Mobeetie To Host Activities

GOOD LUCK, DREW! The "Times" wishes you the best of luck at the High School Rodeo Association's National Finals Rodeo. The Thomases will leave this weekend for Drew to participate in the activities in South Dakota July 21 thru 27. Bring home the National Championship.

The Panhandle Bluegrass and Old Tyme Music Association is proud to present the Seventh Annual Old Mobeetie Bluegrass Festival, July 25th, 26th, and 27th, at the Old Mobeetie Jailhouse Museum, 30 miles east of Pampa on Highway 152. There will be shows Friday 8:00 p.m.-12:00 midnight, Saturday noon-midnight, and a free gospel show on Sunday and plenty of shade tree pickin'.

It rained only twice, briefly, during seven years, and once during a dry spell the Mobeetie Fire Department wet down the roads.

Cleaning and maintaining the grounds has been an ongoing mutual project of both the Mobeetie community and the Music Association. Three years ago the annual Clean-up, Hoedown (with real hoes) was begun.

In May 1985, a "tree-planting week-end" was initiated; Bluegrass families bought and planted 25 mulberry and cottonwood trees on the jail grounds to provide shade for future festival goers.

A number of young members have developed into pickers who now bring home awards, and the group is proud to encourage anyone who wants to learn bluegrass music. The 327 families of the Panhandle Bluegrass and Old Tyme Music Association welcome you to the 1986 7th Annual Mobeetie Bluegrass Festival.

Wheeler I.S.D. Students Score High On Test

All students enrolled in Wheeler Schools were tested on a National Standardized Test during the month of April. These tests were sent to Science Research Associates (for grading) to determine how Wheeler students scored compared to other students throughout the United States.

The results of these tests were returned to the local school districts in May. Students at Wheeler Schools scored 68.6 percentile. The national average for scores on this test was the 50th percentile. Results of this testing show the community that students at Wheeler Schools are in the upper one-third of all students, academically, in the United States.

This series of tests has been given to the students at Wheeler for many years. Each year Wheeler students have been in the upper half of the Nation, academically, but this year reflects the best record of achievement to this date.

Desirable academic achievement is the goal of every school district as is the case at Wheeler. These goals can be accomplished only when parents, faculty, staff, and students give their best effort. All parties involved in this endeavor are to be congratulated. Good parents, good faculty and staff, and good students make a good school. Wheeler is a good school, and this can be proved by this academic record compared to all schools. All patrons of this community are to be commended for their support.

BACKGROUND

In 1978, two Amarillo bluegrass buffs-Hugh Coder and Dave Lacaze-advertised in AD-beat for others to join them. The immediate and enthusiastic response became the Panhandle Bluegrass and Old Times Music Association. The group of 25 including both pickers and toe-tappers, began plans for a festival. Eddie Maxwells weather research proved the last week-end of July to be the least likely time for rain. Member Geoff Caldwell had relatives 80 miles away on the board of the Old Mobeetie Assoc., and the board needed funds to restore its old stone jailhouse. When no support was forth coming from the Amarillo city fathers, an agreement was made with Mobeetie. The bluegrassers had a festival site, and the Mobeetie jail would have its restoration.

The first festival, in 1979, was small with only 200 people attending-including the four bands' pickers and families. The annual event has grown to almost 5000 people listening to over 20 bands and individual performers.

6. Motion by Mr. Ledbetter, seconded by Mr. Thomas to adjourn. Motion carried unanimously.

Community Suicide

(Editor's Note: The following article appeared in the March 12, 1936 issue of "The Wheeler Times"; it applies today—probably more so.)

One of the strangest phenomena witnessed in most town and small cities is the apparent eagerness with which many otherwise good citizens contribute to the tendency to commit community suicide.

These citizens will often show uncommon zeal in boosting any movement to obtain city improvements, to promote the location of new industries, to secure better educational facilities and so. Yet many of these same proud boosters will deliberately engage in a practice which nullifies all their otherwise laudable efforts—and wonder why their own doesn't go ahead.

We refer to the suicidal habit of buying away from home.

The enormous growth of the small order habit in recent years is largely responsible for the failure of many communities to make the progress which their natural advantages should make possible. The money that ought to be kept at home for the expansion of local trade and industry is sent away to distant cities, never to return. The life-blood of prosperity is allowed to ebb away through the indifference or thoughtlessness of the very persons who should set an example of local pride and loyalty.

The trifling saving here and there, usually more imaginary than real, is sufficient to cause the average citizen to forget his duty to his community and to himself, which if performed would mean far more in the direction of local prosperity than all his other boosting efforts put together.

Why boost in one direction while committing community suicide in another? —Wellington Leader.

FOOD PRESERVATION UPDATE LINES FROM LINDA

Homemakers are always looking for the fastest and easiest methods for preserving fresh garden produce. But it is important to remember that it is just as important to pick those methods that are the most safe and reliable.

NEW TOMATO CANNING RECOMMENDATION: Due to research findings on the changes in PH of canned tomatoes, USDA is recommending that one tablespoon per pint or two tablespoons per quart bottled lemon juice be added to home canned tomatoes before processing in a boiling water bath. Also, remember that only hot-pack method of processing is now recommended.

STEAM CANNERS: These are NOT SAFE according to USDA and we simply cannot recommend their use because the heat treatment is not adequate.

PICKLES AND SALT: Don't use salt substitutes (potassium chloride) or lite salt (half sodium and half potassium chloride) in pickling. They do not serve the same function as sodium chloride and large amounts of potassium can leave a bitter aftertaste in pickles. A few low sodium, high vinegar fresh-pack pickle recipes have been developed. Any fresh-pack pickle recipe that calls for as much or more vinegar than water and produces a finished product with at least 1/4 cup of five percent acetic acid vinegar per jar of pickled product can be made

successfully without salt. Sweet pickles generally taste better without salt than dill pickles, but don't expect any to taste like a regular pickle. Hot peppers, herbs, and garlic improve the flavor. Dill pickles taste better if at least 1/2 to 3/4 teaspoon of salt per pint jar is added.

SUN PICKLES: If you have come across recipes for sun dill pickles, the recipe tells you to place cucumbers in jars, a brine of water, vinegar, salt, and spices is mixed together (not heated) and poured on the cucumbers in the jar. The jar is then closed with lid and ring and set in the sun for a few days. This practice is NOT recommended. The sun doesn't replace the processing. The "sun treatment" serves no purpose in preserving the pickles and often results in a bleached, pale, unappetizing condiment. Extension Service recommends using approved pickle recipes and processing them in a boiling water bath.

LOW SUGAR OR SUGAR-FREE JAMS, JELLIES, AND PRESERVES: Recent developments in new pectin products and use of artificial sweeteners are allowing homemakers to make jellied fruit products with reduced or no sugar. Recipes are available in my office for jellied products made with artificial sweeteners and unflavored gelatin and products made with the new low sugar pectin products. You should expect a product more similar to a gelatin fruit dessert than a true jam or jelly in most cases. In addition, most of the products must also be stored in the refrigerator or freezer unless they are made by the long-boil method.

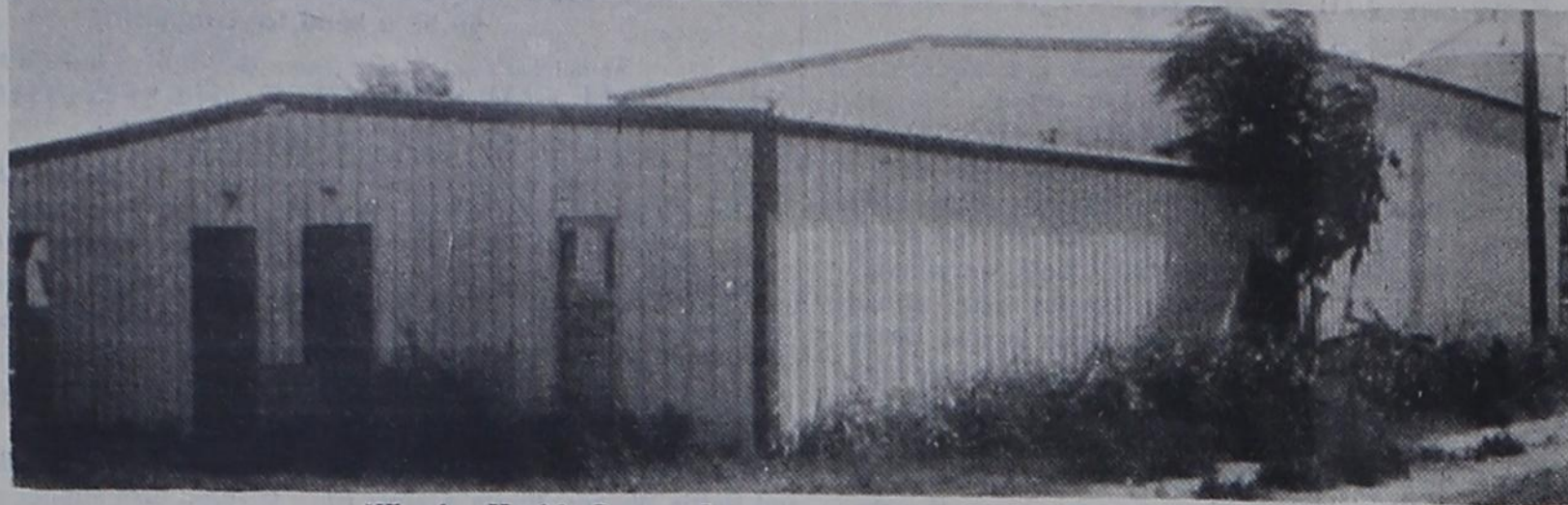
REDUCED SUGAR IN CANNED AND FROZEN FRUITS: The purpose of sugar in these products is to help preserve firm texture and bright color during processing. You must first decide how you plan to use the product after freezing or canning. If firmness and color is of minimal importance, then a lack of sugar will not be a major problem. In most cases, sugar may be reduced by one-third and you will never miss it.

PRESSURE COOKER TESTING: If you would like to have your pressure canner tested, free of charge, you may bring it by the Extension office (2nd floor of the Wheeler County Courthouse). Please bring the entire cooker and allow one-half day for testing. Cookers with a dial gauge and those with a selective (5-10-15 lb.) pressure control can be checked. Cookers with non-adjustable weights cannot be checked.

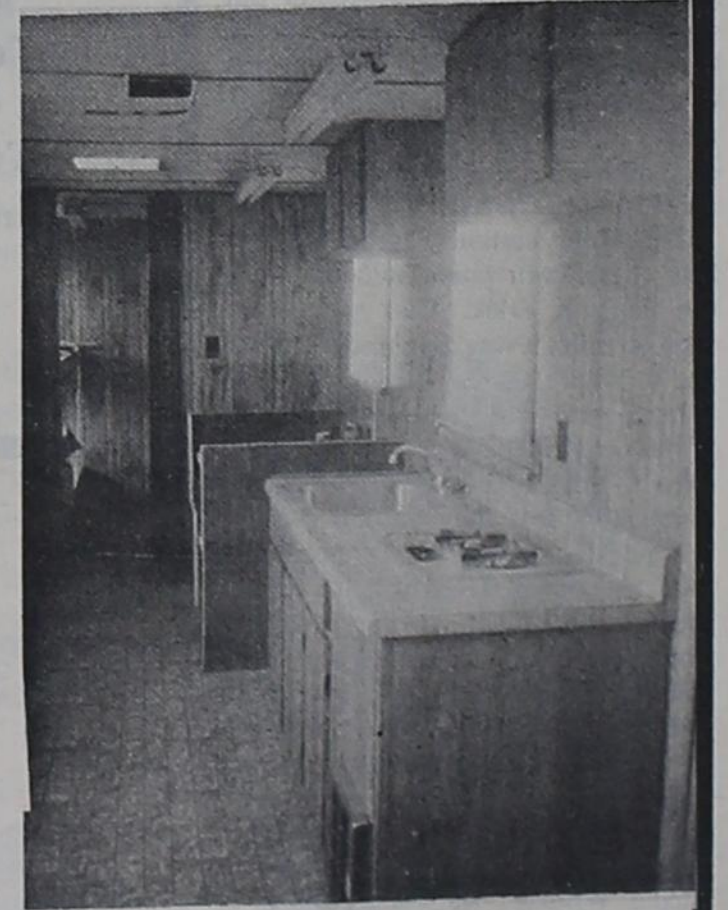
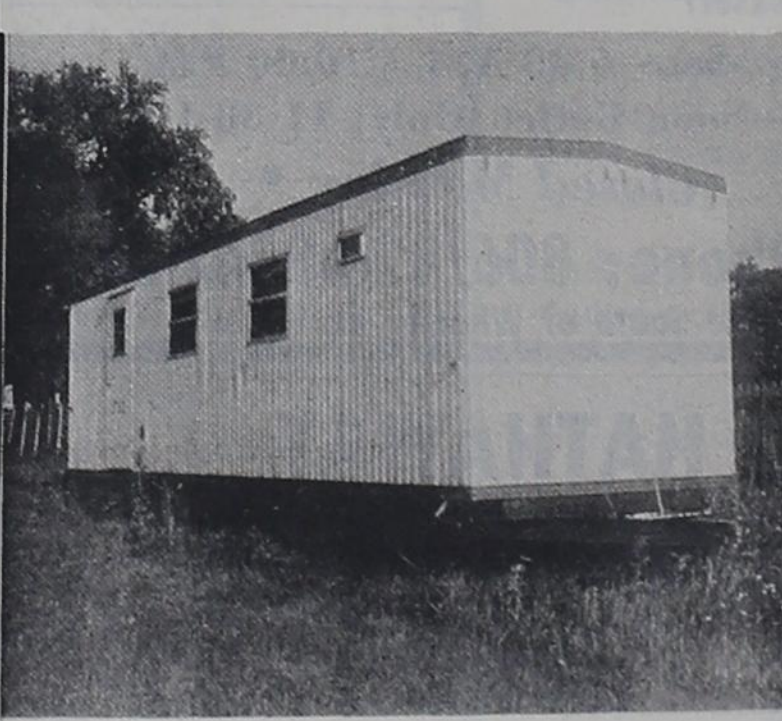

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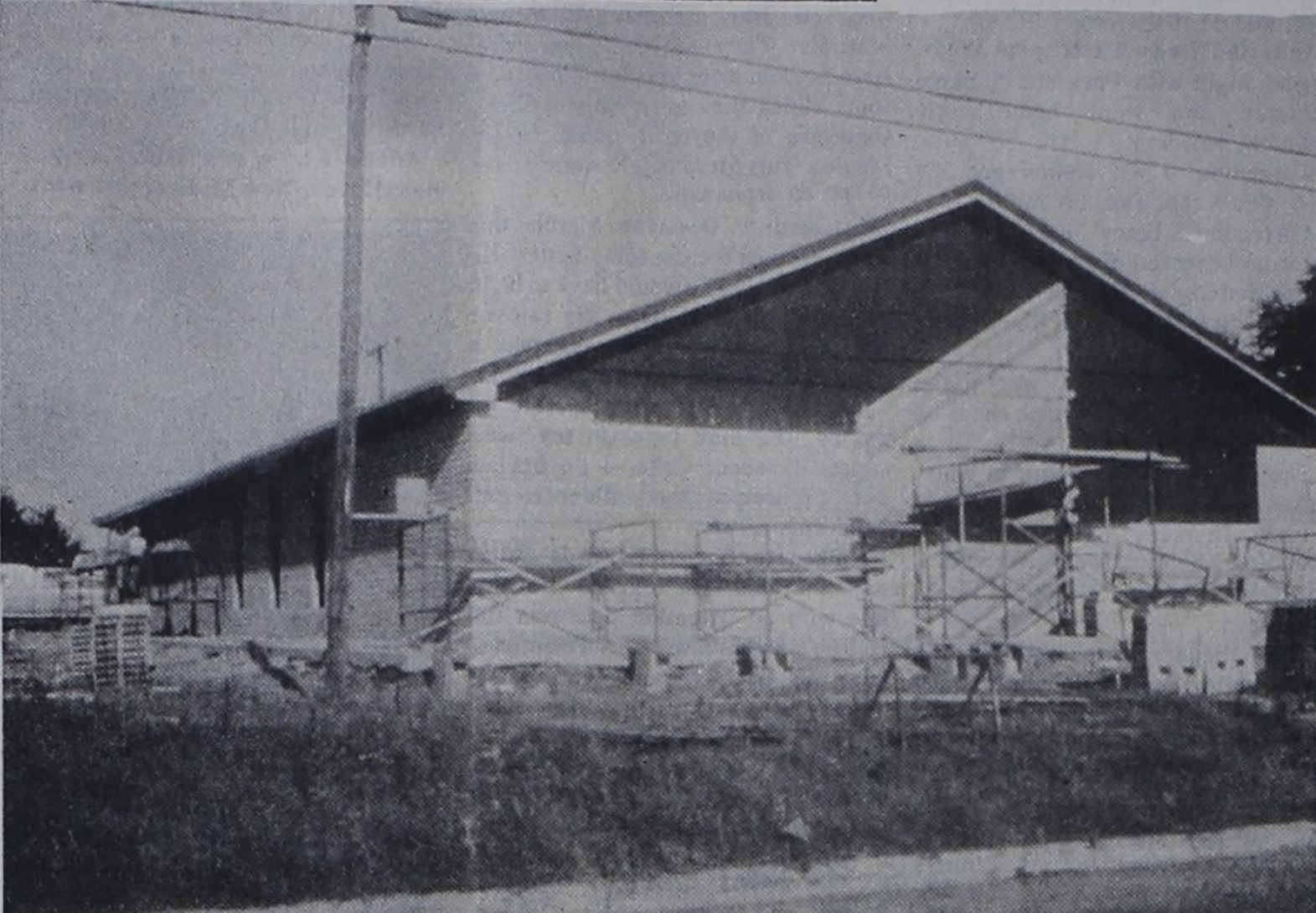

Lower Interest Rates Are Being Considered

The Farm Credit Banks of Texas, responded to a notice this week from its regulator in Washington, D.C. that the agency is ready to consider lowering interest rates for farmers.

James A. Rogers, chief executive officer of the Farm Credit Banks of Texas, today in Austin, said the Texas Federal Land Bank, which has been locked into an interest rate freeze for more than a year, was sending a request today to the nation's capital. The Texas bank first asked its regulator for an interest rate reduction in September of 1985.

The statement follows a news release issued by the Farm Credit Administration (FCA) that alerts district banks that FCA will approve interest rate reductions if the banks meet certain criterion.

"We're pleased that FCA has approved this plan for reducing interest rates to farmers," Rogers said. "We hope that they will act quickly in response to our request."

Rogers said the release didn't mean that FCA would grant blanket interest rate reductions for Farm Credit System borrowers. District banks wanting to lower interest rates must follow FCA guidelines.

In previous requests to lower interest rates, the Texas board had been asking for a 1 percent across-the-board decrease for the Federal Land Bank. The last request was for one-half of one percent reduction which is all FCA says they will allow at this time.

Some criterion the banks must meet to get a favorable ruling on interest rate reductions include designing and implementing a program to obtain current financial statements from borrowers and effecting a program for restructuring loans for borrowers. FCA also urged the districts to offer programs based on differential interest rates, determined by borrower credit quality and classification.

The Texas Farm Credit System is comprised of the Federal Land Bank of Texas and its 44 Federal Land Bank Associations, the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Texas, 28 Production Credit Associations and the Texas Bank for Cooperatives. Collectively, they have \$4 billion in loans outstanding to 40,000 of the state's farmers, ranchers, aquatic harvesters and 147 rural utility cooperatives.
