

Nazareth Swifts Are The Mustangs Bi-District Foe Friday

It took two weeks of play and a coin flip before the Wheeler Mustangs found out who they would play in bi-district competition and when it was all straightened out, this year's game will be a replay of the 1983 contest.

Nazareth and Whiteface played a tie last Friday night and when all the decisions were finalized after the Sundown-Farwell game on Saturday night, the Mustangs and the Swifts will meet at Dick Bivins Stadium in Amarillo Friday night at 7:30.

Not only will the Mustangs be striving to continue on in the state playoffs but an added incentive for the Mustangs should be lingering in their minds as they remember that it was the Nazareth Swifts that knocked them out of the playoffs last year in Memphis.

Once again the Mustangs will be facing a big, strong team in the Swifts with one of the state's best running backs in Class A. Nazareth is big with their offensive forward wall averaging in at a whopping 195 lbs. per man.

Nazareth runs out of the I formation with senior Chris Gerber being their big gun from the tailback spot and the Mustangs will have a chore that no one else has been able to accomplish this year and that will be to stop Gerber.

Both the Mustangs and the Swifts are undefeated but each have a tie on their records and the closeness of the two ball clubs is shown in the polls. Wheeler has consistently rated higher than the Swifts in the Harris poll and the Swifts have done likewise in the AP.

"Nazareth has another real good ball club and it will take a great team effort Friday night for us to come out on top." Coach Preston Smith said this week. "They have one of the biggest lines around and Gerber is one of the best backs going so it is imperative that we control the football," Smith added.

Being in the playoffs should be to no advantage to either club as both the Swifts and the Mustangs have been there before on numerous occasions.

Wheeler is where they wanted to be at this time of the year way back the first of September and their fate in the playoffs is really up to them as all the ball clubs that reach this stage have the capability of going all the way to the state championship game.

MUSTANGS CRUSH GRUVER, 34-12 TO WIN DISTRICT CHAMPIONSHIP

Trailing 6-0 at the end of the first quarter, the Wheeler Mustangs roared back in the second quarter and scored 20 points to begin their 34-12 romp over the visiting Gruver Greyhounds and with the win took the District 1-1A football championship all to themselves.

Things didn't look too bright for the

Mustangs in the early going as Joel Dodd fumbled the opening kickoff and Gruver recovered at the Wheeler 26 but the Greyhounds coughed the ball up three plays later at the Wheeler 12.

Gruver got on the score board with 3:13 to play in the first quarter as Ron Been culminated a 44 yard drive as he plunged over from the 3. The Greyhounds opted for two points but failed.

Taking the kickoff after the Gruver TD, the Mustangs methodically drove 69 yards to the tying touchdown with Toby Collins and Dickie Salyer doing most of the damage on the ground sandwiched around a 12 yard scamper by Cody Wiggins on a reverse. Collins got his first of three touchdowns as he went over right tackle for 6 yards out. Steven Snapp chose to pass for the two points after taking a high snap but the pass was broken up and the score remained knotted at 6.

Wheeler really proved their superiority on their next two drives to take a 20-6 lead at halftime and then put the ball game completely out of reach in the third quarter with 14 more points.

It might have been a closer game if Gruver had been able to score on a belated drive as the first half was coming to a close but the Mustangs shut them down when quarterback Chad Logsdon was downed at the Mustang 6 as the half came to an end.

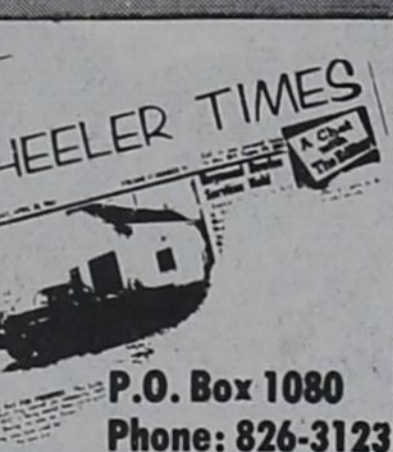

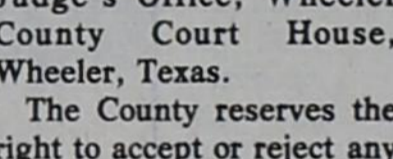

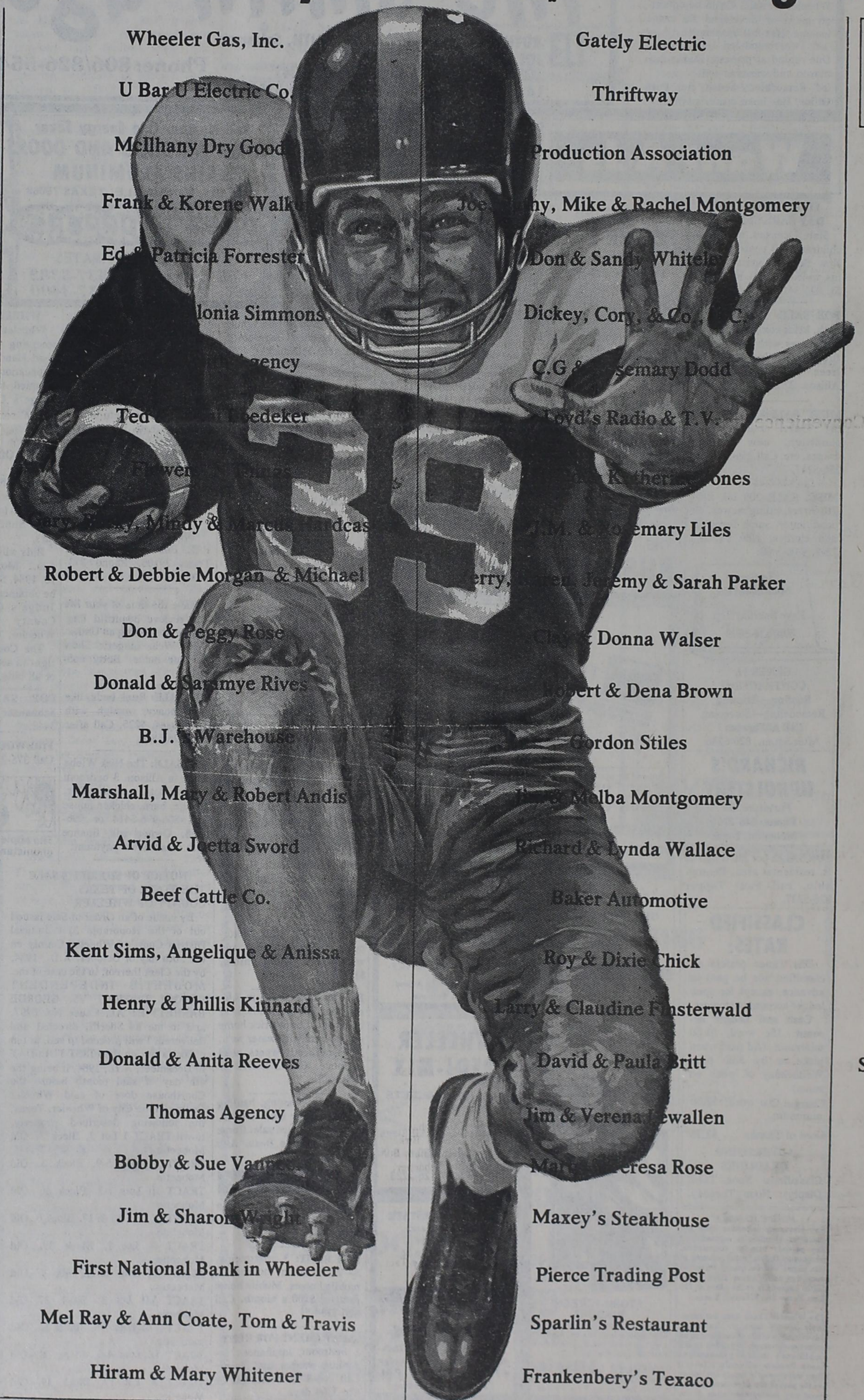

And the youths were challenged by Dallam County Attorney Ron Enns, himself a former Gold Star winner, to view their honor as a responsibility to continue using their leadership abilities to help others.

Joining the youths at the awards banquet in the cafeteria at West Texas State university were parents, government officials, Extension leaders, fellow 4-Hers, educators and other community leaders.

Honored from Wheeler County were Gail Lentz; daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Lantz of Shamrock, and Anita Robinson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Robinson of Shamrock.

Enns told the 4-Hers, parents and friends that his own 4-H experience had played a major part in his life. If it wasn't for 4-H, he wouldn't be here tonight," he said.

"Four-H taught me that short, ugly people with freckles can stand up in front of people and do something," he said, explaining that as a short, freckled boy, he had learned confidence and skills from his 4-H activity.

"A lot of you think your 4-H career is almost over, but it's not," he told the youths. He said their actions and examples are always being watched by younger 4-Hers and others in their communities.

"You're not just getting an honor,

you're getting a responsibility. That responsibility is to take this leadership home and do something with it," he challenged.

Enns told the audience there are many types of leaders. He urged the youths to be the type of leaders who do things because they want to help others, not the "glory seekers" who do things for what they get from their actions.

And he urged the boys and girls to disdain mediocrity. "There is a lot of pressure right now to be 'average', to not do any more than you have to. If everybody was average, there wouldn't be any Gold Star banquets, because no one would be outstanding. There would be no fine universities, because no one would go. There would be no advances, no new ideas.

And he cautioned the young leaders that even though they might do something better than it had ever been done before, their effort would still be mediocre unless it was their own best effort.

Master of ceremonies was Bobby Martin, president, district council, Carson County. Guests were wel-

comed by Tommy Weems of the Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, one of six electric cooperatives which sponsor the banquet annually. The others are Rita Blanca, North Plains, Swisher, Greenbelt, and Lighthouse.

The awards were presented by Mrs. Sue Farris and Paul Gross, district Extension directors.

Dinner music was presented by "Hard Country", a country rock band of Gray County youths. Members of the band are Roy Lott, Mistie Greer, Mike Phillis and Rebecca Venable.
