WHEELER WINS BLOWOUT, KELTON GRABS SQUEAKER

[EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was taken from the Amarillo Daily News, February 18, 1987. Written by Jim Lexa.]

District 4-1A swept a girls' bi-district playoff double-header Tuesday night, with 4-1A champion Wheeler winning a blowout and runner-up Kelton taking a squeaker.

Wheeler, unranked at 24-2, cake-walked its way past Higgins, 69-36, in the opener at Clifton McNeely Fieldhouse.

In the nightcap, 21-3 Kelton connected on some fourth-quarter free throws to beat 3-1A champion Follett, 53-49. Only once did more than five points separate the teams, and that was when Follett grabbed an early 8-2 lead.

Wheeler and Kelton advanced into the Class 1A area playoff round, to be played later this week. Wheeler will play Claude, a 70-48 winner over Adrian Tuesday, with Kelton meeting Groom, a 47-33 winner over Vega.

In Wheeler's victory, the Mustangettes used Marlo Hartman's baseline jumper and a tenacious defense to record an easy win.

Hartman, an all-state senior post, scored 18 points, making 7 of 10 shots from the floor and all four free-throw attempts. Hartman, who was the Globe-News Super Team freshman and also sophomore of the year, also grabbed a team-high 12 rebounds, including five offensive boards.

Financial Management Short Course

A two-day short course discussing Financial Management will be held February 25 and 26 in Pampa at the Courthouse Annex meeting room from 1:00 to 8:15 p.m. each day.

The workshop will focus on the construction, understanding and use of basic financial statements. Topics covered will include enterprise budgeting, partial budgeting, cash flow analysis, income statement, balance sheet and ratio analysis.

Participants will work a number of examples including analyzing the acceptability of some hypothetical loan applications.

Instructors for the course includes several local financial officials as well as Steve Amosson, Extension Economist-Management from Amarillo and local farmer-rancher Gerry Ingnum. Other local discussion leaders include Gary Sutherland, Vice-President, Pampa Office of Canadian PCA; Debbie Stokes, Assistant Vice-President, First National Bank of Pampa; Greg Lloyd, Vice-President, High Plains Federal Land Bank Association of Pampa; and Jim Olsen, Vice-President, Citizens Bank & Trust Co., Pampa.

Pre-registration for the short course by February 18 is requested. To pre-register contact the Gray County Extension Office, 669-7429. A registration fee of \$25.00 per individual or couple will cover cost of materials and can be paid at the door. Participants should bring a calculator. A supper will be provided both nights courtesy of the co-sponsoring financial institutions.

This program is intended for farmers, ranchers and others who want to learn more about these financial subjects that are becoming more important in obtaining farm and ranch loans.

This short course is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Gray County Extension Agricultural Committee.

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PRO™ TEXAS

A NEW OPTIONAL CALLING PLAN FROM AT&T

On November 13, 1986 AT&T Communications of The Southwest, Inc. ("AT&T") filed with the Public Utility Commission (PUC) of Texas to introduce a new intrastate, optional calling plan, PRO Texas. A comparable interstate plan, known as PRO America, is currently available to Texas customers.

PRO Texas gives Texas consumers an opportunity to save money on direct dialed in-state long distance calls. Customers who choose this new AT&T plan will receive a 10% discount on all AT&T intrastate direct dialed station calls by paying a monthly charge of \$15.00.

The PRO Texas discount applies to calls placed during all rate periods and all days. The discount is in addition to the AT&T intrastate evening discount of 25% and the night/weekend discount of 40%. A one time charge of \$6.00 will be billed to initiate the service. However, this charge will be waived during the first 90 days that the offering is available.

PRO Texas will be available to all Message Telephone Service customers in Texas. AT&T estimates that it will generate revenues in the first year of almost \$8 million, which is 7% of AT&T's annual revenues for all Texas intrastate service.

The PUC has assigned Docket No. 7194 to this proposed service offering. The proposed effective date for PRO Texas is March 16, 1987. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the PUC as soon as possible. Spending more money on food doesn't necessarily mean you're getting more nutrition. Consider the following examples:

*Enriched specialty breads, such as French and Italian, cost up to three times more than enriched white bread with similar nutritional value.

*Parboiled (converted) rice and regular rice have the same nutritional value, but the converted rice costs twice as much.

*Fresh, frozen or canned fruits and vegetables have essentially the same nutritional value. Fresh produce in season is usually cheaper.

*Nonfat dry milk, skim milk, lowfat milk and whole milk have the same amount of calcium, riboflavin and protein. Nonfat milk is the least expensive. If there are sales among different types of fluid milk, you would get the same nutrition by buying the least expensive as the most expensive. But do remember that for children under 2, whole milk is recommended.

*Lean meat from a lower cost cut is similar in food value to lean meat from a high cost cut. For example, cooked lean from a pot roast or round steak, trimmed of fat, is a nutritious as porterhouse steak, trimmed of fat.

If you are on a tight budget for food, you don't need to feel like you're short-changing your family nutritionally. Most of the added cost for food products pays for packaging and convenience. If you stick to basic food products, you can save money. And if you buy a variety of foods from the basic food groups of meat, poultry and fish; breads and cereals; fruits and vegetables; and dairy products, you can be assured you're getting sound nutrition for your money.

"Share Our Success" is the statewide theme for this year's Public School Week activities.

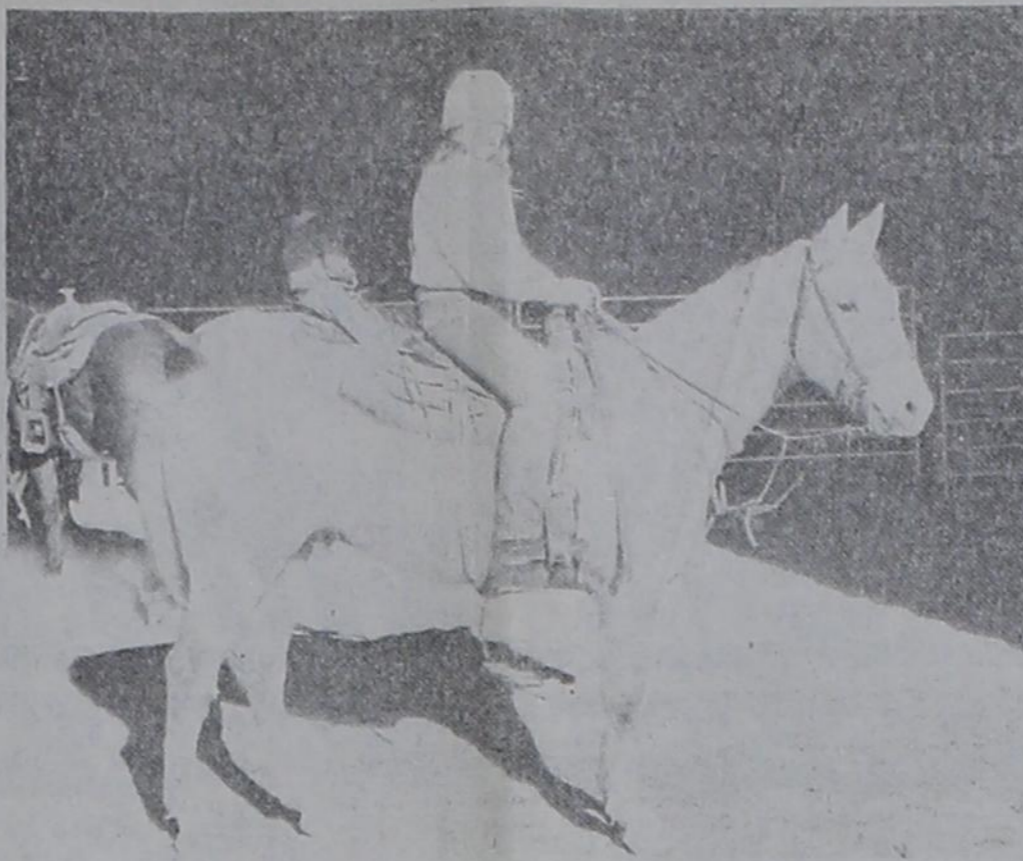
All classrooms, elementary through high school, will host open-house activities during this week and everyone is invited to see first-hand how the school district operates.

Have Reason For Pruning Ornamentals

By Don King

Don't wack away at woody ornamentals in your yard unless they really need pruning. Some of the right reasons for pruning include removing dead or winter-killed growth or balancing the top with the root system when setting out new plants. Exposing the structural form of plants such as crape myrtles can be done by removing overly dense growth or small, twiggy limbs that cross one another. Also remove diseased or insect-injured wood as well as storm or accident-damaged limbs.

Shrubs can be rejuvenated by removing older branches at the base. Pruning also can help develop a desired shape or size as well as aid in producing better flowers and fruit. If possible, avoid severe pruning. It is better to prune lightly and more often to prevent sunscald to sensitive inner branches. Never leave stubs that invite insects and disease to enter.

Plants which bloom in early spring with the appearance of new leaves should be pruned after they flower. Those that bloom later in the spring or summer should be pruned during the dormant season. For any pruning operations, always use sharp tools.

like that this year," Wheeler coach Jan Newland said. "When she gets it down in there she's tough."

DeAnn Jolly, Wheeler's 5-9 junior wing, survived a pair of slight knee injuries in the game to score eight points, but more importantly get eight rebounds and four steals.

Guard Tera Henderson, a 5-3 sophomore, made six steals for Wheeler, while senior wing Tammy Baker had 14 points.

"I thought we played well, but we threw the ball away (14 turnovers) when we shouldn't have," said Newland, whose team is 52-6 over the last two seasons. "I thought we played a good defensive game."

Wheeler, which made 25 of 33 free-throw attempts (75.8 percent) while winning its 16th consecutive game, converted 25 Higgins turnovers into 22 points.

Higgins, which trailed 41-13 at the half, was led by Carrie Detrixhe, who had 18 points and seven rebounds. Robbie Pudwill had eight points and a team-high 12 rebounds for 10-9 Higgins.

In the nightcap, Kelton shot 38.5 percent (20 of 52) from the floor - most of it from the outside - and survived a scary 52 percent (13 of 25) from the line. But the Lady Lions clicked when they had to.

Kelton led by one or three points during the fourth quarter, except for the final stanza's first eight seconds - before Michele Keelin hit an outside shot to give Kelton a 38-37 lead - and in the game's final minute, when Michele Keelin hit the front end of a one-and-one for a 51-47 advantage.

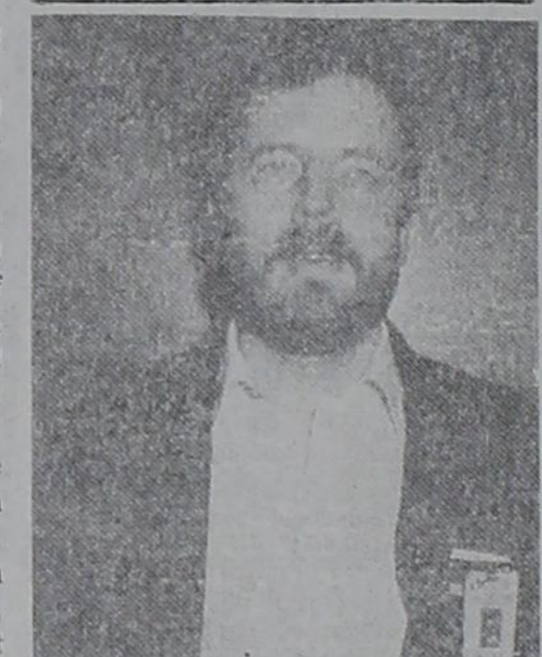
