## Terminal Fed Heifer Program Awards Given

Canadian Production Credit Association sponsored a banquet Monday evening, June 11, to honor the feeders and sponsors of Wheeler County's first Terminal Fed Heifer Program. The banquet was held at the new Maxey's Steak House of Wheeler.

Thirteen 4-H members feed pens of two heifers the same mixed feed for a set period of days. At the end of the term, the cattle were weighed, observed and slaughtered; the carcasses were then judged for grade and marketability.

Those gathered for the banquet were shown a video of the heifers before and after

slaughter with the comments on the beef, both on the hoof and at the slaughter house.

Plaques were presented to each of the charter feeders.

Eight plaques were presented to individual participants; receiving awards were Tommy Velasquez, high score—jr. record test; Augie Hennard, high score—sr. record and test; Todd Baize, lowest cost of gain; Kimberly Kiker, highest average daily gain; Richie Kiker, champion carcass; Kimberly Kiker, champion live pen; Kimberly Kiker, reserve champion pen and Richie Kiker, champion pen.

## MOBEETIE MASONS BREAK GROUND

The Mobeetie Lodge had "Ground Breaking" for their new building Monday evening, June 11. The new building will be located at the corner of First and Miami Streets—to the north of the present building.

Construction on the 30'x60' building is scheduled for about two weeks. Jimmy Adams of Wheeler is under contract for the construction of the wood frame structure. Three weeks is the time allowed for construction.

The present building which has served as the home of the 76-year-old organization for an undetermined number of years will be razed. The building was built in Old Town with the first floor being used as a funeral parlor and the upper floor being the Lodge Hall. The stucco building was moved to New Town in 1929 to its present location. Materials will be salvaged to use in the interior of the new hall.

C. W. Burch will do the finish work on the interior. Chris Gateley of Wheeler will do the electrical work and Larry Jennings of Wheeler will



help with the plumbing.

The charter for the Mobeetie Lodge was dated December 3, 1908.

## Plant Clinic To Be Friday

This is the time of the year when many home owners as well as agricultural producers are having problems with disease and insects that are attacking their plants.

In an effort to help answer the questions these people have, the County Program Building Committee has scheduled, free of charge, a Plant Clinic for Friday, June 15 from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. in the Commissioner's Courtroom of the County Court House at Wheeler.

Three Texas Agricultural Extension Service specialists will be on hand to answer questions. They are Dr. Bob Berry, Extension Plant Pathologist; Dr. Carl Patrick, Extension Entomologist; and Dr. Roland Roberts, Extension Vegetable Specialist.

The clinic is for anyone who has questions concerning plant growth problems, regardless if it is about the lawn, ornamental, vegetable or crops such as wheat, cotton, grain sorghum of pastures.

The best approach would be for the person to bring a specimen plant of cutting of a leaf, limb, etc. to the clinic. If, however, the problem occurs at some other time of the year of a specimen is not available, the person should feel free to come visit with the specialists.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.

## Report On Rabies Clinic

The Rabies Clinic held at the Wheeler Veterinary Clinic Saturday, June 7, resulted in the vaccination of 91 animals for rabies. The animals, 78 dogs and 13 cats came to the Wheeler Clinic from Wheeler and the surrounding communities.

State law, HB 1323, requires all dogs and cats be vaccinated against rabies.

City dog licenses are sold at the time the clinic is held. Twenty-six licenses were sold.

Should an unlicensed dog be picked up by the city, there would be no way determining the owner.

Veterinarians Ben Ed and LeeAnn Hillhouse expressed their appreciation for the cooperation in holding the Vaccination Clinic.

## Appraisal Review Board

The appraisal review board (ARB) for Wheeler County Appraisal District begins hearing taxpayer appeals on Minerals and Industrial Properties on June 21, 1984 at 9:00 am. Property owners may protest some aspect of their property appraisals at any time prior to the date the ARB approves the appraisal records.

The ARB is a group of citizens of the appraisal district who have been appointed

by the district directors to equalize property values and consider claims for exemption and agricultural value. With the implementation of the central appraisal district, taxpayers are able to address a single equalization board instead of one for each taxing unit in which their property is located.

According to Marilyn Copeland, Chief Appraiser for the Wheeler County Appraisal District, a property owner may protest any of seven specific actions of the appraisal office, as well as any other action that applies to the owner and adversely affects him.

The seven protests are:

- \*the appraised or agricultural value of the property;
- \*unequal appraisal of the taxpayer's property in comparison to the weighted average level of appraisals of other property in the appraisal district;
- \*inclusion of the property on the appraisal records;
- \*denial of a partial exemption, such as homestead exemption;
- \*denial of agricultural-use, open-space or timber valuation
- \*identification of the taxing

## RESOLUTION

JOINT RESOLUTION OF THE BOARDS OF DIRECTORS OF SHAMROCK AND WHEELER CHAMBERS OF COMMERCE

WHEREAS THE Boards of directors of Shamrock and Wheeler Chambers of Commerce recognize the vital importance of the construction of the proposed Sweetwater Creek Dam and Reservoir in Northeastern Wheeler County to the well-being of the people and the continued development of Wheeler County.

AND WHEREAS the development of this important water source not only will supply sufficient water to serve the basic needs of the people of Wheeler County for the foreseeable future, it will be the vital factor in any future industrial and agricultural progress of the area and will provide jobs for many local people during the construction phase.

AND WHEREAS the completion of this project depends upon a majority vote by the people of the county authorizing an \$18,000,000 bond issue in a proposition to be offered to the voters August 11, 1984.

AND WHEREAS the passage of this bond issue will depend largely upon an organized effort of the two Chambers of Commerce to provide factual information to the people to convince them of the necessity of this project and thus assure a large affirmative vote on August 11, 1984.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Boards of Directors of Shamrock and Wheeler Chambers of Commerce join hands in dedicating themselves to a combined effort to make the construction of the Sweetwater Creek Dam and Reservoir a reality by supporting the project enthusiastically and actively working for its success from now through completion and to final operation.

unit or units in which the property is located;

\*determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the property.

A property owner who wishes to lodge a protest based on one or more of these actions must file a written "notice of protest" with the review board, Copeland said.

Official forms are available at the appraisal office, she noted. However, the Chief Appraiser added that a letter from the taxpayer will also be acceptable as a notice of protest, as long as it identifies the property owner, the property that is the subject of the protest and indicates dissatisfaction with some determination of the appraisal district office.

A hearing will be scheduled after the notice is filed and the property owner will be informed of the time, date and place at least 15 days before the date of the hearing, or as soon thereafter as possible if the protest is not received prior to 15 days before the scheduled hearing and a waiver of the 15 day notice is received with the notice of protest.

**Rogue Buffalo Is Hunted Down**

Buffalo hunting is not entirely a thing of the past in the eastern Panhandle. Three young men brought the carcass of an 1800 pound buffalo Bull to a Canadian meat processing plant Thursday noon.

The buffalo was shot near Briscoe Thursday morning after a 15 day rampage had left a 45 mile trail of broken fences from the Sweetwater area in western Oklahoma to the L.D. Childress ranch near Briscoe. The old bull had been part of

a small herd on a ranch near Sweetwater, Oklahoma, when he started his angry flight into Texas after a young bull had been introduced to the herd.

The old buffalo turned rogue, and left a broad trail of torn fences until he was finally hunted down fifteen days later. His carcass weight was estimated at about 1800 pounds when he was hauled into the Scroggins Meat Processing plant in Canadian at about noon Thursday. He dressed out to 686 pounds of buffalo meat, which was ground into hamburger on Don Stuckey's order.

On the same weed-end another section of Texas,

another rogue buffalo was being tracked in the Fort Worth area, but was still at large last week-end after escaping from a herd on a Tarrant county ranch.

The property owner filing the protest is then entitled to appear in person before the ARB to offer evidence to support their claim. He may also offer his evidence by affidavit without appearing personally. In the event that the property owner wishes to proceed with the protest by affidavit rather than appearing in person, he should notify the appraisal district that this is his intentions when he files his protest.

The property owner should attempt to clear any problems before hand and therefore possibly eliminate the need to appear on the hearing date by contacting the appraisal district office, or by calling the telephone number that appears on the Notice of Appraised Value that he has received.

It should be noted that the governing body of each taxing unit that the property is located in decides whether or not taxes on property will increase and the appraisal district only determines the value of the property. If the taxpayer objects to increasing taxes and government expenditures, he should complain to the governing bodies of these taxing units. Only complaints about value should be presented to the appraisal office and the appraisal review board.

The 1984 estimated tax rates indicated for the taxing units on the Notice of Appraised Value are estimates only, based on the tax rates for 1983 tax rolls. Each one of the taxing units may not adopt a tax rate that will increase tax revenues for operating purposes from properties taxed in 1983 without publishing notice in a newspaper that it is considering a tax increase and holding a hearing for taxpayers to discuss the tax increase.

The property owner and Chief Appraiser will be notified by certified mail of the ARB's decision on properly filed protests.

Copeland said that protest hearings will be held for one day for Mineral and Industrial Properties on June 21, 1984 and for one day for Real Estate and Personal Property on July 20, 1984.
