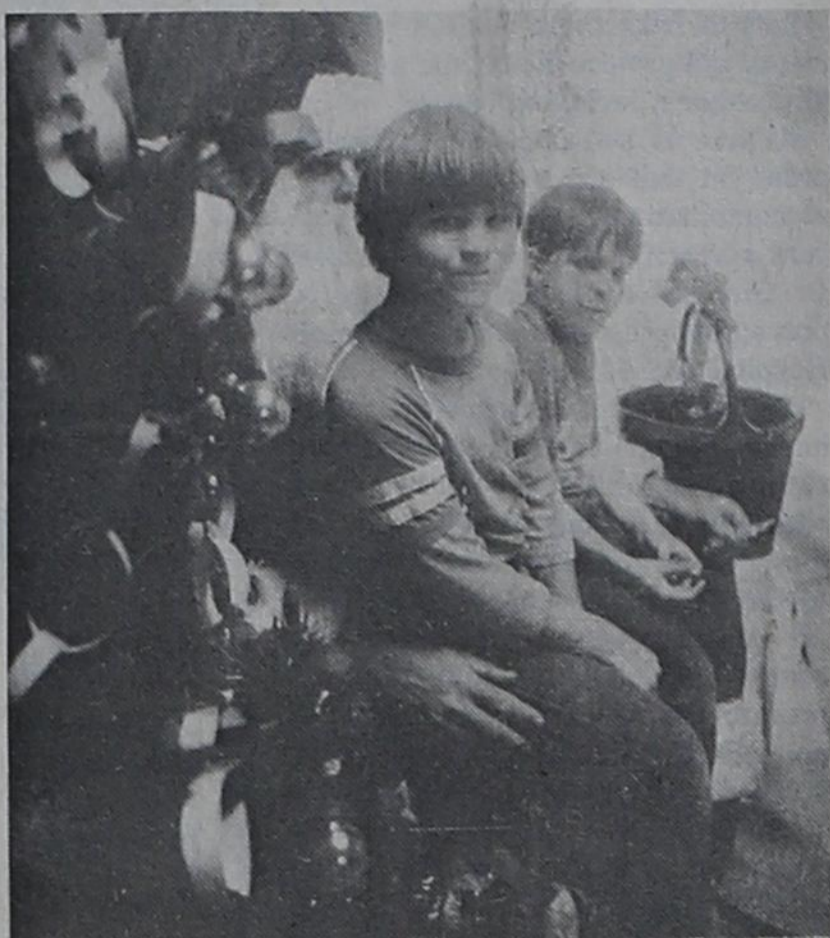

Dr. Earl Little To Speak Here Sunday

Dr. Earl Little will be at the Christian Center this coming Sunday evening at 7:00 p.m. he is President of Christian Law Association and will be ministering.

Dr. Little has been associated with the Christian Law Association since it was incorporated in 1977. CLA is associated with the Gibbs and Craze Law Firm of Cleveland, Ohio. In the summer of 1981 Brother Little resigned as pastor of Miller Road Baptist Church, Garland, Texas, where he had served for nearly 10 years, to become President of CLA. The Christian Law Association is unique in that it provides a staff of lawyers to defend through Constitutional litigation various Bible-believing churches and Christian individuals whose First Amendment freedom of religion is threatened. CLA is a ministry of help which, as a servant to churches nationwide, makes no charge for its services.

Dr. Little brings to CLA's leadership a pastor's heart, having pastored churches in Texas and Florida since his graduation from Tennessee Temple Seminary in Chattanooga, Tennessee in 1964. Under his leadership the average attendance at Miller Road more than tripled to 1,010 average attendance and over 400 baptisms his highest year. Miller Road Christian Day School grew to nearly 300 students during his ministry.

The law firm represented by Dr. Earl Little has represented Christian Center in past legal problems.

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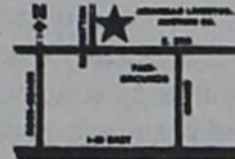

Can Vitamins Prevent Cancer?

Lots of folks think vitamin supplements will protect them from all sorts of problems, including cancer.

"There is no conclusive scientific proof yet that any particular vitamin or combination of vitamins can prevent a specific kind of cancer," says Dr. Guy R. Newell, director of cancer prevention programs at The Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute.

He hastens to add, however, that important new information is being obtained all the time about how some naturally occurring vitamins in the foods we eat appear to have protective features for a few malignancies.

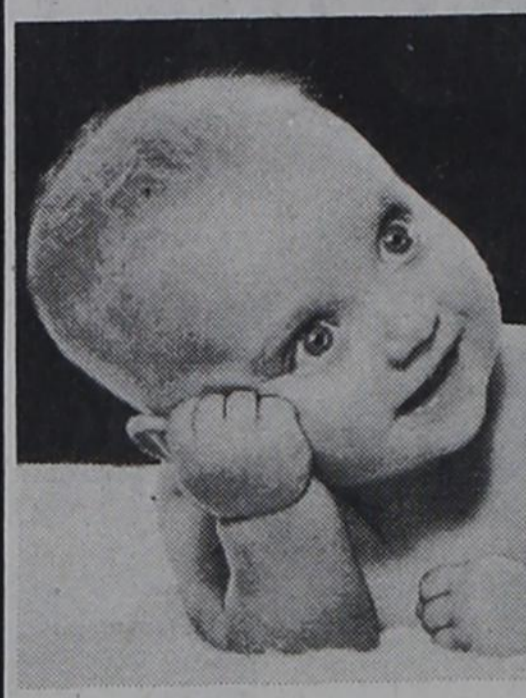
"Vitamin A and some synthetic components of this vitamin can suppress chemically induced tumors in animals. While people are being advised to eat more vitamin A-rich foods—such as dark green and deep yellow vegetables—they should be warned that excessive supplements can cause damage to the liver," Dr. Newell says.

As for vitamin C, there are indications, that fruits and vegetables high in ascorbic acid provide insurance against cancers of the stomach and esophagus. Dr. Newell explains vitamin C inhibits carcinogenic nitrosamines from forming in the stomach. But taking megadoses of this vitamin can cause serious bone marrow changes.

"Everyone should do everything possible to prevent cancer or any other disease. Huge doses of vitamins however, are no panacea for any health problems," Dr. Newell contends.

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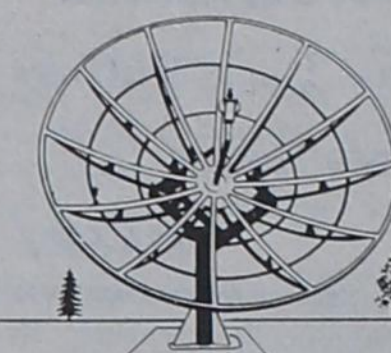
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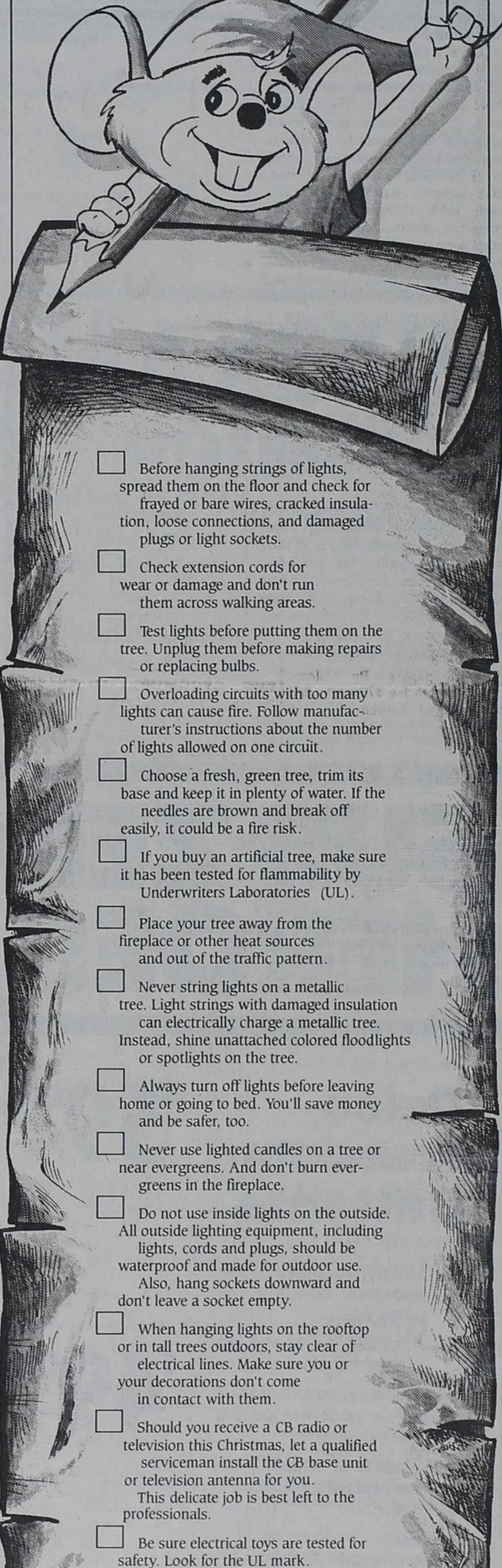
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Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

Birds and Gardening: The Two Go Together

If you're a bird lover as well as a gardener, you'll like the Purple Martin. This friendly songbird and gardening go together naturally.

The martins are entertaining to watch and they also make your yard and garden more pleasant by ridding the area of many unwanted insects. In fact, bird authorities estimate that one adult martin can consume up to 2,000 mosquitoes in a single day.

A member of the swallow family, the Purple Martin measures 7 to 8 inches in length. The male is glossy black or violet with purple iridescence. In contrast, the female is light breasted.

These friendly birds, migrate northward from South America in late winter or early spring to nest and rear their young. They will make homes in most parts of Texas, except in the far west.

Watching martins is an

extraordinary sight. They are masters of the sky and spend most of their lives in the air. They even take their food and water on the wing.



If you want to attract purple martins to your garden or yard, you must be able to meet several requirements:

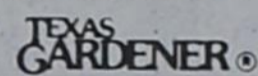
- Location: A back yard on a large lot in the country or in a small town with a pond or stream nearby is an ideal location for martin houses. But they also may be attracted to large backyards in the

city so long as there is a fairly large open area for their house.

- Spacing: The martin house needs to be placed in an open area at least 20 feet or more from the nearest building or large tree limb.

- Houses: A properly designed colony-type house should have at least eight compartments and be mounted on a cat-and-squirrel-proof pole 14 feet off the ground. Around January 1 is a good time to put up a martin house.

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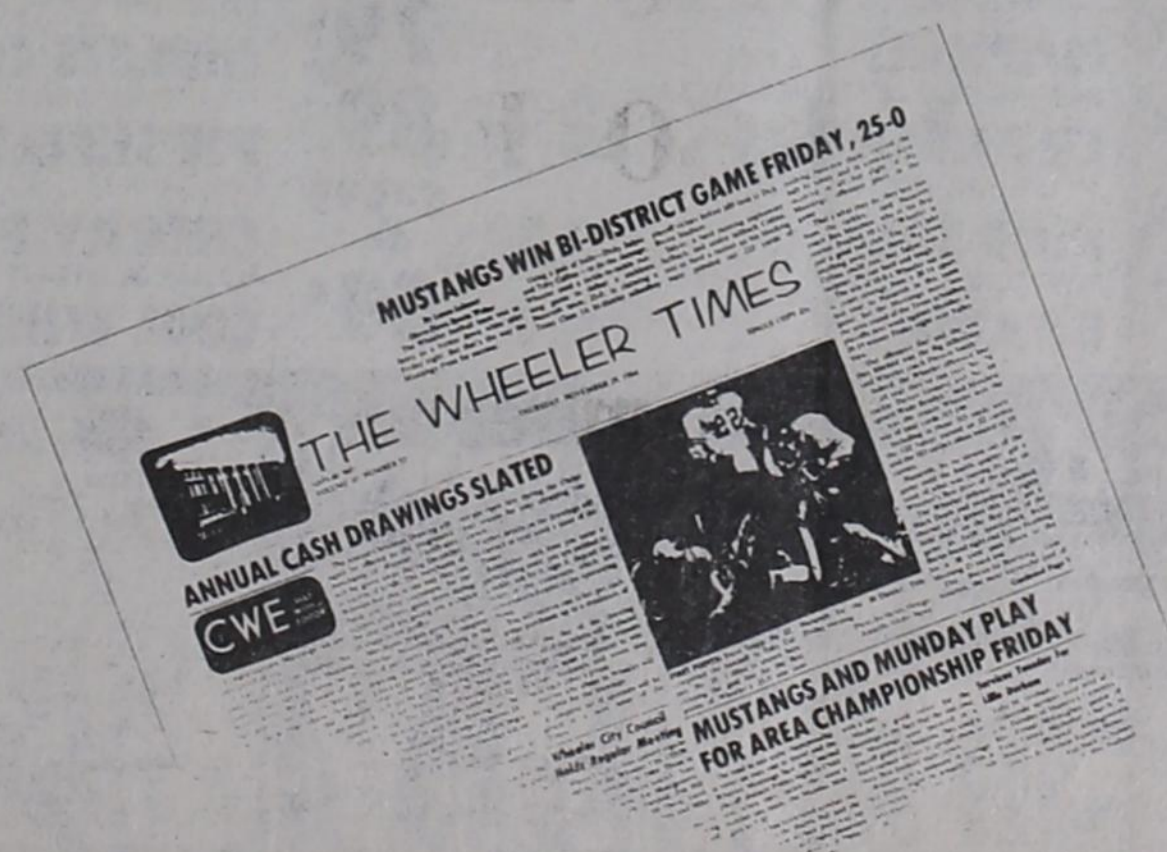

Enjoy Your Coffee Without Worrying

Can drinking too much coffee increase your risk of developing cancer?

"It appears doubtful," says Dr. Guy R. Newell, director of cancer prevention programs at The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute.

For every study suggesting coffee is a villain in promoting cancers of the bladder and pancreas in particular, other research has failed to show any connection between coffee and malignant diseases.

"No biologic explanation can be given for why coffee could be implicated, either. Some investigators assumed caffeine would be the culprit, but this is a natural component in both coffee and tea and there is absolutely no link to tea intake and any kind of cancer," Dr. Newell notes.

Considering the large amount of coffee consumed in the United States and many other countries, he says relatively few human studies have

been done about the possible role of this popular drink and cancer.

"I'd like to see some very careful research to check out the alleged associations. Meanwhile, I see no reason for people not to have another cup of java and enjoy it," Dr. Newell says.
