Postal Notes

What is Insured Mail?
Insured Mail provides coverage for an item which is lost, damaged, or stolen while in the postal system. Items are insured for their actual cash value at the time of mailing and coverage is limited to \$400. (Irreplaceable items and items of high value should be sent by registered mail.)

Insurance is available for third class and parcel post and for merchandise sent by Priority or First Class mail. Items must bear complete addresses and be properly packaged to withstand normal handling. Items that are so fragile they cannot be carried safely in the mail, regardless of packaging, cannot be insured.

When you take your package to be mailed, you will be issued a receipt for each item you insure. Be sure to keep this receipt in a safe place as the original receipt must be presented if a claim for loss or damage is made. The Post Office keeps no record of the mailing of insured packages. So, if you have any questions about how to file an Insurance claim, the limitations of Insurance coverage or even how much insurance costs. Please, call or visit your Post Office.

Mobeetie School Increases Taxes

At the regular Mobeetie I.S.D. board meeting on September 13th, trustees raised the tax rate by 8 cents. The tax rate was raised from 64 cents per \$100 valuation to 72 cents. This will be used to fund new curriculum requirements, extra paper work, and faculty salary hikes. The tax rate increase was also prompted by a state tax incentive program: raise taxes to get more state funding.

The new state funding bases state aid on average daily attendance and the value of taxable property. This will mean rich small districts like Canadian and the very small like Mobeetie will get less tax funds.

The state has equal to substantially raise taxes to make up for last state funding. Mobeetie could lose half of its state funding for 1984-85 plus another half down 75 per cent in 1986.

If the tax has to be raised the school gets \$62,500 in state aid.

Among some of the school reforms Mr. Mickey disagrees with are the state funding formula, full day for kindergarten and extending the terms of the new appointed state board to beyond the four year limit.

A month after two board members quit because of the hiring of a relative as a substitute teacher, trustees approved the appointment of Nadean Morris and Archie Summers to be on board. As Mr. Summers was also on City Council. The City council met Thurs. night and changed their meeting night to the second Wed. of each month thus allowing Mr. Summers to serve on both boards. Mobeetie is such a small town their biggest problem is finding someone who isn't related to someone in the school.

The Mobeetie City Council met on September 13 with board members, Archie Summers, Don Moore, Dale Hathaway, Roy, Stribbling, Greg Estes; Leona House, Mayor were present.

The meeting date was moved from the second Thursday of each month to the 2nd Wednesday so Archie Summers could attend the council meetings and school board also.

A public meeting will be held soon to replace Dale Hathaway who is moving to the home of Kent and Carla Sims moved from.

The council voted to keep the water rate the same and the City tax will not be raised.





BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 6, 1984

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 29 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides to state-chartered banks the same rights and privileges that are or may be granted to national banks of the United States domiciled in this state. For example, if national banks become authorized to maintain branch offices, this amendment would extend the same privilege to state banks.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bonding capacity of the fund to include the components of The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction to include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials; (3) for an increase in the bonding capacity from 20% (2/5 for The University of Texas System and 1/3 for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond proceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded purposes for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and maintenance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County, Prairie View A&M University, and The University of Texas at Austin.

House Joint Resolution 19 also annually appropriates \$100 million in each fiscal year, beginning September 1, 1985 (from the first money coming into the state treasury that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution) for the use of those

agencies and institutions of higher education which are not included in The University of Texas or Texas A&M University Systems and, therefore, not eligible to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program. The amount of this appropriation could be adjusted every five years by a 2/3 vote of the Legislature, but could not be adjusted in such a way as to affect outstanding bonding indebtedness. Each institution of higher education that is eligible to participate (i.e., those institutions of higher education outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M University Systems) would be authorized to expend directly its share (such share to be determined pursuant to an equitable formula) of the \$100 million appropriation for the purposes of acquiring land, constructing and equipping buildings or other permanent improvements, major repair and rehabilitation of other permanent buildings or improvements, and acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials. Additionally, each institution would be authorized to issue bonds backed by a pledge of up to 50% of its share of the \$100 million annual appropriation for the purpose of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

Except in the case of fire or natural disaster and in other extraordinary cases, verified by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature, all institutions of higher education would be precluded from receiving appropriations of general revenue funds for the purposes of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to create from general revenue a special higher education assistance fund for construction and related activities, to restructure the Permanent University Fund, and to increase the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the Permanent University Fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the legislature to provide for the payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of officers, employees and agents of the state or its political subdivisions, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units authorized to make arrests, who die in the course of performing hazardous official duties. Payments to surviving spouses and dependent children of

such officers, employees, and agents are already authorized by the Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of certain public servants killed while on duty."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 20 proposes a constitutional amendment which abolishes the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties if a majority of the voters in each of those counties vote in favor of abolishing the office of county treasurer in a local election to be held on the issue. All the powers, duties, and functions of the office of county treasurer in each of those counties would be transferred to the county clerk.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which provides a new method of filling a vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The amendment requires the President pro tempore of the Senate to call together the committee of the whole Senate within 30 days after a vacancy occurs in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The committee would be required to elect one of its members to perform the duties of the Lieutenant Governor until the next general election. This individual would continue his duties as Senator at the same time that he performs the Lieutenant Governor's duties. If the Senator who is elected ceases to be a Senator before the next general election, another Senator must be elected according to the above procedure to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties. The President pro tempore would be required to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties pending the election of one of its members by the committee of the whole Senate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that permits the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on non-assessable life, health, or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in this state. The constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or company has limited life and health group policies of political subdivisions to non-mutual insurance companies. The amendment would permit mutual insurance companies to bid for those policies.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment to permit use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on certain insurance contracts of mutual insurance companies authorized to do business in Texas."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem of members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide a per diem for members of the legislature equal to the maximum daily amount allowed by federal law as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator."

HOW TO TALK TO YOUR CHILD'S TEACHER

There are no real secrets to talking to a child's teacher, but the task remains a challenge to most parents. First, remember that the goal of the conference is to help the child. This means that parents should not use the teacher's conference to vent dissatisfaction with school policies or frustrations with aspects of your family life.

Second, unless confronting an emergency, allow yourself time to clarify the picture your child presents at school. Children, like adults, have good and bad weeks. If you're worried about grades, gather several examples of work you've seen at home and take them with you for clarification.

Third, seek a positive, adult relationship with your child's teacher. Many parents see the teacher as a rival, especially in the early grades when children become attached to their teacher. Sometimes fear of the teacher dates back to the parents' early school experiences.

Teachers may feel uncomfortable or threatened by parents, too. Teachers spend most of their working hours as the unchallenged adult in a classroom of younger children or adolescents.

The goal of a parent-teacher conference, then, is a mutually supportive adult conversation about a child, one in which both parties communicate respect for each other and value each other's knowledge of the child.

Parent-teacher conferences are usually different each time. Get-acquainted meetings may occur at special events, when you pick up children at school, or in community contacts. Don't try to use get-acquainted meetings for extended personal conferences.

Check-up sessions should be planned by parents and teachers at least once a year, whether or not they are required. Exchange notes about what you want to talk about so each party is prepared. Required conferences have a more formal air since they are typically limited to 15 minutes and other parents are waiting their turn. Required conferences usually need a follow-up, genuinely personal conference later.

For telephone conferences, jot down your concerns and keep your voice tone non-threatening. A concern handled over the telephone requires less time for both parties. Try not to ask the teacher to call you at home nor call the teacher at his or her home unless it is a genuine emergency. Call the teacher during the work day at a time convenient for both of you.

A letter to the teacher is a neglected form of parent-teacher communication. A letter requires you to present

your concerns and feelings in a clear, concise way. It also gives the teacher a chance to reflect on a response that is often more helpful and informative than an immediate answer.

Sometimes a crisis conference is necessary. To make the most of these, both parents and teachers need to be open and frank, while focusing only on the diagnosis or solution to the child's problem. Because of the emotional base of most crisis conferences, a follow-up session is almost always necessary.

A child's growth and development are the reason for parent-teacher conferences. When effective communications between home and school become a reality, the child also reaps the rewards.






