This is the time of the year when many home owners as well as agricultural producers are having problems with disease and insects that are


In an effort to help answer the questions these people have, the County Program Building Committee has scheduled, free of charge, a Plant Clinic for Friday, June 15 from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. in the Commissioner's Courtroom of the County Court House at Wheeler.

Three Texas Agricultural Extension Service specialists will be on hand to answer questions. They are Dr. Bob Berry, Extension Plant Path-Roland Roberts, Extension


The clinic is for anyone who has questions concerning plant growth problems, regardless if it is about the lawn, ornamental, vegetable or crops such as wheat, cotton, grain sorghum of pastures.

The best approach would be 6-4 for the person to bring a New Admissions speciman plant of cutting of a 6-4 leaf, limb, etc. to the clinic. If, 6-6 however, the problem occurs at some other time of the year of a specimen is not available, 6-7 the person should feel free to come visit with the specialists.



Appraisal Review Board

The appraisal review board (ARB) for Wheeler County Appraisal District begins hearing taxpayer appeals on Minerals and Industrial Properties on June 21, 1984 at 9:00 am. Property owners may protest some aspect of their property appraisals at any time prior to the date the ARB approves the appraisal records.

A property owner who wishes to lodge a protest based on one or more of these actions must file a writen "notice of protest" with the review board, Copeland said.

Official forms are available at the appraisal office, she noted. However, the Chief Appraiser added that a letter from the taxpayer will also be acceptable as a notice of protest, as long as it identifies the property owner, the property that is the subject of the protest and indicates dissatisfaction with some determination of the appraisal district office.

A hearing will be scheduled after the notice is filed and the property owner will be informed of the time, date and place at least 15 days before the date of the hearing, or as soon thereafter as possible if the *denial of a partial exemp- protest is not received prior to 15 days before the scheduled hearing and a waiver of the 15 *denial of agricultural-use, day notice is received with the notice of protest.

The property owner filing the protest is then entitled to appear in person before the ARB to offer evidence to support their claim. He may also offer his evidence by affidavit without appearing personally. In the event that the property owner wishes to proceed with the protest by affidavit rather than appearing in person, he should notify the appraisal district that this is his intentions when he files his protest.

The property owner should attempt to clear any problems before hand and therefore possibly eliminate the need to appear on the hearing date by contacting the appraisal district office, or by calling the telephone number that appears on the Notice of Appraised Value that he has received.

It should be noted that the governing body of each taxing unit that the property is located in decides whether or not taxes on property will increase and the appraisal district only determines the value of the property. If the taxpayer objects to increasing taxes and government expenditures, he should complain to the governing bodies of these taxing units. Only complaints about value should by presented to the appraisal office and the appraisal review board.

The 1984 estimated tax rates indicated for the taxing units on the Notice of Appraised Value are estimates only, based on the tax rates for 1983 tax rolls. Each one of the taxing units may not adopt a tax rate that will increase tax revenues for operating pruposes from properties taxed in 1983 without publishing notice in a newspaper that it is considering a tax increase and holding a hearing for taxpayers to discuss the tax increase.

The property owner and Chief Appraiser will be notified by certified main of the ARB's decision on properly filed protests.

Copeland said that protest hearings will be held for one day for Mineral and Industrial Properties on June 21, 1984 and for one day for Real Estate and Personal Property on July 20, 1984.
