ANNUAL BLOOD DRIVE Mon., Nov. 12

There will be a BLOOD DRIVE in Wheeler on November 12, 1984 in the Wheeler School Cafeteria. This drive will be from 4:00 p.m.-7:00 p.m.

Blood is urgently needed for Wheeler County. Our residents use a considerable amount of blood during a year. "The rarest blood type is the type that is not available when a person is in need of the Blood". This could be you or a member of your family.

Please take time to give a little part of yourself to give life to someone else.

Each donor may give for: (1) An established blood donor club: These credits may be used to partially pay processing charges incurred by any member of the blood donor club or anyone so designated by the chairman of the blood donor club. This blood donor club would provide coverage for any person, so designated by the chairman of the blood donor club, whether they donate or not. This will not penalize persons who previously were not covered because of their ineligibility to donate.

Each donation or credit to the blood donor club is valued at \$10.00.

In order for more members to be able to benefit from this coverage, credit will be forwarded to the hospital for each blood component used by an individual.

Most existing insurance companies pay 80% of the processing charges. Blood donor club credits will provide the additional 20% needed by the individual. So in essence their processing charges will be covered 100% through the combined use of individuals.

Please do not confuse transfusion charges, set-up fees, and additional hospital fees for administering transfusions with processing charges.

Credits in your blood donor club are valid for a 12 month period and may be transferred at the discretion of the blood donor club chairman only.

These same credits can be transferred to any one of the aforementioned 23 area hospitals or to other states that may be members of the National Clearinghouse and associated with the American Association of Blood Banks. (2.) Personal Credit: Anyone may request a personal credit which would be kept on record and can be used at your discretion any time during the

next 12 months. For such purposes as: (A.) transferred to a specific donor club. (B) used as a replacement credit.

Upon notification Blood center personnel are available for assistance in transferring these credits.

(3.) Replacement Credit: A \$10.00 credit will be forwarded to the hospital for each blood component used by an individual to assist him or her in paying for processing charges during hospitalization. Please indicate name of patient and hospital.

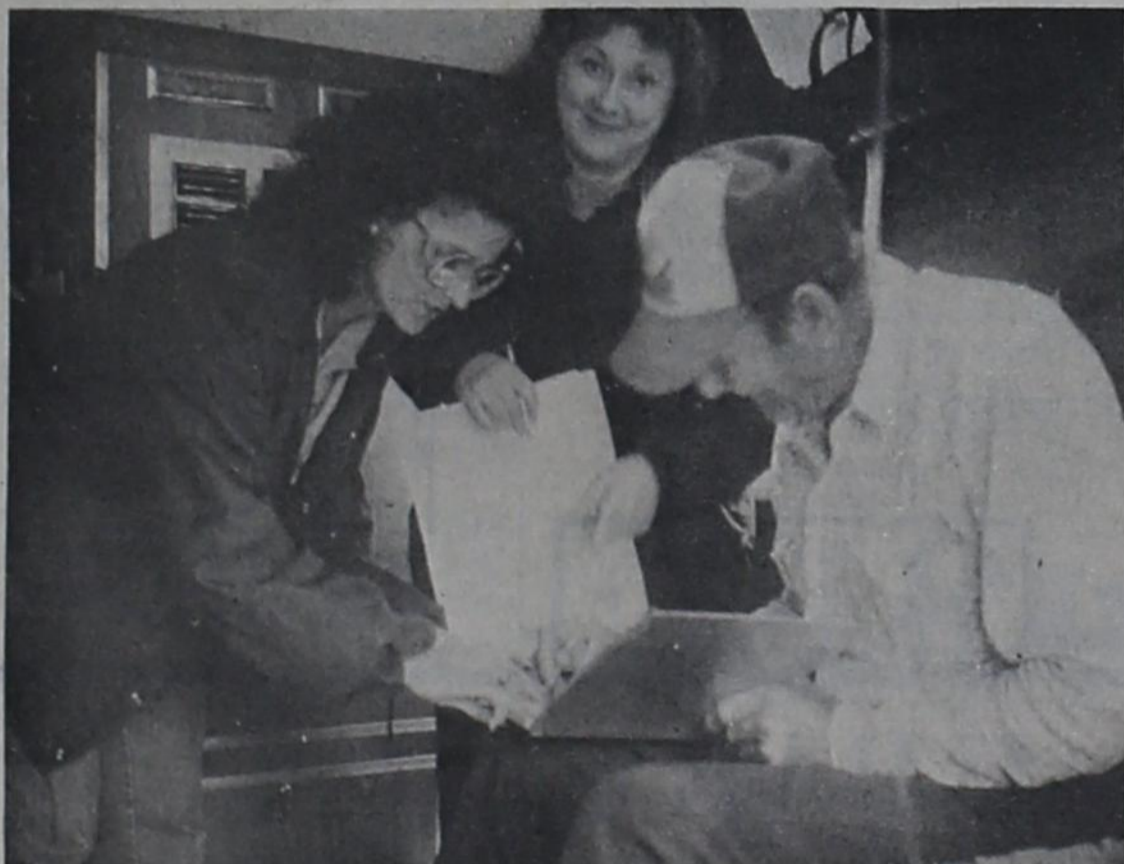
Cattleman's Assoc'n Organizational Meet

Child Safety Seat Law
 The child safety seat law passed by the Texas Legislature went into effect on October 31, 1984.
 The new law requires resident of Texas to transport children up to two years old in federally approved child safety seats and children from two up to four years old in the child safety seats or safety belts.
 An offense is punishable by a fine of \$25 to \$50, but the court will dismiss the charge if the person shows proof of having acquired a safety seat by purchase, loan or rental within ten days after the offense.
 The law exempts violations involving a person operating a vehicle for hire and a person transporting a child in a vehicle in which all seating positions equipped with the child safety seats or safety belts are occupied.
 Although the law was effective at the end of Oct., only those offenses committed on or after January 1, 1985 will be prosecuted.
Choosing Childcare for Your Baby
 One of the most difficult situations faced by employed parents is finding quality childcare for their baby.
 Most parents are aware that the early years are critical for intellectual, emotional, physical and social development. Yet sometimes cost and convenience of location, rather than quality, is the primary factor in selecting a caregiver.

Finding quality care requires that parents first carefully investigate the skills and qualifications of the caregiver and the health and safety conditions.
 In addition, child development specialists suggest that parents of children under eighteen months old, ask the following questions before hiring a caregiver.
 * How many children will be cared for by this person and what are their ages? One adult should not be responsible for more than three infants or toddlers.
 * How much and what quality of individual attention will my child receive in this situation?
 * Will my child be held and cuddled during the day, especially during feedings?
 * Will my child spend part of the day outside a crib or playpen and also outdoors, weather permitting?
 * Will my child receive individual "playtime" attention?
 * Will prompt attention be given to changing my child's diapers and meeting other physical needs?
 Parents can answer many of these questions through talking with a potential caregiver, making observations and checking recommendations. Once a caregiver has been selected, however, the parents' job is not over.
 Parents will need to monitor the childcare situation through frequent communication with the caregiver as well as announced and unannounced visits. Informed and concerned parents can make a difference in the development of their children.
 Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.



Federal Land Bank Rate Increase
 The Federal Land Bank of Texas' variable interest rate will increase from 11.00 percent to 11.50 percent on Farm loans and from 11.50 percent to 12.00 percent on Rural Residence and Farm Related Business loans, effective November 1, 1984, said Talmadge Porter, president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Childress.

 "It is imperative that the bank continue to post adequate earnings to ensure that our bonds can be sold in the financila markets at the lowest possible costs, which results in lower interest rate loans for our borrowers," said James A. Rogers, president of the Federal Land Bank of Texas.

Opportunities Await

4-H Volunteers

With the new 4-H year under way, the call is going out for 4-H volunteers. 4-H offers unlimited opportunities for volunteers to help young people learn and develop.

4-H is the youth development program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and focuses on the needs, interests and concerns of boys and girls between 9 and 19 year of age, regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, religion, or national origin. Its aim is to help young people develop through practical learning experiences such as preparing a nutritious meal, building bookshelves or growing a vegetable garden.

Since young people do not develop their skills and attitudes overnight, they need and seek guidance from the 4-H volunteer who helps them probe the "why" behind the "how to do it".

Helping youth develop, however, requires different kinds of leadership. For those who prefer to work primarily with youth, 4-H offers leadership roles related to the organization, project or activity aspects of a 4-H group.

While the organization leader guides the overall operation of a 4-H group, project and activity leaders help boys and girls learn by involving them in a specific project, such as clothing, auto repair or bicycle safety and related activities, such as safety clinics, exhibits and local tours. These leaders may in turn, be assisted by junior and teen leaders who work closely with an adult or teen advisor.

Volunteers who prefer to work primarily with adults also have a wide range of choices. A 4-H project or activity chairman helps other leaders with a specific project or activity. A 4-H recruiter seeks out youth and adults interested in becoming 4-H members or leaders, then allows the 4-H organizer to help the new group get started. Volunteers are also assisted by the 4-H trainer who helps train other leaders in the area and by the 4-H resource person who secures special materials or people from the community.

If you are interested in young people, want to share your talents and hobbies, and enjoy meeting other adults with your same interests, consider being a 4-H volunteer. Call the county Extension office for more details at 826-5243 or write Box 505, Wheeler, Texas 79096.

We rode up to the driver and never said anything; just fell in and went to work.

We took the cattle out a gate into the country road and headed east, at Dozier, we turned south. There were several small calves in the herd; they were getting tired. The calves would get into the tall weeds along the side of the road and lie down. We had to get off and trail them back into the road. We did this several times in the three or four miles we had to go.

We turned into a nice looking ranch house, southwest of Dozier. We left the cattle at a windmill and some large stock tanks. One of the men said, "Tie up and come in." He took us into the kitchen and gave us a cool drink; then we went into the den. He sat down at his desk, opened a box and gave each of us a big Silver Dollar. We thanked him and he thanked us.

We took off for home in a lobe; we didn't even stop at Dozier. We wanted to hurry home to show the big dollars to Dad and Mother.

The man's name was Sam Norwood; this was before the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad came through and before there was a Samnorwood village and school.

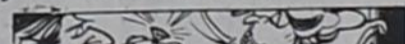

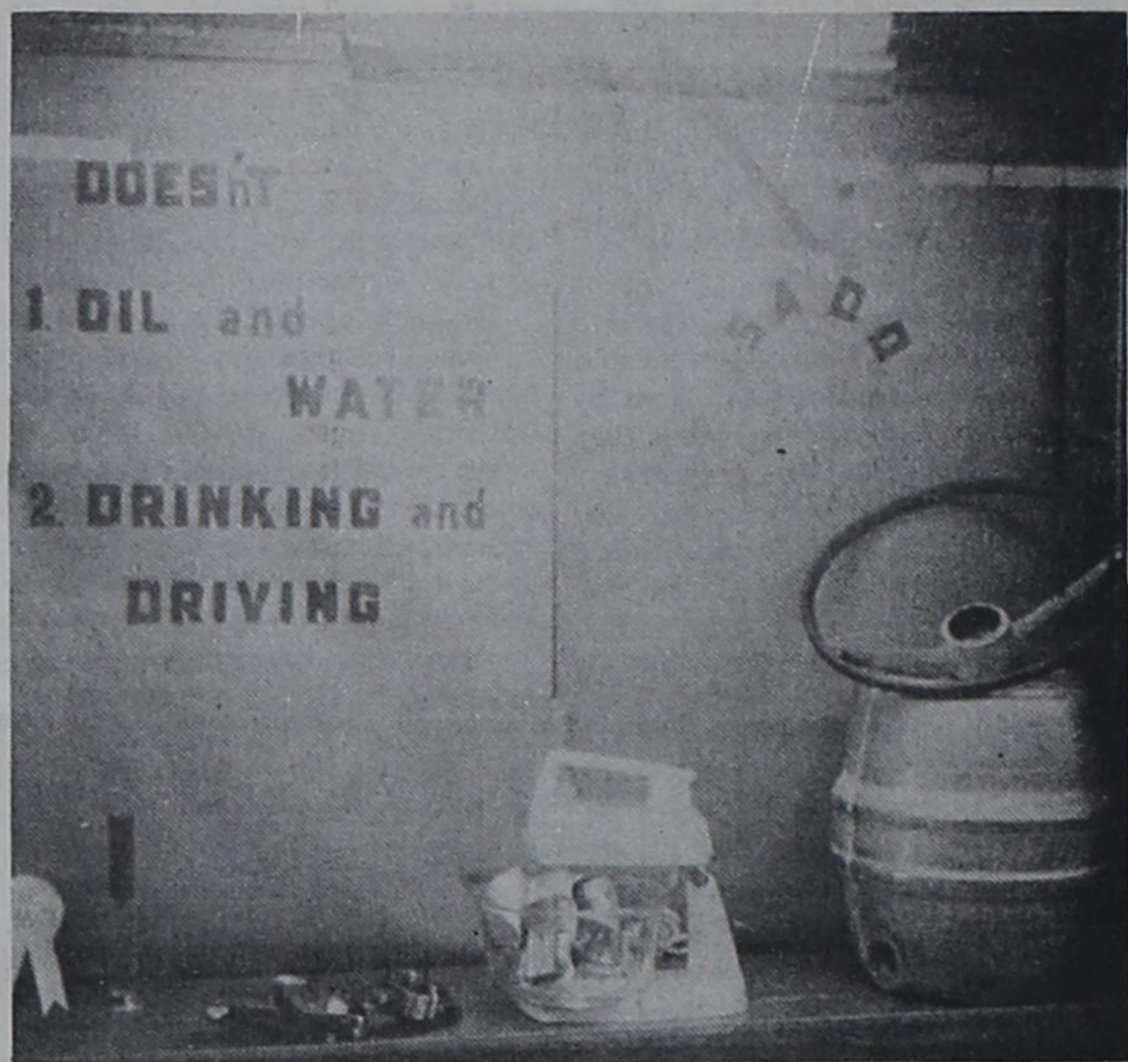
The kids are very busy now getting their lambs and pigs for this year F.F.A. shows. James, Alycia and John Moffett went with the kids to Clarendon.

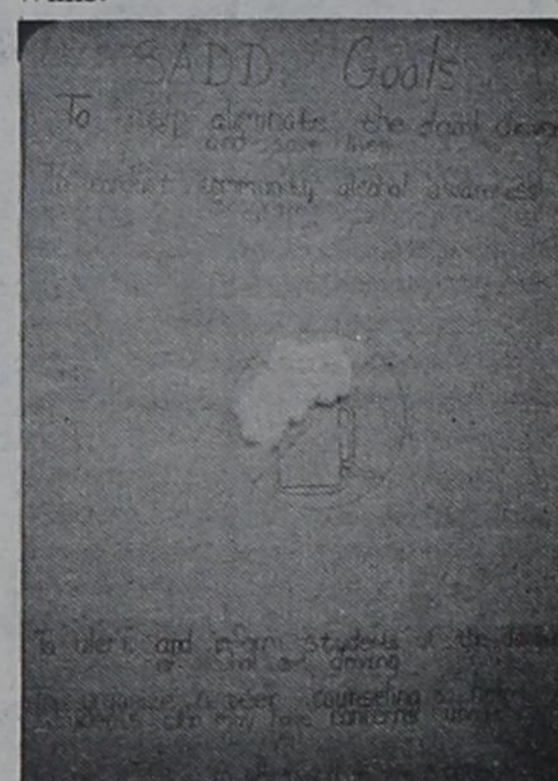

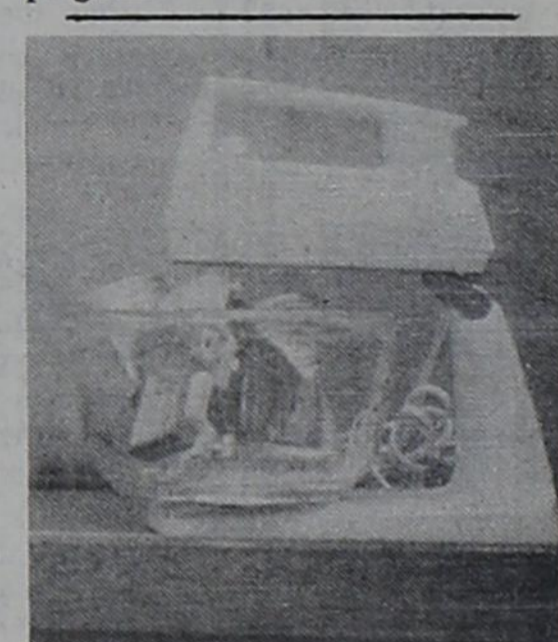

TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

Plan Now for Spring Strawberry Harvest

If you live in southern Texas, strawberry planting time is just around the corner. And if you live in other parts of the state, it's time to prepare beds so they'll be ready for planting in a few months.

Strawberries can be grown in most parts of Texas. Even if your soil isn't suitable, you can grow them in containers or specially prepared beds.

Strawberries should be planted in a sunny location. And since they are shallow-rooted, you must irrigate, but don't overwater. Strawberries don't like wet feet. To aid drainage, plant the berries on a raised bed 4 to 6 inches high with a well-drained soil mix. Don't try to grow them in clay soil. If that's what you have, you'll have to grow them in containers.

Fertilize strawberries with a complete fertilizer such as 12-12-12, 13-13-13 or 6-12-6, applying half before planting and half as a side-

dresser prior to spring production. Mulching your strawberry bed is important and will help protect the plants from disease and bad weather as well as control weeds.



There are two planting methods for strawberries. If you live in the southern one-third of the state, roughly from San Antonio and Houston south, use the annual method. Prepare beds 42 inches wide and 4 to 6 inches high. In late October or November, set out plants in a double row on the bed, staggering them and leaving 12 inches between each one. Plants will bear fruit in the spring. After harvest is over, discard the plants because it's best to start over with new ones each year.

If you live in the cooler northern two-thirds of the state, plant strawberries according to the matted row system. You prepare the beds the same way as the annual system but don't plant until late winter or early spring. And you set the plants in a single row down the center of the bed, spacing them 18 inches apart.

If any spring flowers form, remove them. Later, the plants send out runners. Select five runners, 8 to 10 inches long, and root them at selected spots to control spacing. Mulch the plants in the winter and they will produce fruit during their second spring. For top production, you can start new beds each spring or you can probably maintain the existing bed for two or three years.
