## HOMECOMING ACTIVITIES FRI.

Homecoming activities began at Wheeler High School on Wednesday of this week; the high school observed "Western Day". Thursday will be "Black and Gold Day" and Friday will be "Dress Up Day". The "best dressed" will be selected Wednesday and Thursday.

The students will attend

school Friday in their "Sunday Best" for "Dress Up Day"; the day's activities will begin with the Homecoming assembly at 10:00. Jimmy Adams, a Wheeler High School graduate will address the assembly. The queens and their escorts will be presented at the assembly; the young ladies will present their talent.

The Pep Club will hold a "Pinning", following the presentation of the Queen candidates. Each Wheeler Mustang will be introduced and a member of the pep club will pin the young man. The coaching staff will be included. Friday afternoon at 2:20, the Homecoming Parade will assemble at the front of the school

and travel down Main street to the "square". The Queen Candidates and their escorts will be introduced on the west side of the square, and the 1983 Homecoming Queen will be crowned. This activity will be followed by a pep rally. Friday evening (5-7 p.m. at the school cafeteria) will be a Salad Supper sponsored by the

Mustang Boosters. The 1983 Homecoming Queen and her court will be introduced to the Football Fans at Nicholson Field shortly after 7 and prior to the game with the Lefors Pirates. The young ladies will be escorted by their fathers at this time.

## Mustangs Crush Phillips, 33-6

The Wheeler Mustangs opened their quest for the 1-A football championship with an easy 33-6 victory over a young and rebuilding Phillips last Friday night in Phillips.

Raising their record to 3-1 with the win, the Mustangs were able to get valuable playing time for their reserves in the second half as they built a commanding 26-0 margin at the half.

With Toby Collins leading the way with 102 yards, the Mustangs ground out 209 yards on the ground and a relentless defense led by senior tackle Manson Porter held the Blackhawks to a paltry 85 total yards in the contest.

Taking advantage of a partially blocked punt midway of the first quarter, the Mustangs drove 34 yards for their first TD with Collins going over from 3 yards out. Rodney Bond's kick was wide to the left and at 6:52 the Mustangs had a 6-0 lead.

Just four seconds remained in the first quarter when the Mustangs took advantage of another break, this one via a fumble recovery at the Phillips 35. Loyce Benefield got the

Mustangs second touchdown with a 23 yard run but the Mustangs failed to convert the two pointer and led 12-0 going into the second period.

Larry Trevino returned a Blackhawk punt 57 yards to give the visiting Mustangs another east shot at the end

zone and they capitalized quickly three plays later when Collins got his second six pointer from the 4 yard line. Bond's kick was good to up the score to 19-0.

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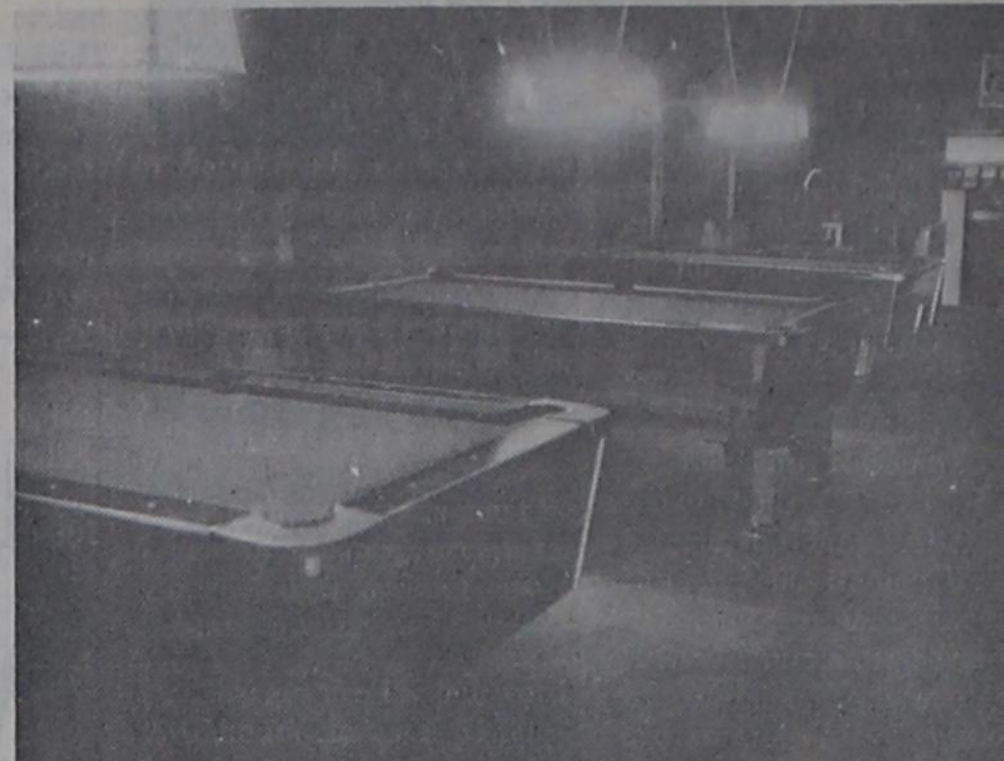

Over the years, millions of 4-H'ers have gained valuable leadership experiences and learned practical skills that have improved their quality of life.

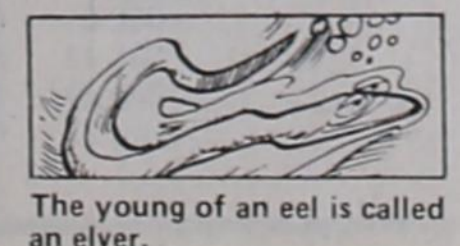
Today almost five million youth across the nation between the ages of 9 and 19 are gaining valuable learning experiences through 4-H-187,000 of those are in Texas. The Texas 4-H program reaches boys and girls through more than 2,000 community based clubs and another 900 short-term project groups.

4-H'ers are engaged in some 50 different project areas in which they gain lifelong skills through the program's "learning-by-doing" concept. These projects had their beginning 75 years ago when special Corn Clubs were organized for boys in Jack County. First focusing on such traditional areas as crop and livestock production and canning and sewing, 4-H projects now deal with a wide range of subjects, including small engines, rocketry and veterinary science—even the use of computers.

The 4-H program is conducted in each state through the Cooperative Extension Service and is backed by the state's land-grant university (Texas A&M University for the Texas program) and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

4-H is open to youth between the ages of 9 and 19 regardless of socio-economic level, race, color, sex, religion, or national origin. Some 22,000 adult and teenage 4-H leaders shoulder much of the responsibility for the 4-H program in Texas.

## THE MYTH OF SEPARATION OF CHURCH AND STATE

Proverbs 29:2, "When the righteous are in authority, the people rejoice; but when the wicked beareth rule, the people mourn." If a man could govern apart from his presuppositions (his basic religious beliefs) the truth quoted above would not be true. Nobody can make major decisions affecting law and morality in this country without involving his religious beliefs. Secular humanism is a religion. It has been so declared twice by the Supreme Court (which doesn't make it so simply because they say so — they have been wrong many times, but the point is that even they recognize that it is a religion). A definition for "religion" is "the quest for the values of the ideal life". Secular humanists teach that in this matter of determining values that there are no absolutes, no Diety to

They claim to be diverse and open to any and all differing opinions. The truth is they are hostile to the Bible and the God of the Bible. Religion cannot be separated from government.
