



Mobeetie Swears In

School Trustees

Archie Summers Jr. made it official Oct 11 when he and Nadeen Morris were sworn in as school board members.

Mr. Summers and Nadeen Morris will replace Paul Hathaway and Jim Hamilton who resigned when school trustees hired a relative of theirs. State law prohibits a school from hiring close relatives of trastees.

The state is against people serving on two local boards with the Texas Supreme Court ruling that serving on city and school boards were incompatible.

Mr. Summers submitted his resignation to the Mobeetie town council Wednesday.

Because of the return to standard time the school meeting time has been moved from 8:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.

The trustees decided to leave the school transfer and tuition policy the way it is now. Under this policy the district may charge a tuition fee for **Deadline Nears** students not of school age, summer students, adult educations students, or other special programs or courses. Alpha Mu Alpha's 6th Annual Baby Transfer students will not be charged tuition.

Jim Batton, school trustee reported that the Tri State Rodeo Association which sponsors school rodeos in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas is adjusting its eligibility rules to be in line with new educational reforms. Under new rodeo policy a student must pass 3 classes to take part in the Rodeo. The state requires passing grades in all subjects before students can be involved in extra-curricular activities.



To Lease Property

Many Landowners may not know land to hunters. The landowners is required to have a Shooting Preserve License. The fees are \$15 for less than 500 acres. \$40 for 500 acres or more but less than 1000 acres and \$60 for 1000 acres or more. Wildlife rescources hunted under the authority of this license are subject to seasons, bag and possession limits as specified in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Hunting Guide. When meat is frozen slowly, in a home freezer, it ruptures the cells and allows moisture to escape. There will be an extreme juice loss when it is thawed.
