4-H Feeding Project Show

The 28 heifers that have been fed by Wheeler County Youth in the Wheeler County Terminal Fed Heifer Program will be on exhibit from 3:00 to 4:00 p.m., Thursday, May 17 at Beef Cattle Company, west of Wheeler. A packer-buyer will discuss and evaluate each of the 14 pens.

Area cattlemen and others interested in the beef cattle industry are invited to attend and see the type of job the young feeders have done. Feeders include: Craig Archer, Todd Baize, James Harris, Augie Hennard, Todd Helton, Jason Helton, Tammy Helton, Michael Kenny, Kimberly Kiker, Richie Kiker, Elizabeth Stiles, Robert Stiles, and Tommy Velasquez.

The feeding period began on December 29 and will conclude 140 days later on May 17. The heifers, in pens of two head each, have been fed a custom mixed ration under feedlot conditions. On December 29, they were weighed and processed at Beef Cattle Company. They were weighed and reimplanted at Wheeler Feed Yards on March 10, 71 days into the program.

At the halfway point, the heifers had an average daily gain of 2.9 pounds, the average feed conversion was 7.1:1 and the average cost of gain was \$58.23.

After the exhibition, the heifers will be trucked to Amarillo where they will be slaughtered and sold on the rail. The carcasses will be evaluated and final placings in the program will be determined on the basis of feed conversion, cost of gain, carcass rank, record book, and test scores.

Letters From The Panhandle

DEAR FOLKS:
This past week we celebrated our first year as Texans! It was one year ago that we packed up the kids and the furniture and headed West. Jon drove a U-Haul truck, and I drove the car as we wound our way across the 1200 miles from Beavercreek, Ohio, to Houston, Texas.

What a trip that was! All six of us—eager and excited—ready to take on the world (or at least a big part of the U.S.). Jon had taken a job in Houston when he was there for his first check-up. After 6 weeks of letters and phone calls, and that awful distance between us, we were ready to move. Jon flew home on a Sunday afternoon and we were scheduled to begin our trip the next day.

Boy, was he surprised to see that the boys and I had everything packed, taken apart, and ready to load! Looking back, I'm amazed myself at how we managed that.

We began to load the big U-Haul trailer and when it was 1/2 full, we could see that the car's axles would never be able to handle the weight! So, it was back into the house, box by box, until it was all unloaded again. We were all disappointed as this meant we'd have to exchange the trailer for a truck the next day, and we'd get a much later start on the long journey ahead of us.

Our good friends, Dee and Neal, had invited us for supper and to spend the night. We had a delicious meal. The warmth of their hospitality, and our shared prayers, helped to ease the jitters. Soon, their boys, Scott and Chad, were off to their rooms for the night, taking our boys with them. A little later we said good-night and headed to our room.

I can remember lying there in bed, basking in the love of these dear friends, yet saddened at the thought of leaving all those good people who meant so much to us. Somehow, I finally got to sleep.

I awoke to a gentle knock at the door, followed by the early morning bantering of six young boys. Dee had prepared a huge breakfast to start us off—juice, coffeecakes, bacon and eggs. Then they presented us each with a going-away present. Actually, it was all packed into a large plastic carry-all labeled "Survival Kit". Each boy had activities to do or a book to read. Dee had made a lap board for Andy with his name on it and sent plenty of paper and crayons to use with it. Jon's present was a Ziggy book, and mine was Marjorie Holmes, "Hold Me Up A Little Longer, Lord". How appropriate! Amid tears, prayers, and laughter, we said our last good-byes and left for our truck.

We were ready to leave at around 12:30 Monday afternoon. Naturally, the boys all wanted to ride in the truck. So, to balance things out and make riding with mom more desirable, I kept the snacks and goodies in the car with me.

The miles seemed to fly beneath us. It was springtime and it seemed that every state we passed through was putting on its best show just for us.

and something to drink, and chatter away at all we'd seen since the last break.

We hit our first big rush of traffic at around 5:00 that afternoon in Memphis, Tennessee. It was nerve-racking trying to keep track of the right U-Haul—at one time there were 3 of them ahead of me.

By 6 or 6:30, we were pulling into a motel outside of Nashville, a beautiful place nestled in the foothills of the Smoky Mountains.

Tuesday morning, we gobbled down a big breakfast and were on our way again. High-lights of the day were crossing the Mississippi River, and heading deeper South and seeing the eerie weeping trees and lush vegetation, even wild boars. We spent that night in Texarkana—the Texas side, mind you!

Wednesday morning, we were so excited we could hardly stand it. We knew that by early afternoon we'd be in Houston at our apartment. Sometimes we'd be the only two vehicles on the highway, surrounded by rocks and trees, creeks and wild flowers—in our own little world.

That was the day we saw our first armadillos, and a bit later, the bluebonnets of Texas seemed to wave in the breeze,

welcoming us.

At 3:30, we were at our apartment. We had traveled 1200 miles and had no problems other than the truck's windshield wiper which stuck on one side and had to be operated manually by one of Brad's long arms as we drove through the I-610 traffic in the rain.

We had so many things in store for us—people of different nationalities, foreign languages, a new kind of food (Tex-Mex) and last but not least, our first cockroach!

Well, you know we've all adjusted quite well to Texas, and the wide differences between Houston and the Panhandle. But I think it does us all good sometimes to sit back and recall some of the challenges we've faced in our lives, and realize what marvelously strong, creative people we are!

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NO JOB TOO SMALL!

Consumers Have Big Stake In Food, Fiber Production
Many American consumers get no closer to agriculture than the supermarket, yet they still have a real stake in keeping the U.S. a leader in agriculture.

Linda Daughtry, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, says farm and urban people depend on each other for products and services that are essential to modern business and living.

One group can't live without the other. Together they make the best food and fiber team in the world.

A basic ingredient for the economic, political and social success of a country is a highly productive agricultural base, which gives a nation the capacity to feed its own people and to export for economic gain as well as humanitarian purposes.

Food in this country is still an incredible bargain, with Americans spending about 17 percent of after-tax income for food and beverages.

Agriculture is this nation's leading employer, exporter, and the number one industry in the United States.

Today, one U.S. worker now produces enough food for about 55 people at home and another 25 overseas. At the turn of the century, one American farm worker could feed only seven people.

In Texas, one out of every 35 persons is a farmer or rancher, yet about 25 percent of the state's retail trade business is directly associated with agricultural production and selling of food and fiber products.

Roy E. Byrd Rites Read

Potter County Justice of the Peace Roy E. Byrd died Sunday, May 6, 1984, at his home, less than four months after announcing his intention to retire. He was 75.
Byrd was first elected justice of the peace Precinct 1, Place 1, in 1972. After serving three terms, he announced in January that he would not seek re-election this year.
"I am looking forward to my retirement and the surety of sleep uninterrupted by trips into the cold of the night to view heart-tearing tragedies," Byrd said.
He said he had no particular plans after retirement except to remain actively involved at First Baptist Church, where he was a member, to see more of his three children and to go fishing.
Serving as justice of the peace was not Byrd's first service to the people of Potter County.
The Stephenville native served as a deputy with the Potter County Sheriff's Department from 1968 until his election as

JP. He had been an Amarillo resident more than 43 years, first from 1927-1931 and then from 1945 until his death.
Before joining the sheriff's department, Byrd was a salesman for 37 years.
Byrd said in 1971 that he had worked in sales with three different companies and chose another field because he was tired of traveling.
He said he sought a job as a nightwatchman, but then-Potter County Sheriff Paul Gaither appointed him deputy sheriff.

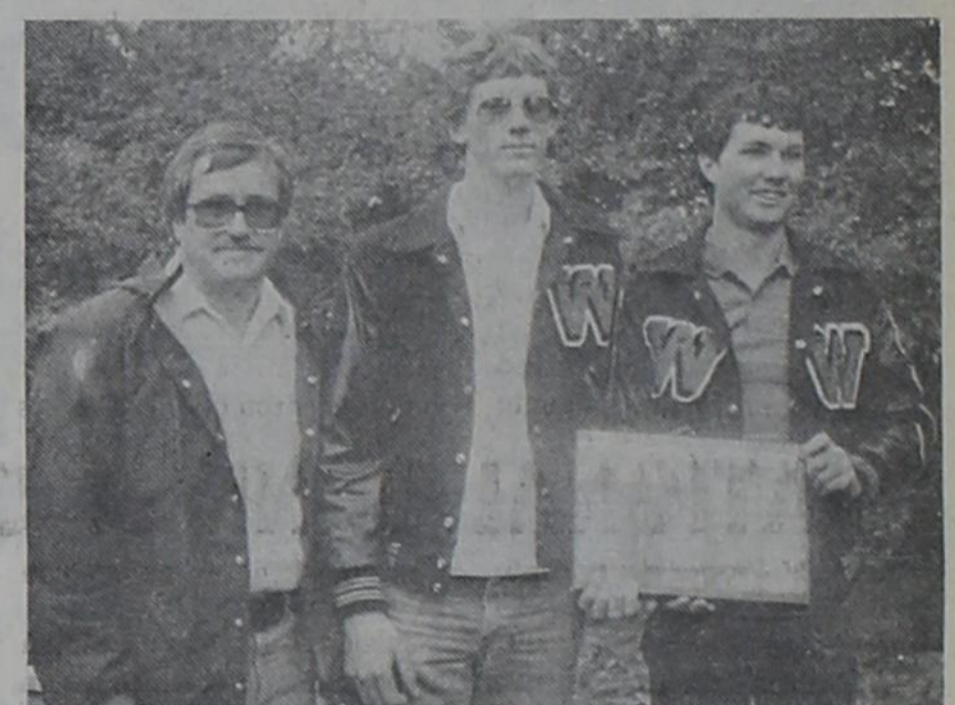
Joe Hairston, a school attorney with the Austin firm of Doyal, Hairston and Walsh, was the featured speaker at a luncheon on May 4.

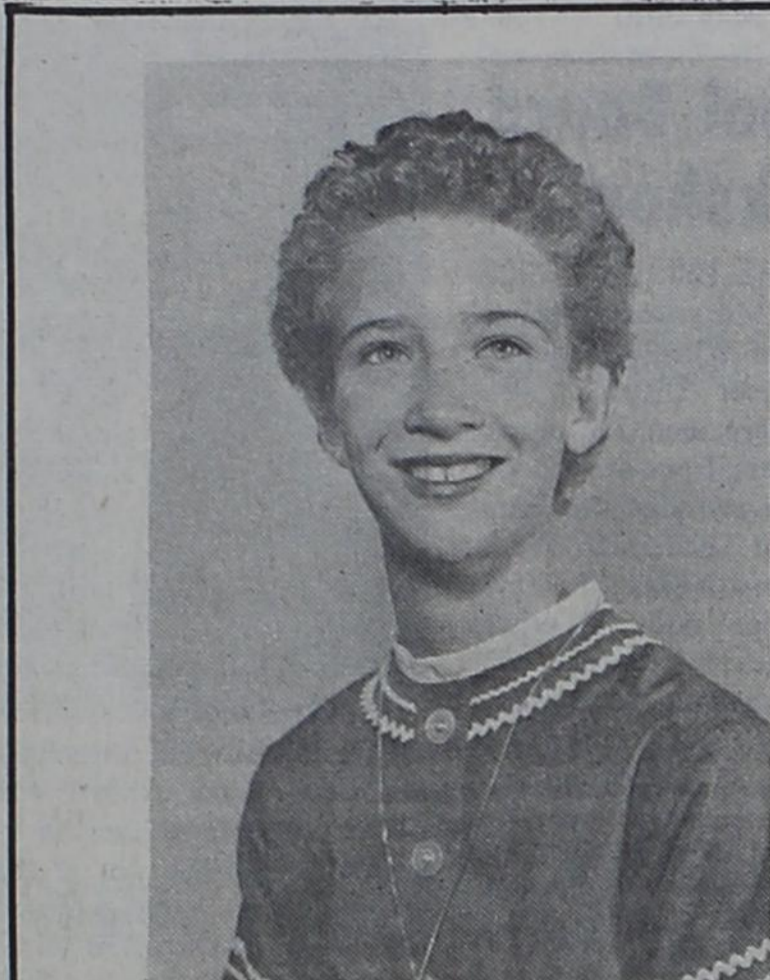

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Beef Cutting Demonstration

Beef makes up a substantial portion of Texan's diets. Much of this beef is purchased as retail cuts over the counter or in the form of halves or quarters processed into retail cuts. There is, however, an alternative to purchasing beef in this form.

Dr. Frank Orts, Extension Meats Specialist, will be in Wheeler County, Tuesday, May 22 to give a beef-cutting

demonstration. The demonstration will be held in the Wheeler School Cafeteria at 7:30 p.m.

Dr. Orts will show how a person can purchase a wholesale cut such as loin or round, and cut it at home to have the cuts he prefers. The cost of beef can be reduced by doing this. Orts will start with a hindquarter, which is being furnished by Thriftway Grocery of Wheeler, and break it into the wholesale cuts and then into various retail and specialty cuts.

Mrs. Shirley Greene, a member of the Top O' Texas CowBelles, will present information on the nutritional value of beef. In addition, the CowBelles will have beef recipes available.

The program is being sponsored by the Wheeler County Program Building Committee, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and Top O' Texas CowBelles Association.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

Everyone is invited to attend. There will be no charge for the program.

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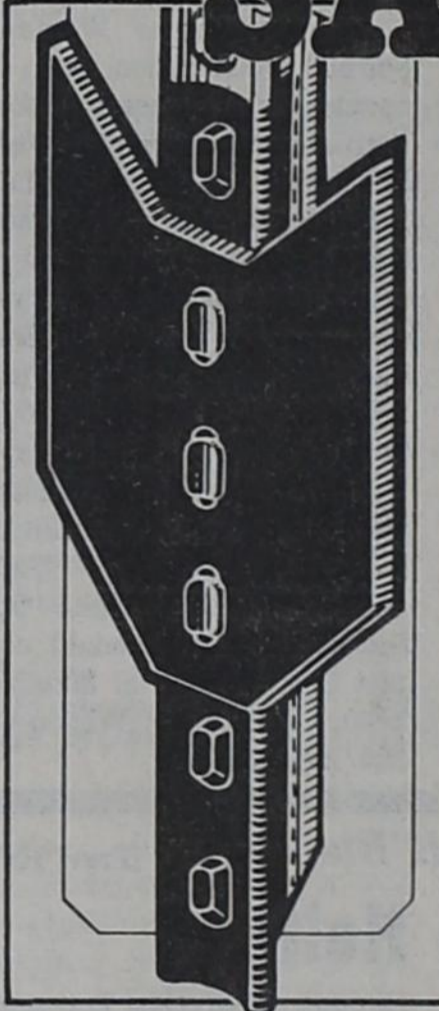

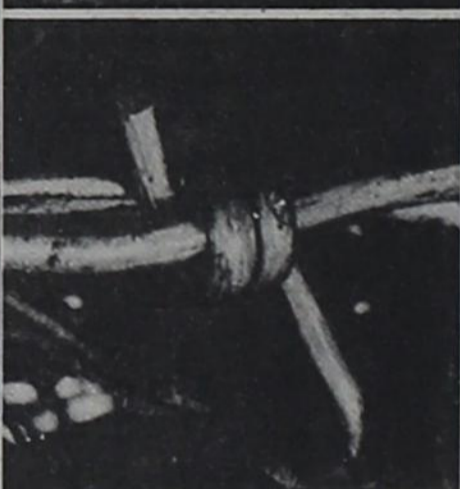

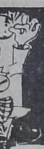
