Child Identification BRISCOE-ALLISON-KELTON-MOBEETIE

The Alpha Mu Alpha Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi will be sponsoring a Child Identification Program at the Briscoe School, Tuesday, October 25, 9-12 a.m. Allison School, Tuesday, October 25, 1:30 to 3:30 p.m. Kelton School, Wednesday, October 26, 9-12 a.m. Mobeetie School, Wednesday, November 2, 9-12 a.m.

The purpose of the program will be to fingerprint each child in our community and the surrounding towns. If your child is kidnapped, this fingerprint sheet will help local and area law enforcement authorities to identify your child and help in the location of him or her.

This will be strictly a volunteer program. Each child enrolled in the Wheeler Schools will be given the fingerprint sheet to take home. This must have the parents signature on the back, otherwise, by law, no minor child can be fingerprinted. They must then return it back to their teacher the next day and we as a service organization will do the printing. Then, the child will bring the sheet back home to the parents. It will then be up to the parents to keep the fingerprint sheet in a safe place in

Pampa Rodeo: The second rodeo of the season was held in Pampa.

ALLISON Little Dribblers' Tournament

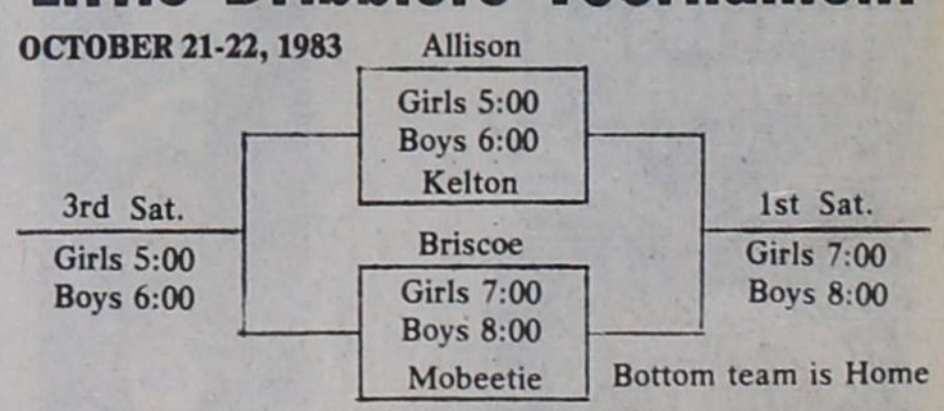

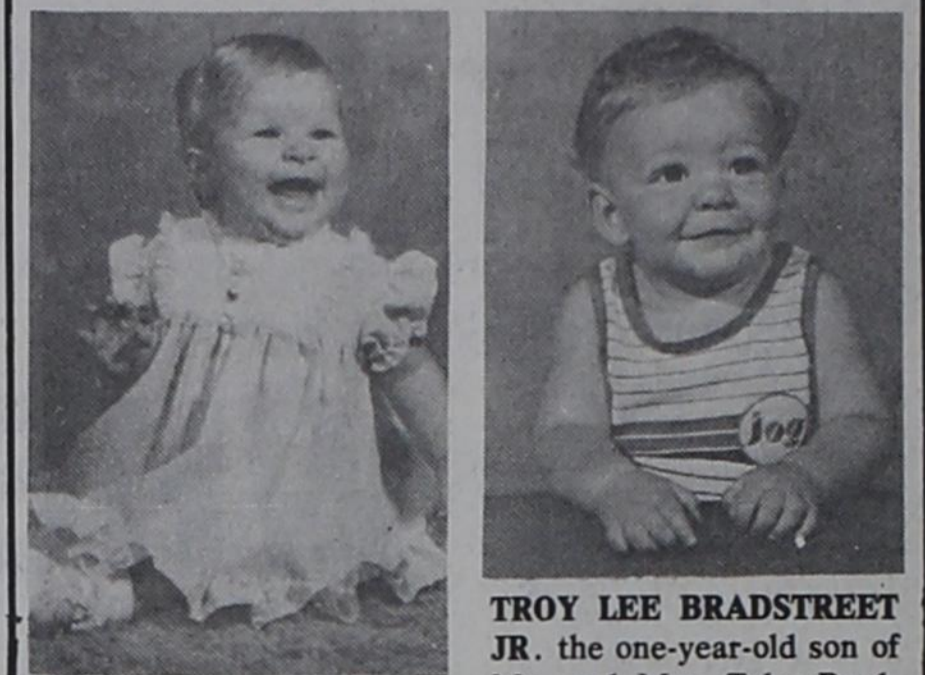

Lawns Need Fall Fertilizer

If you haven't fertilized your lawn in a while, it's not too late to do so.

Fall fertilization can boost a lawn while minimizing energy requirements for mowing and removal of grass clippings.

A fall application of fertilizer not only prolongs green color in lawns, but also stimulates root growth, reduces winter injury and promotes early spring recovery. Fall fertilization also increases turf density and reduces weeds.

Warm fall days and cool nights provide conditions favorable for grass to accumulate carbohydrates that promote root growth and help winter survival. And since leaf growth is also less during the shorter fall days, delaying lawn fertilization until mid-September or October helps reducing mowing requirements and energy use.

Apply a fertilizer high in nitrogen and potassium and low in phosphorus.

Both nitrogen and potassium are important to leaf growth and color and root

growth. Potassium is also important to winter survival, disease resistance and drought tolerance. Phosphorus is essential but is required in much lesser amounts than the other nutrients.

A fertilizer with a 15-5-10, 12-4-8, or similar analysis is suited for the fall application.

Base the rate of application on the nitrogen content, the first number in the fertilizer analysis. Apply 1 to 2 pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn. So, with a 12-4-8 fertilizer, use 10 to 15 pounds per 1,000 square feet depending on when the last fertilizer application was made. If the lawn has not been fertilized for the past three months or longer, use the higher rate.

For the homeowner interested in an attractive lawn this fall and early recovery next spring, fall fertilization is a must.

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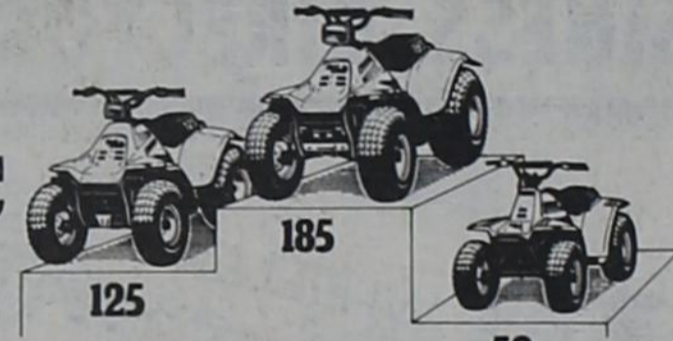

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DIABETES AND DIET

"LINES FROM LINDA"

Diabetes is one disease we are likely to see more of in our lifetime. According to the American Diabetes Association, the incidence of diabetes is increasing by about 6% a year. At this rate, infants born today have a better than 1 in 5 chance of developing diabetes by the time they reach 70.

One common image of a diabetic is a person who takes daily insulin shots, eats special foods and never tastes sugar. This image of diabetes and the diabetic diet is not entirely accurate.

Diabetes is characterized by the inability to process sugars and other carbohydrates normally. It occurs in all age groups from infants to the elderly, but the greatest incidence is among middle-aged or older adults.

About 80 to 85% of all diabetics are 45 years of age or older.

During the past decade, medical research has led to the discovery of new characteristics of the disease. It's now thought that diabetes is not one, but several diseases, possibly with differing causes and means of transmission.

Most people don't realize that diet is the key to controlling diabetes. The majority of diabetics do not need insulin. Older diabetics usually control their disease through oral medication and diet, or diet alone.

A diabetic diet is not particularly restrictive either. In fact, it is the kind of good, basic, healthful diet that nutritionists say we should all eat.

The American Diabetic Association currently recommends a balanced diet with food from the four major food groups and 50 to 60% of the total calories from carbohydrates.

The diabetic's carbohydrates should be mostly from starches such as potatoes, pasta and bread, and the intake of sugars and desserts should be limited. But diabetic diets do not require the kuse of the special no-sugar products you see in the grocery stores.

Diabetics must also regularly space their meals. The total calories for each day must be divided into at least three meals and often one or two regular snacks. The meals and snacks need to be balanced to contain some protein and fat as well as carbohydrate.

Along with diet, diabetics must be concerned about maintaining a desirable weight. Losing weight may help the overweight diabetic reduce his need for drug therapy, and improve his ability to tolerate sugars.

For diabetics, and non-diabetics alike, good nutrition plays an important role in maintaining good health.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin.

Soil Testing Important

Getting your soil tested has always been important, but, now this proven practice is more important than ever.

Making a profit, or in some instances, surviving in farming is more crucial now than ever before, so producers must get the most from their fertilizer dollar. Getting a profitable return from fertilizer depends on the supply of available nutrients already in the soil. A soil test can provide an estimate of this supply.

A soil test will determine which nutrients are deficient in the soil for a particular crop so that a producer can fertilize to supplement the soil supply. It's not profitable to supply nutrients already available in the soil in sufficient quantities for a particular crop or to supply added nutrients that the crop does not need or cannot use.

Now is an excellent time to take soil samples since soil test results can be obtained more quickly this time of the year due to a smaller volume than in the spring. And, once producers have their test results, they can order the fertilizer they need for the coming season.

So, to plan the best fertilizer program, get your soil tested now.

DEAR FOLKS:
It seems kind of lonesome since you've gone. This time of year I always feel kind of nostalgic anyway. Maybe it's the cooler weather, the fall skies, and the end of the growing season that help to bring about these feelings.

I close my eyes and picture beautiful Lake Michigan in fall. The shores once crowded with sun-bathers and children building sand castles, are suddenly quiet. They are deserted except for a hand-holding couple out for a stroll, and a stray dog dashing in and out of the surf. What a contrast there is: the miles of white sandy beach, the deep, dark blue water, and the orange-red glow of the sunset.

Fall in Michigan is special, all right. I remember nippy walks to school in colorful

plaid jackets, shuffling through ankle-deep leaves burnished in reds and golds. I miss the pungent scent of burning leaves, and the bonfires Dad used to set. Why, I even miss the crunchy taste of those raw potatoes that we jammed on a stick and poked into the fire. We were never patient enough to wait until they were done, and, because Dad said they were delicious, so did we.

Enough of this mood! It's time to decorate the house for fall—that should lift my spirits!

I put out a ceramic jack-o-lantern, a fat orange candle, and wax figures of a pumpkin and black cat. Then a red bandanna is spread out diagonally, with a straw cornucopia on it overflowing with glossy ornamental gourds. The final touch is the hanging of several ears of Indian corn on the wall with a bright plaid ribbon encircling them.

I step back to admire my efforts. Yes, it does look pretty good. My gaze wanders around the room. It takes in the durable, but comfortable, furniture with big squashy cushions on sturdy, dark wood frames. It sees the television and stereo with record albums ranging from The Imperials to Walt Disney, from Barry Manilow to Mickey Gilley. There's the beautiful needlework created for us with loving hands, the framed photos of seldom-seen relatives, the rows of books. Probably, the most fascinating of all, is our collection of western things—small covered wagons, a caricature of an old west sheriff and his trusty horse, a straw prairie woman, and volumes on Indians and the history of the West—a collection begun when the idea of living in Texas was not even a dream, much less a reality.

On taking this all in, it's remarkable that it has all survived day-to-day life with four growing boys!

Somehow, fleeting images pass through my mind of things that didn't survive: a shattered blue glass candy dish; the bent, bowing leaves of my Diefenbachia plant-rendered limp by a stray toss in a pillow fight; peanut butter and Kool-aid in new shag carpeting; and an anniversary rose pulled apart by pudgy, inquisitive fingers. I used to ache inside when some treasured object "bit the dust", until a friend once reminded me in our bible study that material things shouldn't be so important. "After all", she said, "the only things you can take to Heaven are your children". I thought of that phrase so many times for a lot of years. Now, suddenly, we're past that stage. The boys are growing up. They come in after school and notice my fall decorations. "That's nice, Mom!", "Hey, where'd you get this?", and "I like it!",

they say.
I listen to their enthusiasm and look at those four smiling faces. It reminds me of an old poem I've saved. I run for my bible and pull out the well-worn copy to read once more.

Yes, I know there are stains on my carpet,
The traces of small muddy boots;
And I see your fair tapestry glowing,
All spotless with flowers and fruits.

And I know that my walls are disfigured
With prints of small fingers and hands;
And that your own household most truly
in immaculate purity stands.

And I know that my parlor is littered
with many old treasures and toys,
While your own is in daintiest order,
Unharmd by the presence of boys.

And I know that my room is invaded
Quite boldly all hours of the day;
While you sit in yours unmolested,
And dream the soft quiet away.

Yes, I know there are four little bedsides
Where I must stand watchful each night,
While you may go out in your carriage,
And flash in your dresses so bright.

Now, I think I'm a neat little woman;
And I like my house orderly too;

 Now after four years in and out of hospital more times than can be counted, for years I can't remember how many times that all of us thought my mother would never make it through the night! But for some reason only the Lord knows, if there was ever a person that loves the Lord, this is my mother. Maybe he left her here for me, to teach me patience, kindness, tolerance, thoughtfulness for her, she deserves its very best of care, and for myself, I have never

been too good at any of the above mentioned.
 Years and years and years, she knew nothing but work, work, work! She raised a family, took care of both sides of grandparents, and any one else sick in town, this was a "god-given" gift to her. She loved it; when one was ill she knew what you needed before you did. She would come from the hospital, go to the garden, with her cane, start picking beans or etc. before she even came into the house, she even talked the doctor out of letting her come home from the hospital for a few hours, dressed 15 or 20 chickens, put them in the freezer, then back to the hospital exhausted!
 The garden, canning, heat,

surpassed tired-leg cramps so bad at night you wouldn't believe unless you saw it! Then each year begged three old kids to take canned stuff from the celler so she could start all over. For my dad and myself, this was about impossible to bear, watching her work like this, physically unable, but at the same time—"Her life!"
 Kinda got off my subject, didn't I? Now back to the lap robes, this being why I started this in the first place. But first I might mention my mother and I are completely different personalities. She loves the Lord and his deep preaching and teaching (as I do) more than any person I've ever known. Yet, I can remember ever hearing my mother really laugh aloud!

The lap robes are seen everywhere I go, to friends in town, even for ourselves, also California, the State of Washington and Oklahoma, the Canadian and Shamrock Care Center and Wheeler twice, also Parkview Hospital.
 When home from the hospital, she goes to work, putting robes together, so as she feels better she can work on them there, even though the doctor or nurses need to thread her needle. She had a lens implant as of November, hopefully, she can get her glasses.
 Isn't it wonderful what an 83-year-old girl can do if your tough enough? Reminds me of a very true fact. Back in the 1950's, some kind friend gave her a wild turkey to cook for Christmas—we had everything on the table ready to eat, started to carve the turkey, we could not make a dent, so we boiled it for hours, ran it through the food grinder, then gave it to the dogs, to this day I believe it was an old buzzard. Not that I am calling my mother a tough old buzzard, but I will say she is "as tough" as one!
 Now, I am sure I was left on her doorstep because I assure you none of this is any part of me. Bless her heart, she loves to share and to give her all! And has so-o-o-o much love for

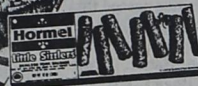
