

Plant Clinic Set For June

This is the time of the year when many home owners as well as agricultural producers are having problems with disease and insects that are attacking their plants.

In an effort to help answer the questions these people have, the County Program Building Committee has scheduled, free of charge, a Plant Clinic for Friday, June 15 from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. in the Commissioner's Courtroom of the County Courthouse at Wheeler.

Three Texas Agricultural Extension Service specialists New Admissions will be on hand to answer questions. They are Dr. Bob Berry, Extension Plant Pathologist; Dr. Carl Patrick, Ex- 5-31 tension Entomologist; and Dr. 6-1 Roland Roberts, Extension 6-2 Vegetable Specialist.

The clinic is for anyone who has questions concerning plant growth problems, regardless if it is about the lawn, ornamental, vegetable or crops 5-27 such as wheat, cotton, grain 5-29 sorghum or pastures.

The best approach would be for the person to bring a 5-31 specimen plant or cutting of a leaf, limb, etc. to the clinic. If, however, the problem occurs at some other time of the year or a specimen is not available, 6-1 the person should feel free to come visit with the specialists.

A Beef Production Short Course for adult farmers will be held June 11 thru 14 under the sponsorship of the Mobeetie Hich School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Bob Mickey, Superintendent, and James Moffett, Teacher of Vocational Agriculture.

Dr. Elmer V. Krehbiel, Beef Production Specialist with the Agricultural Adult Education Program and the Department of Animal Science of Texas A&M University, will be the instructor for the course.

Dr. Krehbiel has a strong background in animal production and genetics. He received a B. S. degree from Oklahoma State University in 1950, a degree from the University of Arkansas in 1959, and a Ph. D. degree from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1966. His Graduate studies were based on selection for type and reproduction performance of cow herds.

Between periods of formal training, Dr. Krehbiel worked with the beef cattle industry as artificial insemination technician, beef cattle herdsman and ranch manager in Oklahoma. He also served as beef cattle research assistant in Arkansas and as animal geneticist for the USDA at Miles City, Montana. For two years

prior to joining the Agricultural Adult Education Program, he served as Area Livestock Extension Agent in The short course at Mo-

The course can be altered to meet the wishes and interests of the farmers and ranchers attending.

Short courses in beef production, as well as in other areas, are available to farmers throughout the state under this cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University. This program is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Summer is the time when and unknowingly come in conour bodies come out of hibernation. We are naturally more active, but sometimes place a needless burden on our bodies by over-doing it. Sensible precautions, therefore, should be observed. Our bodies should be slowly adjusted to any added physical demands. Some simple recommendations would include:

* Gradually become more active.

* Try Out a 10 minute program of flexing the body to music or an exerices record.

on those extremely hot days: * Get all heavy work done on the cooler morning or evening hours.

* Avoid over exposure to the sun, expecially at midday. If you must be out in the early afternoon sun, protect your skin with a sun block, remember to reapply after bathing or excessive perspiring.

* Drink sufficient water, especially before, during, and after strenuous exercise.

* Dress sensibly, Wear loose, light clothing of natural fibers, especially cotton. Avoid nylon and other nonabsorbent fabrics.

OUTDOOR ITCHES

Texans itching to be outdoors this spring shouldn't let that itching turn into the itching of poison ivy, poison oak, of poison sumac.

All parts of these plants -leaves, flowres, berries, twigs, stems and roots -- can cause minor skin irritaions lasting a few days or an itching, weeping ailment which may go on for weeks.

Many people don't know how to recognize these plants

Avoiding the plants is the best preventative medicine.
