

There will be no charge for the course, but the books will cost \$20. Instructors will be Dwight Tipps and Mary K. Christner.

Anyone interested in learning CPR, Cardio Pulmonary Resesitation, and the care of victims of illness or accident is invited to participate in the class. The knowledge of CPR would enable you keep the blood and oxygen circulating, if a person dies as a result of a heart attack or accident. The course will also instruct in the care of cuts, burns and broken bones.

If the heart stops and a person is not

breathing, the brain cells start dying after 4-6 minutes. What would you do?

Enrollment will be at 7:00 p.m. at the ambulance barn at the corner of Highway 83 and Third St. in Wheeler--north of the Wheeler County Jail. Classes are usually on Monday and Thursday evenings.

In the past, we have tended to tell women that their monthly cramps were psychological, or "All In Their Heads." One drug, Naprosyn, specifically inhibits PGF2-alpha. It was found that if taken during monthly cramps, like you describe, the vast majority of women have a dramatic response, while about 75% have total relief. Lately, it has been said quite often that "Today, there is no reason for any woman to have significant problems with normal monthly cramps." There are other causes of severe pain each month, many of which can be treated as well. If you have questions, consult your physician. He should be able to help you back on the road to a normal life each month.



\* Study all health care bills to make sure that you or your insurance pays only for services performed.




