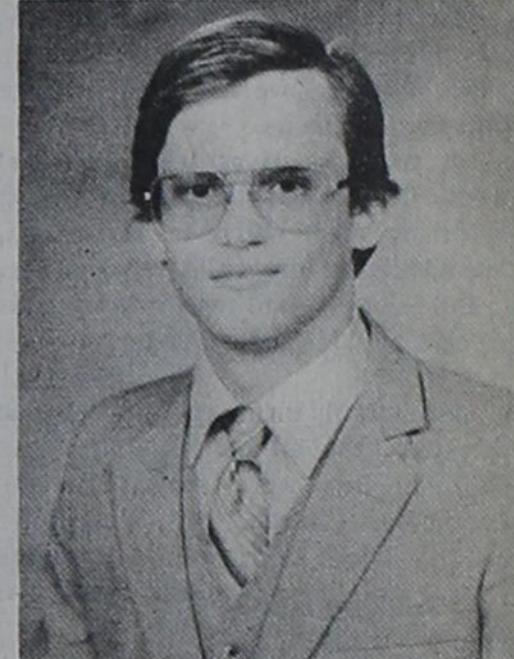

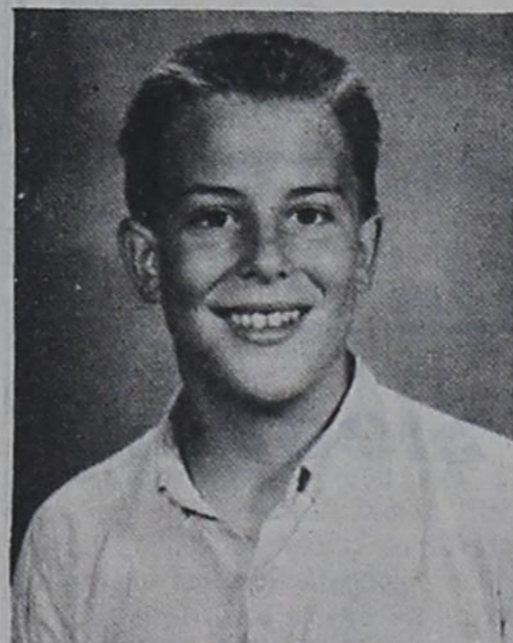
Drew Thomas Signs Letter-Of-Intent

Smoking problem looks so much better at Parkview Hospital. The administrator advised us it would be on the agenda May 12, 1987, at 8:30 p.m. We were there. I want to thank the administrator, the Board of Directors, Mr. Britt, chairman, members Mr. Grayson, Mr. Snelgrooves. We do now have a new smoking policy, these people realize the danger to the sick in this hospital, and cost every one. We understand the smoking areas will be down stairs, out of nurses station and lounge, Lab, Bookkeeping. This will help get cigarette smoke out of hallways. There are some still violating the law some visitors, some employees. And will be reported House Bill 165 will update 4801 which was never any good. Visitors or employees smoking in patients room is against the law, I understand. Also want to thank the employees at Court House who have worked hard at this health hazard. Smoking has been deterrent to their health, same as at the hospital. Nurses and others have had to put up with for 10 yrs. I know of Mr. Hyatt of Wheeler Care Center and employees are working hard to fix a separate room for those that smoke, they too know tobacco does kill.

We have a good health facility Parkview Hospital and Wheeler Care Center, neither can be healthy long as cigarette smoking is permitted there.

Mr. Robertson, administrator at hospital, and others are working for clean Air in these health places. Maybe the sick and non-smoker in this hospital, Care Center might live a little longer and not come down with cancer, heart trouble, emphysema just take a look at your lungs. Smoking does kill. Mr. Chairman, we do hope that the poor management pertaining to filthy smoking is in the past, as you indicated the past is over, but it will never go away long as we force this deadly poison in to the sick and dying lungs, by not being in compliance. One member said you can't strong arm the smoker, no one has done that to my knowledge just ask them to have respect for his fellow man. I don't believe these people want to hurt any one by their smoking. They have become addicted to tobacco cigarette smoking that kills by the millions each year.

Board of directors we still need to know why the last audit of 86 was delayed. Also about indigent care fund and what will be done in case of Aids, cost. They say \$100,000 to \$150,000. There is an epidemic as we are told.

Hennard Places 2nd In State Competition

Tommie Augusta Hennard, III placed 2nd in Ready Writing at the University Interscholastic League Academic State Meet, May 7-9 at the University of Texas at Austin. More than 2,000 students, competing in one or more of the 19 UIL academic contests, placed at district and regional contests to earn a berth in the State Meet.

"Each year, more than a third of the total participation in UIL activities involved academic contests, dispelling the myth of the League as a 'sports organization', Dr. Bailey Marshall, UIL director said. "Texas has the nation's most comprehensive slate of academic contests. Long before other academic-based competitions, the UIL was sponsoring contests in speech, journalism, mathematics and science. In fact, the League was created in 1910 as a forsenic league."

Contests range from headline writing to Lincoln-Douglas debate, calculator applications to accounting. In addition, a literary criticism contest will be implemented statewide next year.

In participating at the State Meet, students qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation scholarships. During 1986-87, the TILF awarded more than \$362,000 in scholarship grants to 282 college students who competed at the UIL State Academic Meet. In 1987, the TILF expects to award an estimated 300 new and renewed grants, valued at approximately \$400,000. The TILF funds are made possible through grants from foundations, individuals and families. Recently, the TILF reached \$1 million in endowed funds.
