RABIES CLINIC IS SET SATURDAY, JUNE 9, ALL DOGS AND CATS MUST BE VACCINATED

The City of Wheeler will sponsor a Rabies clinic Saturday, June 9 at the Fire Station. The station is located behind the city office. At this time dog licenses will be on sale by the city; the clinic will be from 2 to 4:00 in the afternoon.

A state law, HB 1323 passed in 1979, requires all dogs and cats be vaccinated against rabies. The law reads: "The owner of each dog or cat shall have the dog or cat vaccinated against rabies by the time the dog or cat is four months of age or at regular intervals thereafter."

The vaccination will protect the animal for a period of one year. Offered at the clinic for dogs will be rabies, distemper and parvo. Offered for cats will be rabies and feline distemper. All vaccinations will be at a reduced price.

The licenses will cost \$1.00 for males and spayed females and \$2.00 for females.

David Cross and I attended the Texas Municipal League Mayor's and Councilmen's Conference in Corpus Christi Conference over the weekend. It was informative.

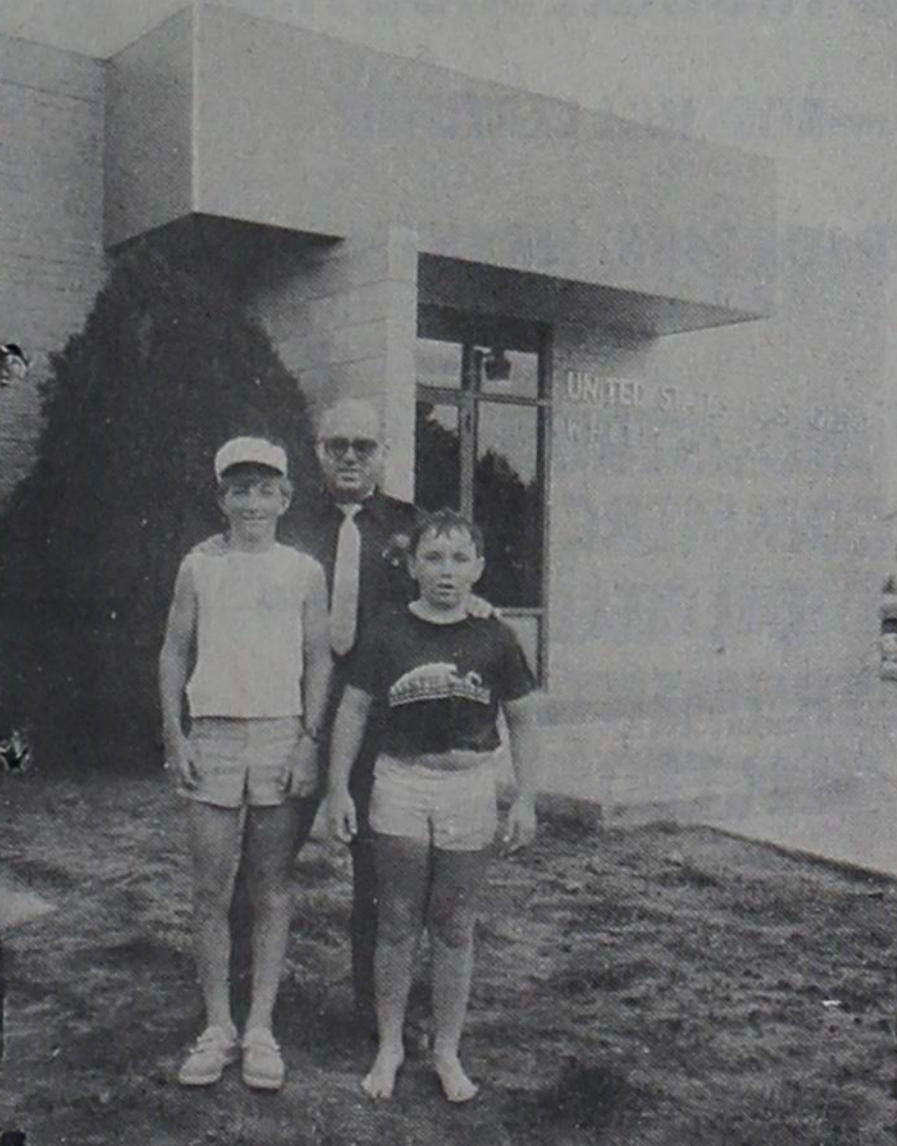

WHEELER AND SHAMROCK CHAMBERS GIVE ENDORSEMENT OF SWEETWATER PROJECT

The Boards of Directors of Shamrock and Wheeler Chambers of Commerce have endorsed a joint resolution to combine their efforts to make the construction of Sweetwater Creek Dam and Reservoir a reality by "supporting the project enthusiastically and actively working for its success from now through completion and to final operation."

Approval of the resolution was announced this week by J. G. Bachmann, President of Shamrock Chamber of Commerce, and Don Rives, Wheeler Chamber President.

A meeting will be announced shortly to name a 10-man steering committee and select a co-ordinator for the project, temporary co-ordinator Rives told The Texan.

"The committee's function will be to distribute factual information to civic organizations and clubs of both communities and to answer questions about the project for the benefit of Wheeler County residents," Rives said.

"This could be the beginning of an era of close cooperation between the two major communities in Wheeler County in working for continued development and progress of the area for the benefit of our people," Mr. Bachmann said.

It is anticipated that Wheeler County Water Supply District will call for a vote Aug. 11, 1984, on an \$18,000,000 general obligation tax bond to help finance the project.

While the estimated cost of the undertaking is \$28,000,000, \$10 million will be financed through purchase of water in storage by the State. Stored water could subsequently be purchased when needed by the Wheeler County Water Supply District.

The bond vote became necessary when Red River Authority and Wheeler County Water Supply District adopted a joint resolution in Wichita Falls Feb. 16, 1984, agreeing to work together to seek a water permit from the Texas Water Commission to build Sweetwater Creek Dam and Reservoir and pursue the project to completion.

Since seeking the water

permit application is an expensive process, Red River Authority insisted on a stipulation in the resolution that the agreement depend upon the people of Wheeler County expressing a real interest in the project by passing an 18 million dollar bond issue to help finance the project.

Engineering reports indicate the lake when full will impound approximately 65,000 acre feet of water.

The pump station and treatment plant would be located in the vicinity of the lake with appropriately sized lines extending to Mobeetie, Briscoe, Allison, Kelton, Wheeler and Shamrock. These lines would be sufficient in size to accommodate the needs of each community served.

Based on present values of taxable property in the county, a tax rate of approximately 25 cents per \$100 valuation would be needed to finance the project. The life of the debt so created would be 20 to 25 years.

With construction costs being met through taxes, it is anticipated that water rates will be comparable to the rates currently paid by residents in communities affected.

Consideration is being given to granting an exemption to all property owners over the age of 65 of the first \$10,000 of their taxable value. This suggestion will be discussed at the next meeting.

BEEF SHORT COURSE

A Beef Production Short Course for adult farmers will be held June 11 thru 14 under the sponsorship of the Mobeetie High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Bob Mickey, Superintendent, and James Moffett, Teacher of Vocational Agriculture.

Dr. Elmer V. Krehbiel, Beef Production Specialist with the Agricultural Adult Education Program and the Department of Animal Science of Texas A&M University, will be the instructor for the course.

Dr. Krehbiel has a strong background in animal production and genetics. He received a B. S. degree from Oklahoma State University in 1950, a degree from the University of Arkansas in 1959, and a Ph. D. degree from Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1966. His Graduate studies were based on selection for type and reproduction performance of cow herds.

Between periods of formal training, Dr. Krehbiel worked with the beef cattle industry as artificial insemination technician, beef cattle herdsman and ranch manager in Oklahoma. He also served as beef cattle research assistant in Arkansas and as animal geneticist for the USDA at Miles City, Montana. For two years

duced more efficiently in order to be a profit-making business. Dr. Krehbiel indicated that the Beef Production Short Course will deal with methods of producing beef at a lower cost and the ways of producing the kind of beef that the homemaker wants to buy. The course will include such important topics as nutritional requirements, winter feeding, minerals, vitamins, feed additives, implants, facilities, equipment, selection of bulls and cows, animal identification including freeze branding, cross-breeding, feeder cattle grades, diseases, parasites, reproduction, market trends, and management for efficient production. The course can be altered to meet the wishes and interests of the farmers and ranchers attending.

Short courses in beef production, as well as in other areas, are available to farmers throughout the state under this cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University. This program is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. The program enables teachers of vocational agricultural production and agribusiness.

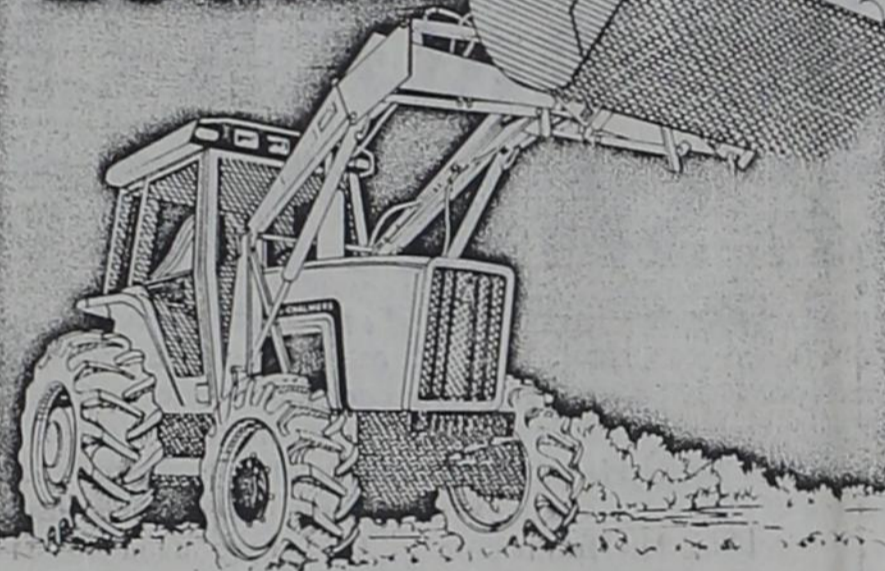

SENSIBLE FUN IN THE SUN

Summer is the time when our bodies come out of hibernation. We are naturally more active, but sometimes place a needless burden on our bodies by over-doing it. Sensible precautions, therefore, should be observed. Our bodies should be slowly adjusted to any added physical demands. Some simple recommendations would include:

- * Gradually become more active.
- * Spend a few minutes in bed each morning doing stretching exercises.
- * Try Out a 10 minute program of flexing the body to music or an exercise record.
- * Drive less, walk more.
- * Spend 20 to 30 minutes every other day at an exercise activity of your choice, (i.e., jogging, running, bikeriding, calisthenics, dancing). Take added precautions, especially on those extremely hot days:
- * Get all heavy work done on the cooler morning or evening hours.
- * Avoid over exposure to the sun, especially at midday. If you must be out in the early afternoon sun, protect your skin with a sun block, remember to reapply after bathing or excessive perspiring.
- * Drink sufficient water, especially before, during, and after strenuous exercise.
- * Dress sensibly. Wear loose, light clothing of natural fibers, especially cotton. Avoid nylon and other nonabsorbent fabrics.

OUTDOOR ITCHES

Texans itching to be outdoors this spring shouldn't let that itching turn into the itching of poison ivy, poison oak, or poison sumac.

All parts of these plants -- leaves, flowers, berries, twigs, stems and roots -- can cause minor skin irritations lasting a few days or an itching, weeping ailment which may go on for weeks.

Many people don't know how to recognize these plants

ferred to different parts of the face and body by the hands. Urushiol may be carried from the plant of clothing, shoes, tools, by animals, and by smoke from burning plants.

Avoiding the plants is the best preventative medicine. If you know you have had contact with a plant, washing the exposed area with a strong laundry soap often can prevent or lessen the effects of poison ivy. Treatment by a physician may be effective if a rash develops, and some resistance may be obtained to poison ivy by desensitization by an allergist.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

Poison ivy and poison oak each have three light green leaves to a stem. While the leaves of poison ivy may have smooth, jagged or rounded. Poison ivy is more of a climbing vine or small shrub, while poison oak usually grows as a small shrub. Both will have small, yellow-green berries followed by white to cream-colored berries.

Poison sumac, found mostly in East Texas, grows as a shrub or a tree up to 25 feet. Its leaves are arranged in clumps of seven to 13 leaflets. It also has small, greenish flowers followed by somewhat greenish white or gray berries. All can produce what is called poison ivy dermatitis, an allergy that affects an estimated 50 percent of the population.

The offending poison in poison ivy is a phenolic or carbolic substance called urushiol, which appears as a sticky, resinous, saplike fluid. It can be--and often is--trans-

There's an alfalfa (?) field between here and Reydon that looks like a clear blue lake. Think it is either Gene Estes of A. B. LeGrands.

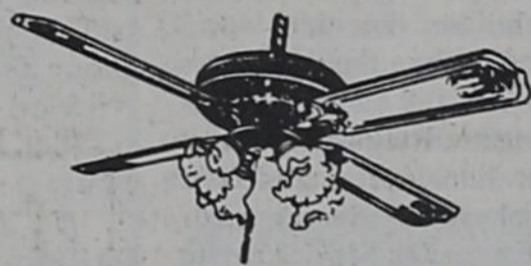
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They are pulling the casing out of the Bryan well by Mulberry and calling it a dry hole.

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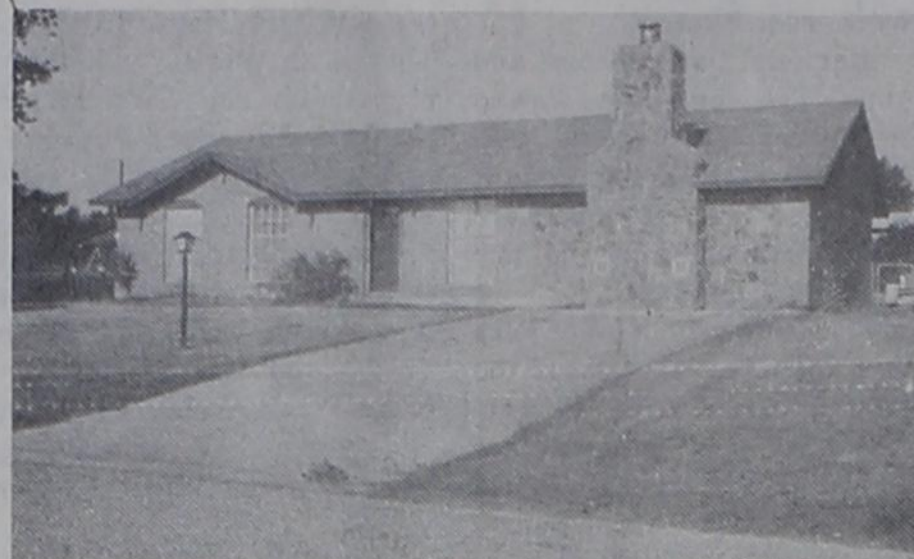
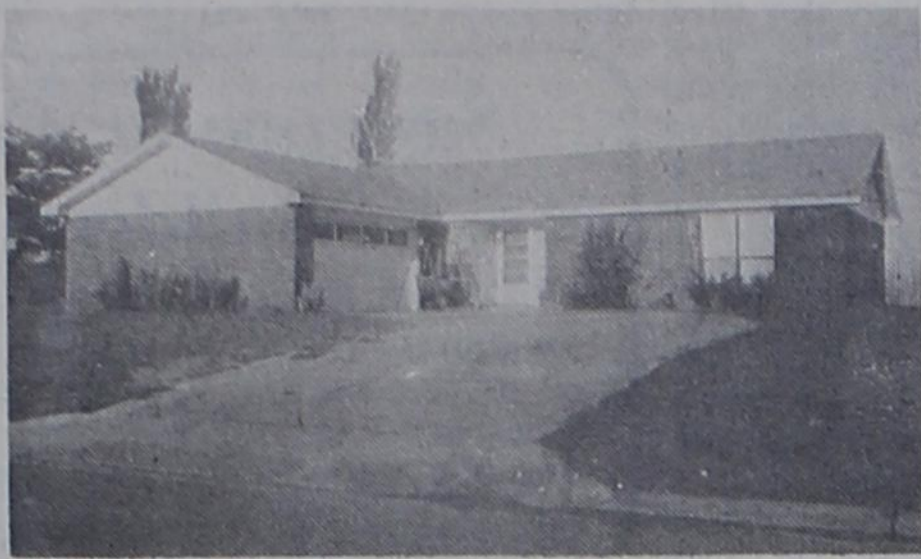

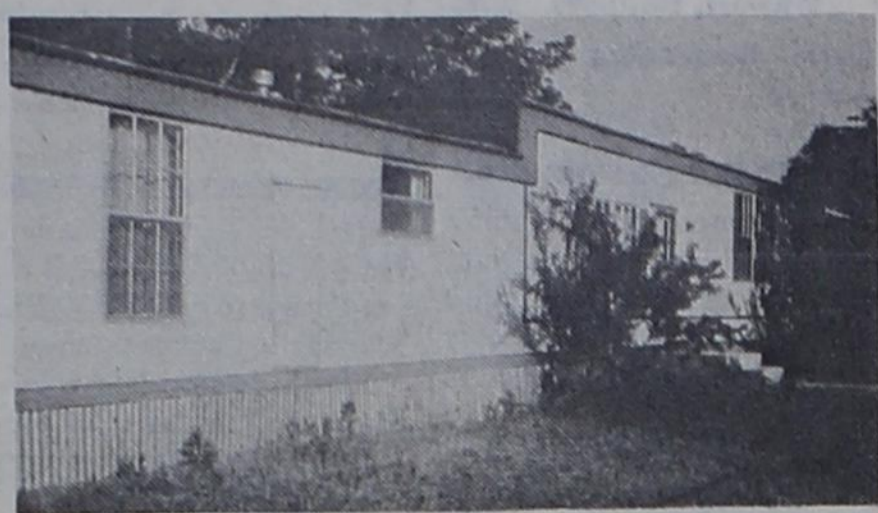

TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

Common Problems With Squash and Vine Crops

Although squash and vine crops are relatively easy to grow, gardeners often run into the same problems with them year after year. The following are a few of the common problems encountered when growing these crops, and how to prevent or correct them.

Seedling death soon after emergence—This is a common occurrence with squash and vining crops as well as beans, peas, and sweet corn. It is usually due to soilborne fungi in conjunction with planting seed in cold, wet soils. Seedlings emerge, though slowly, and develop "weak knees," which causes them to fall over.

The seedlings have suc-

cumbed to what is known as "damping off." Damping off can be prevented by making certain that you don't rush planting time and by purchasing seeds that have been treated with a fungicide to prevent disease development.



Poor fruit set of vine crops—Many Texans find their squash plants bloom and bloom, but seldom produce any squash. This is usually due to lack of pollination. Squash and other vine crops produce both male and female flowers.

Pollen must be carried from the male to the female flower by pollinating insects, usually bees.

If you must spray or dust your vine crops for damaging pests, apply the pesticides during late afternoon to avoid harm to bees, which are most active during the early morning hours. You can also transfer the pollen from the male to female flower by hand.

Squash plants suddenly dying—Many Texas gardeners have been puzzled by squash plants suddenly wilting and dying. The cause is most often the ever-present squash vine borer.

The adult is a wasp-like moth that lays its eggs on the leaves or stems of the plants. The moth is

attracted to the plant by the squash's blooms. The eggs hatch and the small larvae enter the stems near the plant crown to feed and develop, causing the plant to wilt and rapidly die.

The secret to controlling the vine borer is to begin applications of Sevin or Thiodan as soon as the first squash blooms appear, when the moth is attracted to the plant. Direct the insecticides toward the crown of the plant for maximum effectiveness. Once the larvae hatch and enter the plant stems, insecticides are useless.

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
