4-H RODEO BEGINS THURSDAY, ENDS SAT.

The Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo is scheduled for Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, August 4, 5, & 6, at the Wheeler Riding Club Arena, Wheeler, Texas. The rodeo, which is sponsored by the Wheeler County 4-H Clubs and 4-H Texans Horse Club, is open to all youth who have not passed their 20th birthday at the time of the rodeo.

Entries are now being taken at the Wheeler County Extension office, Box 448, Wheeler, Texas 79096 (806) 826-5243. Books will close at noon, Thursday, July 28, and no late entries will be accepted. For entry blanks or other information, contact Don King, County Extension Agent.

Stock for the rodeo is being furnished by Bill Hext of Glazier, Texas. Trophies will be awarded for first through third place in each event and buckles will be awarded for All-Around in each division. Contestants must enter two

events to be eligible for All-Around.

This year, money is being paid back in the 15-19 age group instead of trophies.

The Pre-School and 6-9 age divisions will compete on Thursday night and all other age divisions will compete Friday and Saturday nights.

The following are the age divisions and events for the rodeo. Contestants may enter up to 4 events.

Pre-School: Stick Horse Barrel Race, Flag Race, Goat Ribbon Race & Sack Race.
Ages 6-9: Barrel Race, Calf Riding, Pole Bending, Flag Race and Goat Ribbon Race.
Ages 10-12: Steer Riding, Breakaway Roping, Barrel Race, Pole Bending, Flag Race, Goat Tying.
Ages 13-14: Bareback Ponies, Steer Riding, Breakaway Roping, Ribbon Roping, Goat Tying, Pole Bending, and Barrel Race.

Ages 15-19: Bareback Riding, Bull Riding, Calf Roping, Ribbon Roping, Breakaway Roping, Pole Bending and Barrel Race.

A jackpot steer roping will be held in conjunction with the rodeo this year. The steer roping is scheduled for 1:00 p.m. Saturday, August 6. The charge will be \$16.00 for 3 head. The roping is open to ages 9 through 18 years and will not count toward high point in any of the age groups.

The Allison Sohpomore and Junior classes will be in charge of the concession stand at the Wheeler 4-H Rodeo, August 4, 5 and 6. They will be selling; Hamburger, cheese burgers, nachos, nachos pies; drinks, Coke and Dr. Pepper, coffee, tea, lemonade; Sweets: brownies, krispies treats, cookies, popcorn balls; potato chips, sno-cones, dill pickles, suckers, bubble gum.

Mobeetie Students To Enroll August 15

Classes for the Mobeetie School will begin on Monday, August 15th, at 8:30 A.M. Buses will run and breakfast and lunch will be served in the Cafeteria beginning with the first day. Breakfast will be served beginning at 8:05 A.M. each morning.

Students in Grades 7-12 will enroll on Monday morning and will attend a full schedule of shortened classes on the first day. All parents with students in Grades K-6 are asked to pre-enroll their students on the afternoon of Friday, August 12th, using the following schedule: Kindergarten 1:00-1:30, First and Second 1:30-2:00, Third & Fourth 2:00-2:30, and Fifth and Sixth Grades 2:30-3:00. Students in these grades (K-6) that aren't enrolled on Friday will have to be enrolled on Monday, August 15th.

Water District Election Aug. 13

Wheeler county voters will go to the polls Saturday, August 13, to decide the fate of the Wheeler County Water Supply District. The election was called by the temporary

board at a meeting Wednesday, July 20.

The notice of election, resolution calling for the election and the proposition appear on page 7 of this paper.

The creation of the water district will be the first step in Wheeler County retaining control of the waters of Wheeler county. The district will have no taxing authority; this ability to tax would come from projects proposed by the district and would have to be voted on by the voters.

The election for the Wheeler County Water Supply District resulted from the signing of Senate Bill 436. The bill was signed into law on April 26, 1983. The legislation called for the appointing of a temporary board of directors for the district; one from each of the municipalities of the county and two from the county-at-large.

The temporary board took the "oath of office" with their first meeting Monday, June 13. M. Kent Sims and Dan Macina represent the county-at-large. Pete Burton, Woodrow Sims and Melvin May were appointed by the councils of Wheeler, Sharmock and Mobeetie respectively.

ABSENTEE VOTING UNDERWAY

Absentee voting is now underway in the election to decide the fate of the Wheeler county Water Supply District. The election will be held Saturday, August 13, with absentee voting continuing through Tuesday, August 10.

Individuals, who will be out of the voting precincts or unable to otherwise cast their ballots at their regular polling place on election day, may vote absentee by the office of the County Clerk in the courthouse in Wheeler.

The election on Saturday, August 13, is important to the future of Wheeler County. You are urged to vote absentee if you plan to be gone on the day of the election.

CHANGE IN TWO VOTING BOXES

Two voting boxes have been moved from their former locations; the change will be in effect for the Saturday, August 13, election, according to Thomas Daughtry, Wheeler County Clerk. The boxes, which have been changed, are voting number 2 and 7.

The voters in voting precinct 2 will cast their ballots in the Senior Citizens Center, which is located in the Nicholson Complex at the corner of Oklahoma and Canadian Streets. The old gymnasium had served for many years as the polling place.

The Twitty citizens, wishing to perform their civic duty of voting, will find the voting boxes at the home of Mrs. Lucille King. The King home is located on the Kelton Highway. The office of the Tindell Gin had been used for a number of years by the community.

These changes will be permanent.

DEVELOP HOME STORAGE PLAN

Today's trend toward smaller living areas means less space for storage. The purpose of storage is to provide a place for items not in use or until they are needed. But most of us have more items to be stored than space in which to store them.

A family storage plan can help utilize limited storage space more effectively. Start by assessing your storage needs. Take a close look at your family's size, composition and lifestyle.

Family composition makes a difference since storage needs change as family members grow and change. In planning for storage space anticipate changes that will take place during the next five years. You may need space to store games and toys right now, for example, but five years from now, you will need space to store teenagers' records and stereo equipment.

Lifestyle must also be considered when planning for storage. Consider storage for hobbies and recreational equipment, whether you live formally or informally and how often you entertain. All of these things will affect the amount and type of storage needed by the family. If you hate to dust and dislike clutter, for instance, adding open shelving for storage wouldn't make much sense. Examine your home's existing storage space next. Take note of the type, size and flexibility of the present storage facilities. Categorize facilities into built-in or portable storage. Now you are ready to match objects with available storage space.

Take an inventory of items to be stored. Solve part of your storage problem by cleaning out closets and discarding unused items. As you take your inventory, note the area where the item is normally

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Tracy Walker Returns From European Tour

Tracy Walker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Walker, Jr has just returned from a one month tour of Europe with a group of students from Pampa High School with the American Institute of Foreign Study. Seventeen youth from this area along with Mrs. Leta Olsen, their counselor, attended the tour for which they will receive 6 hours of college history credit.

The following is an account of the trip given to us by Tracy.

For several months before our departure, we met in Pampa once a week for classes on art and other social aspects of Europe. We embarked on our adventure on June 5th, flying from Amarillo to London where we cleared customs and then on to Amsterdam.

This capital city of Holland was our first treat. We viewed the many canals with their richly decorated homes of the past dotted along the way. One of the highlights of Amsterdam was the Rijks Museum which housed paintings by Rembrandt. The "Night Watch" was the most impressive to me.

On the fourth day we traveled via Cologne to Heidelberg. In Cologne we visited the first gothic cathedral in Germany, built about the 8th or 9th century by Constantine to house the Shrine of the Magi. On the way we traveled down the Rhine River in a boat from St. Goar to Bappard. The area was dotted with castles upon the hills reaching Heidelberg in the evening. After dinner we walked down to Heidelberg Schloss, built from the 12th to 16th century in a renaissance style.

From Heidelberg the group traveled to Munich where we viewed Nymphenburg Palace, which was the summer residence of the electors. It is the largest palace in Germany and took almost 100 years to complete. Also visited was the Arch of Triumph and King's Square along with the Olympic Village Salzburg, Austria was the next stop. This town grew up around Saint Peter's Churchyard and the catacombs. For 1,000 years it was the seat of the Archbishop of Salzburg who ranked among the most powerful princes of the Holy Roman Empire. One interesting trip was to Hellburn Pleasure Castle which was built in the 17th century for Archbishop Marcus Sitticus who loved to play jokes on his guests. There were hidden water fountains everywhere that would spray on you when you least expected it.

We went on a walking tour of the catacombs, St. Peter's Churchyard, Hehensalzburg Fortress, Residenz Square and Mozart's birthplace.

That evening we attended a Marionette Theatre for a production of "Feggero" which was entirely in Italian but interesting with the life sized marionettes.

For night entertainment the group visited a disco.

From Salzburg we traveled to Venice, Italy through the Alps, which are some of the most beautiful mountains you could ever see. Venice was a treat as it is a very beautiful city. St. Mark's square was visited at night so that all of

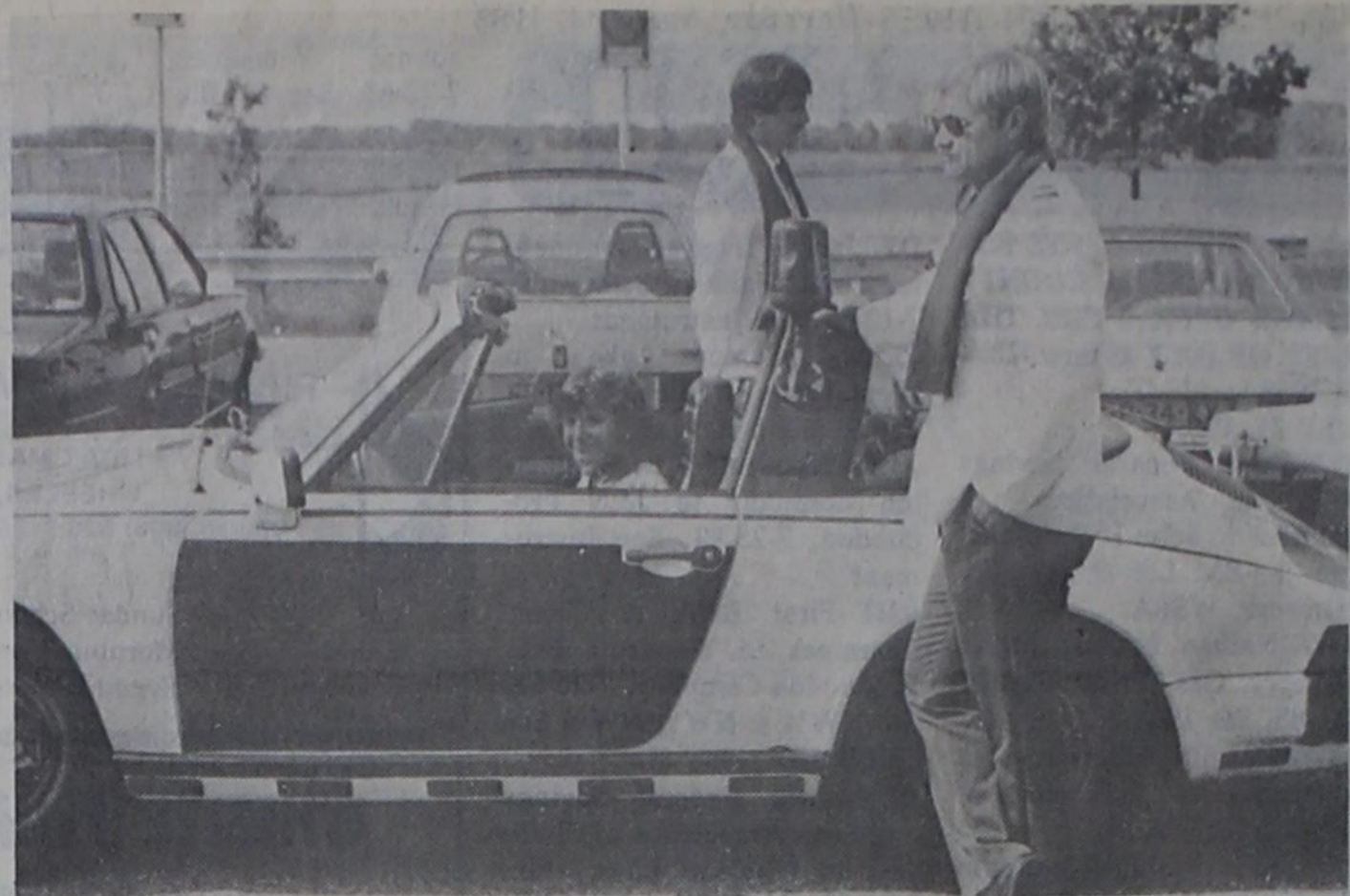

Roman Forum which wasn't quite as I expected. It was strange to see something that old mixed in with modern buildings. Then we went to the Colosseum. It was built between 72 A.D. and 81 A.D. by the emperors of the Falvian family and designed for public spectacle. It could contain over 50,000 spectators and was composed of a podium and three tiers of seats. This site gave me "goose bumps" to think of the history that it has. At the end of this tour we visited the basilica of St. Peter in chains. It was built in 442 to preserve the chains with which St. Peter was bound in Palestine and at Rome.
That night we went to Tivoli for a tour of the fountains of Villa D' Este, a beautiful site.
The next day was one of the highlights of the trip for me—our excursion to Pompeii and the Toile of Capri. The ruins of Pompeii which have been carefully restored proved very interesting and Capri is a most beautiful place. On this trip we rode a hydrofoil which was an experience in its own.
Upon return to Naples we had a day of rest and relaxation and being a typical girl, I did some shopping for clothes and gifts.
From Naples we went to Florence. One thing that shocked me about Italy was that there were communist signs and symbols everywhere. I am afraid that it may be taken over before too long which would be a great loss. In Florence we went to the Space Electronic Discoteque which is the largest in Europe. We also visited the Accademia Gallery where the beautiful statue of "David" by Michelangelo is housed. It was even more beautiful than I expected. The Church of the Holy Cross was

also viewed. It contains the tombs of various important persons such as Michelangelo, Rossini and Galileo.
The next day we drove to Milan via Pisa in Pisa, of course, we saw the famous Leaning Tower. From Pisa we traveled on into Milan and visited the Cenacle where Leonardo de Vinci's "Last Supper" is. This work was painted between 1494 to 1497. This painting is presently being restored and could not be seen very well. There were also other beautiful paintings such as "The Crucifixion" by Donatus in 1495.
After leaving Milan we drove into Leysin, Switzerland through the Swiss Alps. This was the most beautiful country we went to. Some of us went skiing and rode a cable car to the top of a mountain at Diablerets. The view from there was magnificent.
Paris was the next stop. We visited Concorde Square, the site of two of the guillotine scaffolds during the French Revolution. From there you could see the Palace of Justice which houses the French Courts of Law and was where Marie Antoinette was imprisoned.
From there we drove down the famous Champs Elysees viewing the Arch of Triumph, Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and a statue of George Washington, and the Eiffel Tower.
From there we visited Notre Dame Cathedral and on out to Versailles to view the Palace of Versailles and its gardens.
When we returned to Paris our guide took a few of us girls to a duty-free performance where I parted with some of

my money. That night 6 of us rode the metro down to the Eiffel Tower. We took the elevator up and saw a breathtaking view of Paris at night.
The next day we went to the Louvre where we saw the museum which housed the statues of "Winged Victory and the Venus di Milo". We then went to see the paintings of Leonardo di Vinci including "Mona Lisa" and "John the Baptist". It was there that I saw my favorite painting which was of Joseph and Jesus at work by Georges de LeTour.
The ex-editor of Paris Vogue Magazine gave us a talk on fashion and then we visited several of the famous fashion houses. They had some very beautiful things, but the prices were enormous. The following morning we attended a French cooking school and were allowed to taste the day's lessons.
That evening we went on a tour down the Siene River where we reviewed most of the sights as well as saw the French Statue of Liberty.
The next morning we left for our final destination. We drove down to Calais where we caught a cross channel ferry to Dover. We went by Canterbury Cathedral and on to London.

The next day we went on an excursion to Stratford-Upon-Avon where we visited Anne Hathaway's house and the birthplace of Shakespeare. We went to the Matinee at the Globe Theatre. It was "Twelfth Night" presented by the Royal Shakespearian Company. I really enjoyed it. It is a comedy and was very well performed. From Stratford we went to Oxford for a tour of the college and had dinner.
The following day we went on an all-day tour of London seeing the mounted guards, the changing of the guards at Buckingham Palace, the Tower Bridge, Westminster, Big Ben, Hyde Park, the Prince Albert Memorial and No 10 Downing St. We also visited St. Paul's Cathedral, the celebrated church where Charles and Diana were married. The Tower of London was also one of our stops. The Crown Jewels are kept here. The tower itself was built by Melvian the Conqueror to intimidate the locals. During its 900 years it has been the scene of countless numbers of tortures and executions.
The following day we rode out to Windsor, England to see Windsor Castle. There we saw

appearances a 1 over 2,200 foreign appearances before more than 4 million people. The philosophy of Florida is that "regardless of the country or religion, music is the common language."

This year the 16 Continental Singers & Orchestra groups will perform throughout all fifty states and American Samoa, Austria, Bahamas, Barbados, Belgium, Canada, Denmark, Fiji, Finland, France, Great Britain, Holland, Hungary, Indonesia, Israel, Italy, Jamaica, Japan,

Korea, Norway, Philippines, Poland, Puerto Rico, Singapore, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Taiwan, Tonga, West Germany, Western Samoa, and Yugoslavia.

Florida, President of Continental Ministries headquartered in Thousand Oaks, California, has perfected techniques to turn 320 singers and 200 instrumentalists into 16 professional-sounding performing groups in a short 10-day training period. Sound and lighting technicians and bus drivers also receive specialized training. While each member of the group has been rehearsing independently at home prior to coming together, the tour begins with an intensive rehearsal camp in the Los Angeles area, where they meet as a group for the first time.

Financing for this non-profit group is unique. Each

member raises part of his/her expenses on his own, the remainder being supplied by local churches and organizations.

They have recorded 12 record albums on the Word and Light labels, plus nine albums on Christian Artists Records. Their newest albums are "Dreamer," a musical based on the life of Joseph, and "Come Love the Lord," on Christian Artists Records (distributed by Sparrow Records).

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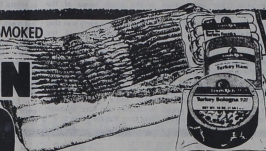
