First Rallies Spur Politics; Absentee Voting to Start

Only Three County Races are Contested

Political "speaking" with the usual coffee and homemade cookies, together with the start of the absentee voting period, gave a mild boost to politics this past week, but, generally speaking, politics still are only simmering on the back burner. At least that's the situation on the local level where only three county races are contested on the Democratic slate. (The Republicans have no county candidates.)

First of the so-called "political rallies" was held this past week, and others are on tap for the next few days. At these affairs, candidates are permitted to speak their pieces, but the affairs so far have been pretty tame; no name-calling has been noticed. Absentee voting on the May 7 slate officially opens today, but the only people who can actually vote today are those who got themselves a ballot last week and are merely posting it today. For the run-of-the-mine voter, however, absentee voting doesn't begin

until tomorrow. The rule book says: "April 18, 1966 (Monday) First day for absentee voting by personal appearance for first primary election May 7, 1966..."

And the absentee period ends May 3 (Tuesday). The rule book puts it like this: An application for absentee ballot to be voted by mail must be received in the clerk's office not later than the close of business on the fourth day preceding election day... Last day for absentee balloting by personal appearance for first primary election, May 7.

Primary day also is the time for holding precinct conventions. The law reads: "At least 10 days prior to the holding of the precinct conventions, the county chairman is required to post on a bulletin board at the county courthouse the hours and places at which the precinct convention shall be held on primary day. A copy of the same shall be filed in the office of the county clerk, where it shall be open to public inspection..."

Then April 27 is the deadline for filing campaign expense statements. Each candidate whose name appears on the ballot at the first primary election shall file a sworn statement not less than seven days prior to the day of such election, of all gifts and loans previously received and all gifts and loans previously received and all gifts, loans and payments made and all debts incurred and obligations incurred or contracted for future use in behalf of such person's candidacy for office...

The Democratic ballot for the first time, a district clerk is to be nominated. County Judge Glen Williams, who has held the post for nearly a dozen years, did not choose to run. The Democratic nod is sought by two men, Don W. Chak, an attorney, and Calvin P. Calvert, a grocer.

Elliott to Head MAIF Board

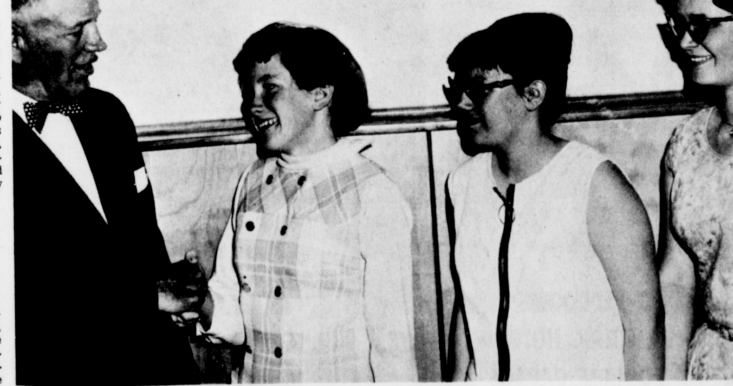

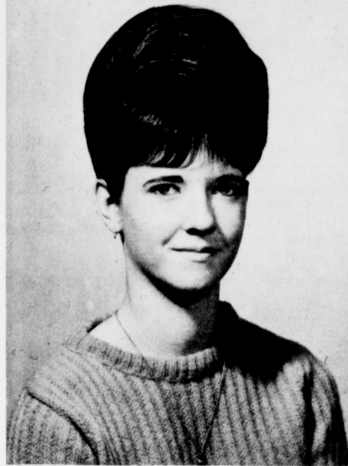

prevent sand and wind erosion. The land was then contoured to control erosion. The Whites have used a conservation cropping system, and crop residue management to improve the farm's soil fertility. Irrigation water management is practiced and proper use of rangeland and deferred grazing are other farm conservation measures. Last fall, they rented another farm - this one contained 307 acres. They're applying conservation practices on it.

It is very destructive to the values that are essential to a wholesome, law-abiding society. We do not need to stand by helplessly. The multi-million-dollar smut industry is vulnerable to a determined and united effort by concerned citizens. In our Constitution, the First Amendment, which guarantees free speech, does not make the smut peddlers immune to prosecution.

The spread of pornography results from public apathy and ignorance of the problem. Do NOT act as a self-proclaimed censor, but make your voice heard.

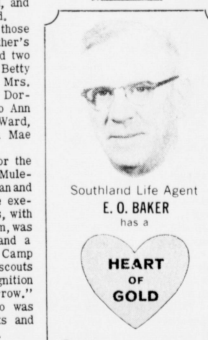

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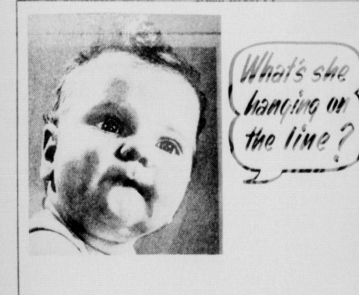
