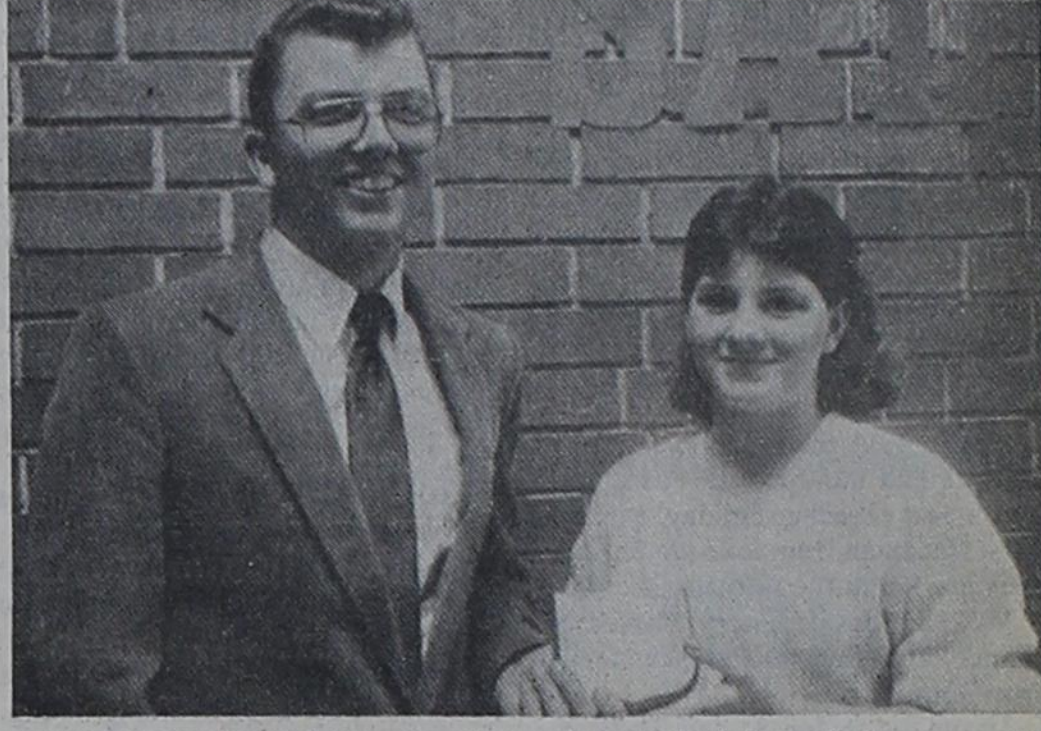

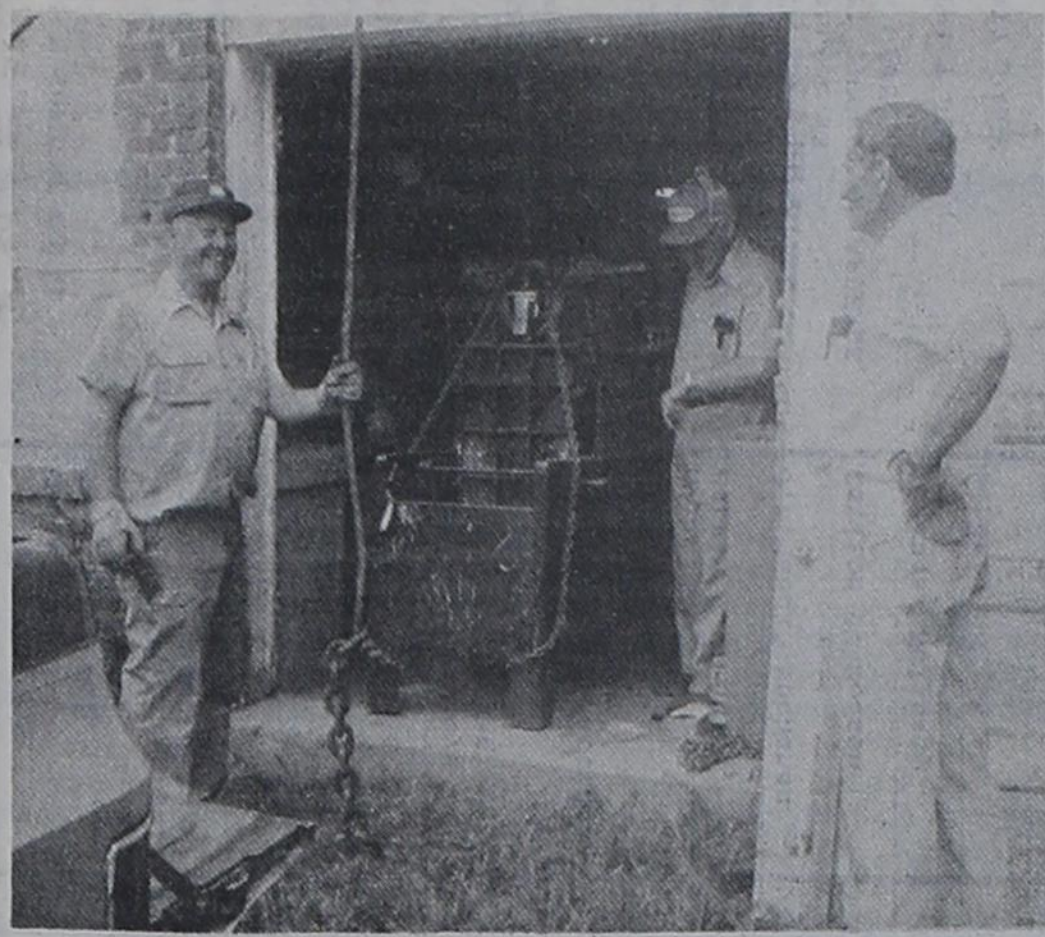

SESQUICENTENNIAL

COMMORATIVE COOKBOOK AVAILABLE

Texas Living Past and Present is a must for the cookbook collector who enjoys good eating and good reading. The book contains a collection of family traditions, old medicinal remedies and receipts, household hints and old family recipes shared by people throughout Texas. The book was compiled by the Dallas County Home Economics Resource Committee.

"I've never gone crazy but sure have been vexed," is a quote from David Preston Wilson (1857-1928). Mr. Wilson was bitten by a mad dog in about 1882 while working in western Cooke County. He was treated with a mad stone in "Old Jim Town" in the Indian Nation. The account of his experience was shared by his grandson, Mr. Jerry Wilcox, and is included in the Medicinal Remedies and Receipts section.

A mad stone is a grey porous plat stone, usually about the size of a silver quarter, taken from the stomach of a wild deer, according to Wilcox and several other contributors to this topic. The mad stone was to be applied to the wound made by the mad dog. The stone would stick as long as it was drawing the poison out. When the stone turned loose, it was dropped into hot water, then into sweet milk, fresh from a cow or warmed on the stove. When the water and milk turned green then you knew that the mad stone was drawing out the rabies virus.

Fourth of July picnics, Christmas Eve at Grandmothers, family reunions, Thanksgiving are among the fond remembrances included in the Traditions Section. Mrs. Jim Roach of Burnet, who sent in her recipe for Taffy candy and this remembrance of a Friday night tradition says "My grandmother came to Burnet County in a covered wagon before the Civil War. This was her recipe. My mother taught me how to make taffy when I was a child. As a teenager candy making on Friday night was something special. No televisions during the "depression," when I was growing up."

Old household hints from how to make lye soap to fly poison were shared also. According to Lee Baker of Tarrant County, a tablespoon of castor oil around the roots of a fern will make it look green and fresh in a short time.

Recipes for Hog Killing Time, Wild Game and Wild Greens, Sweet Treats, The Staff of Life, and Beef and Poultry are among the Past recipe sections. Others are Preserving, European Influence and Tex-Mex. Most of the recipes sent in were for breads and desserts. It was assumed that all good cooks knew how to prepare the plain meat and vegetable dishes.

Food came from wherever it could be found. Lamb's Quarter, Poke and Nettle provided greens for the table. Wild game supplemented the pioneer's diet and cornbread was on most tables as corn grew abundantly.

The preserving section contains directions for making jellies, jams, and pickles with current recommenda-

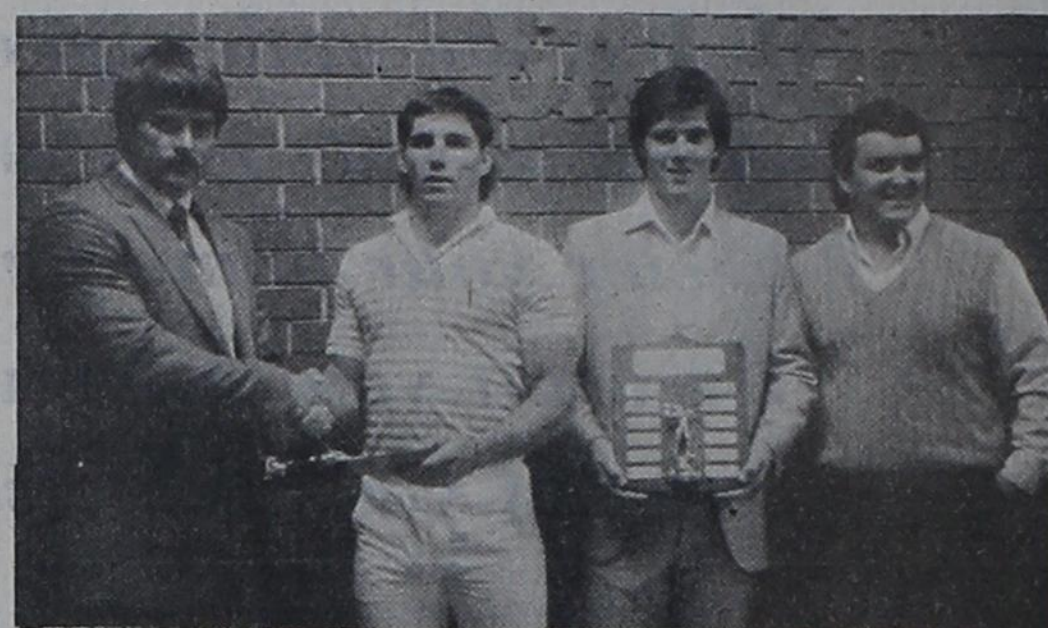

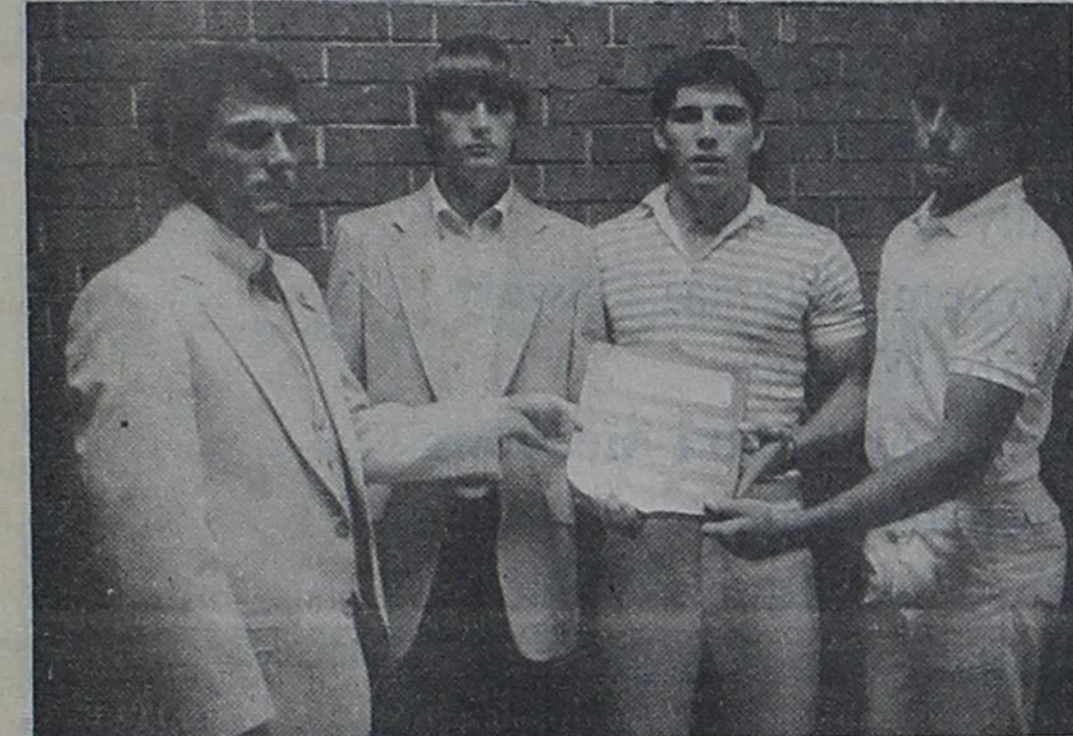

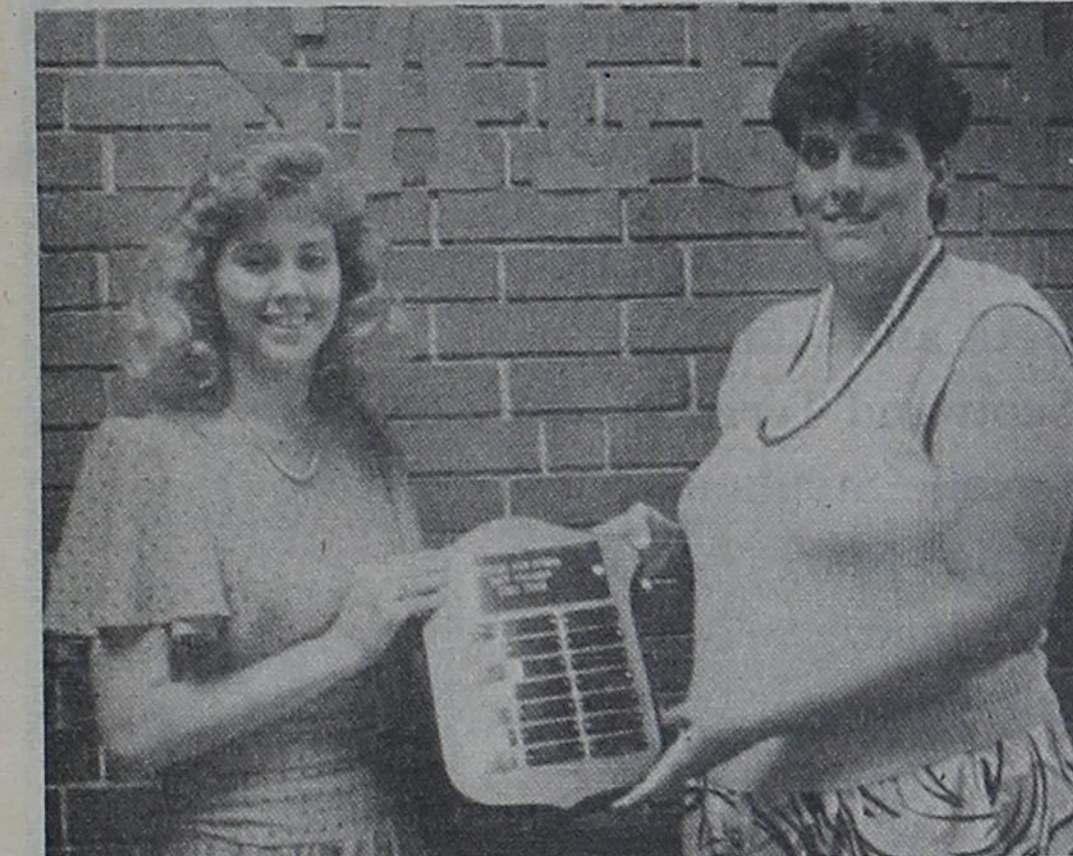
