

The Panhandle Fed Heifer Program was started three years ago to give 4-H and FFA members practical, hands-on experience in cattle feeding. The program was designed to operate as closely as possible to a commercial feed operation.

This year's feeding period began January 25, when the heifers were weighed, processed, and evaluated. The feeders selected their own heifers, and during the 130 day feeding period, they were responsible for the daily feeding and managment of their cattle. The cattle in each county were fed identical feeds so that the results will be an indication of management ability.

Following the live animal evaluation, the cattle will be slaughtered and sold on the rail.

Final placings will be based on the feed conversion ratio, carcass value (as determined by quality grade and yield), and the feeder's score on a record book and test.



Producers invited to insect scouting workship

JOE DON KING

Cotton, corn, and sorghum producers in Wheeler County are again receiving a special invitation to take part in the annual High Plains Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their past management programs.

The first of two workship sessions will focus on early and mid-season school year audit. A letter was read to pests and will be held Tuesday, June 3, at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview, Joe Don King, County Extension Agent, said. The center is on U.S. 87 Business Route south of the city.

The second workshop is scheduled for July 8, in Plainview and will cover mid to late-season crop pests.

The workshop, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest managment programs conducted by Extension, part of the Texas A&M University system.

In subsequent years, it has expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators, and others, as well as producers who want to learn how to scout their own fields for insects. The workshop focuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect investments and yield, and hold down production costs, King

The workshop will begin at 8:30 a.m. with Dr. James Leser, Extension Entomologist, outlining the scope of the training, and explaining general concepts of pest management, and sampling. Leser will then open the cotton pest section with information on thrips. Cotton fleahoppers will be discussed by Greg Cronholm, Extension Agent-Entomology headquartered at Plainview. Dr. Pat Morrison will discuss sorghum pests. Aspects of pesticide safety will be presented by Mark Brown, Extension Agent-Entomology from Crosbyton.

The afternoon segment will open with a presentation on corn pests by Allen Knutson, Extension Agent-En-

tomology based in Dimmitt. Morrison will discuss pests of soybean and sunflower crops.

The daylong workshop will conclude with a hands-on session in which participants will learn how to determine the percent square set on potted cotton plants and will identify insect speciamens. Handouts will be avail-
