If you do not believe in using your seatbelts while driving, seeing an accident like the one Friday morning should change your mind.

The writers of one of the advice columns which appear in the dailys was told by a patrolman that he had "never unbuckled a dead man". I believe this might have been an exception for both the driver and his wife on the passenger side. However, the boy is a different story.

The young man, believed to have been riding in the back seat, would probably have survived with some injuries, had he been "buckled in." With the collision of the car with the tractor tire, the boy became a projectile. It appeared he was thrown through the windshield and traveled some 50 feet before landing on the pavement. When the car came to rest, the boy's body was laying a few feet to the rear of the car. Had the boy been buckled in, the rear compartment of the car was in reasonably good shape.

The dog remained in the back seat, but was apparently thrown around and broken-up from the force of the wreck.

I would like to say "thank you" to the firemen who helped with the accident Friday morning. Their training in handling fires was not needed, but their help was needed in removing the victims from the wreckage.

And to my fellow ambulance volunteers, "thank you".

## THREE DIE IN CRASH

Three people died Friday morning following the collision of a car with a tractor and trailer. The victims were in the automobile and the driver of the tractor escaped injury. The 8 a.m. accident on highway 152 and 3 miles west of Wheeler across from Beef Cattle Co.

The victims were Ronnie Lloyd, 31, of Colorado Springs, Colo., his wife, Denise Lloyd, 26, and a nephew, Bruce Rogers, 11, of Little Rock, Ark. Mrs. Lloyd, a passenger, was killed instantly and Bruce, also a passenger, died at the scene; both were pronounced dead by Justice of the Peace Clark Reagan. The driver of the car was dead on arrival at Parkview. A german shepard in the car was taken to the Wheeler Veterinary Clinic and died within minutes after arrival.

The boy, apparently was riding in the back seat, was thrown either through the windshield or the sunroof. Steve Adkins of Wheeler was the driver of the farm tractor; he was traveling east with a large trailer loaded with manure. Adkins reported he noticed the car, traveling west, veering to the left as it traveled toward him. Adkins began pulling onto the shoulder to avoid the collision; but the car struck the rear wheel of the tractor and into the trailer. The force of the collision turned the car, a Pontiac Transam, a full 180 degrees and it came to rest behind the trailer turned in a north, northeast direction in the middle of the highway.

The Wheeler Ambulance and the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department were called to the scene. Fire extinguishers were used on the car before the departments arrived on the scene. Traffic was routed around the scene on county roads.

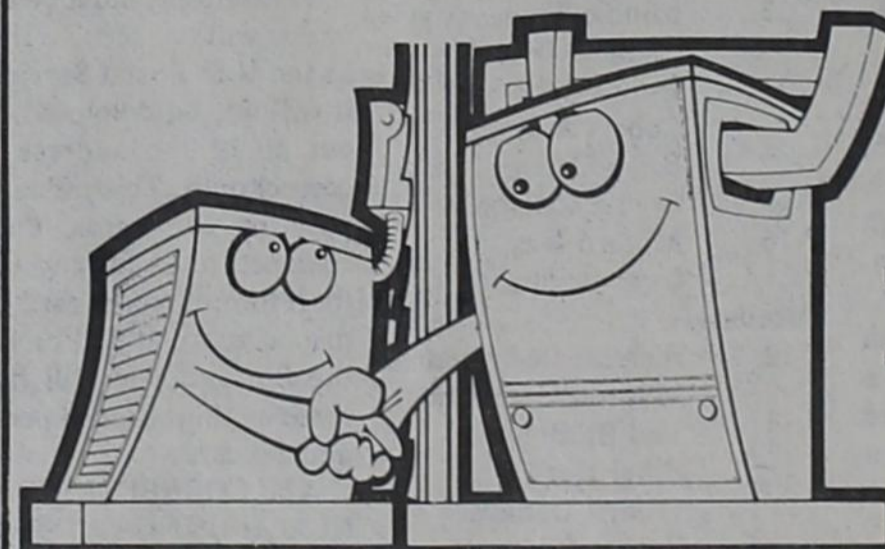

## Public Notice

Southwestern Bell, in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, hereby gives notice of the company's intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas, effective August 1, 1983, unless otherwise determined by the Commission.

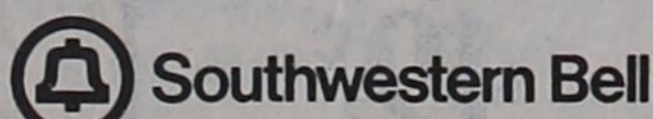
A complete copy of the new rate schedule is on file with the Texas Public Utility Commission (PUC) at Austin, Texas, and with each affected municipality served by Southwestern Bell, and is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices in Texas. The Commission staff has contended in the past that all rates are subject to change as a result of Southwestern Bell's rate application.

As a result of the settlement of a lawsuit brought by the U.S. Department of Justice against AT&T, Southwestern Bell, on January 1, 1984, (or as otherwise ordered by the United States District Court) will no longer be a part of the Bell System, but will be owned by public shareholders. Under the terms of the settlement, Southwestern Bell has identified 15 areas in the state within which it may provide service, and the federal court with jurisdiction of the settlement has tentatively approved these areas, called LATAs (Local Access and Transport Area). On or about January 1, 1984, Southwestern Bell can not provide service between these LATAs, and in addition, must transfer to AT&T customer premises equipment that it leases to customers.

Southwestern Bell has filed a proposed revised rate schedule with the PUC reflecting these changes. These rates would become effective August 1, 1983, if they are not suspended by the PUC; however, it is expected that they will be suspended and that the rates ultimately set by the PUC will become effective on or about January 1, 1984. If the rates were to become effective as filed, they would produce a 48.2% increase in Southwestern Bell's unadjusted test year revenues (or a 76.36% increase in Southwestern Bell's test year revenues adjusted to reflect the effect of Southwestern Bell's divestiture from AT&T). Any change in the rates for any interLATA services offered by AT&T or a subsidiary after January 1, 1984, could affect customers of Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

### Notice to Customers of Other Telephone Companies

While Southwestern Bell has proposed no increase in rates for intraLATA interexchange toll services, any change in those rates could also affect customers of other telephone companies. Southwestern Bell is proposing changes in the structure of the present private line and foreign exchange services. Changes in these rates may affect customers of other telephone companies. Any change in the rates for any interLATA services offered by AT&T or a subsidiary after January 1, 1984, could affect customers of other telephone companies.

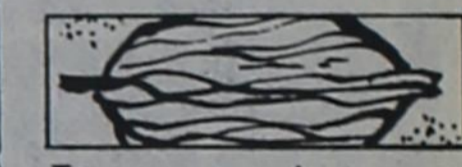

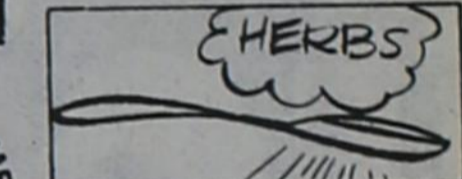

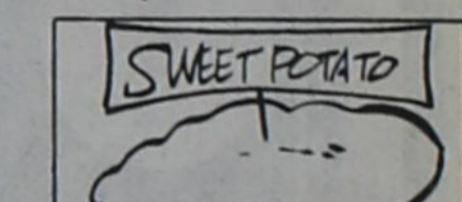
