




All 4-H and FFA members interested in participating in the Wheeler County Terminal Fed Heifer Program are re- 11-24 Caryn Risner quired to submit enrollment forms no later than Friday, December 9, 1983. The total 11-29 Joyce Miller number of cattle that are to be fed in the program needs to be determined by that time so arrangements can be made for an adequate feed supply.

Heifers that are to be fed in the program will be weighed in on December 29 and then fed for 140 days. They will be slaughtered on May 17, 1984 and carcass information will be obtained.

The program will stress the fundmentals of beef cattle selection, management, feeding and evaluation, according to Mr. Doug Cooper, program chairman. Cooper said, "The program is designed to give youth experience in commercial cattle feeding operation and to give them an insight in the economics of cattle feeding."

Cooper explained that final placings of feeders would be based on rate of gain, efficiency of feed conversion, carcass rank, record books and quiz taken by program participants.

Anyone needing an enrollment form or further information should contact their vocational agriculture teacher

or the county Extension agent. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national

FMHA Loans Available

Emergency loans for farmers and ranchers in Wheeler County are available through the county office of the Farmers Home Administration (Fm HA), Billy R. Chance, FmHA county supervisor announced this week.

Chance asked that those who need farm credit as a result of drought beginning April 1, 1983 and continuing make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration Office in Wheeler.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken county will be accepted by Farmers Home until May 18, 1984 for physical and production loss-

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment, or buildings, (including homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock, or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Chance said.

Applicants that certify that other credit is not available may receive loans covering actual losses at an interest rate of five percent for the first any amount over \$100,000, and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's ability to pay. Applicants who The films will be shown at certify that other credit is available may also receive these loans at a higher interest

eling elsewhere to receive treatment, and the emotional cost of this kind of disruption to patients and families is impossible to calculate," she

The \$10 million facility, located in the Medical Center complex in West Amarillo, was built entirely from private donations. No money was borrowed and no government funds were used.

"Now that the doors are open, we need continued financial support to pay for expanded patient care, research, and educational programs," Ms. Van Petten said.

In addition to basic treatment, the Center provides a wide variety of supportive care, including the services of social workers, pastoral counselors, pharmacists, and nutritionists.

"The Center is dedicated to the concept that the whole person must be treated, and that includes emotional, spiritual and financial needs as well as physical," Ms. Van Petten stressed.

"We do not deny services to anyone," she added. "And it should be noted that the destitute are not the only ones who are unable to afford medical bills for cancer treatment."

"When you consider that one chemotherapy treatment may cost several hundred dollars, cancer treatment is priced out of reach for many people. It's not unusual for cancer therapy to cost about \$20,000."

"There are several reasons why the Endowment Fund is beneficial to both the community and the Cancer Center, Ms. Van Petten explained.

"The money contributed to endowment stays in the community to provide funds for local loans, and individuals have the convenience of making a contribution to a worthwhile regional institution organization simply by going to their local bank," she said.

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


eventually destroyed are those who support Israel. No Matter what good we may do, if we ever desert Israel, we are doomed.
