

# Pre-Trial Hearing Held

Friday, January 13th was the date scheduled for the pre-trial hearing of docket #8167, Edward Nall dba Rogue Theatre VS Ricky Pfeil and Christian Center Church.

The hearing, originally set for 9 a.m., was delayed first to 10 a.m. and then to 11, due to one attorney's late arrival because of the weather.

Texas flags. Upon that bench rested the gavel—a symbol of authority, a symbol of finality. The clock ticked silently, the heating system hummed quietly, and three overhead fans turned lazily, belying the undecurrent of emotion which filled the room.

There in support of Preacher Ricky Pfeil were 15 or 16 of his church members. One carried a small worn testament, another a copy of the infamous Los Angeles Times article of Dec. 15th. They talked softly, often using a scriptural passage to emphasize a point.

Several church members said they will be glad when the publicity is over. Another said, "If Brother Pfeil feels so led by the Lord, who are we to question it?" May Muse of Wheeler perhaps echoed the main sentiment of the group when she stated, "We're trusting the Lord to bring us through this."

Mr. Nall had several supporters in the courtroom, too. One of his friends felt that Mr. Pfeil had gone about this in the wrong way; that "instead of harassing Mr. Nall and ruining his business, he (Pfeil) could have been putting his time to better use such as visiting the sick, etc."

Judge McIlhany began the hearing at 11:00. A motion to include The Wheeler Times as a co-defendant along with Ricky Pfeil and Christian Center Church was denied. (The motion had originally been made because Mr. Pfeil's alleged defamatory remarks had been published in the Times).

The Judge then began the "pleading part" of the trial in which he asked for Mr. Nall's specific allegations against Pfeil. He proceeded on to the mechanics of the trial and granted an extension of the February 20th trial date—the reason being that Defense Attorney Craze had been away from his law practice since May because of his son's serious illness. Judge McIlhany urged the three attorneys to set a date to take depositions, etc., so that the trial could be rescheduled without further delay. The attorneys set aside Feb. 13, 14, and 15 for depositions.

The procedure for choosing a jury was also discussed. A larger panel of names will be drawn because Christian Center members will not be able to serve, and there was some question as to whether a former or future theatre patron would be prejudiced in this case.

The trial will most likely be rescheduled for March or April of this year.

## Emergency Feed Corn

An open sign up for Emergency Feed Corn began January 16, 1984 and will continue through Sept. 30, 1984 or until the supply of low-grade CCC corn is depleted.

Producers who were approved in the earlier signups will still need to feed that corn up during the 90-day feeding period.

We ask that any producer check with us as quite a lot of information is needed to determine if you are eligible or not.

Producers will need to determine and sign their intentions by February 24, 1984 for Wheat, Cotton, Grain Sorghum, etc. Participation is voluntary. Contacts signed cannot be changed. Participation will make producers eligible for loans and deficiency payments.

Acres Conservation Reserve [ACR]

ACR will need to be land that was planted to a program crop in two of the last three years, or has been designated as CUA in the past.

ACR acres will be eligible for a cost-sharing program where producers may sign a contract putting this in permanent cover for five (5) years. This will be highly erodible land classed 111E or above. Cost-sharing will be at a 90% rate or as set by the COC on all seedbed preparation, grass seed, fertilizer, and herbicides. Producers will need to sign these acres up during the regular signup period.

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## Bentley, Smith Named to FAA

The Federal Aviation Administration has recently appointed Greg Smith and Norman Bentley to serve as Accident Prevention Counselors in this area. The program goal is to reduce the number of aviation related accidents through education. The accidents that "should not have happened," can be prevented by improving attitudes toward safety and increasing skills, judgement and knowledge of our pilots as well as reducing or eliminating operation hazards.

Bud Noltensmeyer, Accident Prevention Specialist for the FAA Southwest Region, said when revealing the appointments, "In order that we may accomplish these goals, we are appointing a limited number of Aviation Safety Counselors. Those selected must be knowledgeable of the airmen in their immediate area and respected in their aviation communities for their diligence, discretion, integrity, and dedication to safety in aviation. We in the FAA consider these two men the logical choice for the positions."

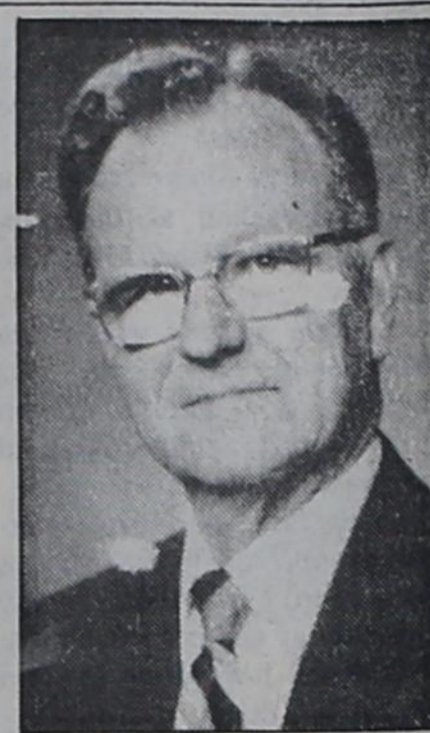

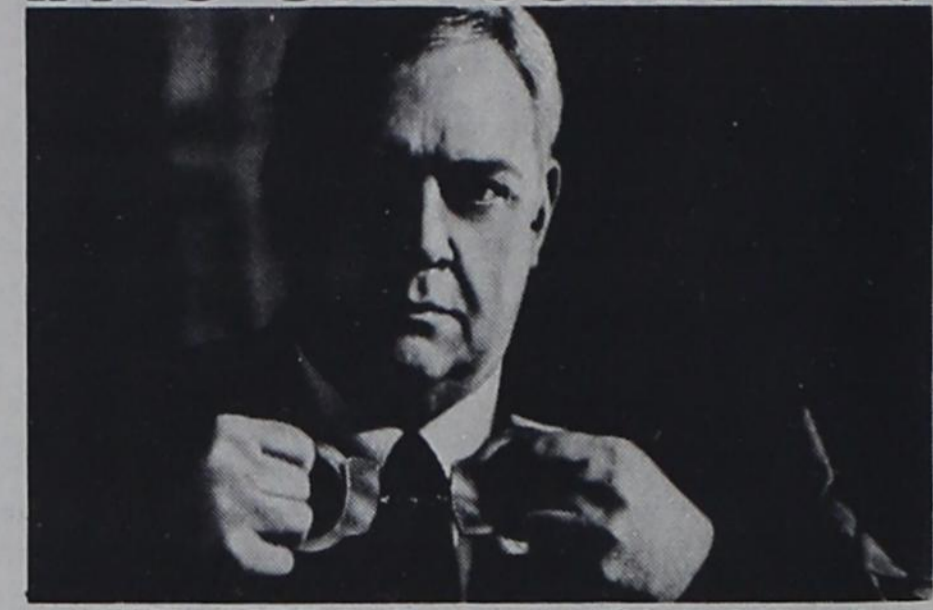

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## PUBLIC NOTICE

In proceedings pending before the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC), local exchange telephone companies are requesting authority to charge AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc., for use of their facilities. These proposed charges are higher than AT&T Communications can pay at current Texas long distance rate levels. To position itself to be able to implement rates that are sufficient to produce revenues that will recover the costs facing the company, AT&T Communications must now file for rate relief to be able to implement rates that reflect the costs of access that are ultimately imposed on the company.

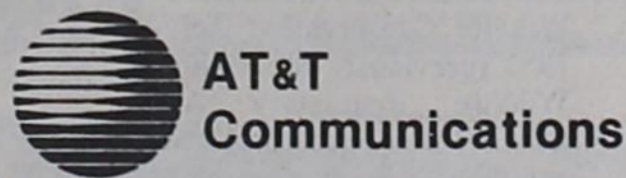
While AT&T Communications does not want to increase its Texas rates, an increase would be required to recover the increased access charges AT&T Communications will have to pay to the local exchange telephone companies under several proposals pending before the Commission. These access charges at the proposed increased levels represent more than 80 percent of AT&T Communications' operating expense in Texas.

Accordingly, AT&T Communications, in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the rules of the PUC, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of rates for long distance calls within Texas. The proposed rates will be effective January 28, 1984, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. All customers and classes of customers would be affected by AT&T Communications' proposed rates.

If higher access charges are ordered, AT&T Communications has no recourse but to pay these charges and recover the costs from its customers as a cost of providing long distance service within Texas. AT&T Communications has filed rates which would mean a maximum overall increase in adjusted test period revenues of \$301.4 million, or 27.85 percent. This amount would help recover cost increases due to the proposed level of access charges now pending before the PUC.

A complete copy of all tariffs and rate schedules is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission at Austin, Texas, and with every municipality in Texas.

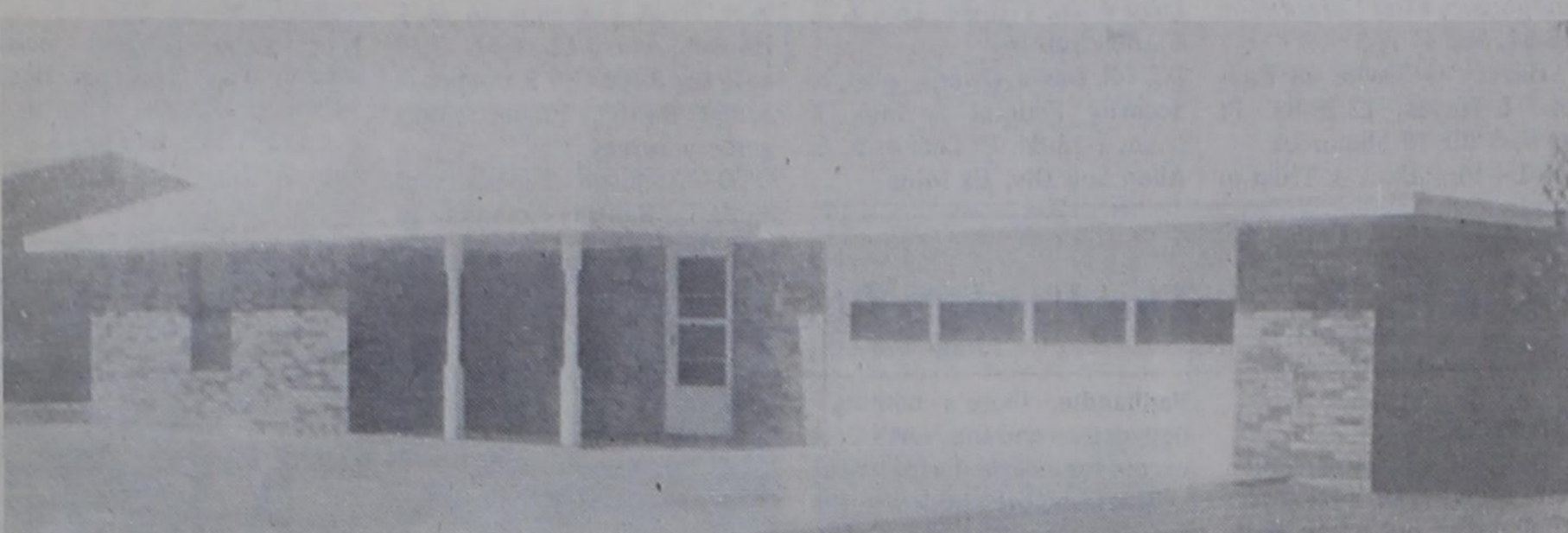

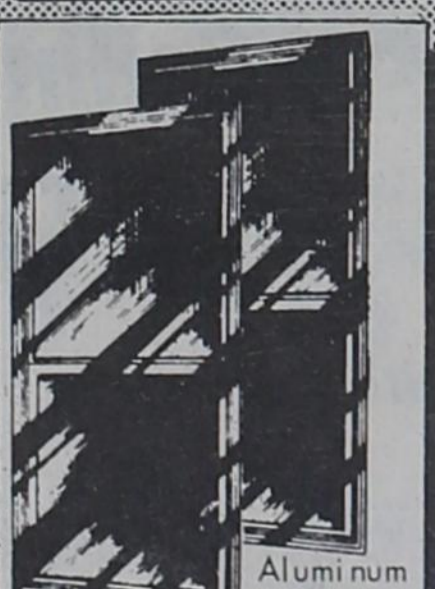

## Exterior - Interior Painting

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## Tree Planting Requires Care

The most important step in establishment of any tree is proper planting. The following steps can be very helpful in assuring a living tree.

**KEEP TREE ROOTS MOIST AND PROTECT FROM FREEZING TEMPERATURES UNTIL PLANTING!!** If trees are containerized, the entire container should be protected.

1. Select a time when ground is moist and not frozen.
2. Kill all vegetation at least three to four feet from planting site.
3. Dig hole about one to one and one-half feet deep and the same size across. A much larger hole is required for pecan trees.
4. Place original ground line of tree about four inches below ground line of hole. BE SURE ROOTS ARE NOT CURLED UP!!
5. Fill hole around tree to cover about one-half of roots.
6. Pack soil around roots to remove all air pockets.
7. Fill hole with water. After water had soaked in, fill in soil to original ground line of tree and pack soil by hand.
8. Bevel out unused soil to build "saucer" around entire plant.
9. Fill saucer with water. Do this at least twice each week during summer and once each week during winter if tree is evergreen.
10. Use of regular fertilizer is not recommended when planting since it is easy to over-fertilize and kill the tree. Ordering information of trees, plus pecans, can be obtained by contacting your local Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District Director or the Soil Conservation Service office in Wheeler.

Supplies of Austrian and Ponderosa Pines are unlimited at this time. Also, the supply of Cheyenne Pecan trees are unlimited at this time. The price for the evergreens is \$1.50 each with a minimum order of 30 trees. The price for the Cheyenne Pecan is \$10.00 per tree with no minimum order. The deadline for ordering has not been set at this time. The evergreens will be delivered in Wheeler March 9th, 1984, while the delivery date for the pecans has not been set. Concern for the type delivery on the pecans was expressed. To prevent the trees from possibly setting on some shipping dock for several days, Wheeler County SWCD Director Paul Macina will personally pick the trees up at the nursery where they are growing. All purchasers of pecan trees will be notified of the delivery date. Several species of barerooted trees are available at the price of \$0.50 per tree with a minimum order of 50. For further information, contact the Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler. It is permissible to plant trees around homes. Also, out of county or out of state orders are welcome.

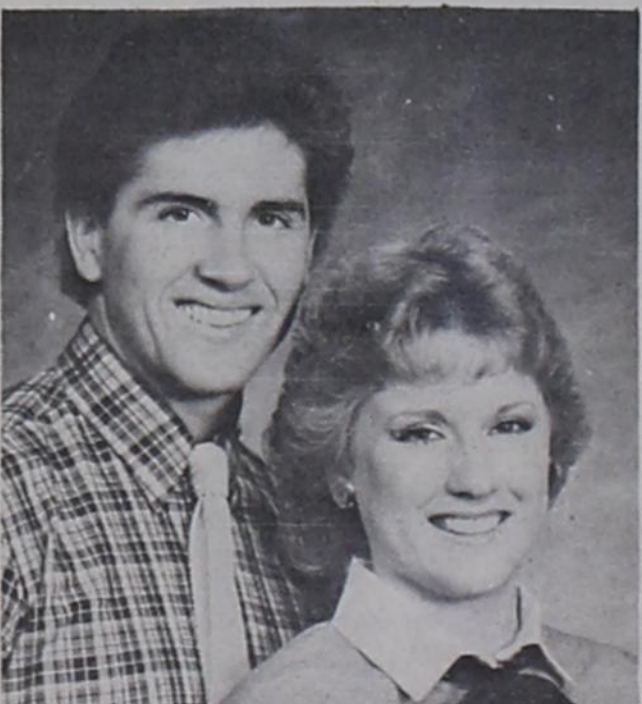
