lost to anyone. The water in Sweetwater Creek is owned 60% by the State of Texas and 401/2 by the State of Oklahoma pursuant to the Red River reservoir. Compact. The Red River Compact was entered into between the Wheeler County Water Texas and the States of Oklahoma, Louisiana and Arkansas

The ground water in Wheeler County is owned by individuals with current record title. These individuals can do whatever they wish with those by any political entity, including the Wheeler County Water Supply District if approved by the voters.

In other words the election and approval of the Wheeler County Water Supply District and the temporary board, will have no effect on Wheeler

To the contrary, the bill Section 7 "(a) The district may acquire any existing water system, sewer system, or water and sewer system that serves all or part of the territory located inside or outside the district boundaries." The district will have the power to condemn any property it needs.

Further, if approved by the voters, the Water District will have broad powers, including the right to issue revenue bonds without voter approval. This means that the Water District could issue such bonds to finance the Sweetwater Creek Reservoir Project or any other project without going to

the voters first. Also, the Water District does have taxing powers. Subject to voter approval, the Water District can issue bonds which will be paid off by taxing





Receive Sales Tax Check

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday, July 14, sent checks totaling \$35.1 million to 974 cities that levy the onepercent city sales tax.

Wheeler County had recieved \$106,795.66 in the sales tax for the year; this money is shared by Wheeler, Shamrock and Mobeetie. Wheeler has received 32,503.30 to date in 1983 from the 1% sales tax: the most recent check was in the amount of \$1,910.29. Mobeetie has received \$9,158.88 for the year and Shamrock has received \$65,133.48.

The county-wide payments reflected a 16% decrease over the same period last year; the payments totaled \$127,155.32. With the July check last year, Wheeler had received \$41,308. 53; Mobeetie had received \$6,781.00 and Shamrock's portion was \$79,065.36.

"Our total payments to cities so far this year are still running about one percent behind last year," Bullock said in sending the July checks to the cities. "Texas was slow to enter the national recession and we are still lagging behind in the recovery. Most major Texas cities are beginning to show higher tax receipts than last year, but the border and oil and gas producing areas are still substantially behind."

Houston received the largest check-\$6.8 millionbringing this year's total to \$75.8 million, down 9 percent from 1982. Dallas' payment totaled \$4.2 million for a total \$45.9 million, up 8 percnet from last year. San Antonio's payment was \$2.1 million, putting 1983 receipts at \$22.6 million, a 8 percent increase.

Austin's July payment was \$1.5 million, bringing the year's total to \$15 million, 15 percent over last year. Fort Worth received \$1.3 million to put the city's 1983 total at \$14.8 million, up 8 percent from 1982. El Paso's check was \$798,000 with 1983 total

DRYCLEANING — WHAT IT CAN AND CAN'T DO

It's that time of year when many of us are cleaning out our closets, storing winter

clothes, and getting a bundle together for the drycleaner. While drycleaning can do a great deal to improve the appearance of many garments. it can't do everything.

According to the International Fabricare Institute. professional drycleaning is much more than just cleaning. It's many different operations performed by skilled people, all aimed at giving your garments a "like-new" appear-

Drycleaning requires reading the labels on garments for care instructions and determining precisely the type of fabric, weave and dyes that make up the fabric. The construction, color and degree of soiling must also be considered. Based on this information, the drycleaner removes spiles and stains with water and special chemicals.

Drycleaning also involves replacing sizing, water repellant and other finishes, and pressing the garment on steam equipment to restore its original shape. It can include replacing missing buttons, performing minor repairs, and packaging the garment neatly.

Although drycleaning offers many positive features there are some things that even the best cleaner cannot do. Some stains, for example, cannot be removed. The nature and age of the stain, plus the color and construction of the fabric may make a stain impossible to remove without causing dainage to the garment.

Drycleaning cannot correct manufacturing defects. Some colors may run or fade during drycleaning or stain removal procedures. This is caused by the manufacturer's failure to thoroughly test the dyes in solvent and water.


Another common manuacturing defect occurs when bonded fabrics separate as they come in contact with drycleaning solvents. Garments sometimes shrink because of the manufacturer's failure to adequately preshrink the fabric, as well.

Consumers may also create problems that drycleaners cannot correct. For example, drycleaning will not repair worn or torn areas caused by excessive wear and abrasion. When consumers use poor home spot-cleaning procedures, such as excessive rubbing or brushing delicate fabrics, or failing to rinse chemicals out adequately, there is little the drycleaner can in to correct the problem.

So before you take a load of clothes to the drycleaner, inspect them carefully. Know what you can and can't expect in the way of getting back garments that look "like-new"

The Wheeler School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 55c grades K-4 or 65c grades 5-12 and breakfast for 25c all grades.

To apply for free or reducedprice meals, please fill out this application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all question on the form. An application which does not contain the total household income, the names of all household members, social security numbers of all household members 21 years or older or a statement that the household member does not have one, and the signature of an adult household member cannot be processed by the

VERIFICATION: The information on the application may be checked by the school or other officials at any time during the school year.

REPORTING CHANGES: If your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increased by more than \$50 per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases.

REAPPLICATION: You may apply for benefits at any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now, but have a decrease in household income, become unemployed, or have an increase in family size, fill out an application at that time.

FOSTER CHILDREN: If you have foster children living with you, they may be eligible for these benefits. If you wish to apply for these benefits for them, please contact the school and they will help you complete the application.

NONDISCRIMINATION: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age, or handicap.
