The "Times" is scheduled to make another change in appearance, beginning in July—another one of those plans to make everything uniform. The paper will be a seven column format with the column width being increased to that of the Amarillo Globe-News. Our advertisers and ourselves receive ad slicks of varied column widths; we then shrink, enlarge or float (center) the copy to fit our paper. The change is intended to correct the situation on a national basis. (Time will tell, it may be like the new math and our changing to the metric system.)

To show my age, I started with the 7 column x 20" page; the columns were 12 pica (2" wide). This was the size of the "Times" until 1963 when we switched from "hot" to "cold" type (letterpress to offset); at this time we changed to 8-11 pica columns—21" long. The companies which make the new spring decided at a later date to make the paper more narrow and we changed to the present 8-10 pica columns on the 21" page.

A furniture truck driven by Frand Fierror of Odessa and a tractor trailer driven by Paul Barringier collided on the Interstate. RABIES CLINIC IS PLANNED

ALL DOGS AND CATS MUST BE VACCINATED
The City of Wheeler will sponsor a Rabies clinic Saturday, June 9 at the Fire Station. The station is located behind the city office. At this time dog licenses will be on sale by the city; the clinic will be from 2 to 4:00 in the afternoon.

A state law, HB 1323 passed in 1979, requires all dogs and cats be vaccinated against rabies. The law reads: "The owner of each dog or cat shall have the dog or cat vaccinated against rabies by the time the dog or cat is four months of age or at regular intervals thereafter." The vaccination will protect the animal for a period of one year. Offered at the clinic for dogs will be rabies, distemper and parvo. Offered for cats will be rabies and feline distemper. All vaccinations will be at a reduced price.

The licenses will cost \$1.00 for males and spayed females and \$2.00 for females. For those people who have had their dogs vaccinated, but have not purchased a license, it will be necessary to take the animal and proof of vaccination to the clinic to obtain the dog license. All dogs in the City limits are required to be licensed.

Area citizens are urged to bring their animals in at this time to be vaccinated against rabies. For those owners who are unable to bring their pets to the clinic, call 826-5821 between 8:30 and noon for an appointment to have the animal vaccinated.

material will depend on his or her up-to-date knowledge of the fabrics available.

When selecting new upholstered furniture, or fabric for re-upholstering a chair or sofa, you will find a vast array of colors, textures, patterns, fibers, and blends from which to choose. The more you know about the fabric, the more likely you are to make a wise choice.

The range of quality and price in upholstery fabrics is great. Be sure you know what you want from the fabric before you buy.

Consider the amount of wear and type of wear a piece of furniture will receive when selecting an appropriate fabric.

A formal sofa in the living room that will be used by adults on an occasional basis, will be suitable for a finer, more expensive fabric than a bolstered sofa in the family room that will receive almost constant use by snack-and-soda-spilling youngsters.

The style of the furniture and that of the other pieces in the room with it should also be considered. The fabric should match the character of its surroundings. Satins don't belong in the family room and burlap plaids would not seem appropriate on a Victorian sofa.

Another consideration in the selection of an upholstery material is the amount of care the owner is willing to devote to its upkeep. How often will the fabric require vacuuming or shampooing? Will spills wipe off easily or will they require immediate and extensive attention?

Perhaps the bottom-line consideration is how long the consumer expects the fabric to last. A piece of furniture that needs to be made serviceable for a few more years until it is replaced will not need the same quality fabric as the antique chair that will be in the family for generations.

Keep in mind, though, that styles change even in antique furniture. A person might not be wise to invest in a very expensive fabric unless she is certain that she will continue to be happy with it for many years to come.

Upholstery fabrics should look comfortable and feel good to the touch. To judge a fabric you will need to feel and handle it. Usually new furniture is offered in a choice of coverings, and swatches of each fabric are available that may be handled and checked for quality. Be sure, however, to check a flounce or ruffle to be sure the fabric on the furniture and the swatch are truly the same.

Here are a few fabric factors to remember:

- * Upholstery fabrics should look comfortable and feel good to the touch.
 - * The life span of an upholstery fabric is determined by its original quality and the amount of wear and tear it is subjected to in the form of heat, moths, perspiration, sunlight and abuse, such as food spills.
 - * Choice of color can do much to create a desired effect in a room.
 - * Fabrics come with various types of finishes. Some finishes are purely aesthetic, they simply make the fabric look better, other finishes are practical, such as making the fabric stain resistant.
- Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricult-

ural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

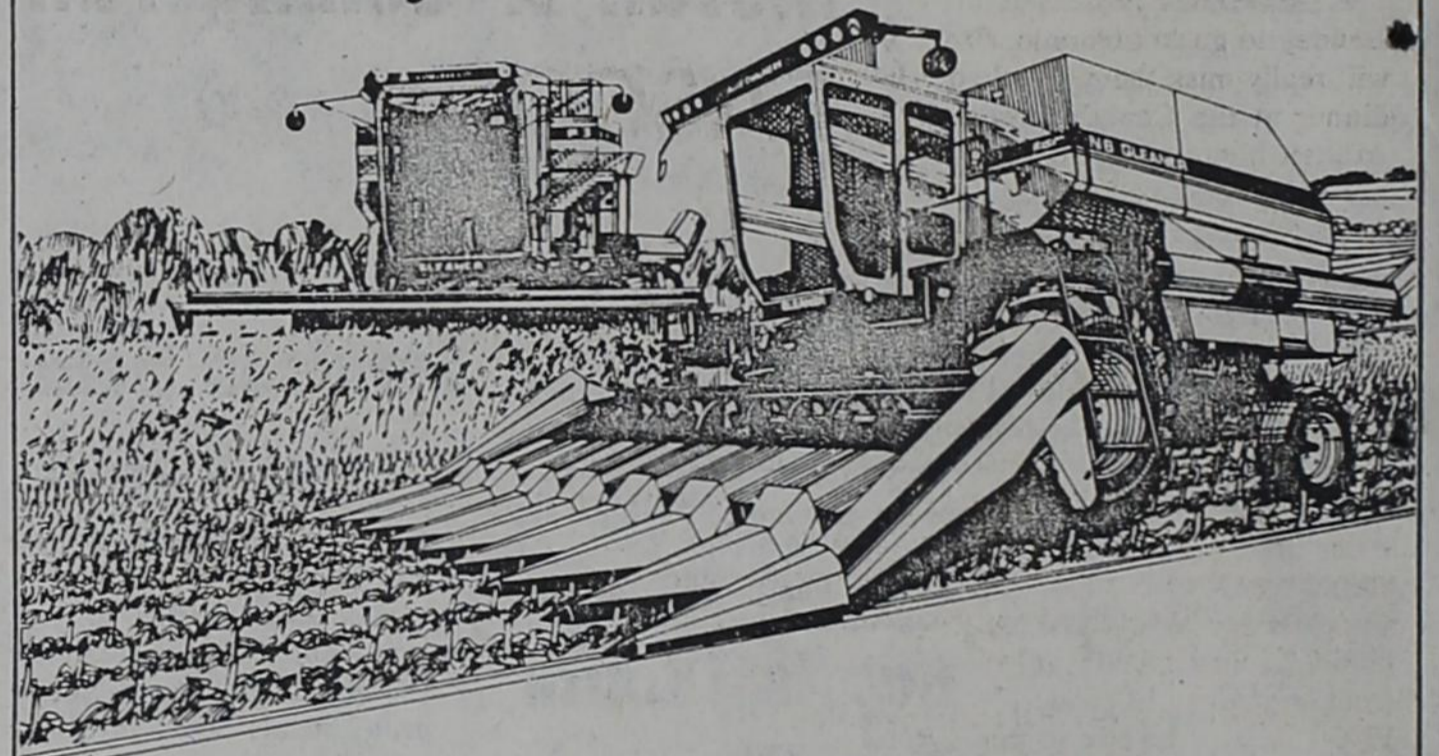

CUT 'N SHOOT, TEXAS

Generations of fighting Harris blood exploded through Roy Harris's veins that night in 1958 as he stood in the boxing ring in Los Angeles.

The city of the Angeles is a long way from CUT 'N SHOOT Texas, but the fighting was not all that much different. It was "root hog or die". The kid from the piney woods of East Texas came out second best and Floyd Patterson retained his title as undefeated Heavyweight Champion of the world. But the whirlwind career that catapulted Roy Harris to the pinnacle of the professional boxing world, remained a sensational story. How could a rustic backwoodsman turned gentleman - scholar - soldier, cope with such a challenge.

That story is finally told in CUT 'N SHOOT, TEXAS [Eakin Press, \$8.95 paperback] a new book written by boyhood pal, Robin Montgomery another Cut 'N Shoot kid who turned out to be an historian, writer and college professor.

Today, Roy Harris still make his home in Cut 'N Shoot, just a stone's throw

from the Houston metroplex city of Conroe. He is a practicing lawyer, real estate dealer and county clerk for Montgomery County and he still finds time to help coach Golden Gloves boxing contenders.

CUT 'N SHOOT, TEXAS is, in part, the story of how and why Roy Harris emerged from backwoods obscurity to the lofty heights of fistic heaven—a heavyweight title bout. But it is also the record of the rapidly vanishing breed which spawned

and nourished him—the rugged individualist frontiersmen of the oilrich southeast Texas thicket country.

The Harrises came to the Texas pineywoods from Tennessee by way of Arkansas. These Scotch-Irish Celtic people were born fighters and fight they did, all the way from the lowlands of Scotland and Ireland, and through Pennsylvania and the Cumberland gap. They fought Indians and each other, mainly because they liked to fight.

Roy learned to fight out of

self preservation. A reporter asked his father if anyone could whip Roy.

"Yep," Henry Harris answered. "Me."

The characters of Cut 'N Shoot are legend, and all bigger than life. There was "Wildman" Woodman, and Cousin Coon and Cousin Armadillo whose coonskin caps and backwoods talk set them apart from the regulars at ringside.

The author's introduction to Cut 'N Shoot was to be thrown into the murky waters of a oil well brine pit. This was standard initiation for newcomers and described by one resident as "about as bad as when I stumped my sore toe but eatin' fried chicken was better."


Since his father, J. T. Montgomery, was principal of the school at Cut 'N Shoot, the author was privy to the inter sanctum of the Harris clan and others who made their living hunting wild hogs and cutting timber. Today Dr. Montgomery is a college professor at SWOSU Weatherford, Oklahoma, and author of a history of Montgomery County where his ancestors settled before Texas became a republic.

Channel 4 said on Monday night that the ingredients of Agent Orange were 245T and 240, half and half. Also they told of all the birth defects and so much sickness and death.

Our county commissioners allow 240 and 245T to be sprayed in such a manner that

it can't be contained. There are other chemicals that can be used that will stay put and not drift over to other people's places for 3 days, destroying crops, trees, gardens and shrubs.

The spray that covered Bill Ault's pecan orchard contained the 24D and 245T chemicals. He had an appraiser from Oklahoma State University look over the orchard and he assessed the damages as \$18,933. That doesn't count the long time damage to the trees. A. & M College said it would take a decade for the large trees to recover.
