Wednesday of last week was quite a contrast with blizzard conditions about noon and almost a clear blue sky in the evening. Our snow did not produce a measurable amount of moisture, but certainly caused a measurable amount of driving problems. research scientists, Extension specialists and agents, and area farmers will get together in Amarillo in January to share the latest information on new equipment and techniques to improve crop irrigation.

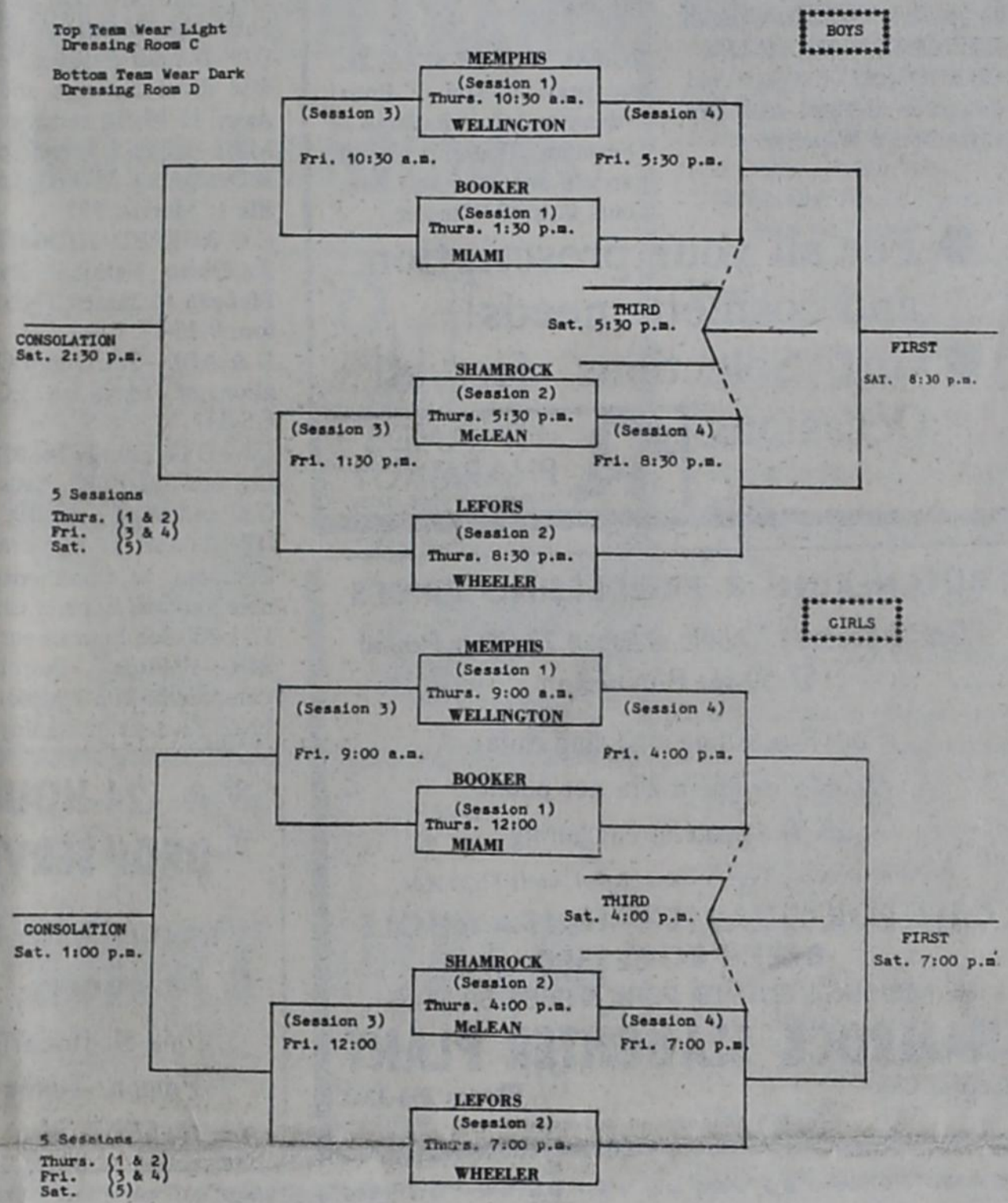

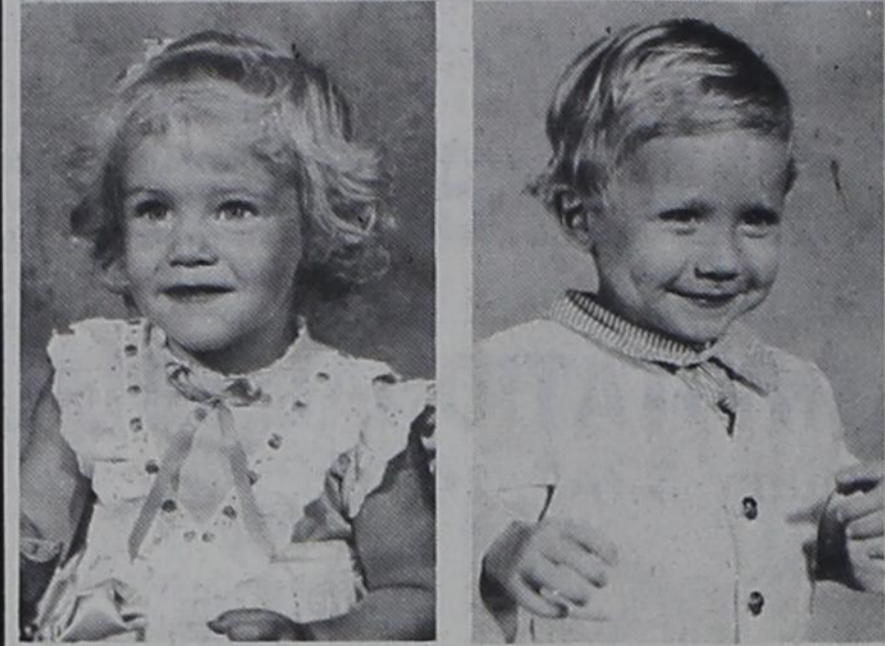

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## TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

### Saving Vegetable Seeds For Another Year

Though seeds are a bargain when you consider how many dollars' worth of vegetables you get from them, their cost can still add up if you have to buy several varieties of vegetables every year.

You may find that the seed packets of some vegetables contain many more seeds than you can possibly use in one year's garden, and you may wonder if these seeds can be saved and planted the following year. In most cases, the answer is yes, if the seeds have been stored in a cool (40 to 45 degrees), dry place.

Under such conditions, some seeds, like beets, eggplant, cantaloupe, and tomatoes, can be expected to last more than 5 years.

The cole crops, lettuce, and peppers can be expected to last 3 to 5 years, while some seeds only last a year or two, like onions, parsley and corn.

To check whether last year's seeds are still "good," follow this simple procedure. Place a known number of seeds on a double layer of paper towels. Roll the towel up over the seeds and secure it with a rubber band or string.

Place the rolled-up tube in an oblong cake pan and moisten it with water, or stand the tube on its end in a glass containing about 1 inch of water.

Keep the paper-towel tube moist and unroll it in 7 to 10 days to see how many seeds have sprouted. Determine the percentage of viable or "good" seed by dividing the number of seed germinated by the total number of seed tested.

Discard the seed if the percentage of good seed is less than 70 percent. If the percentage is better than 70 percent, plant the seed with the knowledge that you are doubly saving money this year.

**Dear Folks:**  
Have you dug your way out of that 28 inches of snow yet? What a time to have such a storm, with everyone on the road for the holidays! It must have seemed strange Christmas Eve to have only one of us there to celebrate, after years of big, noisy Christmases. Our Christmas was beautiful. The "Birthday Party for Jesus" was a big success. It was lots of fun, with clowns, a rainbow of helium-filled balloons bobbing here and there, and even a birthday cake. Yet, coupled with a reenactment of the Christmas story by junior high students, it really brought home the true meaning of the day.

As we sat around the tree Christmas afternoon, it was easy to see that there was something different this year just by looking at the presents. It was a Western Christmas! There were jeans, of course, and an assortment of clothing in Mobeetie maroon, but there was also a cowboy hat, a miniature ranch set, Dallas Cowboy items, and a set of mounted longhorns! The trip to Houston for a check-up for Jon was somewhat harried. The roads were fairly clear until we reached the other side of Dallas. Then it began to get very icy, and our accelerator began to stick. The disc jockey we were listening to on the radio was warning people to be careful for she had slid into a ditch twice on her way to work that evening. Cars and trucks spun around on that glaze and flew in every direction. We all travelled at 10-15 miles per hour, inching our way along. A couple of times when we neared a bigger town, we stopped to check into a motel, but there weren't any vacancies. We all had the same idea—to get off those roads! We did spend the night in Huntsville though, and the roads were all right the next morning as we made our way to Houston and the Medical Center.

I was flooded with a combination of awe, nostalgia, and apprehension at the familiar sight of the Center. On a return visit, it's almost as though you try to slip a protective covering over your emotions. But it doesn't work. Once inside, you feel the same gratitude that there is such a place with countless dedicated skilled, caring workers—and the same horror at realizing that these thousands of people around you have all had their lives and hopes turned upside down by one word—cancer. The main suite at M. D. Anderson where new patients register and are admitted, had been redecorated. Instead of rows of black vinyl chairs and a nondescript color of carpeting, the room now has soft apricot carpet and lovely soft, upholstered chairs in peach, ivory or willow green.

Of course, that dreaded disease touches all ages. This trip's "heart-tugger" was a little boy of around three years of age. He was thin and bald from his chemotherapy, but he rode in a Little Tykes stake wagon holding a tape recorder playing children's stories. His young mother pulled him along cheerfully. Bless her heart! She'd found a way to make the ordeal easier on both of them. We also continued to be fascinated by the foreign languages we heard (although "Texan" is sometimes still foreign-sounding). In one large waiting area, two women talking discovered that they were from the same little area of Saudi Arabia! At our last appointment of the trip, we waited to be called in to see the doctor for his examination and the results of the tests. The anticipation was building as we sat there paired into couples, offering our support by our presence. Some people read, some watched television, some stared off, lost in thought. I worked on my counted cross-stitch because it relaxed me. Yet, from time to time, I'd see others watching me, and that rhythmic in-and-out of the needle seemed to soothe them too. Our social worker recognizing us, rushed up, flung her arms around us and said, "Where's Mobeetie?" Can you imagine, they'd spelled it wrong! And then it was time to see the doctor (Good old Dr. McBride, just friendly enough, just gruff enough). And we passed! Thank you, Lord! We had a quick lunch in the hospital cafeteria. Here and there we would see someone sitting alone, their faces marked in red or blue, like war paint. And they were going to battle—off to radiation to fight the enemy. In fact, many of the technicians wear T-shirts that proclaim in bold letters, "Fighting Cancer—Now that's a job!"

Before we left we stopped at the hospital chapel where I had spent so many hours last year on my "prayer-bones". We thanked God for M. D. Anderson, and prayed for the day when there would no longer be a need for such a place. After this, we were ready to have some fun. We went downtown to the Galleria, a huge shopping mall with very exclusive stores. The tiny white Christmas lights were still twinkling in boughs of evergreen around the center of the mall and there was beautiful classical music playing. As we looked down from the level we were on, we saw brightly dressed skaters ice-skating on the bottom level. The decorations, the music, the skaters,

**Good Nutrition Helps Make You Feel Better**

Good nutrition plays an important part in feeling good. Nutrition is the food you eat and the way your body uses this food. Nutrition affects your physical and mental performance as well as how you look and feel.

Good nutrition means eating the proper amounts of foods. This depends on your age, sex, amount of physical activity and your state of health.

The Daily Food Guide gives a plan for sound eating habits and includes the following groups:

- \* Milk Group — 2 or more servings a day for adults, 3 servings for children and 4 servings for adolescents and pregnant women.
- \* Breads & Cereals — 4 or more servings a day.
- \* Vegetables-Fruit Group — 4 or more servings each day.
- \* Meat, Fish, Poultry and Beans Group — 2 or more servings a day.
- \* Fats, Sweets and Alcohol Group — Use with caution. May be used to provide additional calories as needed.

It is not necessary to have 3 square meals per day to be well nourished. Americans are snacking more and feeling guilty about it. According to a national survey conducted this year by the Wheat Industry Council, two-thirds regularly snack between meals. Snacks can be nutritious and fit into the daily food guide.

For example, yogurt, ice cream and cheeses can be

snacks from the Milk group. Muffins, crackers, breads and popcorn are from the Bread and Cereal group. Fruit juice, fresh fruit, raw vegetables and raisins and other dried fruit are part of the fruit and vegetable group. Cold meats, nuts and seeds are part of the meat, fish, poultry and beans group.

Also remember that several small meals a day often provide for top efficiency and performance rather than 1 or 2 large meals.

You can plan ahead when you're away from home too. Take nutritious, carry-along snacks such as fruits, nuts and canned vegetables or fruit juices.

**Cholesterol and Children**

According to a recent issue of Family Practice News, one in three children today has at least one risk factor for coronary artery disease by age 14 because average serum cholesterol levels are higher than the optimum.

**Breads and Cereals Lower Calorie Than We Think**

Bread and starchy foods have been unfairly treated. They have been billed as fattening and high in calories. Many "starchy" foods are actually lower in calories than most people think. According to a nationwide survey conducted this year by the Wheat Industry Council most people overestimate the number of calories in common foods. Here are some of their results:

Product	Correct Calorie Count	Perceived Calorie Level
5 oz. spaghetti with tomato sauce	163	394
5 oz. macaroni and cheese	269	350
One slice wheat bread	61	117
One slice white bread	76	136
Saltine cracker	12	74
Medium-size potato	88	160
Cream-filled snack cake	160	419

Breads and cereal products are important sources of B vitamins, iron and protein. Whole-grain products contribute magnesium, folacin, and fiber.

Fiber or "roughage" from breads and cereals is also important for food regularity and relief of constipation.

These fibrous foods are bulky and crowd out other calorie sources. More chewing is required, so added effort slows you down and gives your stomach that "full feeling".

**Calcium and Kids' Fractures**

Nearly one in four children who were fracture patients in a study done by the University of Utah consumed less than 60 percent of RDAs for calcium and phosphate. As reported in Pediatric News in June, a control group who ate more than 60 percent of RDAs had higher bone mineral content.

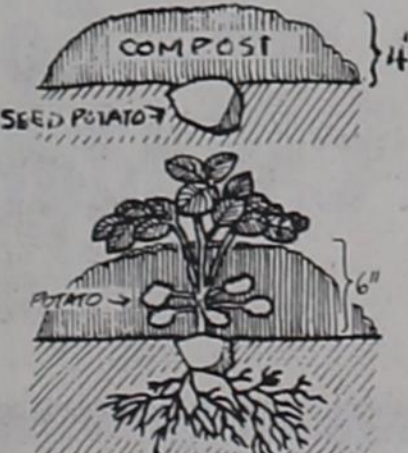
## TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

Potatoes are a favorite eating crop, but they are not widely grown in Texas gardens. Why? Perhaps because gardeners think they are too hard to grow.

If this notion has kept you from planting potatoes, you may be interested in this alternative approach. Though it sounds unusual, this technique involves planting your potatoes on top of the soil, and it is really quite simple.

Plan on planting your potatoes about 3 to 4 weeks prior to the last anticipated freeze in your area. About 3 to 4 days before this date, cut your whole, certified seed potatoes (do not use table-stock potatoes) into pieces weighing 1-1/2 to 2 ounces each, with at least

one eye in each piece. Dust the seed pieces with a fungicide like Captan and cure the pieces in a warm, humid place until planting.



Prepare the soil by tilling it as deeply as possible, working in a complete fertilizer and liberal amounts of organic matter. At planting time, set the seed pieces firmly into the top of the

soil, about 8 to 10 inches apart. Rows should be at least 3 feet apart.

Now comes the part that explains how you can grow potatoes "above ground." Cover the seed pieces with 3 to 4 inches of compost, well-rotted hay, grass clippings, or some other organic matter.

Within 3 to 4 weeks, the potato plants will emerge through the covering of organic material. When the plants are 3 to 4 inches tall, apply another 2 inches of organic matter around them. This is the equivalent of "dirt" traditionally grown potatoes. You may need to add another layer in a week or two as the organic matter settles.

Stop adding the organic material when the seed pieces are covered to a depth of 6 to 8 inches—this is the optimum depth for potato production. The potatoes will develop right in this layer of organic matter, which means there will be less chance of soilborne disease and cracks in the potatoes.

Within 90 days, you will be able to reach down into the compost around your plants and pull out your first above-ground-grown potatoes—smooth, clean, and trouble-free.
