tame sweetened drinks tame sweetened drinks to small
children to cut down on sugar, children to cut down on sugar,
according to Mary Kinney Sweeten, a
nutritionist with University Agricultural Extension Service.
According to Mrs. Sweeten, this
amounts to 920 milligrams for a 40 pound child. Five 8 -ounce glasses of mixes in one day would contain that amount of the sweetener.
"As families eat more diet foods products, it's possible that the amount consumed by some children could
exceed an acceptable daily intake the sweetner," cautions the nutritionist. Aspartame is sold under the brand names Equal and Nutrasweet and is used in gelatin and pudding mixes,
dry cereals, instant coffees and teas, dairy toppings for dining table use, desserts, dessert toppings, powdere addition to carbonated beverages.
Last year the FDA approved the Last year the FDA approved the use
of aspartame in four new food
categories .. frozen novelties, frozen and refrigerated juices, ready-to-
serve tea and breath mints, she say serve tea and breath mints, she says.
Other categories still awaiting FDA approval include bulk frozen desserts,
frozen cheesecake, yogurt, flavored frozen cheesecake, yogurt, flavored
milk, wine coolers, fruit spreads and syrups.
"Parents who are concerned about hame children getting too much asparexcessive sugar,"' Sweeten maintains. such as fruit juice nutritious drinks water," she suggests. "Rather than aspartame-sweetened brealfast varities of bosserts, try low-sugar recipes, cut down on the amount of sugar used.'
Food and Drug Administration in 1981 after reports of extensive studies established its safety. The FDA says it has received few complaints about any
adverse effects of aspertame in children, she notes.
