ELECTION RESULTS

Hall, Vanpool, Hennard, Wright, Return

The voter turnout was good over the county in Saturday's election to name members to the city councils, school boards and hospital board. Most of the elections were contested.

CITY OF WHEELER

Three members were elected to the Wheeler city council. Berniece Hall and Bobby Vanpool won re-election with Jess Sheets taking Mark Frankenbery's place. Vanpool defeated Zodell Swift 229 votes to 35 for place 1. Hall returned to place 3 with 152 votes; Eddie Richardson received 109. In the race for place 5 on the council, Sheets received 114, Frankenbery received 108 and Eddie Hughes received 41 votes. The oath of office will be administered Monday, April 20 at the next regular council meeting.

WHEELER SCHOOL

Three places were to be filled on the Wheeler school board of trustees. The two members seeking re-election will return to the board; Don Ellisor was unopposed for position 3. Jim Wright received 290 votes; his opponent, Patti McNeil received 81. In Position 2 Betty Hennard took the most votes with 136; she was followed by Jimmy Helton with 119, Mel Ray Coate with 60 and Laura Underwood with 58.

MOBEETIE SCHOOL

Four individuals were asking for a chance to serve on the Mobeetie school board. The two elected were incumbent Jim Batton and Greg Estes. The vote count was Estes 69, Batton 42, Kevin Frankenbery, 34 and Aaron Laverty 14.

CITY OF MOBEETIE

The mayor, Leona House, and councilmen Roy Stribling and Dennis Hilburn ran unopposed for re-election and will each serve another two year term. The votes counted were House, 38; Stribling, 37; and Hilburn, 39.

BRISCOE SCHOOL

The two candidates for the Briscoe board of trustees were unopposed. David Zybach was returned to the board with 52 votes and Mac Purcell will serve his first three-year term with 43 votes.

KELTON SCHOOL

Four places were to be filled on the Kelton board; four names were on the ballot. Gary Clements and Bob Hink will serve three year terms. Larry Lister will complete a two-year unexpired term and Champ Davis will finish a one-year unexpired term.

ALLISON SCHOOL

Allison school had two places to fill on their board of trustees; five names were on the ballot. The vote count was Terry Grayson, 92, Keith Boydston, 87; David Gilmer, 56; Dean Keys, 63, and Eddy Walker, 30. David Gilmer was the only incumbent in the race.

PARKVIEW HOSPITAL

Allison, Briscoe and Mobeetie each re-elected their respective representatives to the Parkview Hospital board of trustees. Continuing on the board will be Lewis Grayson, Dean Tipps and Lester Leonard.

Diane Moffett who plays Mrs. Pringle, and Greg Langley who plays Mr. Flannery, received All Star Cast Awards.

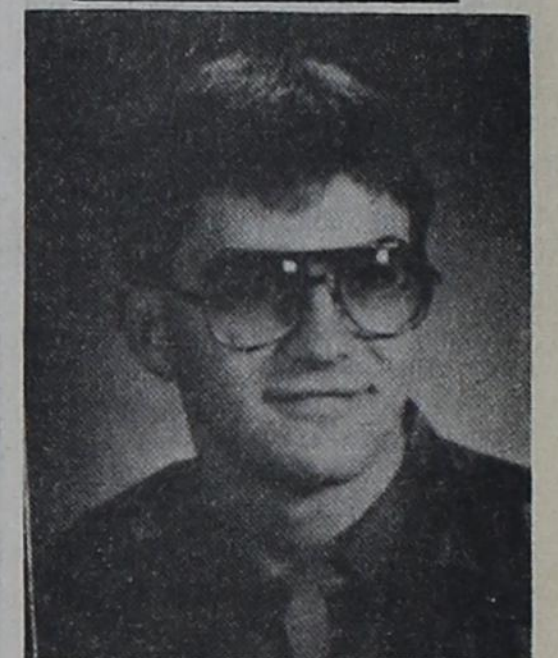

members are Julie Stepps and Jeff Mayfield. The play is directed by Belinda Masters.

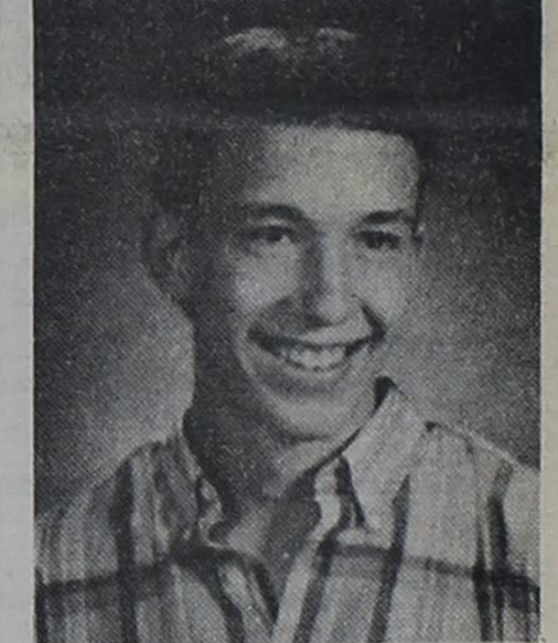

What's Up Doc?

Sprains

Question:

Doctor, several years ago I sprained my right ankle. I figured that it was just a sprain and didn't see my physician. Now it seems as if any time I use my ankle, it is easily sprained again. Can you describe what has happened?

Answer:

There is no such thing as "Just A Sprain". You really can't determine the extent of your injury without your doctor's help. Assumed ankle sprains often turn out to be fractures. In adults, almost all ankle fractures should be operated on in an attempt to prevent further complications. Arthritis is a very common complication several years after the initial injury. If, indeed, no fracture has occurred, ankle sprains come in two main varieties. The mildest form simply stretches the supporting ligaments of the ankle and causes pain and swelling. Application of a good splint for several days will usually result in a well healed ankle. A more severe form of ankle sprains consists of torn ligaments. This is very common and requires more aggressive therapy. This is most likely the injury that you sustained. When the ligaments are torn and are left to themselves to heal, they tend to grow back together stretched out and too long. This will often result in an unstable ankle like yours. Any sprain with torn ligaments requires, at the least, a cast with no weight bearing for a short time. Two to three weeks is usually adequate. The other alternative, sometimes a necessary one, is surgery. The torn ligaments can be sewn together at the proper length. These aggressive treatments will give you a much better chance of living with a stable, normal ankle for the rest of your life. The most important rule to remember is that there is no such thing as "Just a Sprain." When you hurt your ankle, see your physician.

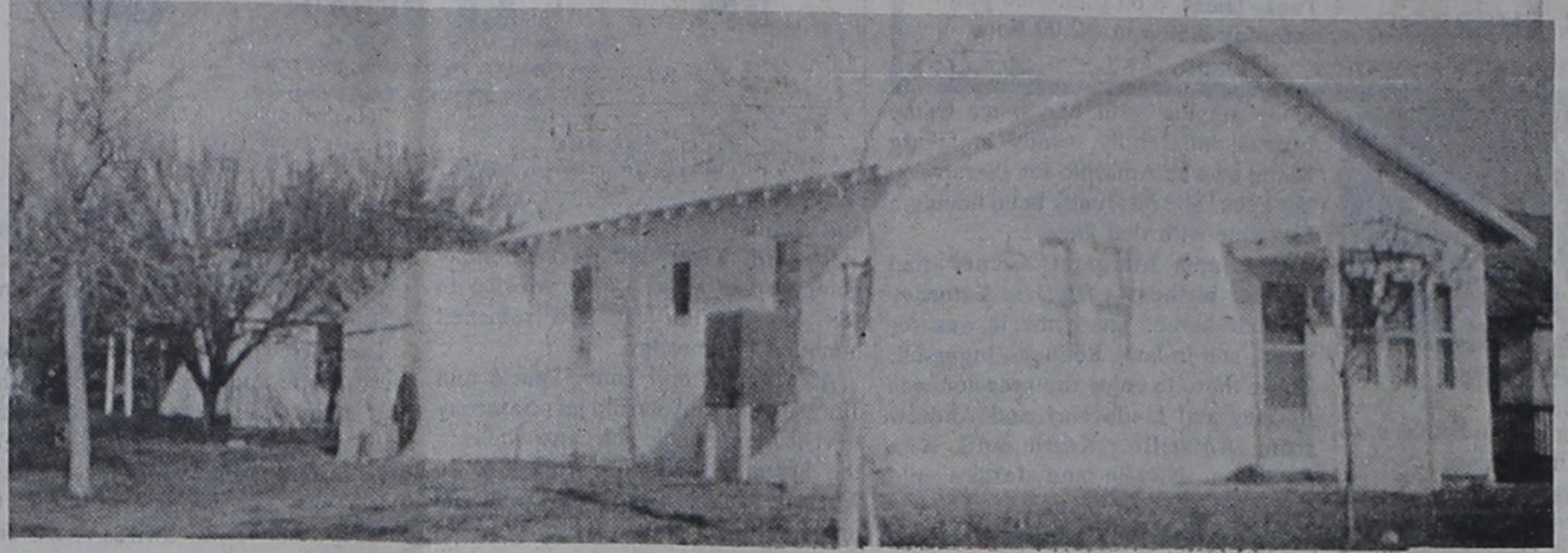
