Sheriff Lonnie Miller called me last week to bring me up to date on the activities of the sheriff's department. The arrest of the murder suspect was followed with the discovery of a dead man east of Shamrock on Wednesday afternoon; the man had had heart surgery and apparently began to feel bad and pulled off Interstate 40. The car was locked and no foul play was indicated. The McLean Ambulance made a call just inside Wheeler county on the other side of the county in the early hours of the morning on Thursday; an injured man had been found along Interstate 40. The individual was the victim of a 'hit and run' incident which left the man in critical condition. He was taken directly to Northwest Texas Hopital in Amarillo.

It appears we are going to have to become more careful. Sheriff Miller has an article in this week's issue advising citizens of the county to be more suspicious of strangers coming to their home for any reason. You are also advised to mark items and record seriel numbers of televisions, recorders and other small household appliances or personal items. Read the warning and act accordingly; unfortunately, it does happen here.

WARNING ISSUED

Sheriff Lonnie Miler would like to warn the people of Wheeler County to be suspicious of strangers coming to their homes for any reason.

Sheriff Miller stated there has been four rural break-ins of residences and barns during the last month. Anytime strangers come to your home asking for directions or anything, try to get a description and license number off of their vehicle. They may be looking your home over and planning to come back and break in while you are away.

It is now more important than ever to record all serial numbers off all T.V.'s, V.C.R.'s, guns, microwaves, and any appliance that might be picked up and put in a vehicle.

Anytime you have a stranger come to your home, call the Sheriff's office. Sheriff Miller will be more than glad to check them out. They may not have stolen anything, but they might be coming back later.

Marking Gun Available At Sheriff's Office

The citizens of Wheeler County are reminded of the availability of a marking gun to mark their personal items. The sheriff's department has guns to loan for the marking of items easily carried off by burglars. To borrow the gun, contact the jail in Wheeler or the dispatch in Shamrock.

In marking items, the owner is urged to use their driver's license number for identification. The license number can be traced, where a social security number can not be traced. For the collector of antique dishes

Vikings Senior Ignites Team At Point Guard

Francis Howell senior guard Tracy Atherton has Viking's coach Mike Gibbons kicking himself.

Gibbons recently moved Atherton to the point guard position. She had spent the last 11/2 seasons at the wing spot. An illness on the team forced Atherton to the point, where she was given the responsiblity of running the entire offense.

The two positions are vastly different and Gibbons was unsure how Atherton would react to the drastic change.

But the 5-foot-5 spark plug has come through with flying colors-much to the delight of Gibbons. He only wishes he would have made the switch earlier.

"It's my fault; I'm kicking myself", he said. "I should have done this sooner."

Atherton moved to the point guard spot during the Hazelwood Central Tournament in mid-January and has been there ever since. Her average has climbed steadily; her totals of assists and steals are also on the rise.

Not only is Atherton scoring more but the team is playing a lot better, says Gibbons.

"Tracy can do so many more things," at point, Gibbons said. "I thought she'd be able to get more shots and concentrate more on her shooting at wing, but it didn't work that way.

"This way she has more duties but she's getting into the game more."

At first, Atherton was unenthusiastic about the move. Bus she realizes she has been playing better of late. She also knows the switch in positions has a lot to do with her improvement.



CRP producers are reminded that grass is required to be planted according to the provisions of the CRP program. The grass species which was decided upon is included in the producer's copy of the contract. If seed has not been purchased or a contractor located for sowing the grass, proper arrangements should be made as soon as possible.

Grass seeding is in progress. The date to begin seedbed preparations for lovegrass that is scheduled to be sown clean till has been changed to April 15. The final date for seeding grass will remain June 1.

WATCH SUGAR-SUBSTITUTE INTAKE OF SMALL CHILDREN

Parents who are worried about their small children eating too much sugar should also be concerned about their intake of the sugar-substitute aspartame.

Many mothers are giving aspartame sweetened drinks to small children to cut down on sugar, according to Mary Kinney Sweeten, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension

According to Mrs. Sweeten, this amounts to 920 milligrams for a 40 pound child. Five 8-ounce glasses of powdered aspartame-sweetened drink mixes in one day would contain that amount of the sweetener.

"As families eat more diet foods and aspartame is added to more products, it's possible that the amount consumed by some children could exceed an acceptable daily intake of the sweetner," cautions the nutrition-

ist. Aspartame is sold under the brand names Equal and Nutrasweet and is used in gelatin and pudding mixes, dry cereals, instant coffees and teas, dairy toppings for dining table use, desserts, dessert toppings, powdered beverage mixes and chewing gum, in addition to carbonated beverages.

Last year the FDA approved the use of aspartame in four new food categories -- frozen novelties, frozen and refrigerated juices, ready-toserve tea and breath mints, she says. Other categories still awaiting FDA approval include bulk frozen desserts, frozen cheesecake, yogurt, flavored milk, wine coolers, fruit spreads and syrups.

"Parents who are concerned about their children getting too much aspartame can still help them avoid excessive sugar," Sweeten maintains.

"Try substituting nutritious drinks, such as fruit juice, milk and even water," she suggests. "Rather than aspartame-sweetened breakfast cereals or desserts, try low-sugar varities of both. In home-prepared recipes, cut down on the amount of sugar used."

Aspartame was approved by the Food and Drug Administration in 1981 after reports of extensive studies established its safety. The FDA says it has received few complaints about any York City at Lincoln Center in 1985 adverse effects of aspertame in children, she notes.




