Doctor, several years ago I sprained my right ankle. I figured that it was just a sprain and didn't see my physician. Now it seems as if any time I use my ankle, it is easily sprained again. Can you describe what has happened?

There is no such thing as "Just A Sprain''. You really can't determine the extent of your injury without your doctor's help. Assumed ankle sprains often turn out to be fractures. In adults, almost all ankle fractures should be operated on in an attempt to prevent further complications. Arthritis is a very common complication several years after the initial injury. If, indeed, no fracture has occured, ankle sprains come in two main varieties. The mildest form simply stretches the supporting ligaments of the ankle and causes pain and swelling. Application of a good splint for several days will usually result in a well healed ankle. A more severe form of ankle sprains consists of torn ligaments. This is very common and requires more aggressive therapy. This is most likely the injury that you sustained. When the ligaments are torn and are left to themselves to heal, they tend to grow back together stretched out and too long. This will often result in an unstable ankle like yours. Any sprain with torn ligaments requires, at the least, a cast with no weight bearing for a short time. Two to three weeks is usually adequate. The other alternative, sometimes a necessary one, is surgery. The torn ligaments can be sewn together at the proper length. These aggressive treatments will give you a much better chance of living with a stable, normal ankle for the rest of your life. The most important rule to remember is that there is no such thing as "Just a Sprain." When you hurt your ankle, see your physician.





Eating Nutritious Restaurant Meals

A 1986 Gallup survey conducted for the National Restaurant Assoiciation shows that 6 out of 10 adults have changed their eating habits at home to reflect nutrition concerns, but only 4 out of 10 have done the same in restaurants.

For some people, restaurant eating is thought of as an indulgence, or a break from eating what's "good for us." Others may not know how to select restaurant items on the basis of nutrition, or find that it seems like more trouble than it's worth.

Some restaurants are making it easier for patrons by printing calorie counts and other nutrition information on the menu. But if that information isn't available, you'll have to make some educated guesses.

Selecting nutritious restaurant meals is easier than you think.

Start by reading the menu carefully, noting the ways foods are prepared. If you have questions, ask you food

who knew Griffin at its height later In general, ordering a la carte will help control what you actually eat because side dishes are elimated. When you order food by the meal, you may be tempted to eat foods you ordinarily wouldn't just because you're paying for them.

> For an entree, select roasted, baked, broiled or grilled dishes without rich sauces, gravies or breading. Trim off visible fat on meat or skin on poultry before eating it.

> Ask that vegetables be prepared with no cheese, cream sauce or almonds. If you choose a baked potato, limit or omit the use of butter and sour cream.

> Request vinegar and oil for your salad instead of creamy dressings. Try food before salting it. You may be able to get along without it or with much

> If you have a choice, order whole grain bread or buns. When bread is placed on the table, avoid overeating by asking the food server to take it away after you have had a few, or ask that they not be served at all.

> When you can't resist dessert, choose fresh fruit or fruit sherbet. Perhaps most importantly, when

> you're full, ask the food server to take your plate and the remaining food from the table.




