## Wheeler Will Offer Pre-Kindergarten

The Wheeler I.S.D. will offer a pre-kindergarten program for the 1987-88 school year. Program instructor will be Mrs. Nancy Hampton.

Enrollment in this program is limited. Any child applying for this program must be four years of age on or before September 1, 1987. In addition any child applying must meet one of the following conditions.

1. The child must come from a home in which English is the second language.
2. The child qualifies for the free/reduced price lunch program.
3. Educationally disadvantaged: The child shows educational disadvantage after the administration of four educational screening instruments.

If you wish your child to be considered for the pre-kindergarten program, you may obtain an application form at the business office of the Wheeler I.S.D. Any additional information about the pre-kindergarten program will be included in the application form.

**NOTE:** Pre-kindergarten does not enroll on August 28th. Dates for application and registration will be available in the application form.
