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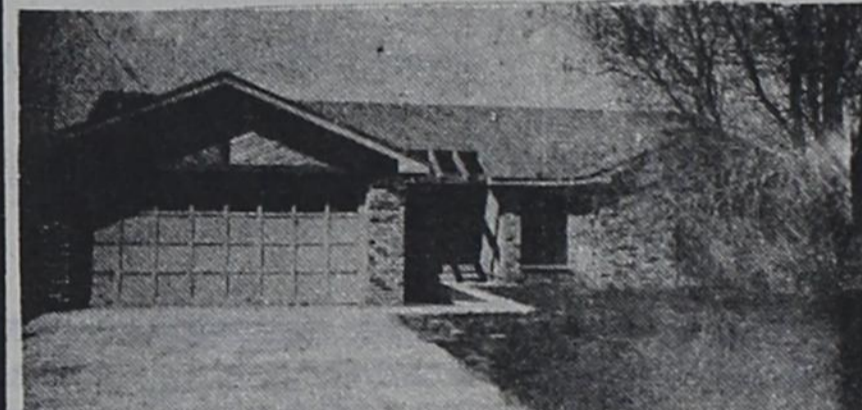
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# Briscoe News

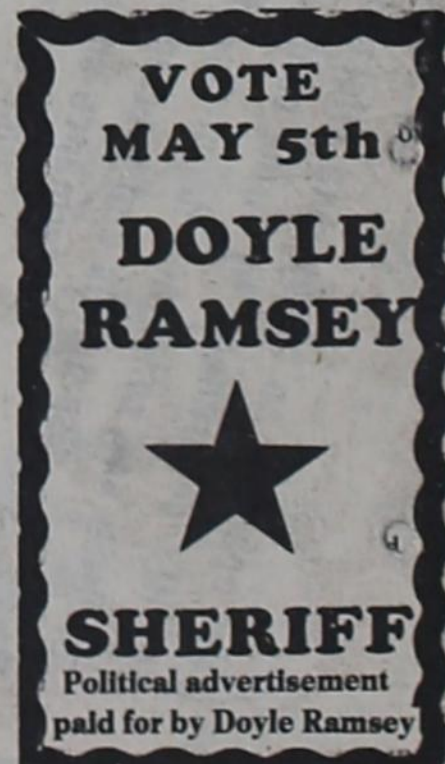

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## Code Permits the Elderly To Postpone Delinquent Taxes

Taxpayers aged 65 or older may take advantage of a special type of property tax relief—deferred payment of delinquent taxes on their homesteads. To obtain the postponement, however, an elderly taxpayer must file a sworn affidavit with the chief appraiser of the county appraisal district or, if a suit to collect the taxes has been initiated, in the court where the suit is pending.

Under Sec. 33.06, Property Tax Code, "An individual is entitled to defer or abate a suit to collect a delinquent tax if he or she is 65 years or older and owns and occupies as a residence homestead the property on which the tax subject to the suit is delinquent."

After a tax deferral affidavit is properly filed, a taxing unit may not press or initiate a delinquent tax suit on the property as long as the over-65 taxpayer owns and resides at that homestead.

An elderly homeowner considering the deferral protection should realize that it allows postponing payment of

taxes, including any delinquent penalties and interest, even though all taxes and penalties continue to accrue during the period of deferral—that is, if he no longer owns or resides in the homestead—all accrued amounts become due and payable.

The affidavit which the elderly property owner files at the appraisal office must include, according to the State Property Tax Board, Rule 155.41, name and address, date of birth and a statement that proof of age may be required, legal description of the homestead, names of taxing units in which the homestead is located and for which the deferral is filed, signature of the applicant, date of filing and an acknowledgement to be completed by a notary public "or other competent official".

Four specific statements must appear on the application, affirmation of age and understanding of the circumstances of the deferral. The applicant must be made aware through these affirmations that a tax lien remains on the property, that penalty and interest continue to accrue during the deferral period and

that taxing units may sue and foreclose on all accrued taxes, penalty and interest when the specified property is no longer owned and occupied as the applicant's homestead.

If a delinquent tax suit has already been initiated, the over-65 taxpayer may halt the suit by filing a similar affidavit with the court, asserting age and ownership of the property. The taxing unit may file a controverting affidavit, but if, after a hearing, the court finds

the individual is entitled to the deferral, the suit will be suspended until the individual no longer owns and occupies the property as a residence homestead.

After filing the deferral affidavit, the over-65 individual may pay, or may fail to pay, any taxes due on the property without altering the protection of the deferral. The taxing unit, too, is protected by Sec. 33.06 (d) from a plea of "limitation, laches, or want of prosecution" because of deferral; that is, the property owner or any future owner may not use the deferral period as part of the limitation contained in Sec. 33.05 or of a claim that the taxing unit failed to sue timely for delinquent taxes.

## PCA Officials Attend Stockholders Meeting

Canadian Production Credit Association (PCA) officials were among 500 Texas agricultural leaders who met for the 28th annual stockholders' meeting of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Texas. Directors from Texas' 29 PCAs and officials of various other financing institutions met April 12-14 in San Antonio.

Directors representing Canadian PCA were Lloyd R. Buzzard of Spearman, Gary A. Jahnel of Canadian and Mack Macias of Stratford. Don W. Morrison of Pampa served as voting delegate.

According to Larry E. Albin, the association's president who accompanied the group, main business sessions were held April 13 with a keynote address by Donald E. Wilkinson, governor of the Farm Credit Administration in Washington, D.C.

A report from the Farm Credit Banks of Texas' Board of Directors was given by Chairman Roy Seaberg Jr. Other reports were given by FICB President J.A. Rogers on the bank's status and progress

in 1983, and Senior Vice President Marsha Martin on "Project 1995: Agriculture and the Farm Credit System in the 1990's."

Luncheon speaker was Stuart I. Greenbaum, Norman Strunk Distinguished Professor of Financial Institutions, and director of the Banking Research Center at Northwestern University in Illinois. Greenbaum's topic was "Fin-

ancial Institutions of Tomorrow".

Friday evening's entertainment included a historical multimedia presentation titled "A Glance at the Past; A Preview of the Future"—a salute to the PCA's first 50 years of service to agriculture.

He's been featured in such publications as Time, Newsweek, TV Guide, Family Weekly, People, Saturday Evening Post, Wall Street Journal and Christianity Today.

A United Methodist minister, Rev. Wildmon holds membership with the North Mississippi Conference of the United Methodist Church. While he maintains his ministerial affiliation, Rev. Wildmon is under special appointment by his bishop to the National Federation for Decency.

Married to the former Lydia Bennett, the Wildmon family includes four children: Tim, 21, Angela, 20, Donna, 19, and Mark, 13.

The NFD is a citizen's group unaffiliated with any other organization or religious denomination, operating on contributions from concerned individuals and from subscriptions to the NFD Informer, a tabloid publication from the organization.

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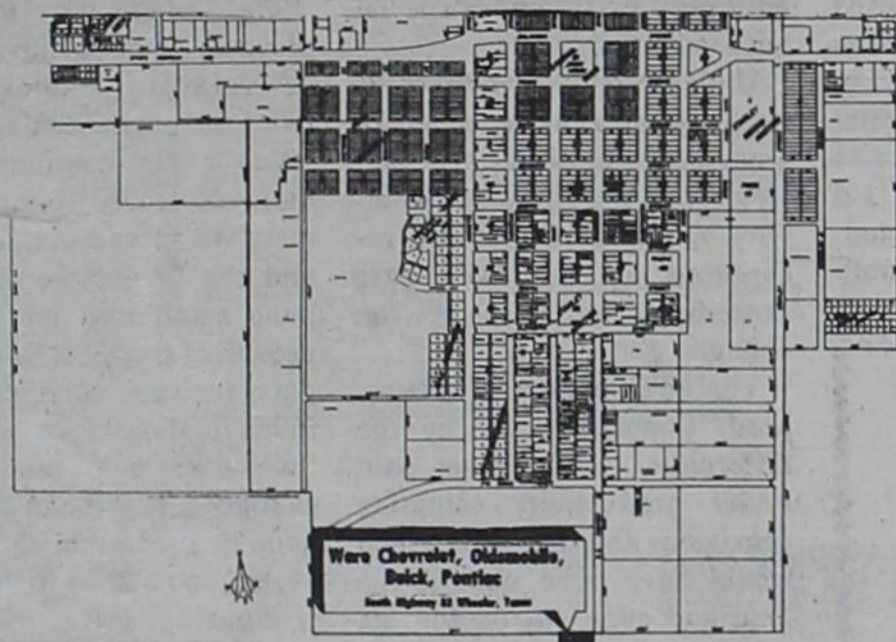
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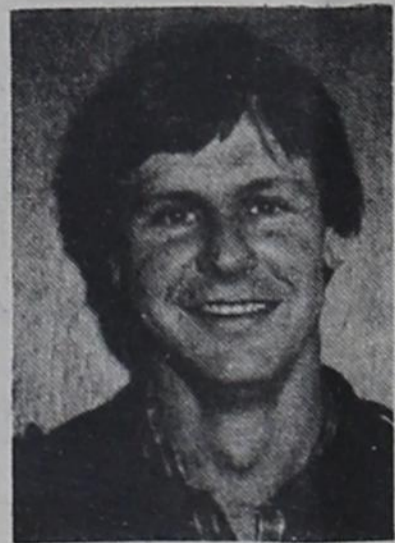

**Perot Changes**

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The following is the second in a series of articles on H. Ross Perot, the Chairman of the Select Committee on Public Education. The articles are taken from the February 1984 issue of Texas Lone Star, a publication for the Texas Association of School Boards.)

Perot strongly believes that changes have to be made quickly in light of projections that the present 3 million school population will increase to 4.5 million by the year 2000.

He is particularly concerned about those children from deprived backgrounds and feels we have two choices in that regard. "We can either move heaven and earth to help them learn how to learn, or we can be prepared to support them as welfare recipients in an advanced technological society. The cruelest form of segregation is to socially promote these children.

"We give them high school diplomas. They don't know anything. They won't ever have a job, and taxpayers will support them the rest of their lives. Is that giving them a fair shake? Their only ticket out is knowledge and they're going to have to work to get that knowledge. There is no easy route."

Perot suggests one solution might be little neighborhood schools that serve no more than 60 or 70 students. "I don't care what the school building looks like," he says. "It's got to be adequate. It's got to pass fire code standards."

"Sooner or later we've got to get over to the people of Texas (that) building fancy public schools does not give you fancy knowledge and education..."

"When you go back to those deprived areas of Texas where the little guys and girls don't have a chance, a fancy school won't make the difference," Perot said. "You don't need facilities to make a great elementary education. You need teachers—teachers who are warm, loving, caring, sensitive persons."

**Day-Care Center**

Perot envisions his network of tiny neighborhood schools opening at 6 or 7 in the morning and staying open until 6 or 7 at night. In addition to children aged 6 to 12, the school would serve 2-, 3-, and 4-year-olds.

"What we've described is a day-care center—a day-care center with a difference based on all the knowledge we've

accumulated about how to make children feel good about themselves."

Instead of one principal for each school, a principal could oversee 10 or 12 of these schools, Perot said. "Because each school is small, each child is somebody. Now that's terribly important," Perot stressed. "We can play to the child's strengths and measure the child's readiness to learn. We've got this thing about starting children in school at age 6. Instead of having that 6-year-old forced into the system whether he or she is ready or not, start them when they are ready to learn. That may be at age 4 or at age 7."

"This is a way to make winners in the school system. By the time these children go to middle school, they can go anywhere," he noted. Perot admits making such a drastic change would probably cause quite a hassle because of all the court decisions concerning desegregation.

"But if you really love these little children and if you really want to help them," he says, "you don't take a child with a 50-word vocabulary, who doesn't know his last name, who is wearing his brother's hand-me-downs, and put him on a bus when he is 6 years old—whether he's ready to learn or not—and ship him to the richest school district in the area and plunk him down with children who have been to Europe, who have beautiful vocabularies, whose parents have taught them to read and write, and who wear designer clothes. At the end of the first day, that child will be so defeated."

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
