### Three Burglaries Investigated

The Wheeler County Sheriff's Department investigated three burglaries Friday through Sunday. No arrests have been made, but the department has a good description of the suspects in at least one of the burglaries.

On Friday, April 10, 1987, some items were reported stolen at Mobeetie. Bob Thrasher of Pampa called the jail and reported a burglary of a residence in the Mobeetie area. An air conditioner, TV and flashlight were taken from a location southwest of Mobeetie. The break-in was discovered at 7 p.m. on Friday; it is believed the items were taken between 5 and 6 that evening.

While Sheriff Lonnie Miller was investigating the Thrasher case, he

was contacted by John Zuerker of Shamrock. Zuerker reported the loss of a saddle from a barn southeast of Mobeetie. The saddle was discovered missing on Friday afternoon. Tire tracks at both Mobeetie locations matched and are believed to be the work of the same individual or individuals.

On Sunday between 10:15 and 12:30 a.m. the residence of Darville Atherton was entered and numerous items were stolen. The Athertons reside 14 miles east of Wheeler on Highway 152.

Access to the home was gained through the patio doors and the burglars loaded their vehicle with a number of household items. Taken were three televisions, a microwave, portable sewing machine, guns, numerous antiques and other household items.

The sheriff's department has a description of the individuals and the vehicle believed used in the Atherton case. The suspect "cased" the Atherton home with the excuse of a "lost dog". The suspects were reported to have been in Sweetwater on Sunday morning and were thought to have parked on the side of the road at the top of the hill near the Atherton residence and waited for the couple to leave for church.

Sheriff Lonnie Miller reports a number of leads in the Atherton burglary and hopes to solve the case within a short period of time.

### SHERIFF'S REPORT WARNING ISSUED

Sheriff Lonnie Miller would like to warn the people of Wheeler County to be suspicious of strangers coming to their homes for any reason.

Sheriff Miller stated there has been four rural break-ins of residences and barns during the last month. Anytime strangers come to your home asking for directions or anything, try to get a description and license number off of their vehicle. They may be looking your home over and planning to come back and break in while you are away.

It is now more important than ever to record all serial numbers off all T.V.'s, V.C.R.'s, guns, microwaves, and any appliance that might be picked up and put in a vehicle.

Anytime you have a stranger come to your home, call the Sheriff's office. Sheriff Miller will be more than glad to check them out. They may not have stolen anything, but they might be coming back later.

### Marking Gun Available At Sheriff's Office

The citizens of Wheeler County are reminded of the availability of a marking gun to mark their personal items. The sheriff's department has guns to loan for the marking of items easily carried off by burglars. To borrow the gun, contact the jail in Wheeler or the dispatch in Shamrock.

In marking items, the owner is urged to use their driver's license number for identification. The license number can be traced, where a social security number can not be traced.

For the collector of antique dishes or those with china and crystal may pickup a marker which leaves an invisible mark on these items. This mark is visible under an ultraviolet light.

The owner of unmarked items recovered outside Wheeler county might not have the opportunity to identify their property. The owner of marked items could be traced through the driver's license number and the items returned to their owner.

Take the time to mark and or record the serial number of their small items; it could mean the difference of recovery or loss.

## What's Up Doc?

Dislocations

**Question:**  
Doctor, several years ago I dislocated my left shoulder while playing basketball. Since the original injury, I have had three recurrences. Is there anything that can be done to prevent this from reoccurring?

**Answer:**  
True shoulder dislocation is rarely an isolated, single event. 80-90% of patients with one dislocation repeat that injury. Each time you dislocate your shoulder, you increase the chances of future occurrences with multiple dislocations, you may have also broken the bone in your shoulder. This condition will almost assuredly continue to happen more frequently and do more damage with each occurrence. Surgery has improved markedly in recent years and results of shoulder reconstruction have improved accordingly. This is a very frustrating condition and should be corrected. Your physician should be able to help you decide is surgery is necessary at this time.

The Texas Beef Cook-Off will be at the Embassy Suites, North in Austin, on April 13 and 14.

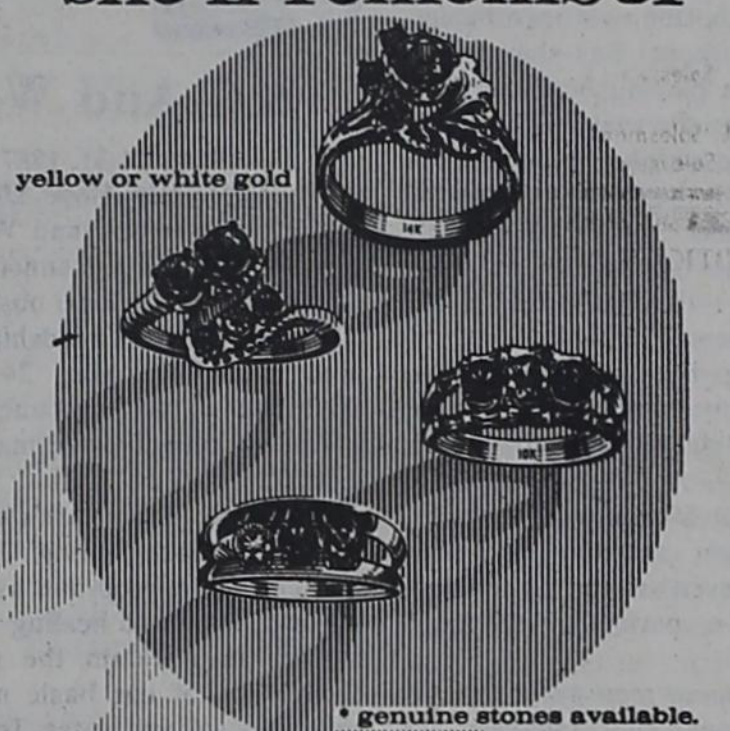

# STORM ALERT

Do you have your place of safety picked out in case a storm is spotted heading in the direction of Wheeler? If not, it would be wise to make a plan of action if it becomes necessary to take shelter.

Each year the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department divides their men into storm watch crews; these men go on duty each time Wheeler is placed under storm alert. The crews position themselves at different locations around Wheeler and watch the clouds for threatening conditions. Radio contact with the fire station allows the immediate sounding of the siren if they feel it is necessary.

The alarm will be sounded when the men feel citizens should take shelter.

The warning, as it has been for a number of years, will be two 30-second blasts. (Note; in case of fire during severe weather, it is the policy to not sound the fire siren; the firemen are notified of the fire with their individual scanners). In threatening weather, if the alarm sounds, two long blasts indicate shelter should be taken. If the power has been knocked out, firetrucks will be used to drive the streets blowing sirens to alert you and shelter should be taken.

Where should you go for shelter? Storm cellars are all over Wheeler; check if the neighbors have a cellar and ask permission to use it in case of a storm. Your second choice would be the basement of the courthouse as it

will be open for those wishing to take refuge in the basement.

If the storm alert sounds during school hours, **DO NOT GO TO THE SCHOOL AFTER YOUR CHILD!** The school has a plan for the protection of your children and they are safer at the school than in a car or on the grounds trying to take shelter elsewhere. The basement of the gym provides room to

provide shelter for the entire school—students and faculty.

Again, you are advised to plan now and don't wait until the alarm is sounded to look for shelter; this plan of action may save your life. If the neighbors have a cellar; don't be afraid to ask permission to use it.

## Tina Alvey Receives Scholarship

Tina Alvey, a senior at Wheeler High School, has been awarded a \$1,000 Carr Academic Scholarship at Angelo State University for 1987-88. Alvey is the daughter of Jim and Beth Alvey of Wheeler, Texas.

Alvey, who currently ranks second in her graduating class, is a member of the National Honor Society and the student council. Alvey was also active in F.H.A. as historian and vice president, the annual staff, basket-

The distinctive scholarship program, created by the late Mr. Carr in 1978, will provide approximately \$1.5 million in academic scholarships during the 1987-88 school year to assist worthy and deserving students to pursue their education at Angelo State University.

Mr. Carr bequeathed to the Board of Regents, Texas State University System, for the use of Angelo State, all his interest in oil, gas and other minerals with the provision that these properties be held in trust for the establishment of the Carr Academic Scholarship Program.

## Shamrock Community Concert Association

An unusual treat is in store for members of the Shamrock Community Concert Association April 23rd. As the last of its series of three concerts, the Association will welcome the Colorado Children's Chorale at High School Auditorium at 8 p.m.

Thirty talented young singers under the artistic direction of founder Duain Wolfe make up the Colorado Children's Chorale. For over a decade the Chorale has hailed as one of the outstanding children's chorale's in the world. The group has toured throughout the United States and has appeared in many overseas cities - Shanghai where the children performed for Radio Peking as well as other points in China; at the Aberdeen International Festival of Music and the Performing Arts in Scotland as well as singing with the Edinburgh Festival Fringe.

The ensemble appeared in New York City at Lincoln Center in 1985 and has made two major United States tours.

The ensemble is unusual among children's choruses in its use of both boys and girls voices to create a sound of genuine richness. Also, because of its diversity in the repertoire - ranging from opera and musical theatre to standard choral compositions in classical, folk and popular traditions.

Duain Wolfe formed a children's chorus in 1974 for the Colorado entrant City Opera's production of "A Mid-summer Night's Dream." Enthusiasm was so great that the group continued its appearances until increased demands for its appearance led Wolfe to form the Children's Chorale as it is now organized.

The Chorale has expanded into five separate groups, encompassing three-hundred children in grades two through eight. The first is a Prep Choir for beginners; further training and performance experience is provided in the Apprentice Choir. The primary performing group for the Denver area is the Concert Choir with the best of the Concert Choir members joining the Tour Choir, which performs out of state.

## WATCH SUGAR-SUBSTITUTE INTAKE OF SMALL CHILDREN

Parents who are worried about their small children eating too much sugar should also be concerned about their intake of the sugar-substitute aspartame.

Many mothers are giving aspartame sweetened drinks to small children to cut down on sugar, according to Mary Kinney Sweeten, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

According to Mrs. Sweeten, this amounts to 920 milligrams for a 40 pound child. Five 8-ounce glasses of powdered aspartame-sweetened drink mixes in one day would contain that amount of the sweetener.

"As families eat more diet foods and aspartame is added to more products, it's possible that the amount consumed by some children could exceed an acceptable daily intake of the sweetener," cautions the nutritionist.

Aspartame is sold under the brand names Equal and Nutrasweet and is used in gelatin and pudding mixes, dry cereals, instant coffees and teas, dairy toppings for dining table use, desserts, dessert toppings, powdered beverage mixes and chewing gum, in addition to carbonated beverages.

Last year the FDA approved the use of aspartame in four new food categories - frozen novelties, frozen and refrigerated juices, ready-to-serve tea and breath mints, she says. Other categories still awaiting FDA approval include bulk frozen desserts, frozen cheesecake, yogurt, flavored milk, wine coolers, fruit spreads and syrups.

"Parents who are concerned about their children getting too much aspartame can still help them avoid excessive sugar," Sweeten maintains.

"Try substituting nutritious drinks, such as fruit juice, milk and even water," she suggests. "Rather than aspartame-sweetened breakfast cereals or desserts, try low-sugar varieties of both. In home-prepared recipes, cut down on the amount of sugar used."

Aspartame was approved by the Food and Drug Administration in 1981 after reports of extensive studies established its safety. The FDA says it has received few complaints about any adverse effects of aspartame in children, she notes.


