Agricultural Computing Course Will Be Offered

An agricultural computer short course for adults will be held Jan. 23-26 under the sponsorship of the Wheeler High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Bynum Smith, Superintendent, and Terry McCasland,

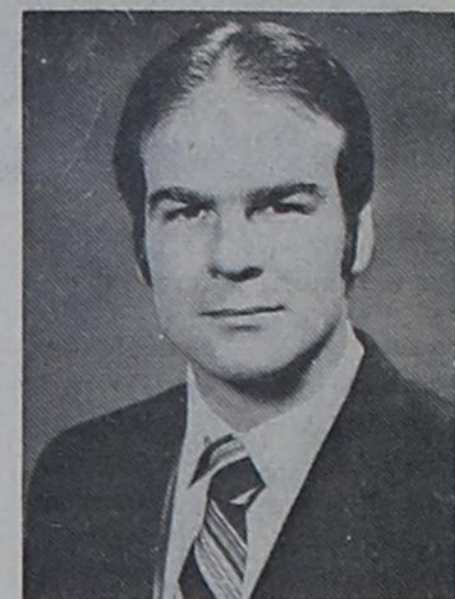
Teacher of Vocational Agriculture. Mr. John Carnes, Agricultural Computer Specialist with the Agricultural Adult Education degree in agricultural education, advanced study in computer science and voca-

tional education, and experience as a vocational agriculture teacher and university instructor. The short course is scheduled to begin Jan. 23, 1984 at 7:00 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture Building. During

the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Carnes will be available to assist enrollees with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm or in-the-agribusiness instruction. Persons interested in attending the short course should call

or write the Teacher of Vocational Agriculture, Terry McCasland, at 826-5534 or 826-5681.

The course objective is to help persons involved in agriculture better understand how computers can be applied to agricultural endeavors. Mr. Carnes states that the short course can be adjusted to the wishes and interests of the people enrolled. Carnes, however, expects to cover such subjects as: selecting computer equipment and software; using word processing, spreadsheet, data base, accounting and agricultural applications software; and accessing agribusiness information sources with telecommunications software. The course involves some lecture but stresses a hands-on approach to understanding computers. No computing experience is necessary, but the course is designed for individuals with a basic understanding of agriculture.

Short courses in agricultural computing, beef production, arc welding, ornamental horticulture and home horticulture are available to adults throughout Texas under the Agricultural Adult Education Program. This cooperative effort, between Texas Education Agency, Texas A&M University and local school districts, enables teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to the adult agricultural community.

CO. ATTORNEY M. KENT SIMS WILL SEEK RE-ELECTION

M. Kent Sims, a lifelong resident of Wheeler County, has announced his candidacy for re-election to the Office of County Attorney, subject to the primary in May. Sims, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lyndon H. Sims, received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Civil Engineering from Texas Tech University in 1969 and Doctor

of Jurisprudence Degree from Tech in May 1972. He has been practicing law in Wheeler since June 1972, having set up his practice immediately upon receiving his Doctor of Jurisprudence Degree. During his practice in Wheeler Sims has in the past been associated with Lowell Lasley (who no longer practices law) and Joe Hayes of Canadian, Texas.

Mr. Sims is active in civic and church activities having served as President of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce in 1974, President of the Wheeler Kiwanis Club in 1974-75, and has served as Director of the United Methodist Youth of the Wheeler First United Methodist Church and is a member of that Administrative Board presently. Sims has served as County Attorney since April 1977 and feels that his office has served the people well during this time.

Sims is a member of the Texas County and District Attorney's Association and has attended various seminars in order to stay abreast of the many changes in our state laws. During his tenure as County Attorney the laws concerning hot check collection have been changed and our system to deal with this problem has been revised to provide better service for Wheeler County, collecting over \$24,000.00 for local businesses during 1983. The D.W.I. laws have also been changed which has substantially increased the responsibility the County Attorney's Office has in these offenses. Sims has been able to work closely with the Commissioners Court, law enforcement officers and other officials in Wheeler County in providing guidance and legal counsel in the performance of their duties.

Churches to Celebrate Sanctity of Human Life Sun.

Thousands of churches across the United States will observe Sanctity of Human Life Sunday on January 22, 1984. This is exactly eleven years after the historic Roe v. Wade Supreme Court decision of 1973 which gave the United States the most permissive abortion laws in the Western world.

The Sanctity of Human Life Sunday program was developed by the Christian Action Council, a Washington-based Protestant pro-life group, which combats abortion and other life-threatening practices such as denying medical treatment to handicapped newborns. The Christian Action Council sponsors a balanced program of activities including education about "Life" issues, the formation of public policy, and service to women with timely pregnancies through their Crisis Pregnancy Center ministry.

"Christians historically have held a high view of human life and have vigorously opposed abortion. Sanctity of Human Life Sunday is a formal declaration of churches across the country that we reclaim and affirm that heritage," said Norman B. Bendroth, organizer of the project and Director of Communications for the Council. "One-and-one-half million abortions per year is a clarion call to Christians to seek justice for unborn children and compassion for women with unwanted pregnancies.

"We believe that Roe constitutes a clear turning away from judaeo-Christian standards of justice to favor those of paganism," notes Bendroth. "Justice Harry Blackmun cited the precedent of 'ancient religion' to justify his abortion decision in part. What he failed to point out is that not only did 'ancient religion' permit abortion, but also slavery, polygamy, crucifixion, and infanticide. It was only through the wide spread influence of Christianity that these practices were abolished. We are here to say that the 'ancient religion' of Christianity holds a much higher view of humanity and we're celebrating that fact."

The Christian Action Council maintains that evidence abounds to indicate a shifting ethic. "The sanctity of human



Teenagers Want Independence

To reach adulthood, teenagers have to change from dependent children to independent adults. They want to be independent, but they are dependent on parents for places to live, food to eat, and perhaps money for education.

Most teens are able to become increasingly independent without getting into major conflicts with their parents. Teenagers who have been given more and more responsibility for their own behavior from the time they were young are not as likely to have a troubled adolescence.

For example, children who decide what to wear at age 3, whether or not to join scouts at age 8, and when to take out the garbage at age 11, are better

able to make responsible decisions at age 15.

Some parents find it difficult to stop giving orders and expecting instant obedience. They want to control every aspect of their teenagers' lives—choose their clothes, friends, hobbies and school courses. Teenagers naturally want to control their own lives. Parents who keep total control are likely to drive their teens out of the family and teens are likely to be rebellious, unsure of themselves, and to conform excessively to the way their friends dress and act.

Parents need to remember that they can't control; they can only influence.

Forming friendships is an important part of the teenager's move toward independence. During the early teen years, having lots of friends is important. But for the older teen, having a few close friends is more important than having many friends. Young teens' friends are usually the same sex. From about age 14 to 16, however, groups of friends include both boys and girls and at about age 17, couples separate from the group.

Learning to form friendships during the teen years is necessary to be able to form friendships as adults. Teens who are able to get along with other teens will probably get along well with others as

adults, whereas teens who have a hard time getting along with others, will probably have a hard time as adults in getting along with others.

Friends give teenagers a sense of belonging and a feeling of self-worth. Teens, especially girls, talk to friends about problems because they have the same problems and may be more understanding than parents.

Many parents worry about their teens getting into "bad company". They fear their teens will get involved in drugs and sexual activity.

Usually teens conform to their friends in superficial things, such as hair style, clothing fads, and music so that they will be accepted by the group. They continue to conform to family standards in things that really matter, such as religion, education, vocational goals, morals and social values. Parents continue to be important people in their teenage children's lives.

Toward the later teen years, young people don't conform so rigidly to customs and fads. They have learned how to be more independent of both family and the peer group.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

PUBLIC NOTICE

In proceedings pending before the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC), local exchange telephone companies are requesting authority to charge AT&T Communications of the Southwest, Inc., for use of their facilities. These proposed charges are higher than AT&T Communications can pay at current Texas long distance rate levels. To position itself to be able to implement rates that are sufficient to produce revenues that will recover the costs facing the company, AT&T Communications must now file for rate relief to be able to implement rates that reflect the costs of access that are ultimately imposed on the company.

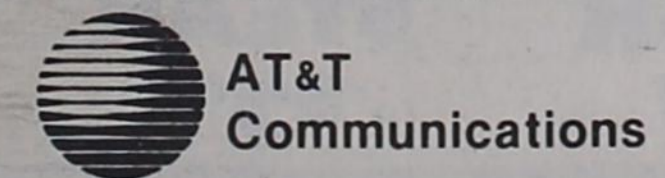
While AT&T Communications does not want to increase its Texas rates, an increase would be required to recover the increased access charges AT&T Communications will have to pay to the local exchange telephone companies under several proposals pending before the Commission. These access charges at the proposed increased levels represent more than 80 percent of AT&T Communications' operating expense in Texas.

Accordingly, AT&T Communications, in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act and the rules of the PUC, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of rates for long distance calls within Texas. The proposed rates will be effective January 28, 1984, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. All customers and classes of customers would be affected by AT&T Communications' proposed rates.

If higher access charges are ordered, AT&T Communications has no recourse but to pay these charges and recover the costs from its customers as a cost of providing long distance service within Texas. AT&T Communications has filed rates which would mean a maximum overall increase in adjusted test period revenues of \$301.4 million, or 27.85 percent. This amount would help recover cost increases due to the proposed level of access charges now pending before the PUC.

HOW DO I FEEL?

This is in response to a question posed in last week's edition of the Wheeler Times. I may not have been the person expected to reply, but I have some thoughts that I want to express. I might say as a little aside to the main subject here that I have been accused of a lot of things since October of 1982, but I have not yet been accused of not standing up for what I believe. There was a time in my life when a certain Scripture in the Bible bothered me somewhat. That Scripture was Luke 6:26, "Woe unto you, when all men shall speak well of you!" So many people were complimenting what I was doing it seemed. When I would think about that Scripture, I was a little troubled. That Scripture never bothers me anymore.
 To specifically address myself to a couple of things that were mentioned in the newspaper last week, I would like to state that though my actions are partially responsible for the news media coming repeatedly, I don't feel that it is my fault if certain reporters think our town is a "hick town". I could say that no one would have ever come, no publicity would have been given, and not a whole lot would have been said if I had been ignored instead of sued. Of course, I realize that the reply to that would be that I would not have been sued if I had never said or done anything, so I won't belabor the point.
 I have been to many small towns. Before I came to Wheeler, I was an internationally unknown evangelist. In fact, I was nationally unknown. Actually, I was almost unknown period. I could hold large gospel meetings in small towns, or I could hold small meetings in large towns. Mostly, I held small meetings in small towns. So many people here help the needy. If anybody around here has a Christmas deprived of good things, it is simply because the community didn't know about them. Big city folks don't know all of this. So, if they don't like our town, I consider that to be their problem because of their ignorance. By the way, "Entertainment Tonight" presented a different attitude toward the town, I thought. They did a very good job of telling the story in a way that was fair to everyone concerned, in my opinion.
 My only other comment about all of this, in all due respect to everyone else, is that if we are going to get mad about something, let's be sure it is something we should really be mad about. By the way, I'm not mad at anybody. I love all of you.
