Regular meeting of April 21, 1986, was opened by Mayor Louis C. Stas. Berniece Hall motioned to pay bills as presented, Mark Frankenbery second, motion carried. Oath of office was administered to

Mayor-elect Wanda Herd and Councilman Robert Jones by Mayor Louis C. Stas. Mr. Don Rose, councilman-elect for place 2, was unable to attend this meeting; therefore he took the Oath of Office April 16, 1986.

In his last official act, Mayor Louis C. Stas handed the official pen over to Mayor Wanda Herd and wished her success. The meeting was then resumed with Mayor Wanda Herd officiating.

Bill Owen reported on activities of the city employees. The swimming pool repairs have been completed and the city men are in the process of cleaning and painting the pools. The roof of the office is supposed to be repaired this week. Mr. Owen reported some 56 street signs are missing. He told the council an estimate of \$1477.30 would be the cost of replacing these signs. Berniece Hall motioned to replace the signs. Robert Jones second, motion carried. The city employees are cleaning the streets, trimming the grass off the curbs and spraying weeds in preparation for seal coating. The City has had a request to widen Worm Road; however this street is only 40 feet wide; therefore not much can be done. But the men have tried to clear this 40 feet in order that passing might be easier. Mr. Owen reported it is time to notify Kennedy and Masters the City wants

to exercise its 5 year option on the water rights at the wells. It was determined to notify same.

Richard Wallace presented a recap of receipts and disbursement for the 12 months ending March 31 and explained same.

Action on insurance coverage was tabled.

Applications for Swimming Pool manager were reviewed. Mark Frankenbery motioned to hire Lyndol Loyd for manager for the 1986 season. Robert Jones second, motion carried.

Robert Jones motion salaries for pool employees be set the same as last year. Berniece Hall second, Motion carried.

Berniece Hall motion pool fees to be same as 1985, Robert Jones second, motion carried.

Mark Frankenbery made motion to amend ordinance No. 122, Robert Jones second, motion carried. This amendment will read: Water bills are due the first of each month and if not paid by the 10th, a penalty of \$1.00 will be added. If not paid by the 15th, the City of Wheeler reserves the right to discontinue service and a re-connection fee of \$25.00 will be charged

to restore service. Berniece Hall motioned Mayor Herd be given authority to co-sign a note with the Fire Department to borrow money, to finish the radio and meeting room in the new building, for a four-year period with the Fire Department making the principal and interest payments. Robert Jones second, motion carried.

Mayor Herd made the following department head appointments: Berniece Hall, Park and Swimming Pool, also Mayor Pro-Tem; Mark Frankenbery; Dump Ground and Fire Department; Bobby Vanpool; Transportation; Robert Jones; Streets, and Don Rose; Water and Sewer.

With the place of collecting taxes moved to the City office, Thurman Rives requested an audit of the tax account in order that his Tax Collector's bond might be cancelled. With the audit for the year 1985-86 ready to begin, Robert Jones motioned to request auditor do this account first. Mark Frankenbery second, motion carried.

Mark Frankenbery motioned the meeting adjourn, Robert Jones second, motion carried.

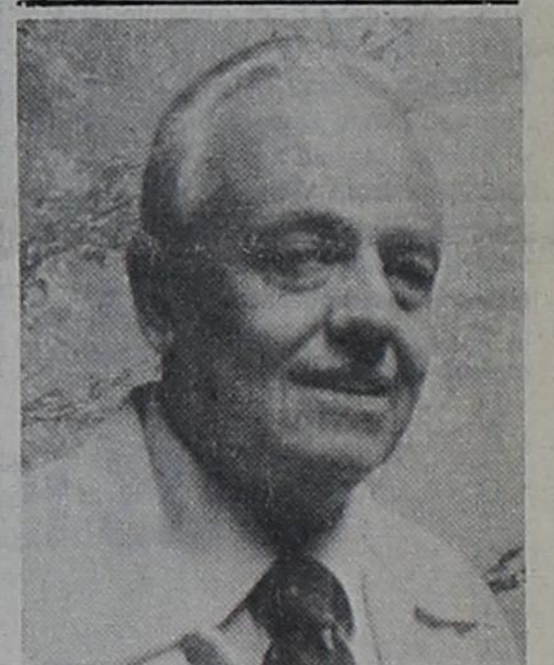

## Mustangs Capture 4th District Track Title

The Wheeler Mustangs captured their 4th consecutive District track title at Higgins this past Friday and Saturday.

The Mustangs amassed 205 total points to out score runner-up Gruver for the championship trophy. The Gruver squad totaled 153 points, while Booker, Higgins, and Follett followed with 54, 52, and 48 points respectively.

The local tracksters completed the regular season with a total of four team titles in six meets.

The Mustangs were led with eleven Regional Qualifiers, qualifying in thirteen events.

Wheeler, once again, dominated

the field events by scoring a total of 80 points.

Scoring began on Friday, with Bret Moore placing 1st in the pole vault, equaling his personal best of 11'6". Grayson Benson placed 4th with a jump of 9'6", and Steve Hinshaw placed 5th with a jump of 9'.

Bubba Smith equaled his season best of 6'4" in the high jump to claim 1st place. Richard Smith jumped 6' to place 2nd and earn a spot in the Regional Meet. David Jones placed 5th with a jump of 5'6".

Bubba Smith tossed the shot 46'8/4", a personal best, to place 2nd. Richard Smith placed 4th with a toss of 43'10/4", while Toby Collins

placed 5th with a throw of 43' 9/4". Dicky Salyer leaped 21'2/4" to place 2nd in the long jump. Bubba Smith had his personal best of 20'2/4" to place 4th, while Grayson Benson, with his personal best of 19'1/4", placed 5th.

Richard Smith with a throw of 142'6/2", set a new District 2-A record in the discus. Bubba Smith placed 3rd with a throw of 132'10".

Hale Hughes ran an 11:32 in the 3200m. run to place 2nd which allows him to compete at Levelland. Clifton Bradstreet ran his best 3200m. time of 11:53 to place 4th.

The 400m. relay team of Benefield, Salyer, Hinshaw, and Collins ran their

best time of the year, a 44.68 to qualify for regional competition.

David Jones ran a 2:08.1 in the 800m. dash to place 3rd, in a very close finish. Chad Bentley ran his personal best of 2:11.3 to finish 4th.

Three Mustangs qualified for the finals in the 110m. high hurdles, with Danny Benefield leading the field with a clocking of 15.38 to place 1st.

Bubba Smith ran a 16.06 to place 3rd, followed by Richard Smiths 4th place finish in 16.59.

Toby Collins qualified for Regional competition by placing 2nd in the 100m. dash, with a time of 11.69. Dicky Salyer followed closely with a time of 11.70 to place 3rd.

Dale Hazel ran his personal best of 51.08 in the 400m. dash to place 2nd in another close finish. Hale Hughes ran his personal best also, with a time of 53.05 to place 4th.

Danny Benefield ran a 41.26 to place 1st in the 300 intermediate hurdles. Richard Smith ran a 45.11 to place 4th.

The 200m. dash saw Dale Hazel run a 22.95 to place 3rd, which was Dale's personal best in that event also. Toby Collins ran his personal best of 23.71 to place 4th.

Todd Helton ran his best time of 5:13 in the 1600m. run to place 6th.

The 1600m. relay team of Hughes, Benson, Jones, and Hazel ran a 3:39

to place 2nd. Members of the District Champs Track Team also included Shane Guest, Greg Koelzer, Tony Jackson, Sam Childress, Randall Hugg, Eric Vanpool, Tommy Velasquez, and Tom Cook.

The Mustangs will compete in a Regional Qualifiers Meet at Vernon this Saturday, April 26. The following weekend the Mustangs will be traveling to Levelland for their Regional Meet.

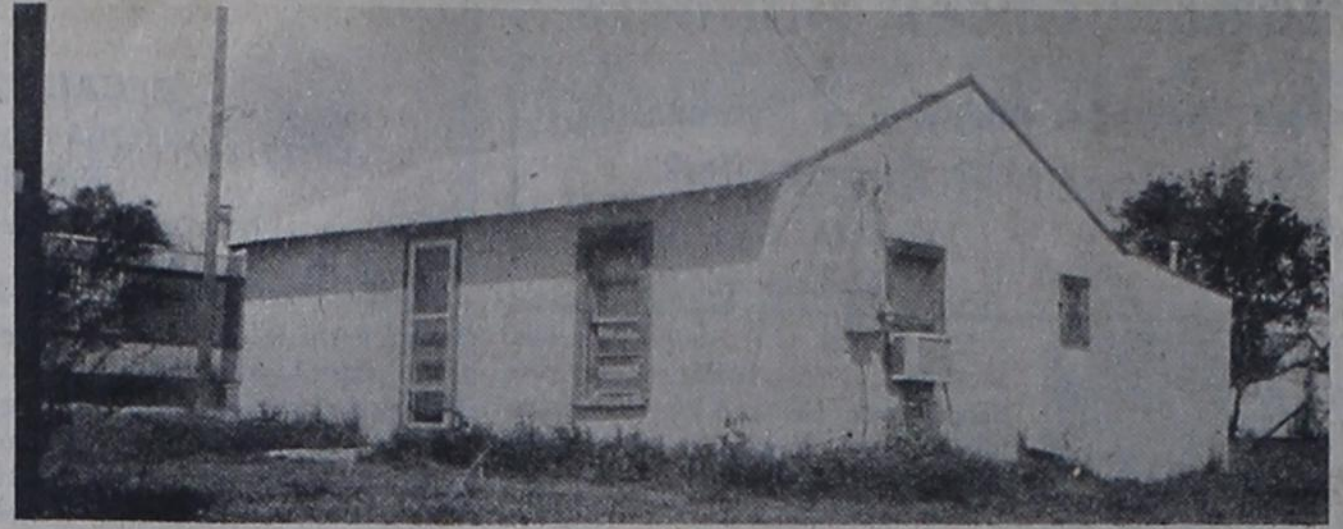

A Briscoe student is among the 232 candidates for degrees this spring at Wayland Baptist University.

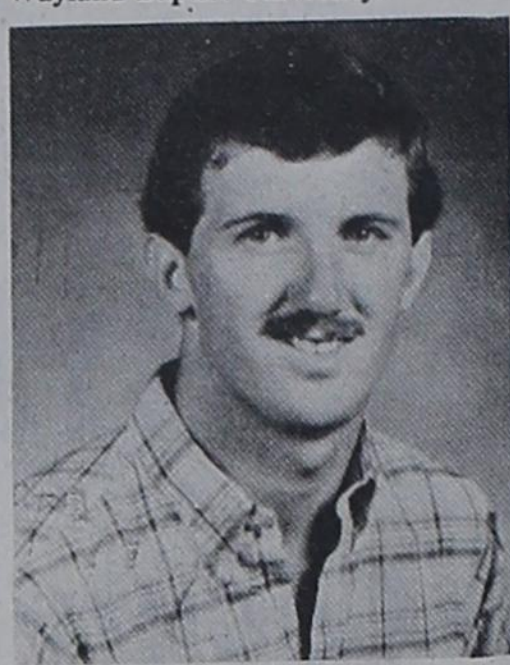
Norman Patrick Morgan is scheduled to receive the bachelor of science degree in physical education.

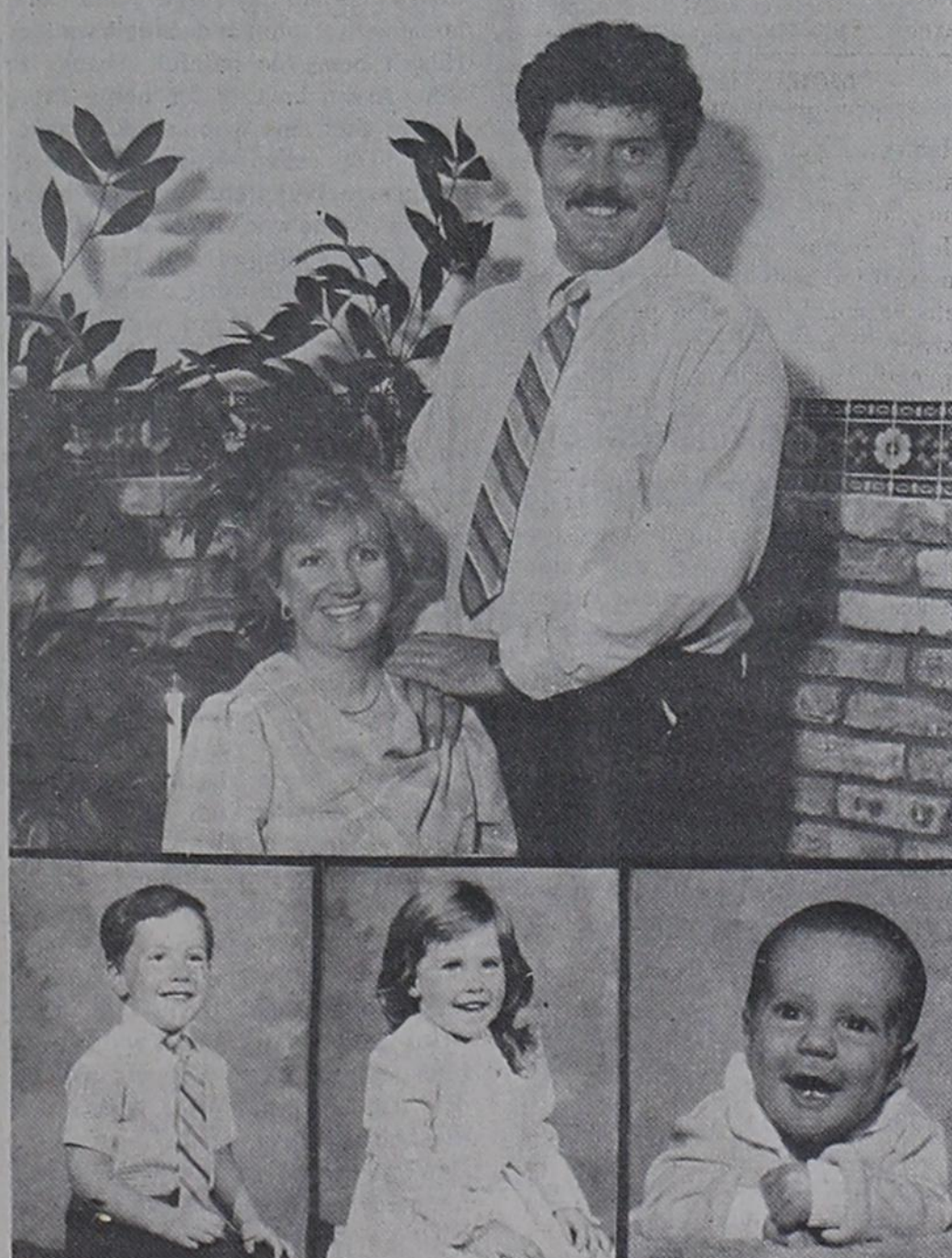

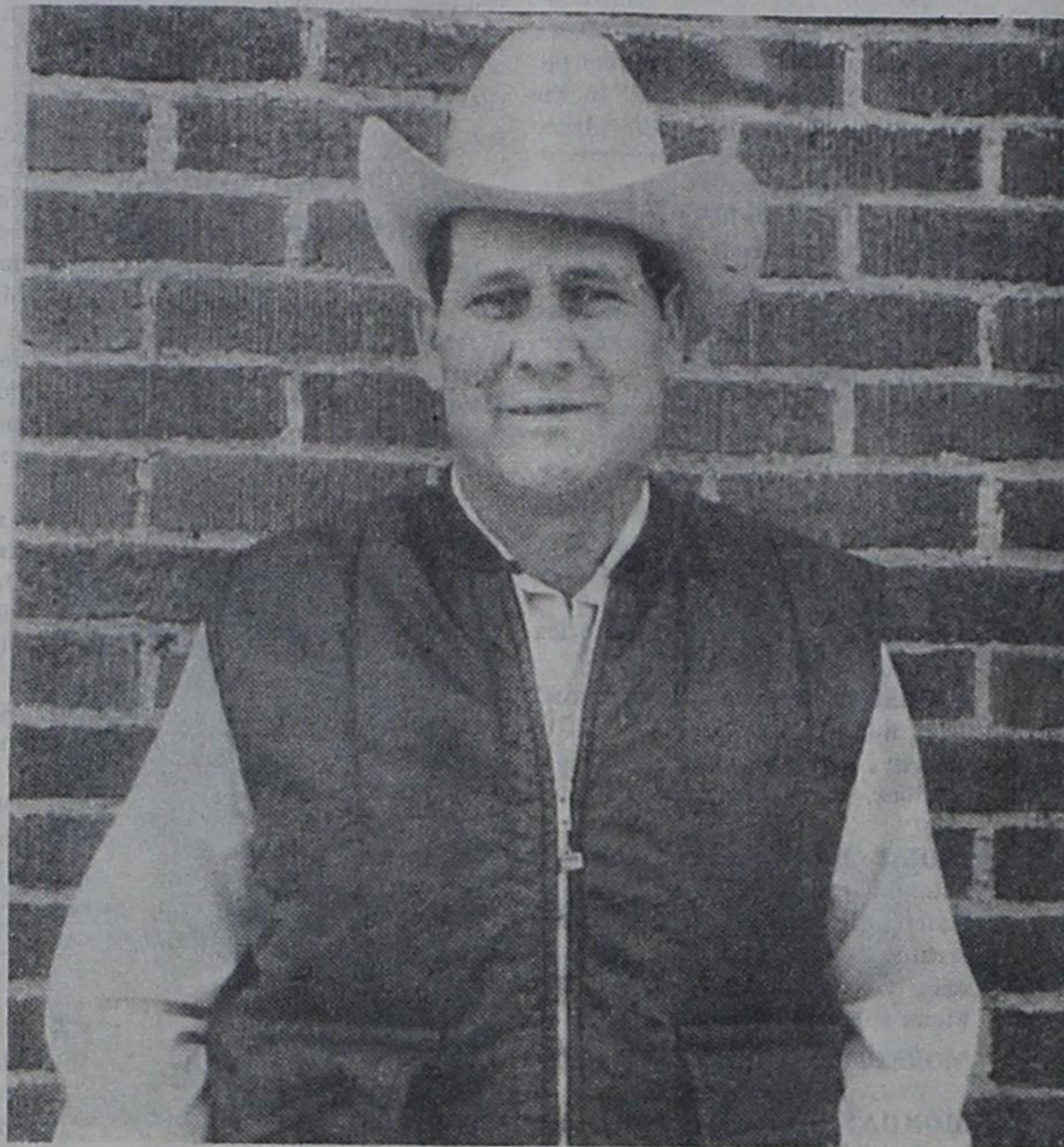
## JAMES G. COX JR. FAMILY TO BE MISSIONARIES IN VIROQUA, WISCONSIN
