The 1983 Ex-Student and Teacher Reunion was attended by 273 former students and teachers. The group enjoyed gatherings in private homes Friday and Saturday evenings, and a dance Saturday evening in addition to the gathering of the group at the school Saturday for registering, visiting, business and dinner.

Ex-Students and Teachers gathered Saturday morning for registration and the paying of dues. This took some time; everyone stopped to visit with an old friend or acquaintance as they worked their way through the crowd.

The meeting of the after-

noon began at 1:30. Entertainment was furnished by Happy Carol, Carroll Killingsworth of Canyon.

The honor classes were recognized and a representative of each class was given the opportunity to reminisce on their high school years. Charles Hooper spoke for the class of '45; with gas and tire rationing marring their high school years, they managed to have a good time and enjoyed an end of school trip to Lake Marvin. Burly Mann, class of '55, used the old annuals and reminded the group of 'nick' names which were popular at the time—some are still used. Jimmy Adams, class of '65, went back in time to his eighth grade prophecy. Kent Ware, class of '75, felt pride in having come from a small town and being able to return home and find a number of friends at almost any time.

Business of the group resulted in new officers for the 1985 reunion; the scholarship

given each year will be reworked. Serving the association for the next two years will be Danny Dorman, president; Jim Hill, vice-president; Bobby Ware, program chairman; Ida Goad, publicity chairman, and Peggy Ford, secretary; the mailing committee will consist of Brenda Mitchell, Fliptian Patterson and Donna Velasquez.

A committee was appointed to work on the annual scholarship fund. A tax exempt corporation will be organized for the purpose of allowing ex-students of teachers to make donations to the fund. The scholarship will be awarded "one year at a time" with the recipient eligible to apply each year for renewal. The group requested the present of the scholarship recipient at the reunion, if possible. Vic Bradford received a four year scholarship in 1981 and will be a junior at Texas Tech University this fall; the change in the awarding of the scholarship will be made with the awarding of the scholarship in 1985. The dues for the June 8, 1985 gathering will be \$10. A noon meal will be served instead of the evening meal. Defensive Driving Course Offered

The Wheeler County Farm Bureau will conduct a Defensive Driving Course in Wheeler during the first week of August for their members.

The eight-topic course in the DDC program utilizes films and discussions to teach people to avoid accidents despite the actions of others and the surrounding conditions by recognizing the hazard, knowing what to do and acting in time. Only Farm Bureau members are eligible to take the DDC course through Texas Farm Bureau. There are no age requirements. There will not be a test of driving involved. All students must have a valid Texas driver's license to qualify for the 10 percent insurance discount.

The principal driver who completes the eight-topic De-

fensive Driving Course will receive a certificate to be filed with the automobile insurance company, qualifying for a 10 percent discount on...bodily injury, property damage, medical payments and collision coverages where those coverages are afforded.

Total cost for a Farm Bureau member to enroll in the DDC is \$18.00. Because of enrollment limitations, registration is limited.

Water District Board Takes Oath

The Temporary Board of Directors for the Wheeler County Supply District met Monday afternoon for "swearing in" and organization. The group gathered at the Commissioner's Court to receive the "Oath of Office." They then adjourned to a room in the courthouse for the purpose of organizing and receiving a briefing on the organization of the district and the Sweetwater Creek Project.

Dam. A decision is to be made shortly. This money, if made available, will be at 6-6 1/2 percent. As a comparison, the state purchased 40% of Greenbelt lake and held it for storage; as the need for water increased, the storage was purchased by Greenbelt and the lake authority now owns the entire lake. This storage is available for purchase by other water users or the water district.

Meeting with the board were Fred Parkey, Jim Nichols of Freese & Nichols, engineering firm of Dallas, Frank Metternich of McCall, Parkhurst and Horton—a bond attorney of Dallas, and Rick Porter of First Southwest Co.—a bonding company of Dallas.

The voters of Wheeler County will decide the fate of the Wheeler County Water Supply District. The election is to be held within 180 days of April 26. This district will have no power unless the voters vote in favor of a project which requires the issuance of bonds; at this time, the board will have the power to levy taxes to pay for the bonded indebtedness. With no debt, the district will simply be organized when the voters decide it is needed. The water district would not control or regulate the use of water in the county; it would be the authority to deal with the state for water rights. The temporary board will announce the date of the election.

I would like to remind all the boys and girls between the ages of 5 and 10 that they are invite to join in the fun at the

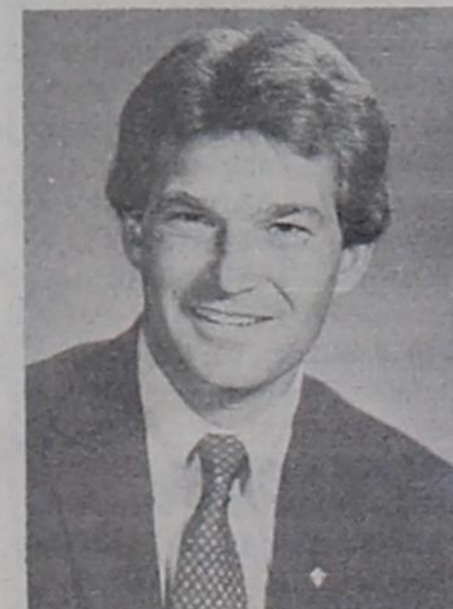

"God's Prison Gang" To Show

"God's Prison Gang," a newly release film featuring Al Capone's getaway driver, the last member of Bonnie and Clyde's gang and two other notorious criminals who have become Christians will be shown at Wheeler Nazarene Church, on June 19th. The showing is scheduled to begin at 3:00 P.M. and 7:00 P.M.

The film, shot behind the walls of New York's Attica prison, is hosted by Art Linkletter. It tells the story of how the work of International Prison Ministry is accomplishing what more guards, higher prison walls and greater financial expenditures have failed to do—keep released inmates from returning to lives of crime.

Telling their stories in the 44-minute film as George Meyer, Al Capone's favorite driver; Floyd Hamilton, (Public Enemy No. 1) the last of the Bonnie and Clyde Gang; Jerry Graham, the "robber king" of California; and Ted Jefferson, convicted of crimes from drugs and robbery to murder.

Also featured is "Chaplain Ray" whose Dallas-based International Prison Ministry has changed the lives of thousands of inmates over the past 18 years.

The Reverend Harold W. Moore, pastor of Wheeler Nazarene church, said he hope all citizens concerned about the problem of rising crime will attend the free screening of the film.



TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

How to Water Your Lawn During the Summer Months

Watering is one of the most basic practices in maintaining a home lawn, especially here in Texas where the summers are hot and dry. But there is a right way and wrong way to water a lawn.

Ideally, an established lawn should be watered just before it begins to wilt. Most grasses take on a dull purplish cast and leaf blades begin to fold or roll. Grass under drought stress also shows evidence of tracks after someone walks across the lawn. These are the first signs of wilt.

With some careful observation and experience, it shouldn't be too hard to determine just how many days a lawn can go between waterings. Common ber-

actually the worst time to water because the lawn tends to stay wet all night, making it more susceptible to disease.

Early morning is considered the best time to water. The wind is usually calm and the temperature is low, so less water is lost to evaporation.

When an established lawn needs to be watered, apply enough water so that the soil is wetted to a depth of 4 to 6 inches. The type of soil has a great deal to do with how much water is needed to wet the soil to this depth. For soils high in clay, an inch of water is usually necessary to wet the soil to the desired depth.

One good soaking is better than several light

sprinklings. If waterings are too light or too frequent, the lawn may tend to become weak and shallow-rooted which, in turn, makes it more susceptible to stress injury.

There is a great variation in the relative need for water between the turf-grasses, so keep this factor in mind when selecting a grass for your yard.

In general, avoid using soluble nitrogen fertilizers, since they tend to promote high growth rates which, in turn, increase the water requirements of the plant.
