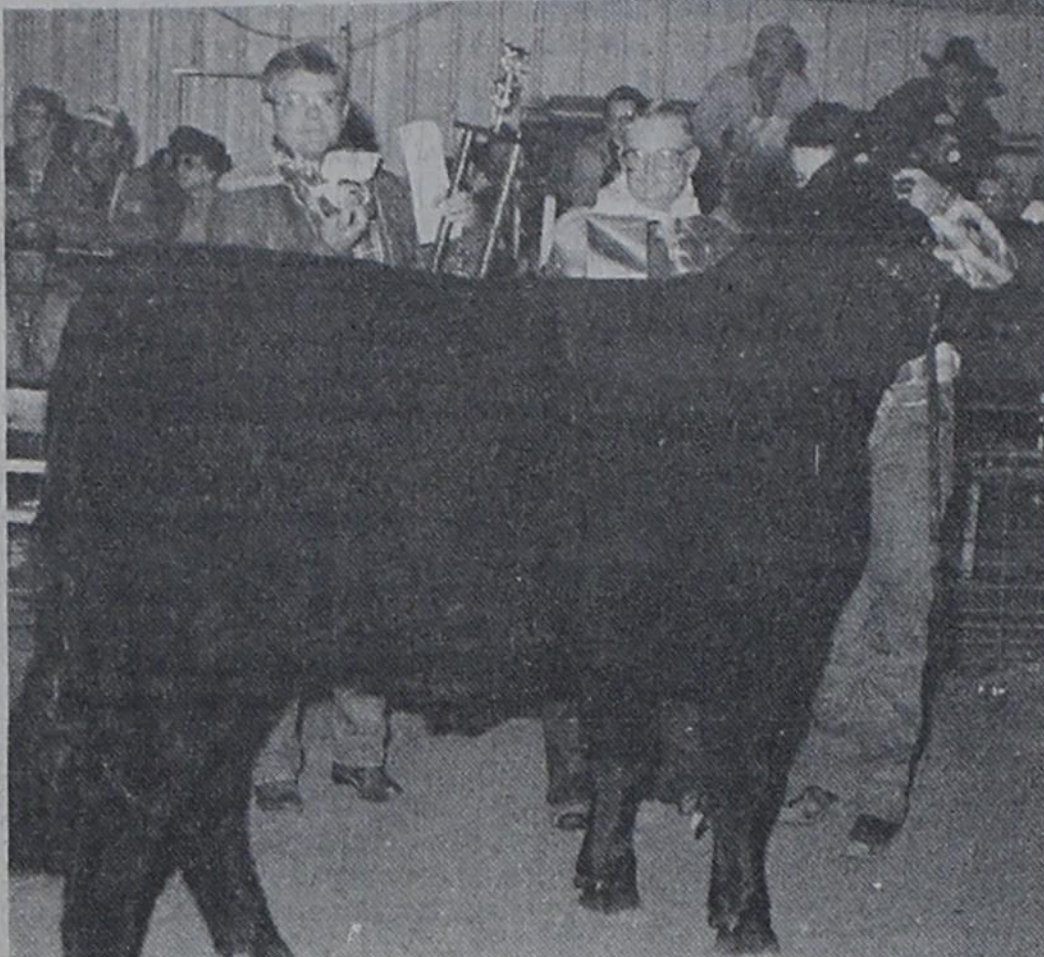

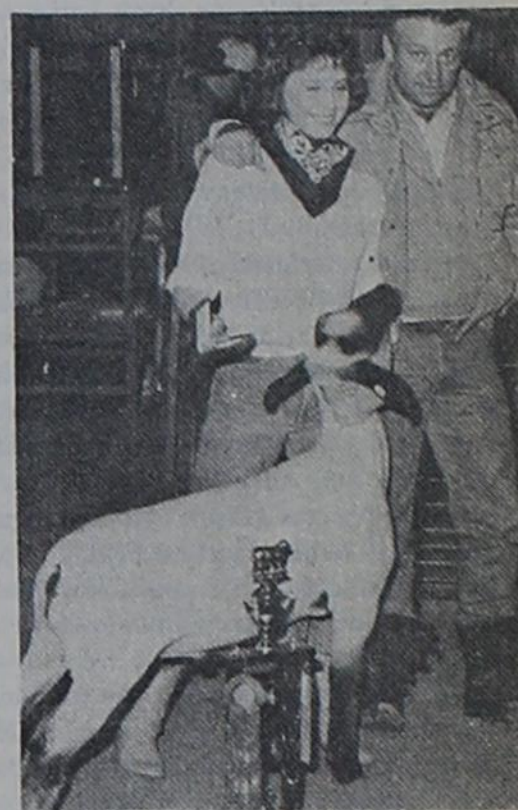

**What's Up Doc?**

Fever

Question:

Doctor, my child recently had a virus and experienced fever to 104 degrees. My neighbors suggested a cold bath and an alcohol sponge bath. After these, I found his fever had risen to 105 degrees. What should I do for my child next time he has fever?

Answer:

There are several things that can be done and several things that should be avoided. If your child has a bacterial infection, rather than viral, antibiotics should be given. These take at least 48 hours to begin to work on an infection. After that time, other methods of lowering a fever should be avoided, to see if the antibiotic is working. Before 48 hours, all of the other methods should be employed.

Tylenol (not aspirin) should be given every 4 hours. A small child should not be wrapped in too many clothes. These then to hold heat in and keep the fever up. Cold baths make the skin cold and cause the body to chill and make the temperature rise. Alcohol sponge baths also chill the skin and cause fever to worsen.

So, things to do include tylenol and light clothing. Things to avoid include heavy clothing, cold baths, and alcohol wipes, for a high fever, always consult your physician.

**Poisonous Snake Bite**

Question:

Doctor, what should I do if I or a friend is bitten by a poisonous snake?

Answer:

There are a lot of myths surrounding first aid for poisonous snake bites. There are some very simple rules to follow. First, pack the wound in ice. Ice packs can never make the skin too cold. A loose tourniquet should be applied above the wound (between the wound and the body.) Then, see your doctor immediately.

Some things should be avoided. NEVER cut a wound or attempt to extract venom. More amputations are done for severe infections resulting from cutting the wound than for any other reason in snake bite victims. Do not apply a tight tourniquet.

After arriving at the hospital, there are two major methods of treatment. Doctors are divided on which is best. The conventional treatment consists of an injection of anti-venom. This results in a relatively short hospital stay. The newer and safest treatment involves a fasciotomy (surgery to open the affected muscle compartments and remove the dead muscle). There is a fairly high percentage of patients that have severe reactions to anti-venom resulting in death. Almost never do patients die from this surgery. Surgery must be done in the first four hours to result in best outcomes.

So, don'ts of snake bites (poisonous) include cutting the wound, extracting venom, tight tourniquets, and delay in medical care.

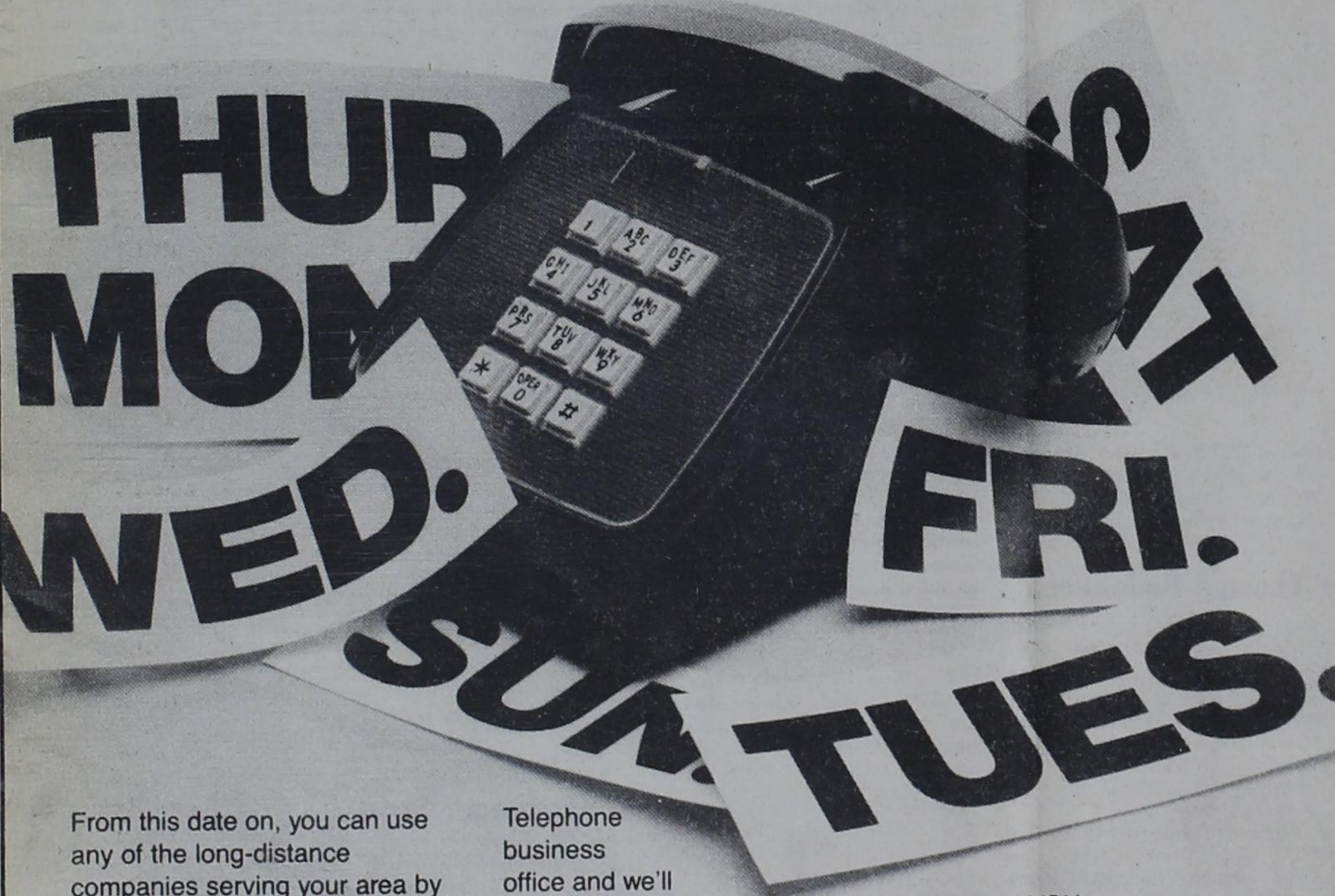
Do's include ice, loose tourniquets, and immediate medical care.

Freeze syrup from canned fruit to make a sauce for gingerbread, coffee cake or nut bread.

## Area Schools Plan Required School Board Training

The Texas School Reform Act, known as House Bill 72, charged the State Board of Education with the responsibility of developing rules that provided for the training of local school district board members. In April of 1986, the State Board adopted such rules and has given local school

districts the mandate of implementing the training. Statewide Standards on duties of school board members were developed and the training is based upon these standards. The State Board Rules specify that each board member currently holding office as well as those members that will be elected in the April 4, 1987 election shall receive 20 hours of training before the call for the 1988 school board election. In addition, the rule provides that 50% or 10 hours of the training is to be developed and presented by persons not directly employed or affiliated with the board members' local district. Upon the completion of this initial 20 hours of training, each member is to receive a minimum of 6 additional hours annually. The rule directs the local board president to "...cause the minutes of the local board to reflect the board members who have and have not completed the required training and shall make this information available to the local media."

Area schools (consisting of Alanreed, Allison, Briscoe, Kelton, Lela, McLean, Miami, Mobeetie, Samnorwood, Shamrock, and Wheeler) in a cooperative effort with Region XVI Education Service Center have planned the 10 hour session for April 27-28, 1987 in Shamrock at the school cafeteria. The sessions are to begin at 4:00 p.m. and end at 10:00 p.m. each day. The program has been developed and will be presented by the Region XVI Service Center staff members. Shamrock was selected as the central site to ease the burdens of travel, time, and costs. It is important that candidates for positions on the local school boards remember that this training will be required if they are elected.

The additional 10 hours needed to complete the mandated 20 hours will be obtained by board members at local sessions or by attending workshops and conventions. Some members of area school boards have already attended sessions that will qualify for credit in this area.

Persons requiring further information should contact the superintendent's office of their respective school district.

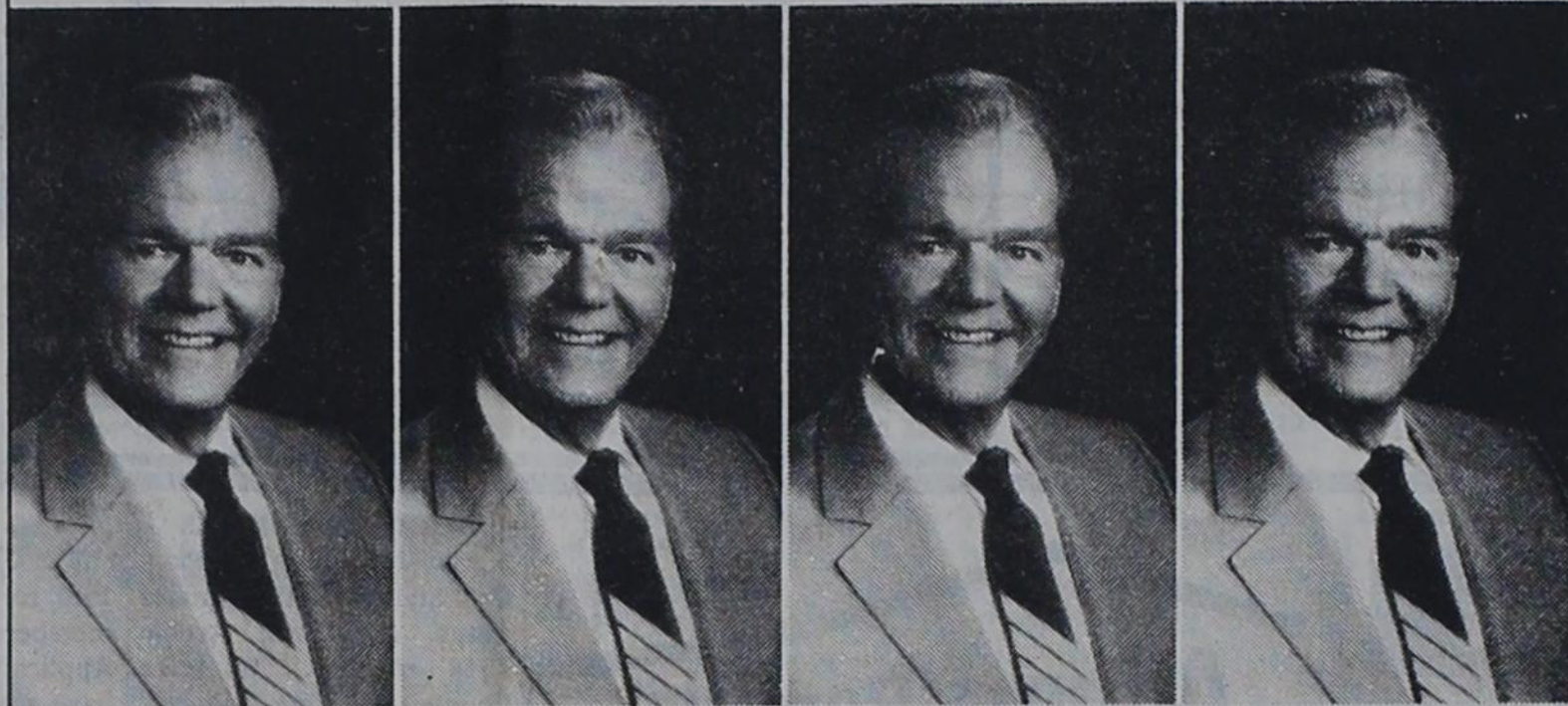

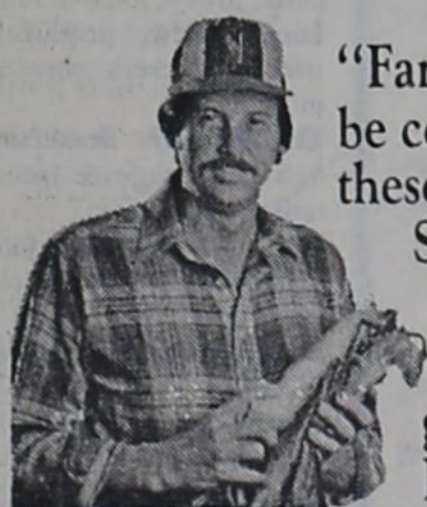

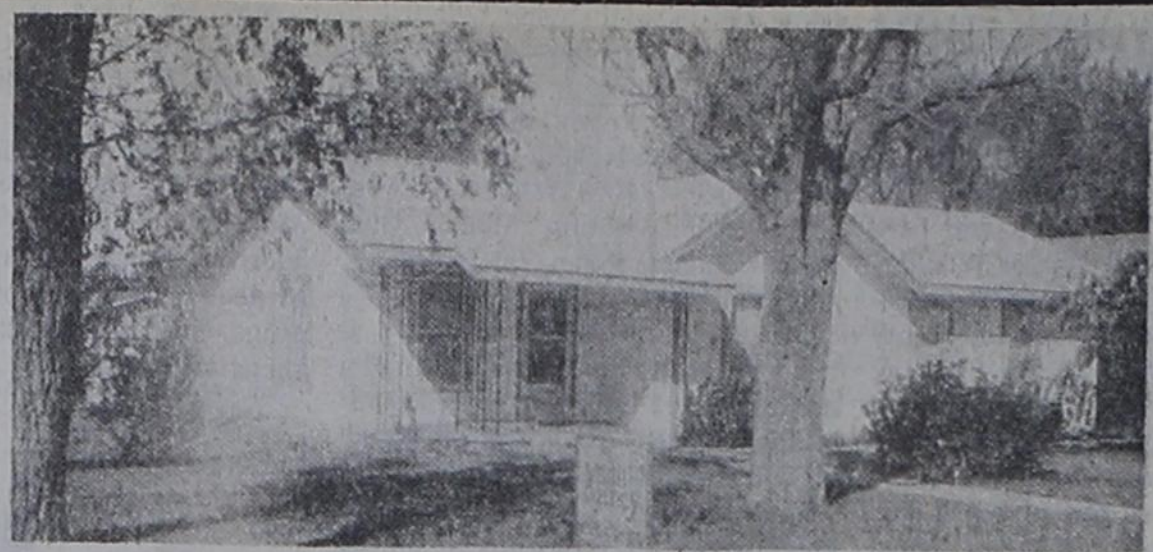

**U S Postal Service Advises Against Chain Letters**

Have you ever been asked to participate in a chain letter which is guaranteed to earn you lots of money with one small investment? Don't waste your money - chain letters are a form of lottery and may violate federal mail fraud laws. The same three elements that apply to lotteries (payment, prize, and chance) also make chain letter schemes illegal. The payment may be money or any other item of value. The prize is the large amount of money you are led to believe you will receive in the end if you participate. The chance is that the chain will break, and it must, because

the chance that all participants in a chain letter will receive mail is mathematically impossible. For example, a typical chain letter may require participants to mail letters containing money to six new participants, each of whom must mail six letters to six more individuals and so on. By the eleventh level of mailing, the entire population of the United States (almost three-hundred million) would be exhausted. By the 13th level, the population of the world (over four billion) would be exhausted. And remember, even if the chain

letter itself is not mailed, as long as the payment or prize is sent through the mail, the entire scheme is illegal. Some chain letters masquerade as Multi-Level Marketing (MLM) Plans. These require an original promoter to sell a product and enlist several other people to become sellers, who in turn recruit others. Most Multi-Level Marketing Plans are schemes to sell the plan rather than the product, and the fact that selling a product is involved, instead of winning money, or statements saying the plan do not violate federal law, do not ensure legality.
