FIREWORKS DISPLAY RESULT OF MANY CONTRIBUTORS

Many compliments were received on the fireworks display which closed the activities at the Wheeler park for the First Annual 4th of July Celebration. Sponsored by the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce. The display began at dusk, shortly before 10 P.M. The crowd gathered in the park and in all areas around the park and ballpark.

Jimmy Adams headed the "shooting" of the fireworks; he was assisted by Ted Boedeker, Larry Porton, Danny Dorman and members of the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department. The fire trucks were in the area in case a fire was started by the display. The display lasted between thirty and forty-five minutes.

A 100' string of firecrackers was lit at the beginning of the display and continued while the rest of the display was being "shot". The string of firecrackers consisted of 16,000 in-

dividual explosives; it was draped on the fence to the east and south of the ballpark.

I went to a 4th of July celebration in 1922, I believe it was, in Wheeler.

We lived in Canadian and my mother and I spent the summer out on my grandfather's farm, south of the old Zybach school. His name was C.V. Blair. My grandmother had fallen and broke her collar bone, that was the reason we were there.

Grandfather heard about this 4th of July celebration at Wheeler. They were having a rodeo. He asked me if I wanted to go. Of course I was ready to go. He never owned a car so we went in the wagon so he could bring back some supplies.

I was real excited to get to go to Wheeler in a wagon. My father bought his first car in 1915; so that

5 years and under: Stick Horse Barrel Race, Stick Horse Flag Race, Goat Ribbon Race, and Stick Horse Pole Bending.

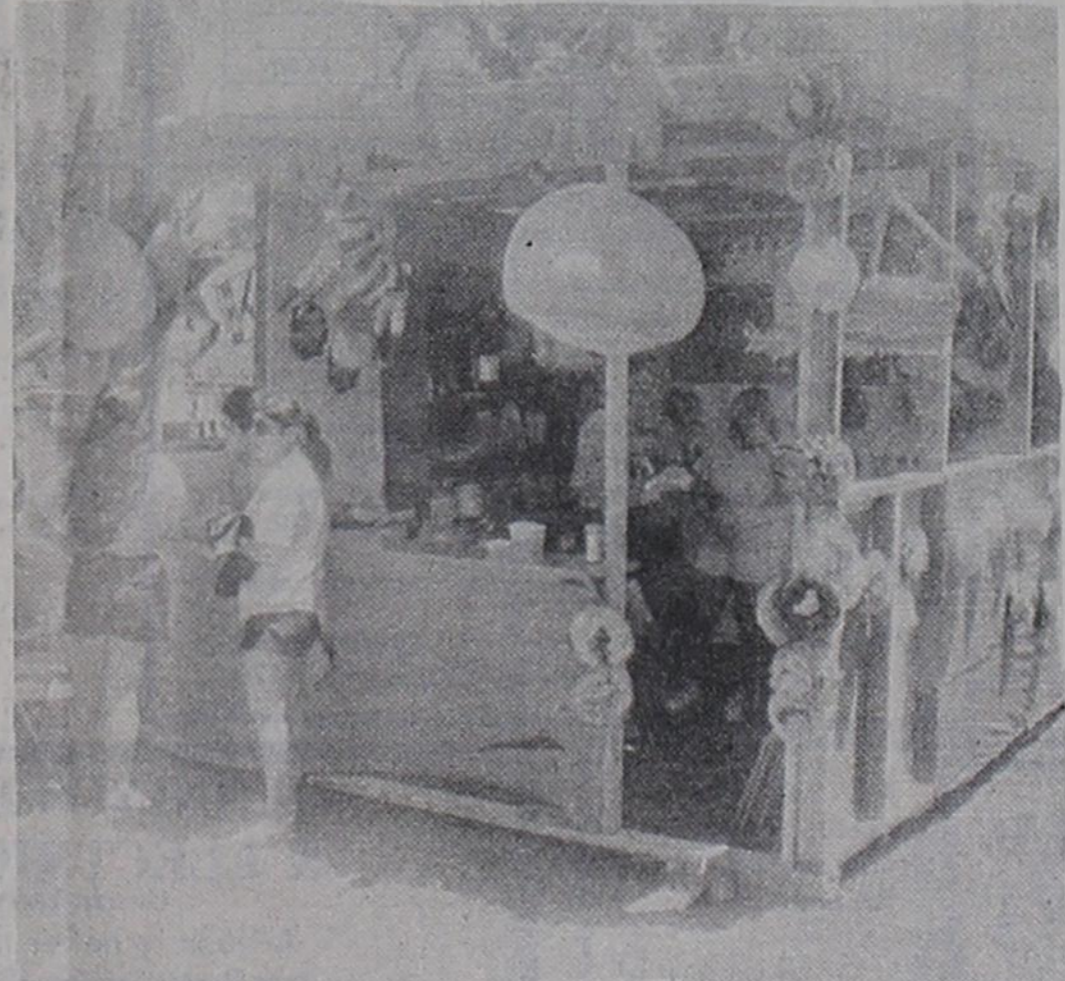
Ages 6-9: Calf Riding, Pole Bending, Barrel Race, Flag Race, and Goat Ribbon Race.

was old stuff for me. There were several cars in the country by then but a lot of folks went in wagons and buggies and horseback.

We started out when the sun was about an hour high. We went the old road to Wheeler that isn't used now. People would come by in cars and stop and ask if the little lady didn't want to ride with them because it was getting hot. I would tell them "no" that I would stay with my Grandfather.

We finally got to Wheeler and went where other people had their wagons parked. We unhitched the horses and tied them to the back of the wagon where there was some feed for them.

We went to the court house square and the ladies had brought baskets of food and were spreading the food on long tables made out of long pieces of lumber on saw horses. You can't imagine all the food that was there. Great platters of chicken, beet pickles, deviled eggs and a whole lot of things to eat. I didn't know there was that much food in Wheeler County.

After everyone had eaten all they could hold we started to the rodeo grounds. Seems to me we walked south of the court house for a while and sat on some benches and watched the rodeo. I can't remember too much about it but about 4 o'clock, maybe 5 o'clock it broke up and we went back up to where the horses were. We hitched up the horses to the wagon, and finally started back on the road home. We arrived after dark and the moon was shining and everything was so pretty.

I can remember another time I went to Wheeler in a wagon. That was before we bought our 1st car. My father was called for jury duty. He told Mama we could all go in the wagon to Wheeler and let him out and we could come on home. Mama could handle a team as good as a man. My brother and sister who were older than I went with us. My father hitched a pair of mules to the wagon. Everything went O.K. until we came to the Sweetwater Creek. The creek was up and you can't imagine how wide it was. There was a little bridge across it and it was out of sight.

My father stopped the team and waded out to see if the bridge was washed out. He found it still there and waved for my mother to drive the team straight to him. She asked him if the wagon bed would float off. He said "no". The mules went right to him and we crossed safely. We drove into Wheeler and my father got out. Mama asked him how we were going to get back across the creek. He said the mules knew where the bridge was and would be all right.

Mama turned the team around and started back. When she got to the creek she pulled over to the side of the road and stopped. Soon a buggy with 2 men came by and she pulled right in behind them and sure enough the mules took us across the bridge.

When we went back after my father in three days the creek was down and we could see the little bridge.

Bike-Aide 86 Passes Through

Wheeler was one stop on the route across America for 10 bicycle riders Tuesday afternoon. The 10 riders are from Stanford University and are raising money and make the public more aware of literary and economic depression and hunger in the world. The trip began at Santa Monica Pier in Los Angeles and will be completed when the group reaches the United Nations Building in New York.

Food and housing were furnished the group during their stay in Wheeler. The "old gym" at the school was opened to house the group for the evening. The Wheeler Lion's Club furnished the evening meal Tuesday. Wednesday morning Maxey and Wanda Herd furnished breakfast at Maxey's Steakhouse. Johnny and Donna Velasquez of Thriftway helped with some of the food and ice to carry the group a little further along their way across America.

The riders left Amarillo at 7:30 Tuesday morning and the first of the riders completed the 100-plus journey to Wheeler around 1:30. They will travel from Wheeler to Cordell, Okla. The average daily ride is 70 miles. A two-day rest is scheduled when the

riders arrive in Oklahoma City on Thursday.

One hundred percent of the money raised is put into an account to help the needy. The money for expenses comes from a separate account or from the pockets of the participants.

The money is not just a handout to the recipients. Money raised is used to educate, furnish seed for crops and improve housing in the needy areas. It is hoped in this way to help the needy care for themselves.

The 10, who traveled through Wheeler are just a part of a larger group. "Bike-Aide '86" is a part of Overseas Development Network of Stanford University; ODN is a student run organization of volunteers. Six groups of riders are riding across America; starting from different points along the west coast, the group will meet August 5 in Washington, D.C. The entire group of 70-100 riders will continue to New York; arrival date is to be August 11.

This is the first time for the 10 riders to be in this part of the country; they are from different location in the eastern U.S.A. A trip by plane to the west coast began the 56 day, 4,000 mile journey
