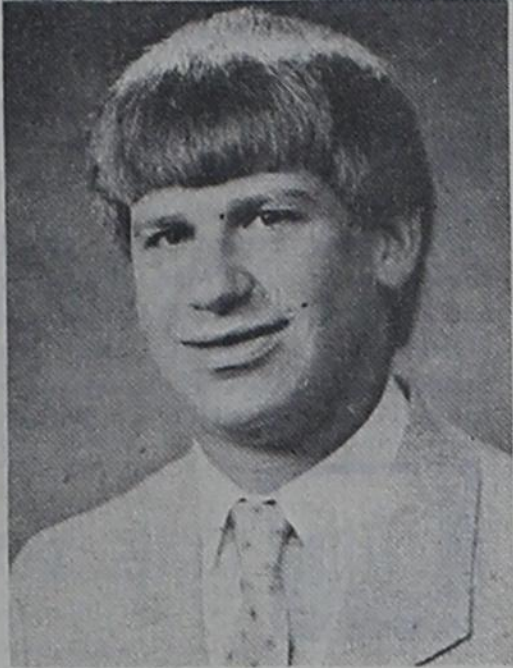

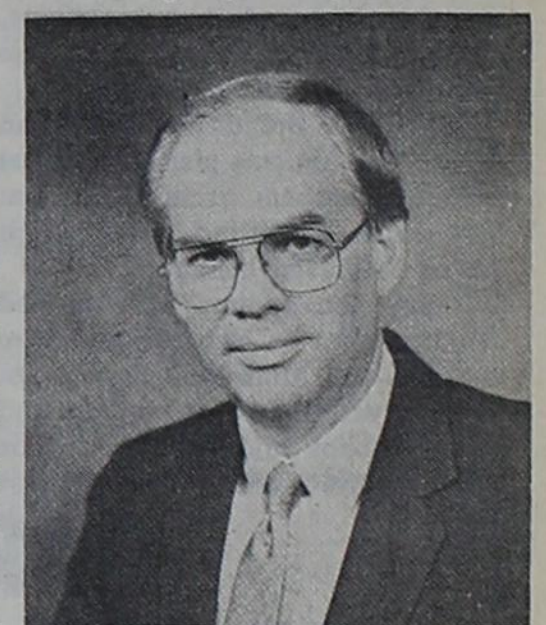
3 Day Meeting At Church of Christ

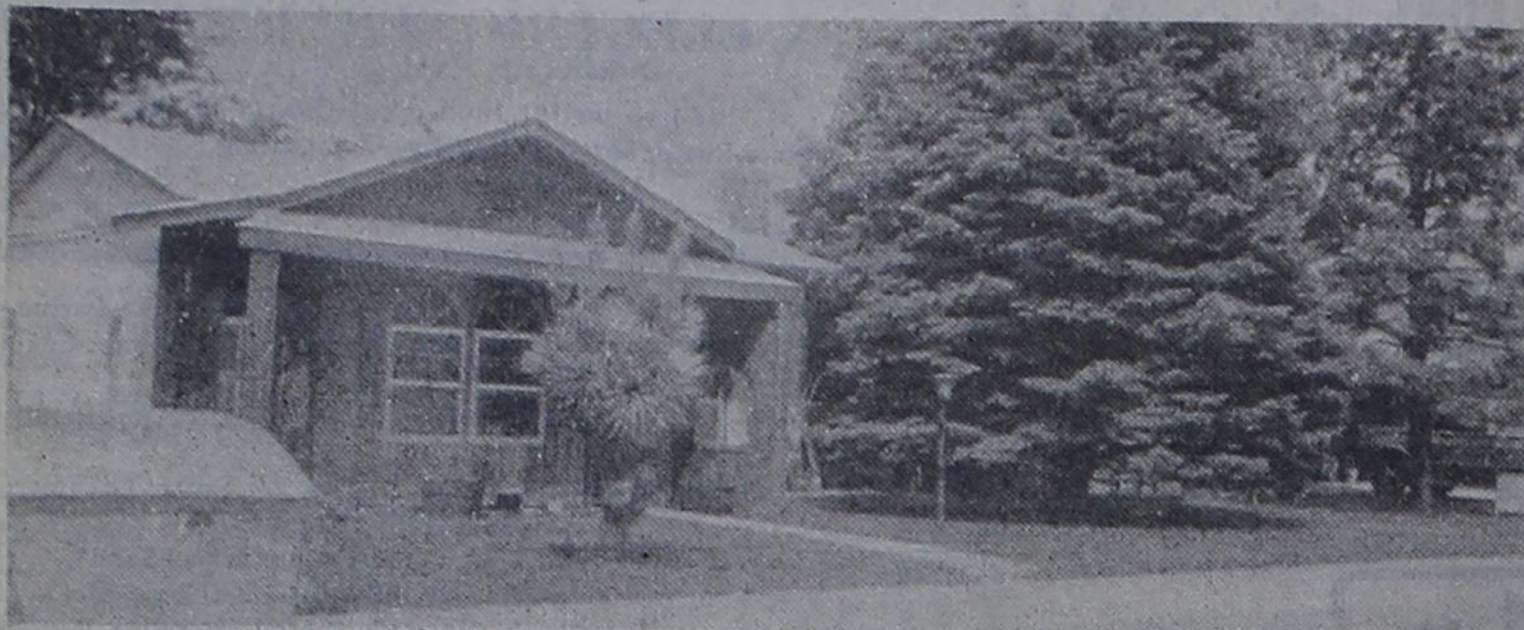

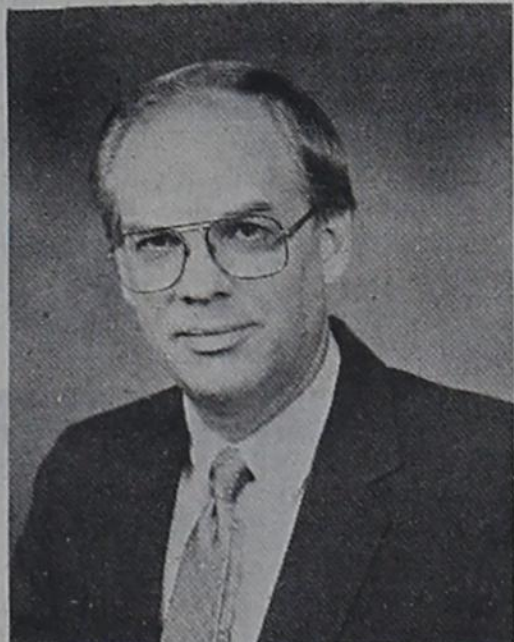

What's Up Doc?
Painful Elbow
Question: Doctor, I have done a lot of work around the house lately. For the last few days I have noticed that my elbow is extremely painful when lifting. What could cause this?

Answer:
There are many injuries associated with new activities or an increased level of activity. Most of these problems are associated with muscular injuries and center in the muscles or tendons. Sometimes, increased activity will result in stress fractures of the related bone.

You may have one of two common problems. Increased exercise can cause sore muscles. Almost all of us have experienced this many times. These muscles are usually no longer sore after two or three days. The other likely problem that you may have described is lateral epicondylitis, or "Tennis Elbow". This is an inflammation of the tendons that result from the overuse or abuse of their corresponding muscles. Since the problem was caused by abuse, elimination of that abuse will help to solve it. Drugs are available that can help the swelling of inflammation to subside more quickly. Inflammation can also be alleviated with warmth applied to the injured area. Your physician should be able to decide which of these problems you may have and get you started on your way toward recovery.
