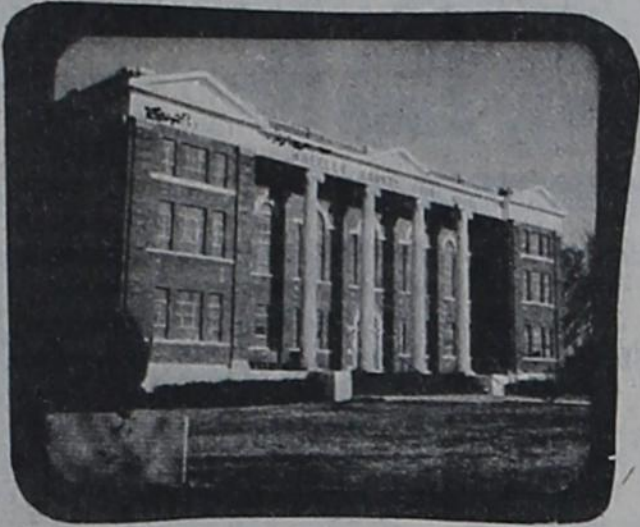

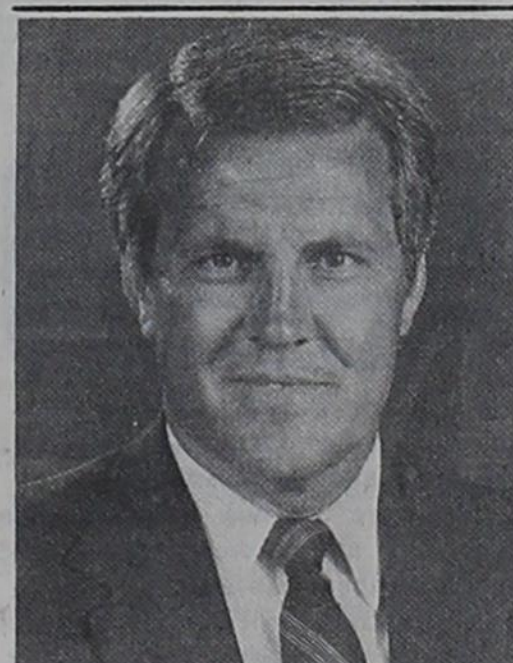



We have in our hospital a great staff, christian leaders from maintenance on up. I believe they are dedicated people. They keep a clean hospital and Care Center. But they can not have clean AIR in hospital or Care Center under the present Dictators, Administrators, and Board of Directors hiding behind filthy thing they call Law 48:01 on smoking. Which will change or over ruled I hope. There is 40 states or more including Texas and millions of people fighting for a Clean Breath of Air and other places. Same as we are doing in this county, some churches and organizations and others have begun to see we're all guilty of watching this filth take place. Smoking, chewing, snuff, does kill. Each time you blow smoke into lungs of sick and dying. May cause that person to die sooner or later. My wife and others might have lived or at least a little longer. What a disgrace.

Dr. Mendiola and some nurses would tell me to go home and rest she was dying anyway. Dr. Mendiola told me to come to clinic for a blood pressure check. I didn't give up then, neither will I give up on smoking problem.

You people that smoke in hospital and Care Center. Know you should have a separate room, away from sick and dying and non-smokers and quit treating them like animals, think about it.

We drive down highways breaking laws. We will lose, funds for up keep. Same as you are losing some medicare, medicaid, and can lose grants. Your addiction is costing everyone, we are losing hospitals and banks everywhere. Aids and smoking is the worst epidemic known to man. Would be glad to set down and talk to anyone on this problem and quit this protesting. Hospitals and Care Centers have been under inspection for 2 or three years. There will be more.

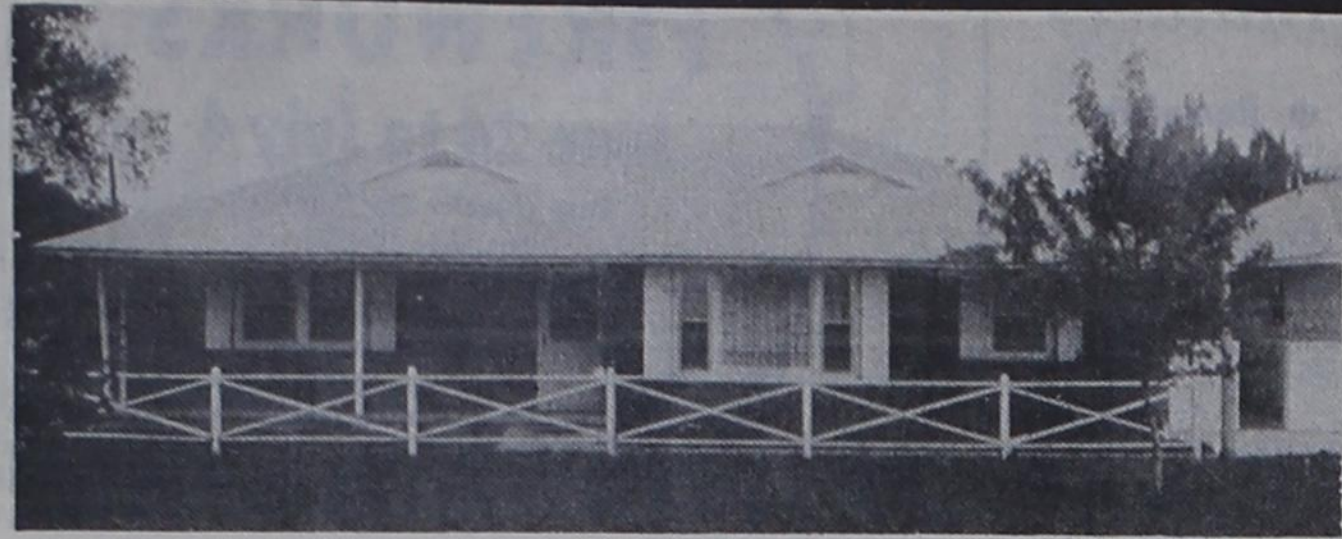

FOOD SAFETY WHILE CAMPING

Camping out overnight presents special food safety problems, but you can plan ahead to solve them. The biggest problem is lack of refrigeration.

Even on a short overnight trip, you'll need to keep cooler space for fresh meat and poultry, milk, butter and eggs. If the trip involves several meals, supper the first night, plus meals and snacks the following days, here are some suggestions for handling the food:

* Don't take any foods that need ice to keep cool than you can use early in the trip. For later use, take along canned meats and fish, vegetable soups and stews, dry cooked cereals, and peanut butter.

* Camping Stores have a variety of dehydrated foods, including dried meat sticks, dried fruits and nut mixes and even whole grain dinners. For beef stew in a pouch, for example, you just add boiling water.

* If you catch fish, remember they're highly perishable. After cleaning, wash the fish thoroughly and cook immediately or wrap the fish tightly and keep it in the cooler with ice for no longer than 24 hours.

* To help keep your ice chest cool longer, wrap the cooler in newspapers and put it in a sleeping bag in the shade while you're hiking, fishing or boating.

* Keep the same standards of cleanliness for cooking as you would at home. Clean your hands before working with food by using either soap and water or disposable wet hand wipers. And wash your hands again after working with raw meat, poultry or fish, and before handling other food.

Food safety is just as important as fire or water safety on a camping trip.

FmHA Announces "Operation Assist"

The Farmers Home Administration office in Wheeler will begin immediately to participate in "Operation Assist," John D. Wolk III County Supervisor, announced today.

Operation Assist is a new effort by FmHA to help farmers obtain guaranteed operating loans. County Supervisors for FmHA will take completed farm credit applications to local banks

or other lenders, along with the farmer wishing to apply for a guaranteed loan.

"We will handcarry the applications, and personally introduce the applicants to our local lenders," said Wolf. "We will present a complete loan package, including cash flows, financial statements, and appraisals. If necessary, we will do everything we can to help the lender, and the borrower, by committing to guarantee the loan at our maximum 90 percent."

While direct operating loan funds are used up in some areas, there is still nearly \$800 million available for the guarantee program. County FmHA officials hope other lenders will make operating credit available under the guarantee, with most of the paperwork done beforehand by FmHA.

Borrowers and lenders interested in an FmHA guaranteed loan should contact the FmHA county office.

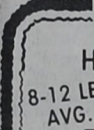
