Cowboy Camp Set For June 28- July 1

The Cowboy Camp was a major event in the lives of families in the wide open spaces of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico in the early days of settlement of the area. Ranch homes were few and far apart, and opportunities for Christian Fellowship were infrequent. Established in the 1890's in the Davis Mountains of Texas, the cowboy camp meetings developed to fill the need for religion and friendship.

Ranching people drove for many miles to a central location a few times each year and two or three days were spent in worship, fellowship and visiting. The camp meetings were an important phase of the social and religious life of the frontier.

As transportation improved, as well as other forms of communication, the camp meetings died out. But in recent years they have been revived, and now eight such events take place throughout the southwest under the auspices of the Ranchmen's Camp Meetings in the Southwest.

One of these will be held near Canadian June 28-July 1. The YL Cowboy Camp Meeting will take place at the Jerel Norris Ranch 10 miles south of Canadian on Highway 83.

Billed as "A Christian Camping Experience for All Ages", the four-day event will feature Evangelists Calvin Springer of Robinson, Texas, and Valson Abraham of Alta Loma California. H. Dean Kelley of Amarillo will be the Music Director for the second year.

The services will be interdenominational and will begin with the evening preaching service at 8 o'clock Thursday, June 28.

There will be Bible study each morning at 9, morning

service at 11, afternoon service at 2, prayer meeting at 3 and evening service at 8 in the evening on Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Meals will be served, at no charge, at 6:30 each morning, 12:30 in the afternoon and 6:30 in the evening. Food will be served from a chuck wagon, in the ranching tradition.

There will be team roping at 4 o'clock each afternoon.

The camp site is located in a pasture; facilities are limited. Each party is responsible for camping equipment such as tents of campers.

Meetings will be held in the Norris Indoor Arena and seating will be provided, as well as restroom facilities. The worship services will incorporate preaching, singing, special music, sharing and Bible study. There will be special activities for children.

Bank in Wheeler. The topic of the evening was the Sweetwater Dam Project; the purpose of the meeting was to inform those interested in the

Beckham County Farm 1 Dedication Held Thursday

The dedication ceremonies for Beckham County Farm 1 were held northwest of Erick, Okla., Thursday afternoon.

Gov. George Nigh addressed the group of local and area citizens in attendance. Larry Sullivan, president of the project, introduced the stockholders and dignitaries prior to the barbecue and trimpings.

Beckham County Farm 1 will be a packaging plant for locally grown produce. The plant with contract with farmers for the production of okra, cucumbers, cantaloupe, radishes, turnips, turnips tops, beets, mustard green, leaf lettuce, etc. The growth, crop maintenance and water-

ing will be supervised and a crew will be brought in to harvest. Contract is guaranteed with the producers before planting. The crop and acreage will be determined by the type land and the area which can be irrigated. A 160 acre farm with center pivot irrigation is ideal. A 40 acre minimum has been set. Producers can expect \$500 to \$1,000 per acre earnings. Farmers, interested in raising crops for Beckham Farm 1 will be interviewed and counseled before entering a contract.

The plant will handle produce from 6,000 acres with the capability of packaging 65,000 bushel of produce per day. The outlets for the produce are located nationwide.

The area has been surveyed and shown 64,000 acres suitable for raising vegetables.

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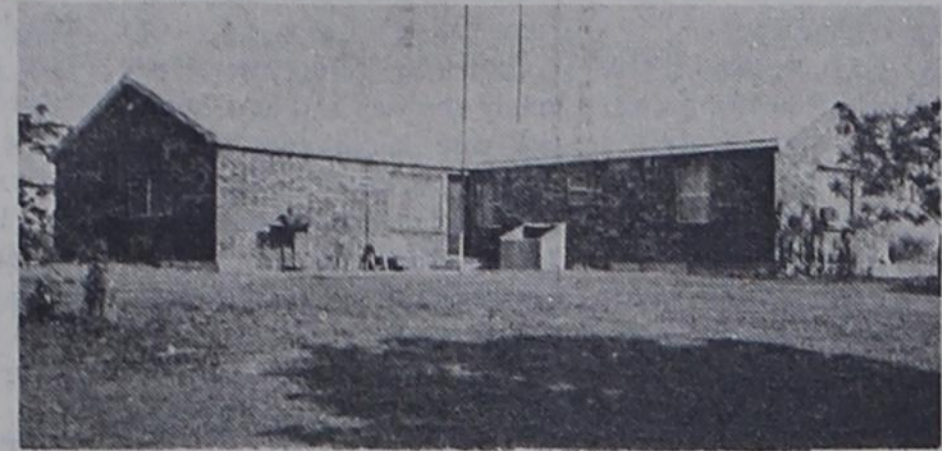
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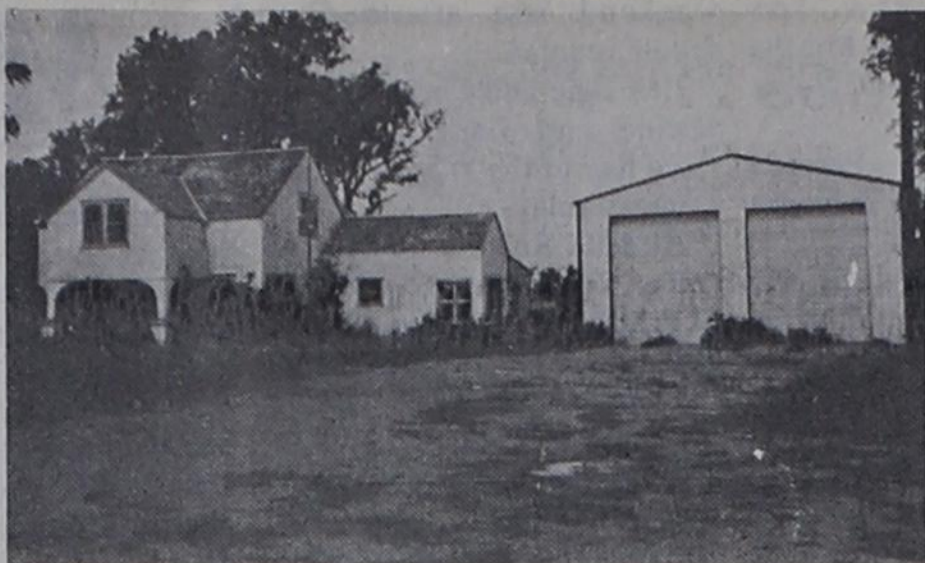

MAKING JELLY

The "secret" to making good jelly is no secret at all -- it's a combination of pectin, acid and sugar in the right amounts. Whether you make your own jelly each year or you're trying it for the first time, it pays to know how these ingredients work together.

Pectin determines the firmness of the jelly. Too little pectin can produce a jelly too soft to hold its form. But good jellies don't have to have as much pectin as commercial jellies, which must be firm enough to withstand shipment.

Different kinds of pectins produce jellies with various degrees of firmness. For example, cranberry pectins yield jellies that break easily into small clumps, while apple pectins create more elastic jellies.

The acidity of the fruit also has something to do with firmness. Juices from higher acid fruits yield firmer jellies than juices from lower acid fruits, even where the pectin content is the same. Fruits actually have a mixture of acids in them. But tartaric acid, which is plentiful in grapes and currents, is more efficient for jelly-making than citric or acetic acid.

Perhaps the biggest question in jelly-making is how much sugar to add, since that can vary from fruit to fruit. Most of the time, it's better to use too little rather than too much sugar if you want a jelly that will hold its form.

Experiments show that three-fourths cup of sugar per cup of fruit extraction works better than a cup of more of sugar, but that depends on their state of ripeness and the amount of water used to cook them.

Having low acid or low pectin fruits does not mean you have to give up on making jelly. Low pectin fruits can be made into excellent jelly if commercial pectin is added. And acid can be increased in a fruit juice simply by adding lemon juice or combining it with other acid fruits.

Commercial pectin is a by-product of the frozen and canned citrus and apple industries. It's available in either liquid or powder form. Powdered pectin has a long shelf-life, but the liquid must be used promptly after opening. Both types of pectin have good gelling ability, although there is some variation among brands. Commercial pectins also have no pronounced flavor to mar the fruit flavors with which they are combined.

The pectin you can buy in the supermarket is a high-sugar product requiring about 50-65 percent sugar to form a

jelly. A low-sugar, or low-methoxyl, pectin is used commercially to make dessert mixes, canned salads and sugarless jellies. But these low-sugar pectins cannot currently be purchased on the retail market.
