## STORM ALERT

Do you have your place of safety picked out in case a storm is spotted heading in the direction of Wheeler? If not, it would be wise to make a plan of action if it becomes necessary to take shelter.

Each year the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department divides their men into storm watch crews; these men go on duty each time Wheeler is placed under storm alert. The crews position themselves at different locations around Wheeler and watch the clouds for threatening conditions. Radio contact with the fire station allows the immediate sounding of the siren if they feel it is necessary.

The alarm will be sounded when the men feel citizens should take shelter. The warning, as it has been for a number of years, will be two 30-second blasts. (Note; in case of fire during severe weather, it is the policy to not sound the fire siren; the firemen are notified of the fire with their individual scanners). In threatening weather, if the alarm sounds, two long blasts indicate shelter should be taken. If the power has been knocked out, firetrucks

will be used to drive the streets blowing sirens to alert you and shelter should be taken.

Where should you go for shelter? Storm cellars are all over Wheeler; check if the neighbors have a cellar and ask permission to use it in case of a storm. Your second choice would be the basement of the courthouse as it will be open for those wishing to take refuge in the basement.

If the storm alert sounds during school hours, **DO NOT GO TO THE SCHOOL AFTER YOUR CHILD!** The school has a plan for the protection of your children and they are safer at the school than in a car or on the grounds trying to take shelter elsewhere. The basement of the gym provides room to provide shelter for the entire school—students and faculty.

Again, you are advised to plan now and don't wait until the alarm is sounded to look for shelter; this plan of action may save your life. If the neighbors have a cellar; don't be afraid to ask permission to use it.

## Mobeetie, Kelton Win Play Contest

The District 2-A South Zone One-Act Play competition was held March 13th at 5:00 p.m. at the Wheeler High School Auditorium.

Advancing to the District competition in Miami on March 22nd, are two schools: Kelton and Mobeetie.

Kelton's One-Act Play was entitled "The Cop and The Anthem". This play was set in the 1890's-1900 in New York. It was the story of a young man, Lemuel T. Thwackbush-

er, played skillfully by Joe Alves, who attempts to upgrade his lifestyle from vagrant to prisoner. His reasoning is that he'd have a bed to

sleep in, clean clothes, and hot meals. The antics he goes through to get arrested, and his extensive vocabulary (most un-bumlike), made this play humorous and enjoyable.

Other members of the Kelton Cast were: Becky Penny, Maralee Singleton, Justin Clemens, Richard Lackey, Kerri Clemens, Denise Green and Russell Holster. Crew members were: Michele Keelin, Leslie Calcote, Pam Penny and Gary Waldo. Glen E. Waldo, Jr., was the play's director.

Mobeetie's One-Act Play was "After Midnight, Before Dawn". The bleak setting of a dungeon was brought across effectively through the use of straw, bare benches, and the pilgrim-type costumes worn by the cast. Adding to the drama was a steady drum beat in the background, simulating a heartbeat.

The theme of the play is the prisoners' anguish as they await their execution the next day, and the lengths to which they'll go to try to spare themselves the unjust persecution.

According to Critic Judge Mr. Samuel D. Cornelius of Frank Phillips College, it took "bravery to pick that show",

and he found it to be "very impressive".

**Make More Usable Space In The Home**

With current housing prices, moving to larger quarters is out of the question for a lot of homeowners. Adding to the squeeze is the current trend in housing construction which emphasizes compactness and economy.

As a result, many of us will need to learn how to live comfortably with less space.

Furniture selection and placement and other decorating devices can help.

Start with an inventory of the total amount of available space in your house and its divisions, the arrangement of areas and size and location of home furnishings.

If some areas seem overcrowded, while others appear underused, reorganize your use of the space. Explore new and different ways of making space function better for your needs.

Some changes can require

costly remodeling or decorating, while others may be achieved by minimal purchases or simple furniture rearrangements.

Here are some low-cost ideas for making cramped quarters look larger:

Plan the decor for the entire home as a unit rather than for each room separately to create

a feeling of spaciousness and continuity.

Carry wall and floor colors from room to room and change textures rather than colors. Blending simple window treatments with wall colors will make rooms seem larger.

Rooms with pastel colored walls reflect light and seem more spacious, while darker walls soak up light and appear to confine.

Modify a guest room or extra bedroom to double as a study, television room, sewing and/or hobby room.

Choose small-scaled furniture with simple lines, and choose multi-purpose pieces

such as sofa beds or drop-leaf tables when selecting or replacing furniture. Place furniture against walls to leave as much space as possible in the center of the room.

Consider clustering items such as the TV, stereo, bookshelves, and storage cabinets in a wall unit to help eliminate clutter, increase floor space, and add interest to your room.

Expand space visually by using mirrors.

Eliminate furniture that's not used and limit the number of accessories to two or three to a room. Beautiful objects need space around them to give people eye as well as elbow room.

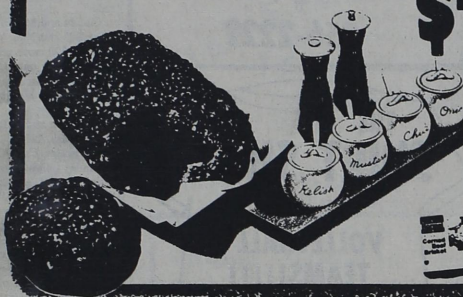
