 5 the HIB immunization. HIB stands for Haemophilus Influenza B. This is a bacteria that causes many infections in children, including meningitis, skin, bone and joint infections, pneumonia, epiglottitis, and ear infections. Unfortunately, this immunization will not prevent ear infections, but it will decrease the chance of these other infections when caused by HIB. So, every child between the ages of 2 and 5 that hasn't received this immunization should be taken to your physician for this very important preventative measure.

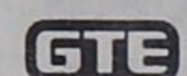

WORK AT HOME SCHEMES—PUT MONEY IN SOMEONE ELSE'S POCKET AND COULD EARN YOU TIME IN JAIL

Each year the American public loses millions of dollars through fraudulent schemes operated through the United States Mails. With the increase of unemployment, especially in the oil related industries, work at home promotions have become more prevalent. These promotions are aimed at the elderly, shut-ins, the unemployed, and house wives who want to supplement their family income.

Work at home fraud schemes such as envelope stuffing, home addressing, and multi-level marketing sales distributorships always include "opportunities" to earn an unusually high income with relatively small investment and with little or no effort on the part of the customer, and in most cases, by someone they've never even met. They are usually schemes to sell the plan to do the work rather than doing the work itself, and no one has ever become wealthy through such schemes.

Any promotion where the success of any operator (regardless of whether "a product" is offered) depends on recruiting people to recruit more people, etc., to participate in the program is an endless chain of pyramid. These are forms of lottery and violate the Postal Lottery Statute.

There are three elements of a lottery -- consideration, prize, and chance. In typical work at home promotions involving stuffing envelopes, the consideration is usually called an "application or introduction fee" or could be the price of a "startup kit." Consideration in multi-level marketing schemes is the money paid to a promoter in order for the participant to become a distributor and to recruit new distributors. The prize is always the promised "big money" that can be made quickly after the promotion has progressed several levels, and the chance is that investors will not initial investments much less earn the "big money" prize. In fact, the chance that all participants will receive mail is mathematically impossible. If a scheme requires participants to mail to six

The U.S. Postal Inspection Service, who investigates mail fraud and Postal Lottery Statute violations, says that promoters as well as participants in work at home fraud schemes can be found in violation of Federal law even if they did not realize the promotion was illegal when they first got into it. If you receive information about a work-at-home promotion you feel may be in violation of the law, turn it in to your Postmaster or mail it to the Postal Inspector in Charge, P.O. Box 162929, Fort Worth, TX 76161-2929. Remember, if it sounds too good to be true -- it probably is.

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PROSM TEXAS A NEW OPTIONAL CALLING PLAN FROM AT&T

On November 13, 1986 AT&T Communications of The Southwest, Inc. ("AT&T") filed with the Public Utility Commission (PUC) of Texas to introduce a new intrastate, optional calling plan, PRO Texas. A comparable interstate plan, known as PROSM America, is currently available to Texas customers.

PRO Texas gives Texas consumers an opportunity to save money on direct dialed in-state long distance calls. Customers who choose this new AT&T plan will receive a 10% discount on all AT&T intrastate direct dialed station calls by paying a monthly charge of \$15.00.

The PRO Texas discount applies to calls placed during all rate periods and all days. The discount is in addition to the AT&T intrastate evening discount of 25% and the night/weekend discount of 40%. A one time charge of \$6.00 will be billed to initiate the service. However, this charge will be waived during the first 90 days that the offering is available.

PRO Texas will be available to all Message Telephone Service customers in Texas. AT&T estimates that it will generate revenues in the first year of almost \$8 million, which is .7% of AT&T's annual revenues for all Texas intrastate service.

The PUC has assigned Docket No. 7194 to this proposed service offering. The proposed effective date for PRO Texas is March 16, 1987. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the PUC as soon as possible. 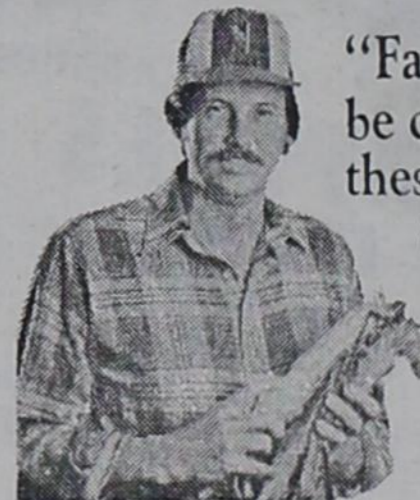
