



"Speak Up, Say No!" is a 6-minute filmstrip, which teaches children how to avoid sexual abuse. The filmstrip features a delightful little characater, Penelope Peabody Mouse, who in a positive, nurturing way teaches children not only to beware of strangers, but to recognize and avoid sexual abuse from trusted friends.

In America today, there is a one-in-four chance that a little girl will be a victim of incest, child molestation, or rape by the time she is 18. There is a

support and protection. one-in-seven chance for little The Rape Crisis and Sexual Abuse Service of Amarillo presents an hour long program for children and their parents. The program is designed to inform children on what to do if they are ever in a situation where they feel powerless or afraid about an adult touching thier body. The program also tells children how to avoid being a victim, through games and role playing.

\* Children should be aware that sexual abuse is not their fault and that it's okay for them to report incidents to their parents, teachers, counselors, police, or a trusted adult.

\* Children need to be informed that they have rights, and that those rights extend to their bodies. Talking about these things takes away the helplessness that comes with being a child and that is multiplied by being a victim.

## PESTICIDE

Joe Don King

Pesticide products containing the active ingredients 2, 4-D (2,4-dichlorophenoxyacetic acid;, 2, 4-DB (4-(2,4-dichlorophenoxy) butyric acid), 2,4-DP (2-(2,4-dicholorophenoxy) propinoic acid), 2,4, 5-T (2,4, 5-tricholorophenoxyacetic acid), MCPA (2-methyl-4cholorophenoxyacetic acid), slivex (2-(2,4, 5-tricholorophenoxy) propionic acid), and dicamba (3,6-dichloro-o-anisic acid), propanil (3', 4'-dicholoropropionanilide) and aresenic acid (orthoarsenic acid), alone or in mixtures, when distributed in containers of a capacity larger tham one quart for liquid material of two pounds for dry or solid material (if marketed using metric measures-containers larger than one liter or one kilogram, respectively) have been classified as state-limited-use pesticides by the Texas De-

partment of Ariculture (TDA). Specialty fertilizer mixtures containing one or more of these active ingredients packaged in containers of 50 pounds or less that are labeled for ornamental use and registered with the Texas Feed and Fertilizer Control Service for sale and distribution in this state are exempt from the classification as state-limiteduse pesticides.

Products for home use containing one or more of these active ingredients requiring no further mixing or dilution before use and packaged in containers with a capacity of one gallon or less for liquid formulations or four pounds or less for dry or solid materials are also exempt from the classification as state-limiteduse pesticides.

State-limited-use pesticides and restricted-use pesticides may only be sold to certified applicators, persons acting under the direct supervision of a certified applicator, or a licensed dealer. Wheeler County producers who anticipate use of a state-limited-use of restricted-use pesticide and who do not currently hold a private applicator certificate may wish to obtain a certificate from the Texas Department of Agriculture.

A person is a "private applicator" if the person uses or supervises the use of a restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticide for the purpose of producing an agricultural commodity 1) on property owned or rented by the person or the person's employer or under the person's general control; or 2) on the property of another person if applied without compensation other than the trading of personal services between producers of agricultural commodities. Persons meeting these qualifications may obtain certification as private applicators from the Texas Department of Agriculture through completion of an approved training program conducted by the county Extension agent or through home study using materials available at the county Extension office. Those wishing to obtain a license through the home study method may contact Don King County Extension Agent for the study material.

Many persons holding private applicator certificates responded to a 1981 Texas Department of Agriculture request to "recertify" and in so doing received a current private applicator certificate which may be identified by a two-digit prefix-81, 82 or 83-of the certificate number (example: 81-17952). Initial issue certificates (certificate number not preceded by a two-digit number) are considered valid according to a TDA source, however, TDA encourages holders of such certificates to submit an "application" for renewal. A limited supply of TDA Application for Private Applicator Certificate Renewal is available at the county

Considering a major product -a car or appliance-that costs a significant amount of money? It's wise to search for before buying.

Gathering information about a product can be rewarding for several reasons.

graphy." To determine if a product will do what you want-and whether you can care for it, read the use-and-care booklets

available and labels attached. If objective information is not available, answer these

questions: 1) Are prices for the product fixed by the manufacturer or retailers-and is there any way to buy the products more

TEXTBOOK SELECTION

AUSTIN - For several years, an unusual rule has guided the selection of textbooks for Texas schools. Basically, if you had something nice to say about a particular book, you couldn't say anything at all. In other words, only testimony from people opposed to the adoption of certain books was permitted under the Texas Education Agency Code.

I ducation recently reviewed the selection process. They adopted proposals that give every Texan the right to comment on textbooks under consideration. The new rules also protect against the threat of aggressive sales pitches by textbook publishers at the taxpayer's

both positive and negative the board, the size of the textbook selection committee would be increased from 15 to 27 members. This is based on the 27 U. S. congressional districts in Texas. Also, the daily expenses of members would be paid by the state, instead

A few amendments to the original bill were also approved. One is that the hearings should carefully examine both general and specific contents of textbooks. Another directs that equal consideration be given to comments, whether they are written or oral. We believe the books that help teach our children to

read and write are vitally important, and that the strong points of a textbook deserve as much consideration as the weak points. After all, the annual textbook review process involves the selection of about

\$60 million dollars worth of textbooks for 1,100 school districts in our state, including those in the Panhandle and South Plains. We are interested in your comments on this issue.






Dr. Frank Petr, Area Exten-10, to discuss minimum tillage farming. The meeting will begin at 7:30 pm in the District Courtroom.
