WHEELER MUSTANGS CONTINUE WINNING

Wheeler Gets Fifth Shutout With 35-0 Victory Over Follett

Toby Collins ran for a 36 yard touchdown with a pass from Steven Snapp as time ran out in the first half to up the Mustangs lead to 14-0 and break open a close ball game with the Follett Panthers and the Mustangs went on to whip the Panthers 35-0 last Friday night.

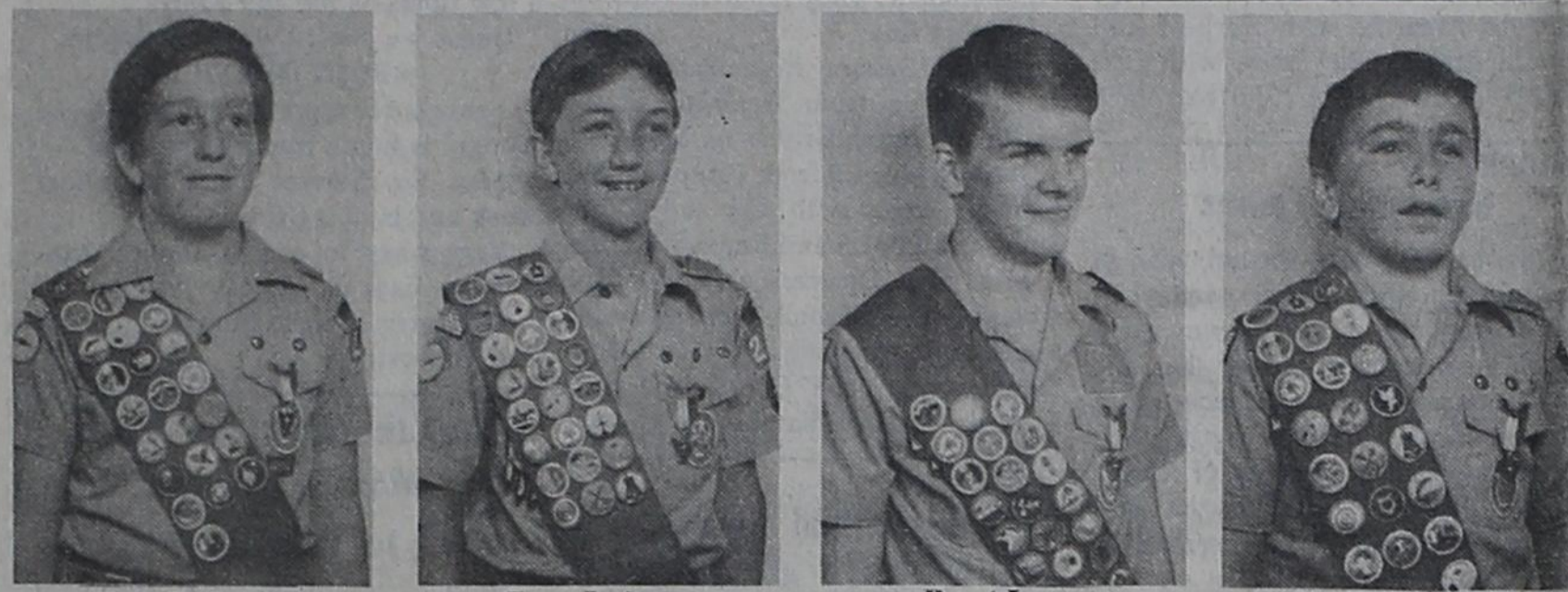
Not only did the Mustangs remain undefeated but they continued their shutout ways. Going back to the final quarter against Stinnett, the Mustangs haven't been scored on in 21 quarters.

The Follett win was another chapter in the Toby Collins and Dickie Salyer rushing story as the two Mustangs continued to rack up the yardage on the ground. Salyer gained 194 yards for his night's efforts and Collins picked up 133 steps and the junior tailback went over 100 yards for the sixth straight game.

Scoring 21 points in the final period over the outmanned Panther's upped the Wheeler margin to 35 and gave the Mustangs a perfect 6-0 mark for the year and 4-0 in district competition.

Wheeler scored the first time they had the ball as they took the opening kickoff and drove 59 yards in just six plays with Salyer breaking loose at left guard for a 38 yard scoring jaunt. Draton Childress booted his first of five extra points but the Mustangs offense sputtered until the final play of the half.

Two drives fizzled out for the Mustangs in the first half deep into Panther country. Salyer fumbled into

The fees are \$15 for less than 500 acres, \$40 for 500 acres or more but less than 1000 acres and \$60 for 1000 acres or more. Wildlife resources hunted under the authority of this license are subject to seasons, bag and possession limits as specified in the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Hunting Guide. ATHERTON RE-ELECTED TO SWCD BOARD

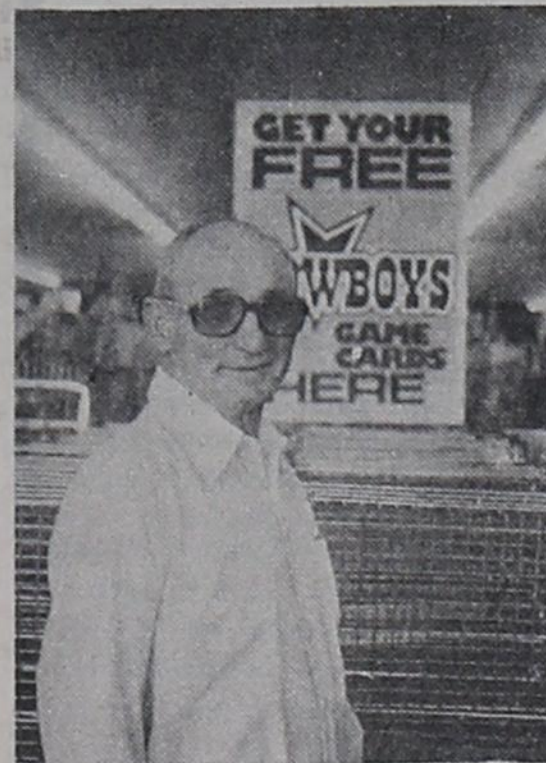

They do not moisture/vapor proof. It lets meat dry out. Within two to three weeks the meat will have freezer burn. Even in just a week, this causes your beef to lose some of its flavor. When meat is frozen slowly, in a home freezer, it ruptures the cells and allows moisture to escape. There will be an extreme juice loss when it is thawed. The meat will be dry and tasteless when it is cooked. If this happens to you, you are not getting your money's worth.

You can still buy your meat a week ahead or take advantage of sales by using a little care. You will protect your flavor and quality by rewrapping the meat in freezer-weight aluminum foil, polycoated freezer paper and in freezer plastic bags before putting it in your freezer. Remember, protect good lean tasty beef with a little "kindness" and get the most for your money.

Keep Fresh Pecan Flavor With Correct Storage

By purchasing new crop Texas pecans right after harvest, it's possible to preserve their freshness through proper storage.

Pecans can be used in many dishes—for special occasions or to make everyday meals more special. They can be added to breads and cereals for breakfast, to salads and sandwiches for lunch and to appetizers, main dishes, or vegetables for dinner. They are natural for desserts as well.

High in energy because of their high fat content, pecans also furnish calcium, phosphorous, iron, potassium, and magnesium. They are a good source of B vitamins like thiamine, riboflavin and niacin.

For maximum flavor and nutrient retention, pecans should be stored in a cool dry place. The fat in pecans can become rancid very quickly if they are not properly cared for.

Pecans in the shell will keep at room temperature for about six months without becoming rancid. Shelled pecans become rancid quickly when stored at room temperature. In the refrigerator they will keep for six months to a year and in the freezer even longer. Frozen nuts defrost quickly and only need to be removed from the freezer a few minutes before using.

Nutmeats can pick up odors from other foods very easily. To guard against off flavors, store shelled pecans in tightly sealed containers, such as plastic food storage containers or cans with tight fitting covers.

Some moisture in pecans makes them easier to shell and increases the number of perfect halves. Nuts just harvested may have enough moisture. If they have been stored for some time, soak the pecans in cold water overnight or cover with water and bring to a boil. Drain and crack. Pecans treated in one of these ways may need to dry slightly to restore crispness.

Pecans in the shell are generally less expensive than shelled nuts and they keep longer. Two pounds of nuts in the shell will yield about one pound of shelled nuts.

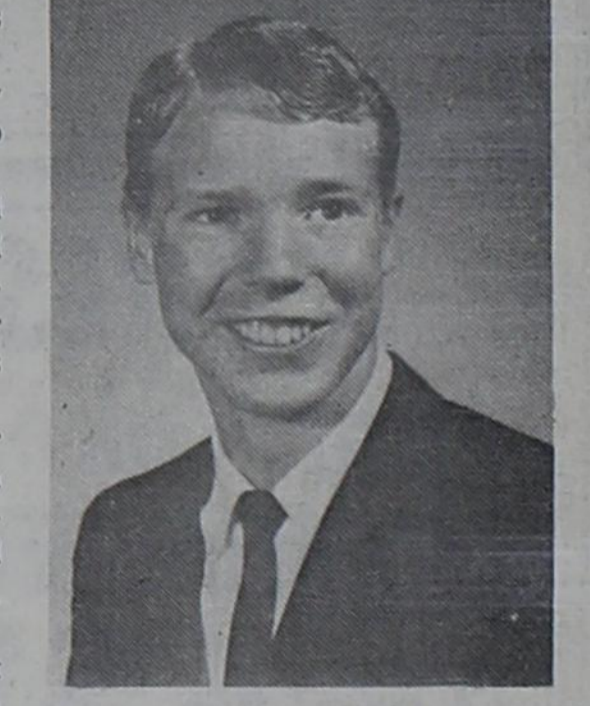
