4-H JUNIOR RODEO DATES

The Wheeler County 4-H Junior Rodeo is scheduled for Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, August 4, 5, & 6, at the Wheeler Riding Club Arena, Wheeler, Texas. The rodeo, which is sponsored by the Wheeler County 4-H Clubs and 4-H Texans Horse Club, is open to all youth who have not passed their 20th birthday at the time of the rodeo.

Entries are now being taken at the Wheeler County Extension office, Box 448, Wheeler, Texas 79096 (806) 826-5243. Books will close at noon, Thursday, July 28, and no late entries will be accepted. For entry blanks or other information, contact Don King, County Extension Agent.

Stock for the rodeo is being furnished by Bill Hext of Glazier, Texas. Trophies will be awarded for first through third place in each event and buckles will be awarded for All-Around in each division. Contestants must enter two events to be eligible for All-Around.

This year, money is being paid back in the 15-19 age group instead of trophies.

The Pre-School and 6-9 age divisions will compete on Thursday night and all other age divisions will compete Friday and Saturday nights.

The following are the age divisions and events for the rodeo. Contestants may enter up to 4 events.

Pre-School: Stick Horse

Barrel Race, Flag Race, Goat Ribbon Race & Sack Race.

Ages 6-9: Barrel Race, Calf Riding, Pole Bending, Flag Race and Goat Ribbon Race.

Ages 10-12: Steer Riding, Breakaway Roping, Barrel Race, Pole Bending, Flag Race, Goat Tying.

Ages 13-14: Bareback Ponies, Steer Riding, Breakaway Roping, Ribbon Roping, Goat Tying, Pole Bending, and Barrel Race.

Ages 15-19: Bareback Riding, Bull Riding, Calf Roping, Ribbon Roping, Breakaway Roping, Pole Bending and Barrel Race.

A jackpot steer roping will be held in conjunction with the rodeo this year. The steer roping is scheduled for 1:00 p.m. Saturday, August 6. The charge will be \$16.00 for 3 head. The roping is open to ages 9 through 18 years and will not count toward high point in any of the age groups.

CONCESSION

The Allison Sophomore and Junior classes will be in charge of the concession stand at the Wheeler 4-H Rodeo, August 4, 5 and 6. They will be selling; Hamburger, cheese burgers, nachos, nachos pies; drinks, Coke and Dr. Pepper, coffee, tea, lemonade; Sweets: brownies, krispies treats, cookies, popcorn balls; potato chips, sno-cones, dill pickles, suckers, bubble gum.

VOTERS TO DECIDE WATER DIST. FATE

Wheeler county voters will go to the polls Saturday, August 13, to decide the fate of the Wheeler County Water Supply District. The election was called by the temporary board at a meeting Wednesday, July 20.

The notice of election, resolution calling for the election and the proposition appear on page 5 of this paper.

The creation of the water district will be the first step in Wheeler County retaining control of the waters of Wheeler county. The district will have no taxing authority; this ability to tax would come from projects proposed by the district and would have to be voted on by the voters.

The election for the Wheeler County Water Supply District resulted from the signing of Senate Bill 436. The bill was signed into law on April 26, 1983. The legislation called for the appointing of a temporary board of directors for the district; one from each of the municipalities of the county and two from the county-at-large.

The temporary board took the "oath of office" with their first meeting Monday, June 13. M. Kent Sims and Dan Macina represent the county-at-large. Pete Burton, Woodrow Sims and Melvin May were appointed by the councils of Wheeler, Shamrock and Mobeetie respectively.


Some of the campers came a week before the festival with equipment to help the Mobeetie people, get all the mowing, spraying for insects,



Read the ads carefully, shop around, and check with the dealer about any limitations or conditions on attractive offers. Take steps to determine whether a dealer's special offer provides genuine savings and gives you the car and financing you want.

If you intend to buy a car and use any financing, try to answer the following questions in comparing and evaluating choices:

1. Are you required to pay a higher price for the car to qualify for the low-rate financing? Would the price be lower if you paid cash, or supplied your own financing from a bank or credit union?
2. Does the financing require a larger-than-usual down payment in the range of 25 to 30 percent?
3. Are there limits on the duration of the loan offered? In other words, are you required to repay the loan in 12 or 24 months?
4. Do you have to buy extra merchandise or services, such as rustproofing, an extended warranty, or a service contract to qualify for the loan?



As you can see, the interest rate is just one part of the total financing package. Other terms, such as the size of the down payment, affect the overall cost of financing. Before you choose your car and make a deal, find out about all the terms or conditions of the financing and about any other special incentives being offered.

After you have made the deal, read the purchase order and loan contract carefully before you sign. Check to see whether the advertised annual percentage rate is the same as the annual percentage rate on the loan contract. If they differ, get an explanation before you sign.

Careful shopping will help you decide what automobile and financing are best for you.

TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

How to Control White Grubs in Your Lawn

During the mid to late summer months there is little lawn enthusiasts fear more than the threat of white grubs. Though white grubs certainly are capable of severely damaging lawns, the real threat they pose may be exaggerated.

A key point to remember is that the odds are against a healthy lawn becoming a white grub victim. And though a lawn may have some white grubs, it may not be infested with enough grubs to cause noticeable damage.

Nonetheless, white grubs are a real concern in Texas. Here are a few things you should know about them.

The white grub is the larval form of an insect commonly called the May or June beetle. The larva feeds on the root systems of turfgrasses. This literally cuts off the plant's ability to take in water and nutrients, and if feeding is heavy enough, the plant may die. If the larval population is reasonably low, the plant may be able to replace the damaged root system fast enough to survive.

Probably the most reasonable approach to the problem is to be aware of any wilted areas in the lawn that do not respond to watering. The first sign of grub activity usually looks a lot like drought damage.

Remove about a square foot of soil from such an area and if there are more than 4 or 5 grubs, consider applying a chemical treatment like diazinon. Responding to the presence of damaging grub populations as quickly as possible.

In dealing with white grubs, here are some points to remember: 1) not all white grub species feed on grass roots; 2) white grubs may be found in most soils all year round; 3) wilting symptoms during mid to late summer may indicate grub damage; 4) populations should be over 4 to 5 grubs per square foot before using chemicals; and 5) a healthy lawn keeps the chances of grub infestation low.

SAFETY LEGISLATION

AUSTIN — Texas children under the age of five are dying in motor vehicle crashes at the rate of 90 a year.

The National Transportation Safety Board identifies Texas as leading the nation between 1978 and 1981 in the number of traffic deaths involving children four years old and younger.

Studies have proven that the use of child safety restraints of car seats can significantly reduce, if not eliminate, the risk of death for children in automobile accidents. Nevertheless, many parents don't place their children in safety seats because many consider them an inconvenience. It is estimated that only 7 out of every 100 children are properly restrained while riding in an automobile.

Legislators have heard many horror stories at the State Capitol about the staggering number of children killed and maimed in automobile accidents. Texas may be on the verge of enacting significant child safety laws during an anticipated second special session of the Legislature.

The Texas Senate approved legislation earlier this year which would have required Texas residents to secure children younger than four in a safety seat while riding in a car or light truck in Texas. The legislation did not pass during the regular session because the bill was never presented to the full House of Representatives for a vote. The Governor, however, has indicated he is considering placing a child safety bill on a second special session agenda.

The proposed child safety seat legislation would penalize Texas residents for transporting young children without the use of safety restraints. Proposed fines would be dropped if the person who is fined proves, within a certain period of

More than 20 states have approved child safety laws similar to the one introduced during the regular session of the Texas Legislature. The experience of other states has proven that child safety laws can save lives.

Tennessee adopted a child safety law in 1978. Since then, the rate of death in Tennessee children under four in car accidents has declined by 30%. Parents have taken measures to immunize their children against diseases which might kill them. They must also immunize their children
