Tickets are now on sale at \$1.00 for a handmade quilt which will be given away at the style show. For tickets, contact Chamber members.

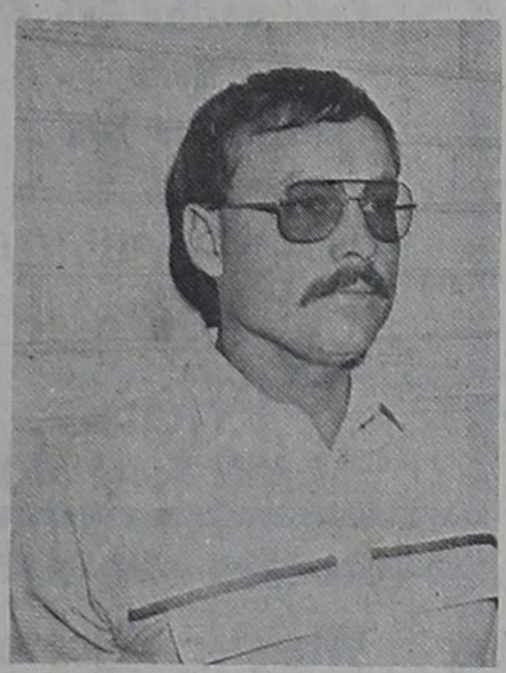

Colts Blast Panthers In Oct. 1 Game Here

The Wheeler Colts coasted to a 26 to 0 victory over Follett last Thursday to up their season record with 2 win and 1 loss. The colts will travel to Sunray this Thursday and play two games. The seventh grade will start at 5:00 P.M. and the eighth grade will follow.

Isidro Salas scored the colts first touchdown on a two yard run against Follett and Trey Smith kicked the extra point to give the colts the lead 7-0. Salas scored again on a 46 yard blast up the middle and Smith added the extra point to increase the lead 14 to 0 in the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Mack Marshall scored his first touchdown of the season with a 10 yard insolation play behind Trey Smith, Ike Finsterwald, Brandon Chick and Isidro Salas blocking to give the Colts a commanding lead of 20-0.

The Colts finished off their scoring before halftime with Jason Beers throwing a touchdown strike to Brandon Chick from 40 yards out. The Colt reserves played the rest of the game, holding Follett with only one first down.

Leading the Colts on offense were Mack Marshall with 87 yards, Isidro Salas, 68 yards; Shannon Robinson, 47 yards, and Jason Helton 14 yards. Jason Beers was 1 out of 4 for 40 yards in passing. Leading the Colts on defense were Brandon Chick, 6; Jason Beers, 5; Ike Finsterwald, 5; Isidro Salas, 5, and Trey Smith, 4 tackles.

Isidro Salas recovered a fumble and Jason Helton intercepted a pass for the Colts.

The Colt offensive line blocked well during the game. They consist of Travis Cook, Jimmy Winter, Trey Smith, James Umsted, Chad Harrison, Ike Finsterwald, Jason Judd, Craig Neal, Joe Dan Ledbetter and Brandon Chick.

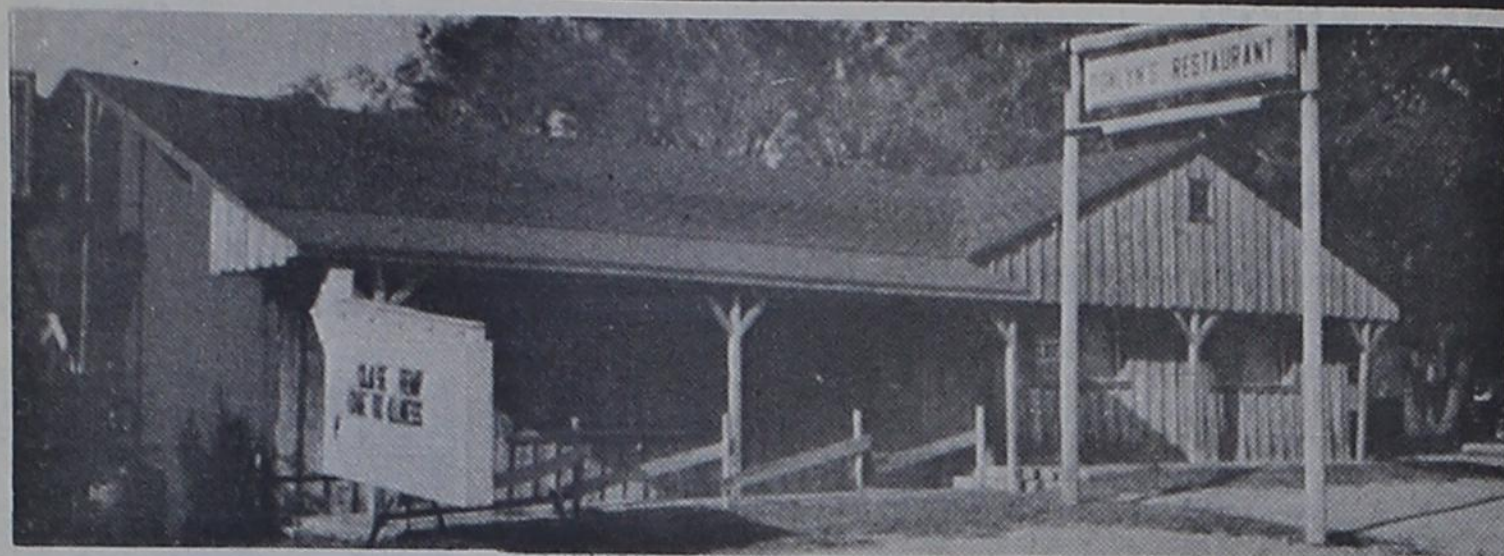



All three of the Panthers touchdowns came via their passing game which was their entire offense of the night. Quarterback Tommy Kotara was sharp in the passing game as he completed 30 of 44 attempts and Mike Mankin was on the receiving end of two of the TD tosses.

A scoreless duel was broken with just 1:50 to play in the first half when Shawn Bradstreet passed 5 yards to David Jones for the touchdown that sent the Mustangs into the dressing room at halftime with the 6-0 lead and clearly the momentum. A fumble recovery at the Panhandle 33 set the Mustangs up for their 7 play scoring drive.

If the Mustangs had the momentum at halftime, it quickly changed to the Panthers two plays deep in the third quarter. Bubba Smith missed a handoff at the Wheeler 26 and Panhandle recovered and took the pigskin to paydirt with two pass plays. Kotara hit Mankin with a 24 yarder to the 2 and then the same combination got the touchdown on the next play. Kent Nix booted the extra point and Panhandle never trailed after that.

The Mustangs came right back driving for a first down on the Panhandle 8 but at that point, the Mustangs shot themselves in the foot. A holding call cost them 10; a fumble lost another 6; another holding call and the Mustangs opted for a 38 yard field goal try by Lee McCasland after Grayson Benson had gained 11 of the

lost yards back on third down. McCasland's kick had the distance but the kick veered wide left. McCasland missed from 43 yards on the Mustangs next possession.

Trailing by 7-6 as the fourth quarter opened, the Mustangs had the ball on the Panther 46 following a Panhandle punt. Bradstreet passed to Bubba Smith for 18 and a first down at the 28 and then hit Grayson Benson with another 18 yarder for another first down at the Panther 10. On first down, Bradstreet never got the handle on the snap and Panhandle recovered at their 16 to thwart another Mustang threat.

After trading pass interceptions, Panhandle was on the Wheeler 46 and it took the Panthers 7 plays to cushion their lead to 14-6. A Kotara to Mankin pass covering 26 yards got the six points and Nix booted good.

Still in the ball game, the Mustangs took the kickoff and drove out to their 40 where another lost fumble really killed them. Panhandle quickly took advantage of the miscue and two passes got the final Panther TD.

Wheeler's second touchdown came with just 2:54 to play when Benson broke loose at the Wheeler 40 and raced 60 yards to the end zone.

"We had our chances and thought we could win but it didn't work out that way and we have got to get ready for district now," Preston Smith said after the game.
